Editorial Notes.

The Monitor Acadian announces that Rev. Mgr. Richard, of Rogersville, Northumberland county, N. B., has been appointed by the federal government an official to bring about the repatriation of Acadians. The newspaper pays a tribute to Mgr. Richard because of his colonization work, and says he is well qualified to carry it on to successful completion.

A newspaper is a town's way of letting outside people know that it is alive—a guide post whereby they can tell the city and the cemetery apart. Most every citizen of the town is willing to put up a slab to let the people know when he is dead, but there are entirely too many in every community who are trying to do business without taking the trouble to let anybody know they are alive. Moral: Don't let your epitaph be your first ad; there may be somebody who would like to do business with you.

The government has been busy in letting contracts for the construction of public works throughout the country. Many of the contracts have been large and many of them have been small. But every part of the country is being catered to and the promises of the government have been kept. This shows the difference in the policy of the present government as compared with that of the Laurier administration. Under the latter only certain parts of the Dominion favorable to the liberals were attended to. This has all been changed and a government for the people and by the people has been substituted.

Tourists and the Roads.

The governor of the state of Maine made some remarks the other day, touching the matter of good roads which are worth repeating and commending to the thoughtful attention of the people of this province. Governor Haines said:

"I have just returned from an automobile trip of 300 miles in New Hampshire, where I went to attend the Forestry convention, but I obtained more information in regard to highways than I did in forestry; I am satisfied that New Hampshire is several years ahead of us on this important question. In traveling over 300 miles in New Hampshire as I did, I think I went over half the distance on improved highways. Through much of the way I noticed the summer hotels. Nearly every farm house was entertaining summer visitors from other states of the union. These visitors to New Hampshire are the result of its improved highways, and not entirely the scenery and climate. This is a crop which needs no protection and does not need to be fertilized or sprayed to protect it from year to year. New Hampshire has no better climate and scenery than ours, and has no better prospects for the future. What we lack to bring the foreigner into our state for the summer is better development of our roads."

What is true of New Hampshire and true of Maine is equally true of Nova Scotia. If the roads of this province were in good condition many more touring parties would come this way in automobiles, and returns would be made to their friends of the charms of a summer sojourn in Nova Scotia. Tourist business pays large dividends, and good roads would greatly enlarge the traffic. But of course the greatest benefit from good roads would be reaped by our own people, especially the farmers, who would be able to market their products so much more readily and with so little wear and tear of their vehicles.

Cheap Fares to Toronto Exhibition.

In connection with the Canadian national exhibition at Toronto, which will be held this year from August 23rd until September 6th, the Intercolonial Railway will give very low excursion rates which will give the opportunity to many to visit the Queen City on the occasion of the great annual fair.

The Toronto fair is the largest and most attractive of annual exhibitions in America, and this year new permanent buildings have been constructed and its extensive boundaries enlarged by new structures. Aside from the attractions of the exhibition a visit to Toronto at this season is sure to be enjoyable especially in view of the very low rates prevailing. From Truro the round trip will be \$45.00 good going August 21st, 23rd, 25th, 26th and 27th and Sept. 3rd and 4th. A special rate of \$30.00 will prevail on August 22nd and 24th and on Sept. 2nd. All tickets are good to return Sept. 19th. Maritime Province travellers will have their choice of two through vestibuled trains, the Queen Elizabeth and the Maritime Express, both of which connect at Bonaventure station, Montreal, with the through Grand Trunk trains to Toronto. It will be well for intending travellers to apply early for reservations.

Canadian Immigration.

The other day I received a report of the Minister of the Interior for the department of Immigration. As I glance over its facts and figures, I am forcibly reminded of the growth of Canada.

In 1897 a total of 21,716 came into the Dominion. Ever since the numbers have increased until last year over 400,000 new settlers arrived in our country. Statistics as a rule are unattractive. But these figures on immigration should be of vital concern to us all.

If to-morrow morning we should wake up to find that eight cities, each as large as Halifax, had sprung up overnight, we would most assuredly begin to take notice. Yet this has virtually happened in Canada during the past year. A population nearly equal to that of Nova Scotia, was added to the Dominion in 1912.

Of the new arrivals, 150,242 came from the British Isles, 139,009 came from the United States, and 112,881 came from other countries.

One hears a great deal of criticism of the Immigration Policy pursued by the Government. Generally such strictures are based on ignorance.

For instance we hear of the scum of South America pouring into our country. But all such talk is bunk. Canada only advertises for and fosters immigration from Great Britain, the United States, and Northern Europe. Our Immigration Policy and that of the United States have, thank Heaven, been vastly different. Such new age of Europe as has been passing through Ellis Island for the past quarter of a century, will never pass through Canadian gateways.

It is not meant here to cast any reflection on the United States. They were pioneers in the field of Immigration, and they had to learn many bitter lessons before they found the best course to pursue. We, on the other hand, have profited by their example and have learned from them what perils to avoid. Accordingly our doors are closed against all undesirable classes.

I remember last fall in Edinburgh, hearing an immigration lecturer say that the only kind of people Canada wanted were those morally and physically sound, or as he vividly expressed it: "The only kind of settlers we want are those who are clean and strong, and are on speaking terms with God Almighty." A few days later hearing the lecturer I happened to be visiting the Colton Hill Jail. In one of the cells was a young man of superior appearance. According to his ticket he had been committed for a petty offence. He was ashamed of his position and said that immediately upon his release he was going to sail for Canada. But his plans were vain. A few weeks later he was held up by an official at the port of Glasgow because of his jail record.

Over 18,000 prospective immigrants were rejected last year as undesirable. Among the causes for rejections might be mentioned the following:—alcoholism, idleness, immorality, poor physique, prostitution, lack of funds, trachoma, vagrancy, and tuberculosis. In 1912 the government spent over a million dollars on the department of Immigration. Canada only advertises for farmers, farm laborers and female domestic servants. The methods adopted in advertising are different in different countries. Every immigrant seeking land at ocean ports is examined by medical and civil officers and those seeking admission from the United States are examined on the highways of travel on the international boundary line.

The Canadian government has no free or assisted passages. All immigrants are required to possess a small capital upon arriving, \$25 in the spring and summer, and \$50 in the winter. Asiatics are to possess \$200. Chinese pay a head tax of \$500. Japanese immigration is restricted by an agreement between the governments of Japan and Canada.

The Hon. George E. Vester prophesied in London last year that within half a century Canada would have a population of 50 millions. Very soon our immigration will be exceeding half a million a year. In the light of these facts we can better understand the wisdom of expending thousands of dollars in improving the permanent way of the D. A. R. and of investing millions on Country Bay in St. John and on the Ocean Terminals at Halifax. The Maritime Provinces are preparing for the best promise of the future. The finest blood of the strongest nations is pouring in to make our "last best West." We have a land of resources that will make us rich, a cold climate that will make us work, and we are drafting into our borders people worthy of such a heritage.

Intercollegiate Sports for the N. S. Provincial Exhibition.

ATHLETIC CONTESTS BETWEEN REPRESENTATIVES OF THE MARITIME COLLEGES WILL BE A FEATURE OF THE EXHIBITION AMUSEMENTS AT HALIFAX.

Among the great amusement features of the N. S. Provincial Exhibition, which will open in Halifax on September 3rd and continue for eight days, will be the great intercollegiate meet open to students of the Maritime Provinces. Last year there were competitors from four colleges—Dalhousie, St. Allison, King's and Acadia, the handsome cup offered by the Exhibition Commission being won by St. Allison.

In addition to the entries from the colleges mentioned there should be at the forthcoming Exhibition athletic representatives from St. Francis Xavier, University of New Brunswick and St. Dunstan's, P. E. I. It is expected that there will be entries from all these colleges and that these athletic contests will be keen and interesting.

The sports will take place in front of the grand stand with the horse racing and vaudeville will give gala entertainment. The list of events is as follows:—100 yds., 200 yds., 3/4 mile, 1 mile, 1 mile relay.

The entries for the horse races for all classes of exhibits close on August 16th but for intercollegiate sports the entries may be sent in any time before the opening of the fair.

An Expert Opinion.

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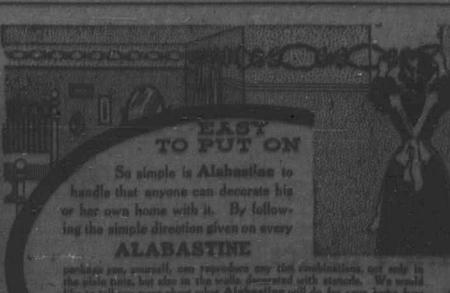
