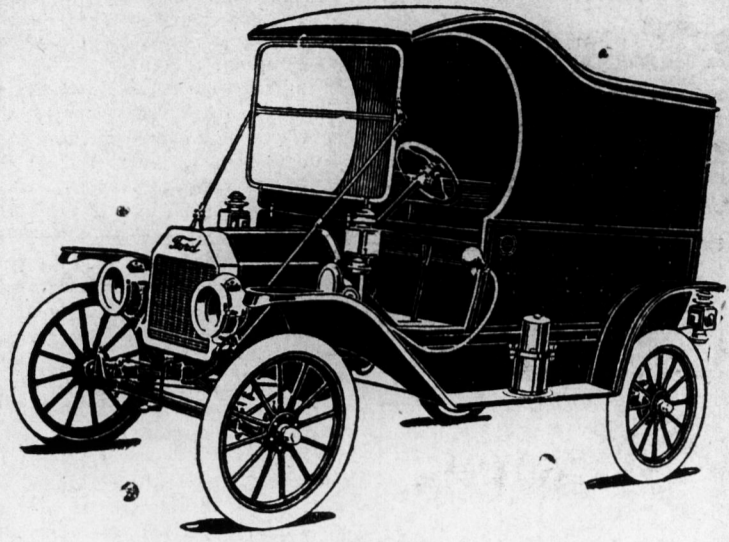


Parcel Delivery to Broad Cove and Portugal Cove.

Rebuff to the Governor.

It will be remembered that the day before the Governor gave his decision on the Morison Memorials for publication, he left the city and only returned on Saturday last. It seems to us, therefore, that now His Excellency is present in the city again, the time is opportune for renewing the comments which were in a large measure kept in abeyance during his absence.

Yesterday we drew attention to the conduct of the Government in taking the Fiona off her proper work to provide the Governor with a yachting trip, and recorded a fresh protest against the Fiona being converted into a pleasure yacht for the convenience of the Governor at a time when there was work for her to do in connection with bait and revenue protection.

Although we laid the blame in the main on the Ministry, who are officially responsible for trifling with the serious interests of the Colony, we pointed out that a measure of blame should be laid on the Governor for taking advantage of the compliance of weak, thoughtless and reckless Ministers; the conduct of one of whom he had under review at the time the Fiona was being specially prepared for his reception.

To-day we turn to another topic, the rebuff His Excellency received from the Secretary of the Colonies.

It may be remembered that after the presentation of the first Memorial to the Governor, His Excellency insisted that the Memorialist asked for the matter to be referred to the Secretary of State for the Colonies. He sent for him and endeavoured to obtain his compliance with what was wholly the Governor's own suggestion, and which was in no way the desire of the Memorialist. Mr. Coaker declined to fall in with the Governor's suggestion, and in the second Memorial pointed out in definite words that the Memorial was addressed to him, that his attention was drawn to the facts recited, his own deliberations were sought, and his own decision was required, and it was made clear to the Governor that there was nothing in the first Memorial which warranted His Excellency's suggestion, and that if he referred the matter to the Secretary of the Colonies it was entirely at his own initiative and wholly on his own responsibility.

The second Memorial, while raising no objection to any course the Governor should decide to pursue in the matter of reference, sets this matter in clear relief—disavowed the Governor's suggestion, and disowned all responsibility for the course

Cable News. Stars Defeat the C.E.I.

Special to Evening Telegram. SYDNEY, N. S., July 29. Edward Scott, was found dead at the Quarries of the Nova Scotia Company at Point Edward this morning. Scott was a native of St. John's, Newfoundland.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, July 29. Ernest Barry, the English champion sculler, defeated Richard Arnst of Australia, in a race over the Thames course for the sculling championship of the world. This was the first time in sixteen years that the world's sculling championship has been competed for on the Thames.

Special Evening Telegram. BRINZ, Germany, July 29. A shocking catastrophe, causing the death of a large number of German excursionists, occurred in a Baltic bathing resort. A landing stage which was crowded during a concert, collapsed and over one hundred people were thrown into the sea. A terrible scene of excitement occurred as the people on shore and those on the ruins of the landing stage endeavored to rescue the men, women and children struggling in the water. Twenty-six bodies have been recovered, but it is believed many more have lost their lives.

Special to Evening Telegram. TOKIO, July 29. Mutsuhito, Emperor of Japan, died today at 12.45. Acute nephritis was given as the cause of his death. He has been succeeded on the throne by the Crown Prince. Great crowds, which had gathered for days outside the park surrounding the palace till the end, are hushed in silence. Even after the death was announced they remained in the vicinity, the people looking at each other without uttering a word, seeming helplessly depressed. The Crown Prince is greatly overcome by the sad event, which has cast the nation into sorrow.

Special to Evening Telegram. PARIS, July 29. President Falliers returned to Paris today from Nancy to receive Premier Borden and the other Canadian Ministers at the Elysee, notwithstanding the sudden death of M. Ramondou. Secretary to the President, and the confusion arising therefrom. The visitors have been accorded a warm welcome by the press. La Siciele says: "England cannot but have sympathy with French Canadians in this undertaking. The greater love French Canadians have for France, the more freely will they contribute to the supremacy of the British navy. When the day of battle comes and British warships given by Canada are engaged in the North Sea, the French Canadians will be protecting not only the honor and interest of England, but the glory and security of France."

IN HARD GAME.

The postponed Star-C. E. I. football match was pulled off on St. George's Field last evening and attracted a large gathering of spectators. A meeting of these veteran teams was formerly looked forward to with increased interest and last evening's exhibition was no exception, as from start to finish the match was exciting and interesting. At seven o'clock the teams took their positions on the field, the Institute boys defending the western goal. The moment the referee sounded the "toot," beginning play the Stars controlled the ball with a desperate rush and for a while confined play to C. E. I. territory. The Stars were determined to score early and gave their opponents back rank a busy time of it. "Neddy" Power and "Neddy" Brophy played a rattling game in the Star forward line. The Institute boys increased their pace and worked east. Harris and Bartlett combined, the former shot within close range and a mix up followed. A corner was conceded the C. E. I. but during the scrimmage P. Harris received a kick in the lower part of the stomach and had to retire. He was sorely missed by his team as he was a fine player. F. Jones came on to replace him. Shortly after the Star forwards took possession of the leather and dashed west. Power, Ernest and Brophy. On resuming the Stars continued their rushes and ere long Brophy repeated the trick with the assistance of Power. No further scoring was done in this half. After changing ends the Institute boys were seen to better advantage but were not playing with the vim and determination of their opponents.
