GREEK CABINET RESIGNS.

ATHENS. Nov. 4. Following defeat in Parliament to- bians at present. lay, the Cabinet resigned. The im ediate cause of the defeat was a remark made by War Minister Yanaki tas, which was considered by former Premier Venizelos as insulting to the National Assembly, Venizelos demanded an immediate apology. Zaimis declared the Government \stood behind the War Minister and denanded a vote of confidence. Discussion of proposed military laws, the correspondent says, raised a question between the Minister of War and the majority of the party of the former Premier Venizelos. On this issue Caimis decided to ask for a vote of confidence. The discussion then turned on the foreign policy of the Government, whose policy, he considered, harmful to the interests of the country. All the party leaders engaged in the discussion. The final vote was 147 against, Government 14. The Athens newspapers which re opposed to Venizelos consider a ssolution of parliament certain.

GREEK CABINET CRISIS.

ROME. Nov. 4. Commenting on the Greek cabine risis, the Giornale d'Italia says: ogic seems finally to have triumphed. Venizelos should return to pow-er, but in Balkan affairs any surprise can be expected.

GREECE GROWS UNEASY. SALONIKA, Nov. 4.

According to information secure rom Greek sources-believed to be eliable-King Constantine has assured the French Minister at Athens tha hould Roumania join the Entente illies, or should the situation in Ser bia be appreciably ameliorated by an Anglo-French offensive movement Greece will not be unprepared to change her present attitude. Reports of Russian troops landing at Varna have made a deep impression here.

VENIZELOS ACCLAIMED. LONDON, Nov. 4.

A General News correspondent at Athens says that after Premier Zai-mis had handed his resignation to the King, the Chamber of Deputies again assembled. There was a striking demonstration in honor of former Premier Venizelos.

WOMEN SOLDIERS. LONDON, Nov. 4. There were nearly two thousand There were nearly two thousand women in Serbia's army when I left. Women soldiers were being organized, said Dr. Gruitch, a Serbian army doctor, now in London, to-day. The women are not special battalions. Some wore the complete uniform of the soldier for the sake of comfort, others wear skirts with blue trainer. hers wear skirts with blue tunics. The younger women go with their brothers or husbands; they are women of every class of the population.
We cannot prevent them from serv-

ing. They inspire the men with whom they march side by side, and with whom they move shoulder to shoulder in the trenches. These wonen are not afraid. Nobody in Serbia is afraid, and the women rankers do not lose their nerve under fire. We realize the great power of our friends in the war. Every soldier feels we are only part of a world army, and, if it is necessary, that our army shall be lost, well, it is only a part. There is time yet to save Serbia, but assistance for her cannot come too quickly.

THE FIGHTING IN THE BALKANS

LONDON, Nov. 4. An artillery duel is in progress all day to-day at Valandovo in the Strumitza region, between the French and Bulgarians. The Serbians are reported to be retiring in good order from Tetovo before a superior force. In Dabuna Pass, which protects the road to Prilip and Monastir, the Serbians are continuing to repel furious assaults by the Bulgarians. Generally speaking, the despatch says, the situation of the Serbians is extremely critical, but if they are able to hold out a little longer, the situation will take on an altered complexion. Further reinforcements of the Allied troops are being moved rapidly for-

PARIS, Nov. 4. Landing of French troops at Salon-ika continues without incident, according to an announcement made this afternoon by the French War Office on operations in the east.

This means that the vote cast in the West End District was over 2321 and as 1945 is sufficient to give a 40% vote in this district, it is possible it has been

In the East End district, the city vote is said to be about 1900. The figures for Bell Island and Pouch Cove, Torbay, Middle Cove and Outer Cove are not available. The population in these places is two-thirds of that in the city limits of this district. and if these external voters have voted in the same proportion as in the city, it would mean that over 3,000 votes were cast, which would leave a chance of a 40 per cent. vote being

reached in the city. The figures for Conception Bay, so far as they are available, seem to indicate a voting of about 44 per cent. of the electorate, which leaves a very small margin for a 40 per cent. vote in favor of Prohibition. 



Hennebury, of the Nfld. that he wrote to his parents on the very same day that they received the official notification of his being wounded. In his letter he says that he was wounded on Sept. 28th. While advancing to the firing line, a shell burst quite near him and a piece of shrapnel entered his right thigh. He was attended on the field by a doctor who temporarily bandaged his wound and ordered him to the base hospital by the seashore, about a mile from the firing line. He was brought there by stretcher bearers, and the next day was put on board an hospital ship and taken to Alexandria. Since arriving there he has been carefully nursed and though at the time of writing the wound was healing, his leg was still very weak. He expected that when he would be a stronger he would be taken to London to make room for others at Alexandria. His letter throughout is a cheery one and has about it a true British ring. He is longing for a speedy recovery, that he may again take his place amongst his comrades in the Regiment.




