AGRICULTURE IN NEW ENGLAND.

From day to day evidence accumulates that the advocates of unrestricted reciprocity with the United States are not alone in their views.

The Minister of Customs at Ottawa, on Saturday last, a package of papers from British Columbia, pertaining to the recent Behring Sea controversy.

A Quebec despatch of the 14th inst. says: Never for years past were wages so high as at present. The shoe factories are all on full time and ship laborers are so scarce that many ships in port are working short-handed.

The Senate court at Paris has found Boulanger guilty of conspiracy. Six senators did not vote. The court found Dillon and Rochefort guilty of complicity in the plot.

The North German Gazette, Bismarck's organ, referring to the impending meeting of the German colonial congress, says: "Angry protests against the action of the British officials are politically undesirable."

The cotton manufacturers of the Dominion have been in session, says the Montreal Times, and the report that the outlook for the future is good. This report was verified in advance by the Journal of Fabrics, which some time ago said that unless something quite unforeseen occurs, there is good reason to believe cotton manufacturers will have profitable business for some time to come.

These is another outcry in California over the Chinese immigration question. The restriction Act, which absolutely prohibited the entrance of Chinese into the United States, was pronounced legal, and the idea prevailed that, if enforced, it would finally settle the long-standing grievance. But a proposal to permit the Chinese to enter in bond, as it were, and pass through the country soon located up before the view of the excited Californians. This is claimed to be a dangerous design, and which will afford the Chinese a chance of evading the law and settling in the country.

An Illinois postmaster has written a funny letter to President Harrison.
