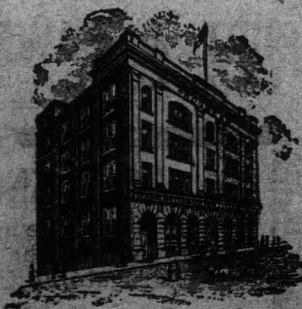

Northam grunted and eyed Percy with a kind of disfavor.

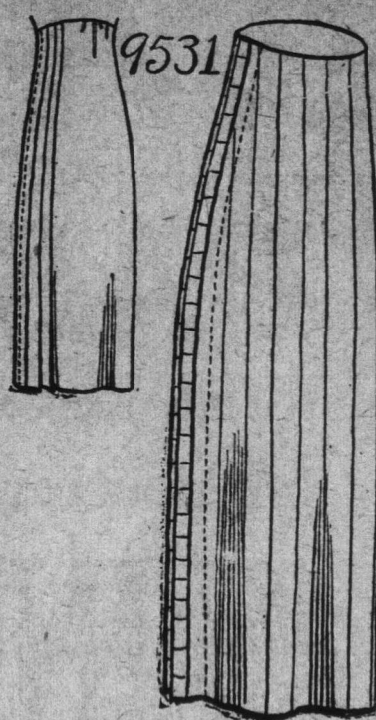
"Good-looking chap," he said. "Pity he can't swap fathers—beg pardon—his a friend of yours p'raps?"

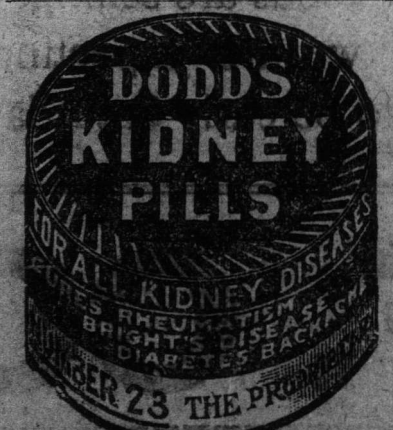

Household Notes.

Sponges are great germ collectors and should be scalded frequently. For a bad sprain, bandage the affected part then pour hot water mixed with two parts of vinegar, as hot as the patient can stand. To restore curdling mayonnaise, put a teaspoonful of melted butter in a round-bottom basin and gradually work in the mayonnaise. When mashed potatoes need extra thinning, if you have no cream, use butter, as too much milk makes the potatoes watery and dark. Cork linoleum is kept in good condition if wiped off daily with a cloth wrung out of tepid water and wiped once a week with skimmed milk. A plain hard varnish finish should be given to the kitchen linoleum once a year; apply the varnish very thinly. When dry, wipe over with milk and water. When the sewing machine becomes clogged, try cleaning it with the bicycle pump. You can blow the dust out of crevices which the cloth cannot reach. Mint sandwiches are excellent for supper or afternoon tea. Mince the leaves from two bunches, season with oil, vinegar, salt and paprika and spread between slices of bread and butter. If salt fish is required for immediate use it will freshen much more quickly if soaked in milk instead of water. Sour milk will answer as well as sweet. It is always better to trim the

selvedge from material before making into pillow cases. The cases will be much smoother, not wrinkling along the seams. Left-over pieces of Boston brown bread may be made into a palatable dessert by pouring over them a sauce made of maple syrup and chopped dates and nuts. To prevent the window shade from flapping when the window is lowered, place an extra set of catches for the shade about a foot lower than the regular place. Try wiping a greasy frying pan with a piece of newspaper before washing it. Much of the grease will wipe off and can be burned, thereby saving soap and labor. When sharp knives are kept with other articles in kitchen drawer, each blade should be protected with a sheath, which may be easily made from heavy wrapping paper. Sandwiches prepared in advance of serving time can be kept as fresh as when made by wrapping them in a napkin wrung out of hot water then placing them in a cool place. During the canning season, many women stand for hours stirring the fruit to prevent it from burning. If the preserving kettle is placed in a pan of boiling water it can cook all day without burning. A convenience in the kitchen is a set of kitchen knives, including four knives, one for onions, one for paring, one for lemons and the fourth for vegetables. On the handle of each knife is distinctly lettered the article for which the knife is to be used. To change the ticking cover on pillows shake the feathers all down; paste the upper portion of the pillow two inches below the top seam, then cut the top seam open. Back the new ticking to the opening; pull out the first basting thread and shake the feathers into the new ticking. White marble can be cleaned by putting a lump of soda the size of an egg into a pot containing half a pint of water and a tablespoonful of soft soap. Stand this pot in a pan of boiling water on a fire, allow it to get hot, and while hot paint it on the marble. Allow the mixture to remain on for a day or two, then clean it off with water and a soft dannel.

Eleven Hours of Boxing

London Outlook:—The thirty-third amateur boxing championship meeting was held recently, the yearly occasion that brings ambitious boxers from all over the United Kingdom to have a fling at each other. Several of the foreigners made a good show, notably the little Danish featherweight, Hansen, who smashed his way into the semi-finals, only to lose to the clever sixteen-year-old brother of "Sapper" O'Neill.

All five championships fell to London. The chief interest centred in the heavyweight. The first round matched Smith, the clever policeman who won in 1912, with Capt. M. P. Leahy, an old Dublin University champion, a stone lighter and four years older than Smith. Leahy was none the less always dangerous and made a tough fight, only to lose on points. Another policeman, by sheer weight and strength, defeated the big Frenchman Paoli and another fighter from Cardiff.

The Cardiff man was the better boxer, and both men had fought each other to a standstill by the end of two rounds. In the last four minutes neither was able to do more than stand, but weight and stamina told, and the policeman won. Good fellow, he had fought two terribly hard fights, with a broken nose and a dreadful eye. But, according to the spectators, he had stuck it out to clear the way for his comrade, Smith, to whom he gave a walkover in the final, leaving him champion for the second time.

An immense crowd of spectators gathered to see the show, which lasted eleven hours without a break.

Personal Interest.

In the House of Assembly yesterday a Bill, entitled "An Act to Incorporate the Conception Bay Electric Company, and for Other Purposes," was in Committee of the Whole.
"It appears that under one of the clauses of the bill, it was proposed to grant the Company the exclusive use of Collier's River for water power."
The Daily News this morning makes a report on the proceedings in these words:
"The bill to incorporate the Conception Bay Electric Company went into Committee, and a lengthy discussion followed. The principal opposition to it came from the members for Harbor Main, who objected to the Company being granted the exclusive use of Collier's River for water power. It was subsequently decided to omit this section from the bill, and the Company will have to apply for a special power in the ordinary way. The bill amended passed Committee stage, and will be read a third time to-day."
The feature to which we direct attention is the statement "the principal opposition to it came from the members for Harbor Main, who objected to the Company being granted the exclusive use of Collier's River for water power."
Now the presumption that arises in such cases is that every member who takes part in particular proceedings in the House of Assembly does so on public grounds, and not on personal grounds. This presumption is especially strong in the case of a member who takes a principal part in a discussion. This course of conduct is

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.
TORONTO, To-day.
Lady Thompson, widow of Sir John Thompson, Premier of Canada in 1892-94, died at a hospital following an operation.

ROME, To-day.
A change for the better in the condition of Pope Pius X. is absolutely certain. The amelioration was so marked last night that if no complications intervene, the speedy recovery of His Holiness to normal health seems practically assured.

MONTREAL, To-day.
The members of the Orange Order throughout the Province of Quebec and other parts of Canada are subscribing to a fund for carrying the Tremblay-Deputie marriage annulment case to the Privy Council. Prominent members of the Order stated there was no doubt but that the amount of money necessary for taking the case to the highest British tribunal would be forthcoming.

WASHINGTON, To-day.
The Senate's attitude toward President Wilson and the new tariff became faintly defined after another meeting with Democratic members of the finance committee. Briefly the Senate committee agree to accept view of the President as to free wool, one cent sugar with free in three years attachment, but will exercise the right to amend other schedules provisions tariff Bill. The fight against free wool becomes more acute at both ends of Capitol. Several State delegations House are appealing to Democratic Senators for support in fight to retain some of the duty.

LONDON, To-day.
As an answer to the Government's Cat and Mouse Bill, fifteen thousand pounds was added to our war-chest to-night, said Mrs. Flora Drummond, closing a suffragette meeting in Albert Hall over which she presided. It was the biggest meeting ever held by the Women's Social and Political Union. The subscriptions included two for £1,500 each from American contributors were Mrs. August Belmont, and Mrs. J. J. White, New York; Miss Scott Troy, San Francisco. Great laughter greeted the announcement of a subscription of half a crown accompanied by a box note signed by the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Lloyd George. The note read: "I have great pleasure presenting to you my first dividend from my Marconi Wireless share." Opening the meeting Mrs. Drummond said, "I am glad to see the message Mrs. Pankhurst would send us from Holloway jail, where she is unable to get out; light on it what we intend to do."

LONDON, To-day.
Indications of a peaceful Balkan settlement continue favorable. The Belgrade correspondent of the Daily Telegraph asserts that Serbia has decided on Russia's advice to withdraw all Serbian troops now investing Scutari. The international blockade of coast between Antivari and Drin River began at eight o'clock on Thursday morning. All ships within the blockade were allowed forty-eight hours in which to depart. The Russian Government issued a long document last night, explaining the efforts of the Powers to arrange a settlement of the Balkan problem and justifying Russia's consent to the annexation of Scutari to Albania on the grounds that this was necessary to preserve peace, because Scutari is purely an Albanian town, the annexation of which by Montenegro would create a source of embarrassment and difficulty, weakening instead of strengthening Montenegro. In the communication it is charged that King Nicholas broke an engagement into which he entered secure Russia's consent before resorting to war and adds, "Nevertheless the Russian Emperor, who was unanimously assisted, Montenegro to attain legitimately her aims, warned King Nicholas the pursuit of personal aims in respect to Scutari would only condemn his people to useless massacre. These warnings he ignored, apparently because King Nicholas believed that continued resistance would embroil Russia and the Greater Powers in European war."

How comes it about that Mr. J. J. Murphy is an applicant for this water power and having this personal interest in it, was discussing this very matter in the House of Assembly against clear parliamentary propriety?

At the House.

Yesterday several petitions were presented by Mr. Woodford, Hon. R. Watson and Mr. LeMay, for various utilities. Mr. Clift presented a petition from the members of the Fishermen's Protective Union, New Bay, praying for various public services and he gave the matter his hearty support.
Hon. R. Watson presented the report of the Select Committee on the petition of the Northern Electric Co. to be incorporated. The Bill was read a first time. The Speaker notified the House that the Council had passed the Dominion Trust Co's Bill, the Merchant Shipping and Medical Bills, without amendment. The Encouragement of Shipbuilding Act was passed with an amendment.
The Inter-Colonial Development Co., Public Service Bills passed their third reading and in Committee the Act to Incorporate the Conception Bay Electric Co., was opposed by the members for Harbor Main, who objected to the company getting the exclusive right to Collier's River, for water power. This section was then dropped from the Bill. Thus amended the Bill passed through the Committee stage and the House adjourned.

ROME, April 10.
The Pope rested calmer this afternoon than at any time since his collapse.

LONDON, April 10.
The C.P.R. Hamburg-American, and Austrian Companies have failed to reach an agreement and a further meeting may take place at Hamburg next week.

ST. JOHN, N.B., April 10.
The s.s. Ruthenia arrived from Trieste to-day, completing the first voyage of the C.P.R. new Austrian-Canadian service. She carried 700 passengers and 2,000 tons of freight.

CHARLOTTETOWN, P.E.I., April 10.
Premier Mathieson in his Budget Speech, showed that the \$83,000 deficit, and \$84,900 liabilities left by the Liberal Government, had been reduced by \$45,000.

PARIS, April 10.
The Paris birthrate for 1912 was the lowest since 1861, only one birth for every 30 families. The death rate was 14.3 per 1,000. Prohibitive rentals form the chief cause of the decrease in births.

LONDON, April 10.
The Duchess of Connaught was operated on this morning at Clarence House by William Arbuthnot Lane, Surgeon of Guy's Hospital. The operation was severe, but was borne well, and the Duchess is as well as can be expected.

BERLIN, April 10.
The British Government intends, after the conclusion of the Balkan War, to approach Germany with a definite proposal to drop naval ship building in both countries during 1914 and 1915, according to the Taegliche Rundschau. Winston Churchill, may, it is said, pay a visit to Berlin with this object in view.

NORFOLK, April 10.
An original cup defender, the yacht Pilgrim, owned by John Royal, was towed in here to-day, crippled by collision with the tail of the Horse Shoe Lighthouse. But for the prompt arrival of the tug Solicitor, the Pilgrim with her crew of twenty, might have sunk. She was bound from Portland, Maine, to Beaufort, North Carolina.

ST. LOUIS, April 10.
Dr. Albert von Hoffmann, of St. Louis, has directed an attorney in New York to apply for an injunction to restrain Dr. Friedman from claiming any contract disposing of his vaccine. Should he attempt to put his remedy on the market, Dr. von Hoffmann claims to have a prior contract for the commercial rights.

NEW YORK, April 10.
Thus far the year 1913 has been the most disastrous for half a century. The shipping losses are difficult to summarize, but Lloyd's reports say that the damage done to deep sea vessels alone would amount to \$7,000,000, exclusive of the coasting trade, which would add several millions. During January one agency reported the loss or partial wreckage of 328 sailing vessels and 510 steamers.

CALCUTTA, April 10.
A detachment of Chinese troops to-day attacked a battalion of police, attached to a British surveying party on the frontier of Burma. Hillmen in considerable numbers joined forces with the Chinese. The British column repulsed the attack but sustained a few casualties. Among the wounded is Sir Charles Bernard, Chief Commissioner and head of the Survey Party.

BRUSSELS, April 10.
Troops are occupying many industrial centres in preparation for the general strike ordered for Monday, when some 400,000 are expected to quit work. Large crowds are watching the arrival of the troops and cheering the soldiers. The Socialist leaders have offered the services of special constables from their own ranks, and say that any outbreaks may delay the cause of manhood suffrage for half a generation.

LONDON, April 10.
The suffragettes destroyed by fire an empty passenger car on a train proceeding to Kingston-on-Thames. The passengers in other cars were alarmed and indignant. The usual cannister was found. Just before the train reached Kingston a loud explosion occurred. A bomb was discovered by a workman, with the fuse burnt within an inch. He extinguished it. The cannister contained 16 loaded gun cartridges, pieces of jagged steel, bullets and scraps of lead. On the box was painted, "more to come; votes for women; give us the vote."

TORONTO, April 10.
The Globe says that there is no longer a pretence of fair play in the Canadian Parliament, and complains bitterly that Sir Wilfred Laurier was "choked down by a mob of opponents," after the Speaker had given him the floor. This, it states, is a black and ugly stain on every man from Premier down. The Globe says that no other course but closure was open. The Liberals will fight, but they will be confined to one speech. All amendments will be barred, and the passage of the new rules will be pressed from now on. This should have been done weeks ago, as the parliamentary machine had become ineffective owing to the laxity of the rules. Parliament was becoming a laughing stock and majority rule was disregarded. Worst of all this state of affairs was associated by a declaration that Canada was with the mother country in Imperial Defence. This declaration would have been more effective had it come from some joint action. This was now impossible, and the vote must go through. There would be loud protests at closure, but intolerable conditions could only be handled by strenuous methods.

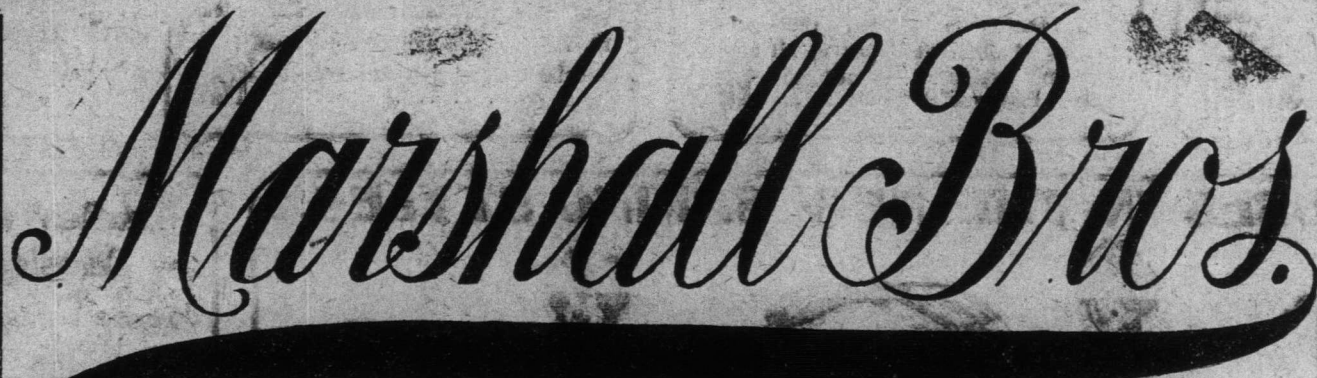

Our Coal Measures.

Editor Evening Telegram,
Dear Sir—This question of our
coal seams is becoming quite interest-
ing since Mr. D. James Davies,
B.Sc., F.C.S., has come into the dis-
cussion. I think Mr. Davies is
to the ranks of correspondents, it affords
me great pleasure to witness his ad-
vocate and to bid him welcome. We
cannot have too many talking on
such an interesting subject. The
number of letters attached to Mr.
Davies name should assure him an at-
tentive hearing.

Seeing that Mr. Davies has seen fit
to introduce a new element, i.e. that
of furnishing one's credentials, I sup-
pose in common decency, your humble
servant must produce his.

To begin with, I have no letters to
put after my name. It stands just
plain Arthur English, but I have
something to put before my name,
and that is nearly twenty years of
close attention to geology and kindred
subjects. My studies have not been
confined to one small field either, I
have left foot prints on nearly every
square mile of Newfoundland. I have
studied the typical developments of
the North American Continent from
the Atlantic to the middle West and
from the borders of North Carolina to
almost the North Pole. That is a
pretty wide field, and is the university
from which I have graduated, and
gives me, it gives no diploma,
but it offers many advantages to the
diligent student. For upwards of
twenty years, I have studied by day
in the field and at night have poured
over the very best text books to be
had. Beside all that I hold the I.C.S.
Diploma for Geology, Mineralogy,
Chemistry, Assaying and Prospecting.
That gives me one subject more than
Mr. Davies. Now that I have intro-
duced myself, I may go ahead, I sup-
pose.

It is quite plain from the outset
that Mr. Davies has not read my let-
ter of April 7th very carefully, for if
he had, he should have seen that I
made no attempt whatever to disprove
Mr. Howley's statements as to the
existence of commercial coal at or
near Grand Lake or elsewhere. I
meant to correct an error made by
Mr. Howley when he said that the
geological horizon of our coal seams
is equal to that of North Sydney, and
I think my words were plain enough.
To prove my position, I pointed out
that Mr. Howley's fossils are calami-
tes and died out in the Middle Cont.
measures. That proves quite clearly
to the reader that our coal strata are
not more recent than the Middle
Barren measures. It was pointed out
by me that the Cape Breton coal
seams are at the very top of the
carboniferous system, leaving a gap
of 8 or 10 thousand feet between our
coal strata and those of Cape Breton.

Mr. Davies has the characteristic
narrow provincialism of a great many
Englishmen, and introduces for our
guidance to the coal measures, se-
quences of horizons as developed in
the Old Country, at the same time
saying that the characteristics vary
from district to district. Mr. Davies
gets quite mixed in his arguments
when he speaks of the Permian. In
the first place he refers to the sys-
tem as the "so-called Barren Meas-
ures." They are not the barren meas-
ures, but are the Upper Barren Meas-
ures for the barren measures com-
prise the middle coal group, coming
in the middle of the sequence of the
coal measures. First in ascending
order from the base upwards come
Lower Productive Measures, then
Middle or Barren coal measures, then
the Upper Productive measures, and
lastly the Permian or Upper Barren
measures. Next Mr. Davies states
that granting that our coal seams do
not belong to the Permian, is an ar-
gument in their favor. Whilst not
contending at all for the Permian,
to not see the force of Mr. Davies' ar-
gument, when it is remembered that
the coal fields of Kansas, Missouri,
Illinois, Nebraska, Nova Scotia, New
Brunswick, Cape Breton Island, Col-
orado, Arizona, Utah, New Mexico
and California are referred to the
Permian system.

which Mr. Davies says are rather fa-
vorable to the supposition that exten-
sive coal seams occur. I beg leave to
differ with him. It has been pointed
out that calamities did not survive the
Barren Measures. Can Mr. Davies
really mean that the Barren Measures
and those beneath them are more
valuable than the younger seams.
Does he forget that the great coal
fields of Pittsburg occur in the Upper
Productive Measures, where no calami-
ties are found.

I think Mr. Editor, that I have
shown Mr. Davies that he has been a
little too hasty in coming into the
controversy. However, he is very wel-
come.

**LETTER FROM MR. COAKER TO
THE GOVERNOR.**

April 9th.
His Excellency
Walter Davidson, C.M.G.,
Government House, City.

Your Excellency—I wish to draw
your attention to an editorial note
contained in the "Guardian," pub-
lished at Bay Roberts, dated April 4th,
1913, in which reference is made to
me as follows:—

"Need we wonder that the doors
of the Government House and
of the Hall of the Fishermen's In-
stitute in St. John's, which, after quot-
ing 'him (meaning the writer) and
'those associated with him (mean-
ing the F.P.U.) and that the re-
fusal of the organization of our ex-ecutive
'Klag refused to receive you
'(meaning the writer) or coun-
'tenance the organization of
'which he is the head."

Will you kindly say whether this
statement is true, that you have re-
fused me admittance to the Govern-
ment House or refuse to receive me.

THE GOVERNOR'S REPLY:
Government House,
St. John's, Nfld.,
10th April, 1913.

Sir,—I am directed by the Governor
to acknowledge receipt of your letter
of the 9th inst., in which, after quot-
ing a passage from a local paper, you
enquire whether this statement is
true, that the Governor had refused
you admittance to Government House,
and refused to receive you. In reply,
His Excellency desires me to state
that you have not been refused ad-
mittance to Government House nor has
the Governor refused to receive you.
During the tenure of office of the pre-
sent Governor you have not presented
yourself at Government House.

2. The quotation has reference to
the occasion on the 12th ult. when two
political meetings were held
simultaneously in St. John's. It had
been announced for several days in
the newspapers that one meeting
would end in a torchlight procession
to Government House. A person in
your employ came to Government
House on the afternoon of the 11th
enquiring whether the Governor
would receive the procession; and to
him it was explained that the Govern-
or, being outside of all political par-
ties, preferred not to receive a pro-
cession which, on that occasion, was
of the nature of a political demon-
stration.

However, as the advertisement was
repeated in the papers, that evening,
the Governor made arrangements to
receive and entertain the leaders of
the procession, with the intention of
treating all persons courteously, but
also of adding that the reception must
be understood to have no political
signification. The procession, how-
ever, did not enter the grounds of
Government House.

3. The Governor hopes that it may
be understood by all, especially dur-
ing the discussions which precede the
general elections, that His Excel-
lency, by virtue of his office, stands
entirely apart from any question of
local politics or parties. It is desir-
able that all persons, writing or
speaking on such issues should en-
deavor to bear in mind that the Gov-
ernor stands apart from any ques-
tions connected with political parties.







Lusitania Out of Commission Until August.

Suffered \$300,000 Damages in Avoiding Collision With Booth Liner in Mersey.

Liverpool, March 24.—The big Cunarder 'Lusitania' in dock undergoing repairs to her turbines, which were seriously damaged when entering the Mersey. On her last trip from New York, the 'Lusitania' had reached the mouth of the river Mersey, on January 2, when she suddenly reversed engines to avoid a collision with a Booth liner. It is supposed the strain in reversing quickly was so great that the blades of four turbines were stripped away. When, after avoiding the Booth liner, she attempted to proceed up the river it was found that the propelling turbines would not work. In fact, that the vessel was helpless. Tugs were signalled for and towed her up the river. Passengers were disembarked by tender in mid-river and the vessel was hurried into dock. The company gave out a statement that owing to slight derangements of the machinery, the vessel would be unable to take her place the following Saturday according to the schedule. Closer examination revealed that the repairs to be made were very numerous, but then it was announced that the ship would be in dry dock only a few days. Now the extent of the damage is realized in full, and it is believed it will be August before the 'Lusitania' will be able to resume her sailings.

Actual repairs will cost \$300,000, while the loss of earnings is estimated at half a million dollars.

Mr. Nardini.

English News Notes

THE COURT MOURNING.

The orders for the Court mourning, which changes on April 9th and ends on April 16th, will in no way affect the season in London, which commences on April 21st, by which date their Majesties will observe only personal mourning, which does not interfere with State fixtures. Ireland is again unfortunate, as it will be remembered that the coal strike prevented the King last year from carrying out the plans for his visit there.

ENGLAND'S POPULATION.

In spite of the heavy emigration, the population of England and Wales increased in the ten years from 1901 to 1911, by a larger amount than in the whole of the eighteenth century, and is even now increasing by more than 100,000 a year.

FAR EAST ENTENTE.

The visit of Dr. Sun-Yat-Sen to Japan, is likely to have far-reaching effects on both the commercial and political situation in the Far East. The constitutional crisis in Japan has disclosed a democratic spirit in the nation, which would welcome a rapprochement with the world's latest democracy. China and Japan have mutual interests and to a certain extent are dependent on each other.

WOMAN SUFFRAGE.

This question will occupy the attention of Churchmen at the Church Congress, to be held this year at Southampton.

THE ALL-INDIAN MOSLEM LEAGUE.

The meeting of this League at Lucknow, is an event of more than usual importance on account of the intense feeling excited among Indian Mohammedans by the defeat of the Turks. In India religion takes precedence of nationality. The true believer cares far more for the faith he has inherited than for the country in which he was born. Seeing the downfall of the Turks, it is painful to them to feel that the Power they owe allegiance to (England) is unwilling or unable to help them, and it is only the common sense of the leaders of the Moslem community in India that has prevented the bitterness being expressed. The League recommended self-government for India.

CINEMA EXHIBITION.

The International Cinematograph Exhibition at the Olympia last month, sought to prove what that machine can do for Education, Science, Hygiene, Patriotism, Colonization and Religious Instruction. The completion of the photo play aspirants proved highly amusing.

RAINBOW FASHIONS.

Notwithstanding climatic drawbacks the Easter Sunday fashion parade at Hyde Park, brought many new color schemes. Not for many a season has there been such a wealth of color, warm.
