





NEWS BY CABLE.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, July 23.
Having tided over to-day's critical session of the Conference on the Ulster situation, and no rupture having occurred, has created a decidedly more hopeful view among the general public as to the outcome of the discussions between the statesmen representing the different parties. The Irish Nationalists, however, are still disinclined to commit themselves to any expression of optimism. Among the Liberals and Unionists there exists an impression that a settlement will be reached, if not by the conference itself, then outside of it. The Nationalists show less confidence in this point, and after to-day's meeting William O'Brien, the Sinn Fein leader, said: "I am none too sanguine of an agreement between them being reached. Finding a solution hinges on the discovery of a compromise as to the thorny problem whether the counties of Tyrone and Fermanagh shall be included in the area which the adherents of Carson and Ulster Unionists shall be allowed to vote as a whole on the subject of exclusion from control by the Dublin Parliament. The Nationalists are ready to allow, the four Eastern Counties of Ulster to vote as a single area, but claim that Tyrone and Fermanagh must be allowed to cast separate county votes as suggested originally by Premier Asquith."

NOME, Alaska, July 23.
The revenue cutter Bear, with Captain Robert Bartlett, master of the wrecked Stefansson expedition ship, Karluk, aboard, sailed to-day for the Arctic to take off the 18 white men and 4 Eskimaux of Bartlett's command, who are marooned at Wrangel Island, where they sought refuge after the ship was crushed in the ice off North Herald Island last winter. The Bear is carrying provisions to last nine months. Bartlett said the marooned men will run out of provisions about the middle of August. The Bear will make every effort to reach them before then.

VANCOUVER, July 23.
Shortly after 5 o'clock this morning, the Japanese steamer Komagata Maru steamed out of the harbor on her way back to the Orient. The Hindus on board made no demonstration, and the services of the militia, who spent the night on the wharf were not needed. The vessel was conveyed out of the harbor by the Rainbow, which will accompany her to a point off Vancouver Island. Two months ago to-day the ship arrived in Vancouver Harbor. Seven Vancouver Hindus have taken passage aboard the Komagata Maru. They declare they are going to India for the purpose of spreading revolution, as the result of the trials which the Hindus have undergone in Vancouver.

BISLEY CAMP, July 23.
Australia won the Kolapore Cup, one of the most coveted team-shooting trophies, with an aggregate score of 776. Canada was second with 774; England third, with 770, and India fourth, with 747. Canada lost the cup by the mistake of Sergeant Bullock, of Toronto, who at 500 yards mistook his target and placed the bullet in the wrong canvas, which did not count, Canada losing two points.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 23.
Five striking workmen were killed and eight wounded during fighting in the streets of St. Petersburg, between the strikers on the one side and the police on the other. The fight continued throughout the night, and only stopped at dawn this morning. Three police officers were injured. Official returns of the number of men, who quit work give the total as 120,000. These include street car employees, but do not comprise a large number of unskilled laborers in the building and other trades.

Should a statue of Madame Nordica be erected it will be one of a woman in New York and according to a recent investigator one of three women in the United States. Mrs. Harry Payne Whitney, it is understood will be asked to design the statue.

HONDURAS.

By GEORGE FITCH, Author of "At Good Old Swash."

Honduras is an American Republic about which as much is generally known as has been found out definitely to date about the Colorado labor war.

Central America harbors Honduras and has suffered more or less severely from it in the past. Honduras is one layer below Mexico, geographically and politically. It begins where Mexico leaves off on the map and in civilization and covers an area of about 50,000 square miles, being as disagreeable to the inhabitants as a heavy rash.

Honduras is a hot, moist country, which is as hard on white men as buckshot. It raises bananas and Hades with equal facility and exports what hard wood it does not use for government officials to the United States. There are over 500,000 people in the country, most of whom are Indians or half-breeds. All the people of Honduras are free and equal and can do whatever they please so long as they do not vote against the administration. The country has a fine constitution like its neighbor, but keeps it in a nice case, where it will not get soiled and never refers to it.

Honduras produces much gold and silver, but doesn't get it, itself. American and British companies mine it, while Honduras goes gaily on owing about \$100,000,000 in principal and interest on its national debt. Thus we see what statesmanship can do. The United States, with all its size, has barely been able to owe a billion dollars without incurring great hostility among the opponents of the administration, while countries like Honduras, whose inhabitants do not average one shoe apiece, can pile up one-tenth of that amount and owe it to European bankers at that. We should take lessons from Honduras.

Honduras has one railway line with an anaemic locomotive, some fine rivers, dense forests of mahogany, interesting ruins of the great Indian cities which flourished before the white man introduced his justly celebrated civilization into the vitals of the natives and a lottery company which advertised the country extensively in the United States twenty years ago. It has been a republic since 1821 and has waged great wars with Nicaragua and other Central American nations, in some of which fatalities have occurred.

LONDON, To-day.

The outstanding fact in the Irish situation is that the Home Rule Conference is still in being. The predictions of the whole Liberal and Unionist press of yesterday, that the Conference was on the eve of collapse, have proved false. After a protracted meeting, yesterday, the Conference adjourned until to-day. Meetings and discussions of various party leaders proceeded in the lobbies of Parliament last night with unabated activity, and moderate men like Lord Courtney, are working indefatigably in the direction of compromise. Hopes and fears fluctuate from hour to hour. One favorable sign is found in the fact that further consideration in the Commons of the Amending Bill has been still further postponed. This justifies the belief that the Conference will extend into next week. Another hopeful indication was the meeting of Unionist leaders, which was attended by the Marquis of Lansdowne, Earl Selborne, Marquis of Salisbury, Earl Halsbury, Earl Curzon, Duke of Devonshire. Liberals from the Premier down are working tooth and nail to find a solution of the Irish problem which will meet the views of the Unionists and the Nationalists. Should the conference fail they hope to reach the goal by other means.

LOURDES, France, To-day.

The second day of the Eucharistic Congress witnessed the first effort to get the 6,000 delegates divided according to nationality. Owing to the fact that there is no edifice here, capable of accommodating the entire Congress, and owing to the great diversity of language spoken, simultaneous sessions will hereafter be held every day in a dozen different churches. The session of the English speaking division was attended by Cardinal Farley, of New York and seven other Bishops who are representing England and the States.

ST. JOHN, To-day.

Two cars were overturned in the Market Square by a mob, after two hours of disorder, and set on fire. Finally the fire brigade put out the blaze at midnight. It was the most serious disorder in the city in forty years. The city was quiet by midnight. Troops will be out to-day. The trouble is mostly due to hoodlums rather than strikers, though the introduction of strike-breakers has precipitated many rows.

OTTAWA, To-day.

The Government is erecting a new wireless station at Cape Race, which will double the present radius of the station and make Cape Race the first point of land communication for all vessels sailing from or to North Atlantic ports. The new equipment will have a radius of at least five hundred miles instead of the present distance of three hundred miles.

OTTAWA, To-day.

His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught, left yesterday for a farewell tour of the West.

Death of Earl of Caithness.

Lived for Years in West as Plain John Sinclair.

New York, July 20.—A despatch from Los Angeles to the Tribune says a simple monument, arranged for by himself, was reared yesterday over the grave of John Sutherland Sinclair, who was buried beneath the pepper trees at Hollywood, a few days ago. It bore the inscription:—"John Sutherland Sinclair, C. F. T., Earl of Caithness."

The stone covers the body of the seventeenth Earl of Caithness, head of one of the greatest and oldest houses in Scotland. For three years the earl had lived here at the hotel Bilboa, and only two persons besides himself knew of his title.

For years he lived as a farmer in North Dakota, and always he passed as plain John Sutherland Sinclair.

The earl's family has had the earldom since 1542. The title now goes to John Sutherland Sinclair's brother the Hon. Norman MacLeod Sinclair Buchanan, who is wealthy. On inheriting the big estates of his uncle in Aberdeenshire, three years ago, the present earl changed his name to Buchanan. He has three daughters, but no son. There are two other brothers one a clergyman, and the other a lawyer.

Brings Mails By Aeroplane.

Sydney, N.S., July 20.—Aviator Guillaux brought the mails from Melbourne, South Australia, to this city, a distance of 400 miles, yesterday by aeroplane. He made the distance in five hours and twenty minutes, or an average of 75 miles an hour, during his flight, and at one time reached a speed of 105 miles. There was a heavy rainstorm during the flight. Guillaux received an ovation when he arrived here.

Will Meet in Toronto Next.

London, July 20.—The invitation of the Ontario government to the Imperial Union of Teachers to hold the second imperial conference in Toronto in July, 1915, was unanimously accepted at the annual gathering, presided over by Earl Meath on Saturday last, at Westminster. Dr. James L. Hughes, on behalf of Dr. Payne, minister of education of Ontario, extended the invitation, promising accommodation at Toronto University, side trips and other attractions. The decision was supported by Dr. Randall, principal of Winchester College, and by the chairman of the London County Council. The delegates from Australia, New Zealand and the Transvaal also acquiesced.

Posed for Years as a Man

Tampa, Fla., July 16.—Hiram E. Calder is dead at Orlando, Fla. Calder was for ten years a resident of this city and of Orlando, was known as a man and not until a few days ago, the supposed man was taken to a hospital, was it discovered that "he" was a woman.

Calder came to this city from Norfolk, Va., with a woman supposed to be "his wife." She died at Tampa two years ago. "He" had been living since then at Orlando.

For the entire decade Calder has voted regularly. "He" and his supposed wife were people of seeming refinement. On her death-bed the woman kept the secret. There is no clue as to her real name.

Munificent Bequests.

It is understood that the late Edward P. Cummins, who died on Tuesday last, has bequeathed quite a sum of money to the several charitable institutions in the city. We learn that according to a will made four years ago, the principal bequests are as follows:—Littledale Academy, \$5,000; St. Patrick's Church, \$2,000; Mount Cashin Orphanage, \$1,000; Convalescent Home, \$1,000; Association for Prevention of Consumption, \$500; Belvidere Orphanage, \$500; Home for Incapacitated, \$500; St. Vincent de Paul Society, \$500; besides a substantial amount for St. Bonaventure's College to assist in the education of young men studying for the priesthood. In addition to the foregoing, we also learn that many private bequests of a substantial nature have been made to friends in the city.

The Teeth and Health.

In fact, Preventive Dentistry is the name that describes it best."

"To whom will I go for this Preventive Dentistry?"

"Anyone may practice it, without a college training, a diploma or an elaborate set of instruments. Because, simply, it is building and continuing a habit. And this habit is catching."

"What is the habit?"

"It is the habit of keeping the teeth clean." The nurse then continued with emphasis: "The most wonderful event in a baby's life is the entrance of the first tooth. No event thereafter excites so much admiration or so much interest. Were one-half the admiring interest bestowed on that first tooth, worked up into practical tooth and mouth sanitation, four-fifths of the dental diseases would be prevented. Were you to keep your child's mouth clean from birth, washing it as often as the face, wiping its gums with linen gauze wrapped around your finger and dipped in lime water or lemon juice one part and water five parts, you would save your child and yourself a great deal of future trouble."—Dentistry, in Woman's World for May.

Ontario Issues Four and a Half Bonds.

We observe that Ontario is the latest of the Provinces of Canada to approach the London market with a Four and a Half per cent bond. On Saturday a prospectus was issued offering £1,000,000 in 4½ per cent stock at par. Nova Scotia, Quebec, Alberta, Saskatchewan, British Columbia had previously joined the group issuing Four and a Half Per Cent Bonds. It is somewhat singular that while the Canadian Provinces find it advisable to issue Four and a Half per cents, the different States of the Commonwealth of Australia, such as New South Wales, South Australia, West Australia, Queensland, Tasmania can issue Four Per Cent Bonds at much the same prices as the Canadian Provinces issue their 4½'s.

It is expected that after the settlement of the Irish and Mexican questions, money will be easier. It is said that investors are hoarding up immense sums afraid to invest at present. The Winnipeg water loan of \$2,000,000 was a rank failure, some ten days ago. Only \$60,000 was taken up by the public; \$1,940,000 of the stock being left on the underwriters' hands.

This morning we were shown a sample of the stuff at the Health Office. The stech from it was to say the least, unpalatable. We were informed by Dr. Brohm that the beef was totally unfit for food and should be destroyed immediately. We asked him what action he was taking in the matter and he told us that it was being dealt with by the Meat Inspector. We understand that the meat seized has been buried by Inspector Cook.

Reading Biography.

"Every day is a fresh beginning. Every morn is the world made new. You who are weary of sorrow and sinning. Here is a beautiful hope for you. A hope for me and a hope for you. Every day is a fresh beginning; Listen my soul to the glad refrain. And in spite of old sorrow, and older sinning, And puzzles forecasted and possible pain, Take heart with the day, and begin again."

Do you ever read biographies? When you go up to the public library and come back with an armful of books are they all fiction or is there occasionally a biography among them? Perhaps you can't see any connection between the bit of verse I have quoted and those questions. But there is.

For it seems to me that the last two lines of that glad refrain typify exactly what the records of the lives of our great men and women do for us. They give us new courage; they show us that weak human beings like ourselves handicapped by old sorrow and older sinning have still been able to make something worth while of their lives; they help us also to take heart with the day and begin again.

And lest that sounds too serious to attract you, let me also add that truth often really is stranger than fiction and that many of these biographies are filled with love stories, adventures and complications quite as interesting as any you will find in your novel or your magazine.

Toronto, July 17.—The will of the late Duncan McMartin, prominent Cobalt financier and real estate magnate, who died on May 2, last, was filed in the Surrogate Court here yesterday. The late Mr. McMartin was at one time president of the Hollinger gold mine, and a member of the syndicate of Canadians controlling the large share of the mining interests of the north.

Motor Car Driver Guilty of Negligence.

An interesting case occupied the attention of Judge Knight in the Central District Court to-day. Sir William Horwood sued Dr. Burden for damages in negligently driving a motor car on the 26th instant. Sir William and Lady Horwood while sitting in a street car were bespattered with mud which came in through the window of the street car from the motor car. The action was taken to have a pronouncement by the magistrates as to the rights of citizens generally to be immune from such like damage at the hands of motorists who tour our streets. The complainant in this instance did not seek monetary damage but intimated that proceedings were taken to be a caution to motor drivers, that whilst many inconveniences have been suffered by citizens, many of those so inconvenienced and injured had not, though feelings of delicacy or otherwise, brought the matter before the courts. The defendant was represented by Mr. Jas. P. Blackwood, who tendered an apology and payment of damages, but defended the case upon the principle that there had been no negligence. The Magistrate, however, held that the act itself of splashing mud from a motor car at such a height and distance into a street car was the best evidence that could be adduced, and commented severely upon the use by motorists of our streets with an utter disregard to the rights of the general public. As no damages were asked for, His Honor merely ordered costs with a brief fee to the complainant's counsel.

Address of Welcome

TO HIS GRACE THE ARCHBISHOP.
 At 8 p.m. yesterday the Roman Catholic Societies of the city accompanied by the C. C. C., T. A. Juvenile, and Adult Bands assembled at the Cathedral grounds to present an address of welcome to His Grace Archbishop Howley on the occasion of his return from his visit to the Holy See. Owing to the weather conditions that prevailed when his Grace came to the steps to receive the greeting of the vast numbers who had assembled, the programme had to be slightly altered. His Grace then retired into the Church and ascended the Throne, and a large number of priests from the city and outports were present in the Sanctuary. Hon. J. D. Ryan thereupon read the following address:—
ADDRESS
 To His Grace the Most Reverend M. E. Howley, D.D., Archbishop of Saint John's.
 May it Please Your Grace:
 On behalf of the Catholic Societies and community of St. John's, it is our privilege to tender to Your Grace a most hearty welcome upon your return from the Eternal City to your own See and our respectful assurance of the great pleasure it affords us all to feel that the Spiritual Head of the Catholic Church in Newfoundland has returned to the Archdiocese, which he has so wisely administered for many years.
 This is an occasion upon which the many and difficult labours so successfully undertaken by Your Grace and under your auspices, recur to the minds of all—the churches and schools you have built, your many services to the great cause of education, the restoration of our Cathedral and the many other works which are a perpetual memorial of Your Grace's zeal and devotion.
 We feel sure that Your Grace's efforts on behalf of the Archdiocese will be as fruitful of good in the future as they have been in the past. We trust that Divine Providence will, for many years to come, preserve you as our Archbishop and prosper the good works which you may undertake and in which you will be assured of the loyal co-operation of all for the good of the Archdiocese and the advancement of the Church in this Country.
 In tendering you this expression of the devotion of our Catholic people towards Your Grace in person and towards the Church which you so worthily represent, we venture to express the hope that your visit to the Holy Father will have the effect of strengthening that loyalty to Holy Church and the Apostolic See which has ever characterized the Catholics of Newfoundland.
 Signed on behalf of the Catholic Societies and the community of St. John's, this twenty-third day of July, A.D. 1914:

Barron, President Holy Name Society (St. Patrick's); Joseph Partridge, President Christian Doctrine Society; C. O'Neil Conroy, Lt.-Colonel Catholic Cadet Corps; John T. Fitzpatrick, President St. Joseph's Institute; C. P. Eagan, Grand Knight, Knights of Columbus; J. L. Slattery, Chairman of Committee; Vincent P. Burke, Secretary.
 After the address had been read His Grace left the Throne, and proceeding to the altar steps, expressed his sincere thanks for the reception accorded, and felt that the address was a beautiful manifestation of the loyalty of those present and all Catholic citizens to the Church. Referring to the awful calamity that had occurred during the sealing voyage, His Grace said that it was long after the event that he heard the news, and while he felt the deepest sympathy for the afflicted ones, he knew that an assurance was unnecessary as he had left a worthy representative behind, Rt. Rev. Mons. Roche, who, he felt, would do all that was required. As for himself he remembered the people in his daily Mass.
 He pleasantly referred to the great work done by the Christian Brothers in Rome, where they have over 1,000 students, a remarkable number in a Latin country. Speaking of his visit to Ireland His Grace said that at his call at the schools in Tralee the band played the Banks of Newfoundland as a welcome, and a pleasing feature in this respect was that the teacher of the band was Brother Power, a native of this city, who went away with the Christian Brothers who first visited the country.
 His Grace was in Ireland for the passing of the Home Rule Bill and in speaking of the issue said that he thought of this side of the Atlantic. He stated that he thought the messages to the Press were greatly exaggerated statements, and that the country which is now flourishing will yet attain its second amongst the Nations and regain its ancient prosperity.
 He then imparted the Pontifical

blessing given him by His Holiness the Pope. The bands in the Cathedral grounds then rendered several selections and a display of fireworks was given, after which the gathering dispersed.

NEWS BY CABLE.

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, July 23.

Having tided over to-day's critical session of the Conference on the Ulster situation, and no rupture having occurred, has created a decidedly more hopeful view among the general public as to the outcome of the discussions between the statesmen representing the different parties. The Irish Nationalists, however, are still disinclined to commit themselves to any expression of optimism. Among the Liberals and Unionists there exists an impression that a settlement will be reached, if not by the conference itself, then outside of it. The Nationalists show less confidence in this point, and after to-day's meeting William O'Brien, the Sinn Fein leader, said: "I am none too sanguine of an agreement between them being reached. Finding a solution hinges on the discovery of a compromise as to the thorny problem whether the counties of Tyrone and Fermanagh shall be included in the area which the adherents of Carson and Ulster Unionists shall be allowed to vote as a whole on the subject of exclusion from control by the Dublin Parliament. The Nationalists are ready to allow, the four Eastern Counties of Ulster to vote as a single area, but claim that Tyrone and Fermanagh must be allowed to cast separate county votes as suggested originally by Premier Asquith."

NOME, Alaska, July 23.

The revenue cutter Bear, with Captain Robert Bartlett, master of the wrecked Stefansson expedition ship, Karluk, aboard, sailed to-day for the Arctic to take off the 18 white men and 4 Esquimaux of Bartlett's command, who are marooned at Wrangel Island, where they sought refuge after the ship was crushed in the ice off North Herald Island last winter. The Bear is carrying provisions to last nine months. Bartlett said the marooned men will run out of provisions about the middle of August. The Bear will make every effort to reach them before then.

VANCOUVER, July 23.

Shortly after 5 o'clock this morning, the Japanese steamer Komagata Maru steamed out of the harbor on her way back to the Orient. The Hindus on board made no demonstration, and the services of the militia, who spent the night on the wharf were not needed. The vessel was conveyed out of the harbor by the Rainbow, which will accompany her to a point off Vancouver Island. Two months ago to-day the ship arrived in Vancouver Harbor. Seven Vancouver Hindus have taken passage aboard the Komagata Maru. They declare they are going to India for the purpose of spreading revolution, as the result of the trials which the Hindus have undergone in Vancouver.

BISLEY CAMP, July 23.

Australia won the Kolapore Cup, one of the most coveted team-shooting trophies, with an aggregate score of 776. Canada was second with 774; England third, with 770, and India fourth, with 747. Canada lost the cup by the mistake of Sergeant Bullock, of Toronto, who at 500 yards mistook his target and placed the bullet in the wrong canvas, which did not count, Canada losing two points.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 23.

Five striking workmen were killed and eight wounded during fighting in the streets of St. Petersburg, between the strikers on the one side and the police on the other. The fight continued throughout the night, and only stopped at dawn this morning. Three police officers were injured. Official returns of the number of men, who quit work give the total as 120,000. These include street car employees, but do not comprise a large number of unskilled laborers in the building and other trades.



Chicago Sleuths Shot.

Clash Between Two Branches of the Police Partly to Blame.

Chicago, July 17.—With one detective dead and three wounded as a result of a revolver battle last night in Chicago's vice district, officials reported closed, police officials attempted to-day to untangle the accounts of the fatal affray between members of the department.

The dead detective, Stanley J. Birnes, was a member of the regular plain clothes force. John C. Sloop, Birnes' partner, was shot through the thigh, Joseph Merrill and Fred Amart, detectives of the morals squad, were wounded less seriously. James C. Carroll, who said he was an investigator and railway fireman, also was wounded.

In the investigation by Chief Gleason, two facts appeared to stand out viz., that the killing and wounding of the policemen were precipitated by a gang of levee characters, and that many of the volley of shot fired came from weapons in the hands of the gangsters.

The affray was possible because the morals squad men, Merrill and Amart, and Carroll, who was not a member of the force, did not recognize Birnes and Sloop. Merrill and Amart had been policemen but a short time. They had just raided a disorderly resort, and sent a wagon load of prisoners to the station. A gang of levee hangers-on followed and hooted Merrill and Amart. Stones and bottles were thrown, and the detectives drew their revolvers. Birnes and Sloop ran up to disperse the mob. "Look out, they have guns!" some one cried. Then the shooting began. Merrill declared that the first shot was fired by a man in the crowd who dodged behind a woman.

The morals squad had been sent unexpectedly into the district to make raids unknown to the regular police squad, who had also been ordered on the same errand.

Joseph J. Lannin.

Britton was the challenger last year and Friede the defender.

The racing on Gravesend Bay to-day was a run, a reach and a beat, for five miles in each race, morning and afternoon. The wind was fairly steady, about ten miles an hour from the northwest. In the morning's race, Friede's margin was five minutes. In the afternoon, he covered the course in the elapsed time of two hours, 4 minutes, 46 seconds, finishing nearly seven minutes and a half ahead of Britton. Two out of three races was to decide the winner.
