

Three Heros eof Memorable Battle Reach Town.

By the express which reached the city Satur-day afternoon there arrived home on sick fursus Cahill, Private A. Tipple and Private F. Rowe, all battle-scarred heroes. They were met at the station by Acting Premier Bennett, the ladies of the Reception Committee and many of their relatives and friends. After being addressed by the Acting Premler, the soldiers were driven to Gov-ernment House where they were warmly welcomed by His Excellency the Governor and Lady Davidson. Each of the returned heroes bears conorable wounds received in the memorable "great push" of October 12th last, in which the Newfoundland Regiment played such a prominent and triumphant part. During the great advance Corpl. Cahill said he was hit by shrapnel in the thigh when about fifty yards away from the German trenches. While wounded he lay in a shell hole and witnessed the bayonet fighting and hand to hand en-gagements. The slaughter was terrible: about one thousand Germans were killed and more taken prisoners. The trenches were captured by "Ours" in the evening of Oct. 12th and were held and consolidated all hat night, despite three counter attacks. Speaking of losses, Corpl. Cahill said our losses were nothing ompared to what the Germans' were A remarkable coincidence happene n connection with Corpl. Cahill's career while on active service. By mistake he was officially reported missing after the "big drive" of July 1st and his relatives and friends here, it will be remembered, had mourned his loss. Later it transpired that Corpl. Cahill was still in the flesh and that the one missing was the late Pte. J. Cahill, who was taken prisoner by The apppointment of Mr. Stewart the enemy. 
