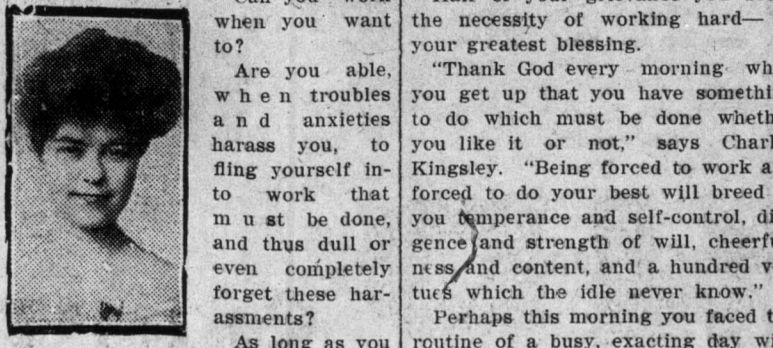

## Official Had a Hard Time.

Mr. J. W. Mitchell, Postal Telegraph Inspector, returned by the s.s. Prospero and again went north on her yesterday. He got off the Home at Brig Bay on Nov. 12th, installed a new telegraph office there, and at Flower's Cove, and then had to travel 100 miles, taking operator Matthews of Cape Norman and three men with him, also a team of 10 dogs drawing a komatiek on which was their instruments and gear. It took three days to cover the distance. On the second day out they were overtaken by a terrific snow storm. But that the exertion of beating a path for their dogs kept up the circulation, all must have perished. Often they had to desist for a while as they were nearly smothered by the drift. They only made 20 miles from daylight till dark and reached Boot Harbor completely exhausted and with their dogs scarcely able to crawl along. After resting that night they proceeded to Fogo's Harbor, near Cape Norman, leaving Mr. Matthews there. Mr. Mitchell here took nine dogs and two fresh men and started with a komatiek for St. Anthony, travelling across country, and crossed the bottom of Pistolet Bay, which was blocked with Arctic ice. At the entrance to Bartlett's River, up which they proceeded, dogs and men in crossing this ice went through, and how all were not drowned is a mystery. They beat their way to more firm ice and clambered out on the dogs' backs, then rescuing their fore-footed friends, and arrived at St. Anthony late at night after a miserable journey and with their clothes frozen to their backs and the dogs in a pitiable condition. The next day they started for Gritquet and arrived there safely, opening an

## Fell 19 Feet.

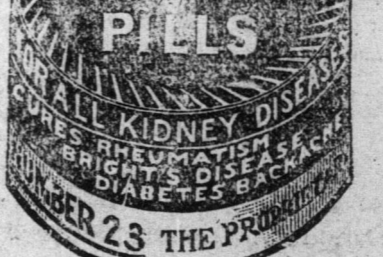

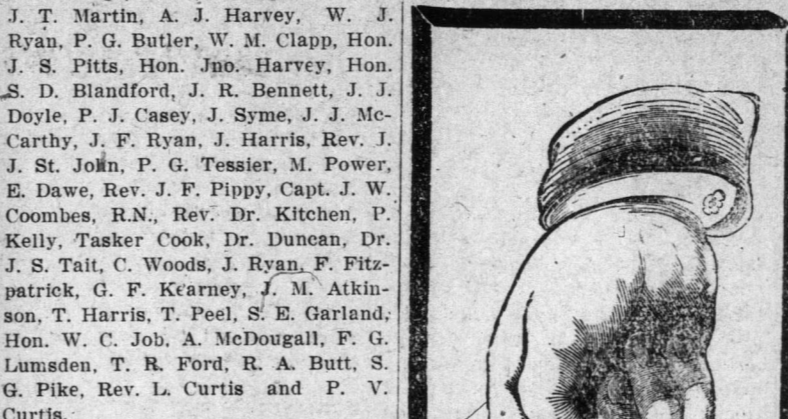

At the R. C. Cathedral.

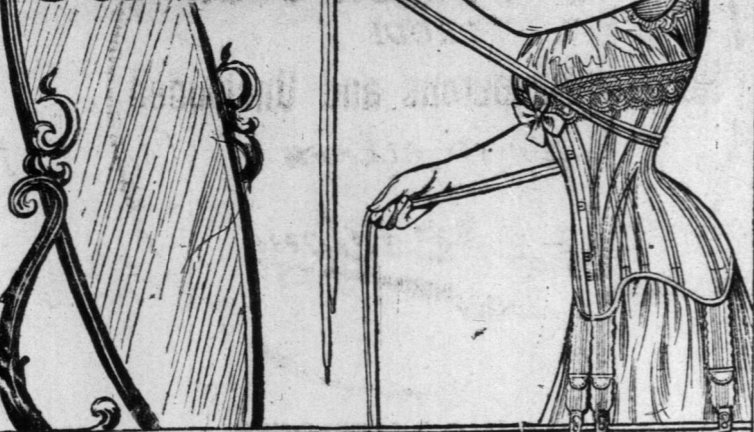

### Shipping Arrivals.

She brought 21 bags and 14 baskets of mail matter with 300 tons cargo and as passengers W. Mark and A. C. Jacobs, saloon, 3 intermediate and 2 steerage.

S. S. Almeriana. The S. S. Almeriana arrived here from Halifax yesterday morning after a run of 56 hours during which she had fair weather. The ship brought 1,000 tons cargo but no mails or passengers and sails to-night for Liverpool.

### Schooner Olive on Fire

At 6.35 p.m. Saturday an alarm of fire was turned in from box 31, bringing the Western and Central firemen to the wharf of A. Goodridge & Sons, where a blaze was raging in the cabin of the schr. Olive which was laying at the centre pier laden with fish. When the firemen arrived on the premises flames were shooting up the cabin companionway, while Capt. T. Doyle and some employees were trying to quench the fire by drawing buckets of water from the harbor and throwing it down into the cabin. The firemen soon had a stream of water from the plug near the premises on Water Street and in a short while had the fire quenched, but not before the cabin was pretty badly damaged, especially on the starboard side, where a lamp which exploded and caused the blaze was located. About 30 qts. of dry cod were in the cabin, with the same quantity more or less in a locker near, and this was considerably damaged by fire, smoke and water. Capt. Doyle was the only person on board the vessel, and just before leaving to go home to tea he turned down the lamp, which was set in a bracket, and went up the companionway, which he closed almost completely. As he left the vessel he suddenly heard a noise and noticed that a bright light illuminated the apartment. When he went to investigate he found the place in flames, and when Watchman Parrott saw this he notified Mr. Geo. Motty, who sent in the alarm. Besides gutting the cabin, in the fire destroyed Capt. Doyle's clothing, charts, nautical instruments and effects, and he loses much by the accident. All on the premises worked hard to save the vessel, which would assuredly have been destroyed but for the prompt arrival of the firemen.

**Another Bold Burglar.**

Saturday afternoon old Mr. Solomon Snow, shipwright, left his home in Rossitor's Lane, and on returning late in the evening was surprised to find that some stranger had been in the house before him as his rooms were disarranged, and on investigating he found that a trunk in his room had been opened and that all the money he had in his possession which he left there—\$15—had been stolen by the intruder. Who ever it was, forced the front door open without making much noise and unobserved by the neighbors and got away with the cash. The matter was reported to the police who are assiduously exerting themselves to catch this daring thief.

**Advantages of Gas.**

But the advantages of gas over the old-fashioned way of conducting domestic affairs is by no means confined to cooking. If instead of gently pulling that magic chain, which turns on the bright incandescent light, one had first to have ordered and taken in oil polished the pedestal of the oil lamp, cleaned the glass chimney, trimmed the wicks, lit the bowl with oil, one might cry out about the difficulty of doing the day's work, and the dreadful dearth of really reliable domestic servants. Geyers in a bathroom avoid all the disappointment of finding that the water is only tepid instead of being boiling hot, because the kitchen fire has been allowed to burn low after the cooking for the day is over. With a geyser all the trouble of stopping and building up the fire and keeping it at a certain height are unnecessary, one strike of the match applied to the burners is absolutely all that is needed for the attainment of a hot bath, and the water heats with great rapidity. Where there are young children, it is often of untold importance to have ready to hand the means of giving a hot bath in cases of sudden illness; so this is another point in favour of substituting gas for the oil method of heating, cooking &c. During the winter months gas fires also play a prominent part in lessening the labours of the housewife. It is satisfactory, after having been out for some hours, to be able, on returning home, to get all the benefit of a cheerful fire in an incredibly short space of time, without waiting whilst the wood splutters, and the coal frequently refuses to kindle. When unexpected visitors arrive, it is so easy whilst discussing the cheering cup, to set a match to the gas fire in the drawing room, and the temperature of the apartment having risen to a desirable height, the evening can be pleasantly passed in the enjoyment of music, for it is here that the piano usually finds a home.

By using the gas ring at the top of the cooker, a plentiful supply of hot water can be obtained for washing dishes, dusters and clothes; further, by obtaining flexible piping, the ever-useful gas-heated iron is at your service. But, it may be urged, is not all this gas rather an expensive item? Properly used, most decidedly not! Without its aid, assistance in the housework would in many cases, be absolutely indispensable. In conclusion, it must be said that to abstain from the use of what is such an important factor in the lighting of domestic drudgery is, to say the least of it, being a penny wise and a pound foolish.

**Dangerous Shooting Accident.**

We learn by the Prospero that a dangerous gunning accident occurred early last week in the upper part of the Arm of Anthony. A number of young men were skylarking there just before entering the house of a resident, an old man, who jocosely said that he would give the ringleader of the crowd, George Andrews, a good-natured rollicking fellow, a fright. As Andrews walked inside the door the old gent took down his gun from the rack and thinking it only contained powder, pointed it at Andrews with the muzzle at a comparatively low angle and pulled the trigger. With the explosion Andrews screamed and fell and the author of the accident became prostrated with fright. The load of heavy shot which the gun contained lodged in Andrews' thigh causing ugly wounds which bled profusely. The man is now in hospital. Our informants say that the doctor in that place fears he will have a hard task to extract the shot. Had the load took effect further up, the man would have been instantly killed.

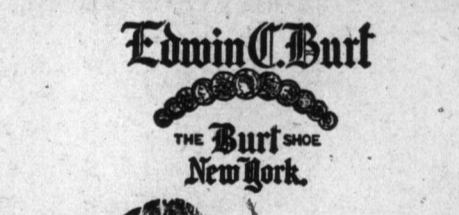
