Ricketts at Govt. House

At 11 o'clock yesterday all soldiers of the Newfoundland Regiment who had won decorations and were able to attend, assembled in the Empire Barracks, and 15 members who had not previously received it, were presented with the ribbon of the 15 star.

At 3.30 p.m. the men numbering about 30 marched to Government House and were received by His Excellency the Governor, who was attended by Capt. Campbell, M.C., Private Secretary, and Capt. R. H. Tait, M. C. A.D.C.

An address was then read to Sergt. T. Ricketts, V.C., D.C.M., C. de G., by Capt. Tait, M.C., and a gold watch and chain was presented to him by Miss Annala Hayward, President of the Daughters of the Empire, who were the donors of the gift. The outer case of the watch bears the initials of the hero, and on the inside is the following inscription:—

Presented to Sergt. T. Ricketts, V. C., D. C. M., C. de G., From the Daughters of the Empire, Newfoundland, 1919.

The Daughters of Empire and the Ladies Reception Committee were present at the reception, at which luncheon was taken with His Excellency.

One More Added to the Great Army

'Harriman of the Air.'

New York, Feb. 6.—Roy U. Conger, the "H. H. Harriman of the Air," as he is already called because of his purchase of ten million dollars' worth of Canadian government aircraft equipment, plans to start a new line for carrying freight, passengers, express and mail.

Starting in Canada, these commercial lines are to be extended into the United States. At the offices of the United Aircraft Engineering Corporation, at 52 Vanderbilt Avenue, the new air magnate told of his preliminary plans for criss-crossing the sky with freight and passenger lines.

"Exact plans for the operations of the aerial lines cannot be given out as yet," he said, "for the deal was put through in such a hurry that I have not yet had time to work out plans fully.

"Our first big job, of course, is to assemble the planes and other equipment which we have purchased. It is scattered all over Canada in six flying fields. The assembly will be made at Leaside, just outside of Toronto, our headquarters. I have appointed F. G. Ericson, former chief engineer for Canadian Airlines, Ltd., as general manager.

"As soon as assembly of the property is complete, we will start the establishment of air lines, laying out landing fields and air routes and starting to carry light express matter. Later on we will take passengers, and may carry mail for the Dominion Government. We will get all the pilots we need from the 2,500 Canadian aviators who are returning from overseas. We expect such success from the initial Canadian operations that the business will soon spread to the United States."

The new air king's purchase includes 350 Curtiss JN-4 training planes, 1,000 Curtiss OX engines of 90 horse power each and a great quantity of propellers, spare parts, extra fuselages, etc. The price paid for the material, which cost the Canadian Government originally, some ten million dollars, Mr. Conger refused to reveal. He expressed the opinion, however, that he "got a bargain."

The entire purchase was financed by the United Aircraft Engineering Corporation, of which F. D. Duffin is President, and of which Roy U. Conger is the controlling interest. There will be no stock for sale to the public, as Conger intends to run his air service entirely "on his own."

MINERS PARTY DISSATISFIED.
LONDON, Feb. 12. (AP.)—While the House of Commons approves of Premier Lloyd George's Labour programme, it fails to support the Parliamentary Labor Party which has prepared an amendment to the Speech from the Throne regarding the absence of proposals dealing with the causes of industrial unrest and the securing of wages and hours conditions of labor which will establish a higher standard of life and social well-being for the people. The labor side demands a crisis to-day in connection with the Government's proposals for great unions representing 1,000,000 workers, the result of which demands is awaited with interest by the entire labor movement.

MINERS REJECT TERMS.
LONDON, Feb. 12. (AP.)—The Conference of the Miners' Federation of Great Britain at a meeting to-day, decided against the terms offered by the Government for a settlement of the strike. The conference adopted the following resolution: "We reject the terms offered by the Government as not being in reply to our demands and we refer the executive committee of the Federation to the conference to-day to what should be the proper basis for our demands."

A COMPLEX PROBLEM.
PARIS, Feb. 12. (AP.)—The Reparation Commission of the League of Nations has before it, according to the terms, three positions for the settlement of the German reparations. It is said that the Commission will propose to assess against Germany the cost of the war, and individual, from the point of view of her outlay for the war. ARCHANGEL, Feb. 11. (AP.)—Bolshevik forces have resumed the offensive in the region of Srednaya. For a brief time last night the Bolsheviks occupied several Allied blockhouses after penetrating the town, but they were driven out by a British and Russian counter attack. The fighting continued to-day. Patrol activities continue on the Kadish sector but the American, British and Russian troops maintained the gains made in the offensive last week. On the Pinega sector east southeast of Archangel, Russian forces drove back the Bolsheviks. The French Foreign Legion, which is composed of Russian volunteers trained at Archangel by French officers, is now fighting on the Kadish front.

TO IMPROVE RAILROADS.
WINNIPEG, Feb. 12. (AP.)—The Dominion Government has consented to a parliamentary approval, to an expenditure of about sixty million dollars for improvements and new construction to be done during the coming year on the Canadian national railways. It was learned here to-day, of the amount to be expended, \$20,000,000 will be rolling stock already ordered and expenditure under this head may be increased to \$30,000,000. Extension of lines and improvements will probably require about \$20,000,000.

ARMISTICE CONDITIONS.
PARIS, Feb. 12. (AP.)—The Supreme Council at its meeting to-day decided on the conditions for the renewal of armistice with Germany, according to an official announcement.

BRITISH DESTROYER IN HAMBURG.
AMSTERDAM, Feb. 11. (AP.)—A British torpedo boat destroyer entered the harbor of Hamburg Sunday and left later with the British steamer Cosmos which had been interned there during the war.

CONDITIONS IN MOSCOW.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 12. (AP.)—Wood for fuel in Moscow costs from 800 to 1000 rubles per carriage load, according to advices to-day to the State department, and the temperature is rarely above 41 degrees below zero. The main street in Moscow is the only one lighted and because of frequent street fighting few citizens would venture out of doors at night.

BORDEN AS AMBASSADOR TO U.S.
LONDON, Feb. 12. (AP.)—The Daily Express says that Sir Robert Borden, Prime Minister of Canada has been offered the post of British Ambassador to the United States.

SAFE ENOUGH NOW.
VIENNA, Feb. 12. (AP.)—Italian troops and bankers to-day began removing from a bank here bank notes, bonds and securities valued at 1,500,000,000 kronen, which had originally belonged to the city of Trieste. The money was removed for safe keeping during the war.

WILL SOON BE READY.
PARIS, Feb. 12. (AP.)—The League of Nations Commission, says the Temps, will probably be able to submit to the council of the Powers the definite text of its project before President Wilson's departure. In its present form, continues the paper, the project involves the members of the league making a definite engagement to take up arms for the maintenance of their territories and the safeguarding of international treaties. It would seem that the conception has been discarded whereby the league becomes a superstate in favor of the institution of the close mutual relations furnishing guarantees for the independence of each nation more efficient than the old system of alliances.

THE KING'S SPEECH.
LONDON, Feb. 12. (AP.)—Following are the sections of the King's Speech omitted from yesterday's cable:—
For the last months a conference of plenipotentiaries and the representatives of all the Allied Powers have been assembled in Paris to deliberate upon the terms of a just and lasting peace. Their discussions have been marked by the utmost cordiality and good-will and by no disagreement. They have made good progress with the examination of the numerous and varied problems which will require settlement in the terms of peace, and I trust that before this session is far advanced the preliminary of the peace will be signed. I rejoice particularly that the Powers in the Conference have agreed to accept the principle of a League of Nations, for it is by progress along the road that I see the only hope of saving mankind from a recurrence of the scourge of war.

I took an early opportunity to visit France and to convey to the President of the Republic our heartfelt enthusiasm with which my people acclaimed the final liberation of her territories and the vindication of the national unity of our faithful friend and ally. I was deeply moved by the demonstration of cordial affection which I received during my visit. It has also given me great pleasure to receive in this country the President of the United States of America. The enthusiastic welcome accorded him is proof of the good-will which all sections of my people feel toward the Great Republic of the West, and an earnest of the increasing understanding with which I trust they will act together in the future.

For the last few months the Imperial War Cabinet has been in continuous session, and my counsels in regard to the war and external affairs have been both strengthened and enlightened by the presence of the leading Ministers of my self-governing Dominions, and representatives of my Indian Empire. The inspiring sacrifice and invaluable service which have been rendered by the people of my Dominions and India during the war have won for them an important place in the councils of the world, and it has been a source of special satisfaction to me that their title to representation has been recognized by the Paris Conference. I trust that the reports of the committee which are now inquiring into matters connected with the Indian Constitutional Report will be received in time to enable a Bill on the subject to be presented in the course of this session.

The position of Ireland causes me great anxiety, but I earnestly hope that conditions may soon sufficiently improve to make it possible to provide a durable settlement of this difficult problem.

All the Small Measures Possible.

We were talking the other day about some pictures we had sent to the developer and were expecting back by every mail, and in the course of the conversation I asked a neighbor if she ever took pictures.

"Oh, no," she said, "I never have been one for fads of any sort." She seemed to take pride in the statement. I wondered why. Is it something to be proud of that one shuts off the sources of harmless legitimate pleasure? For myself, I love to have as many small pleasures in my life as I have a right to have.

Take the Fad of Photography. Take the fad of photography. What an interest it gives to life! You see so much more of the world about you because you have the photographic eye, and you learn to see groupings and bits of composition that will make good pictures. You snap the pictures and you send them away, and then you have the pleasant anticipation of the day they will come back. Every mail may contain them, which gives the postman's visit much more interest to you. When they come, you enjoy looking at them and showing them to other people who are also interested in photography or in the individual subject (I assume you are the sort of person who knows enough to confine his audience to people who are really interested). Then you put them into books and as the years go by you look over these books again, and light up and vivify your memories by them, or hunt for some special picture that illustrates some story you are telling, or some particular locality that some one is interested in.

This is only a Symbol. I have said so much about photography because it is a fad with whose contribution to the interestingness of life I am familiar, but I am not trying to urge the practise of it upon you (though I think I shall be doing you a favor if I direct your attention that way), only using it as a symbol of all the pleasure and interest a small fad can bring into your life.

And after all, isn't it these small humdrum, commonplace little pleasures whose sum make up the largest

part of our joy in life? Isn't it small pleasures that fill up the nooks and crannies where loneliness and boredom would otherwise lurk? How such little pleasures light up a day.

Your favorite rose brings forth its first blossom, the postman brings you a magazine with the latest installment of an interesting serial in it, a friend invites you in to listen to a new record, you hear an interesting story about some people you are interested in—these are all little things, but how they enrich and light up a day!

Big adventures, great events, special pleasures cannot come every day, but the anticipations and thrills of small pleasures can, and the wise man or woman has as many of them as he legitimately can in his life.

BLUE LANGUAGE.

The war has made us more profane, which gives my gentle soul a pain. In olden times we used to swear when sick or burdened down with care; if in the darkness we arose, and on the door jamb broke a nose, we'd spring some red-hot parts of our speech which made the weary well-in-screed. But when a stern occasion called for language that would scorch and scald, our speech was soothing and refined, the output of the placid mind. But now we cuss the whole day long, and no one seems to think it wrong. The stories in our public prints are full of words of lurid tints, and even the masters shock the pews, the sort of adjectives they use. Profanity was always coarse; and now it's losing all its force, when it is sprung in constant flow—it lacks the pep of long ago. In war it may have been all right, this damning everything in sight, for we were racked by dread and doubt, and cusswords seemed to help us out. But now that peace is come again, let's be polite and godly men, and quit this foolish, stupid stunt of pushing swear words to the front.

A New Delicacy.

There is no accounting for tastes, and that is being shown every day in the week in some sphere of life. In the fish industry one has only to turn to those persons whose chief delight is to gorge themselves with a dish of devilfish. Some persons call it devilfish, in the East it is sometimes classed as sea cat, while in the waters of the Gulf of Mexico, where it is sometimes taken in great quantities it is called octopus or cuttle. It makes very little difference what the name may be, the fish is considered a delicacy by Italians, Greeks, Japanese and Chinese. Five or six years ago devilfish sold in the Vera Cruz markets for about 35 cents per pound. Now, with the additional high cost of living, it is bringing higher prices, sales during the present week being made at 75 cents per pound, wholesale. Who says fish is high in price when devilfish bring more money in the wholesale market than any other variety outside of Kennebec salmon when it first comes to market.—N. Y. Fishing Gazette.

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
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


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
