injection of good quality gold some times reaches the fifty-pound mark while in one or two exceptional cases gold injections have cost over a hun-

dred pounds each. Consequently, only very rich persons can at present un-

dergo this gold treatment, which has been successful in rescuing several

cases of complete nervous breakdown It should be remembered, however, that the gold itself is of no great value as a tonic. The idea in making the in-

jections is to liven up the patient and

prevent him or her from brooding too

seriously. This done, doctors believe

It will also be very interesting to

know that this gold treatment is now being used in several of the largest

hospitals on the Continent. Until now only nervous people and those suffer-

ing from mental disorders have been

treated, but experiments have recent-

ly shown that gold injections, costly

though they are, are of great value in

allaying fever and kindred diseases.

Strange to say, the injections are not

that half the battle is won.

Many English judges are advocating the use of the "cat" as punishment where offences with violence are proved. At Lincoln recently Mr. Justice

Horridge passed sentence of twelve strokes each on four men convicted of robbery with violence, and his example is being followed all over the country. There are two varieties of whip us-

ed for the purpose-the "cat-o'-ninetails" proper, which consists of nine leather thongs fastened to a short handle; and a long piece of tapering leather to which studs of lead are fastened at intervals.

Before undergoing the punishment the prisoner must be certified by the prison doctor as fit to bear it without

danger to life or reason. After passing the doctor the prisoner is taken to another room where a steel triangle has been erected; he is fastened to this by leather thongs round wrists and ankles, and stripped

to the waist. Before the punishment starts the doctor has again to examine the prisoner, and at any time while the strokes are being given the doctor has the power to stop the proceedings.

The sentence is then read out by the governor of the prison, and the number of lashes ordered duly given, after which the prisoner is handed over for medical treatment.

The whip is treated with strong antiseptic before each stroke.

Strokes up to the number of fifty may be ordered by a judge of assizes, under the Act of 1863, but the sentence may not be carried out until ten days have passed, as the prisoner has power of appeal up to that time.

A City of Crime,

Although there is an epidemic of crime in most cities of the world, there is only one town which can boast of possessing more criminals than lawabiding folk. That is the Italian city of Artena, which is known as the City of Crime.

Ever since the sixteenth century every criminal who has escaped from prison or done his time has emigrated to Artena, and to-day practically every inhabitant is a criminal or a child of a

Every family takes the law into its own hands, and hardly a day passes without a murder being committed in the streets.

The Italian authorities have now come to look upon Artena as hopeless. and remark that it is far better that criminals should kill criminals than that innocent persons should be their

The World's First Auto.

The world's first automobile is not yet half a century old. It is the property of the Marquis de Broc, of France. The authentic record of this self-propelled road car is that it was built (at enormous expense) in 1878. It was used on long road trips, and had a speed of about twenty-eight miles an hour. But the marquis stopped using it, as it frightened the neighbors' horses! It somewhat resembles a stagecoach in design, having a powerful engine in the front and a chimney in the rear. It was propelled by steam, much as our steam rollers are to-day. The small wire railing at the top was intended to hold baggage while travelling, and it is evident that the car was fitted up with every convenience which could be contrived at the time. The car is now stored in the marquis's



Under the old rules, which had been in vogue for about nine years, all bouts were limited to six rounds, but Director Cortelyou, has decided to allow bouts of eight rounds duration. He claims that by lengthening the number of rounds, boxers will be less apt to "stall" and every fighter who signs up for a match will have to "weigh in" at, or under, the stipulated weight called for in his contract. The director also has asserted that the new code will be enforced to the letter and has warned all promoters, managers and boxers to that effect. Following are some of the new rules:

Contestants shall not be permitted to have more than three attendants or seconds and these must refrain from coaching during the progress of the

Seconds shall use a fan and not towel for fanning boxers.

All seconds shall remain in their boxers' corner during the bout and not place themselves in a neutral

Throwing water by seconds on their men during a round shall disquualify the boxer, and one-half of the latter's money shall go to a hospital to be designated by the club.

Wherever a boxer is apparently outclassed the bout must be stopped No boxer shall be allowed to contest aganist an opponent ten pounds heavier than himself, in the lightveight class or under.

We need economy at the present time more than any other one thing in the world. Money is more evenly distributed than it has been for many a day, even if there are some over-fat pigs in some pig-sties. 



A Violin Worth

This magnificient specimen of th Cremona School first attracted wid attention when it was purchase about 100 years ago in Italy by th famous connoisseur Taurio and takes by him to France. Since then it ha been one of the most sought for vie lins in the world. Its value cannot b estimated. Made in 1735 it has been wonderfully preserved. The reddist varnish is still thick and luminous It has a tone of matchless beauty and depth, and is said to be without superior and has but few equals in the violin world.

It is almost impossible to place any value on one of these rare in struments. Some of them could scarcely be purchased at any price Ordinarily well preserved speciment of the work of the great Italian violis makers. Stradivari. Guarnerius and Amati, are sold for prices that are almost unbelievable to the average man. A price of \$10,000 for a genuine, high grade specimen made by one of these makers is not at all unusual.

According to tradition a tract of 1500 acres in the heart of what is now the city of Pittsburg was once traded for a "Stainer" violin.

As a violin weighs less than s pound and an ounce of gold is worth \$20.80, the celebrated Stradivarius which was sold at an auction in London for \$50,000, brought more than one hundred and fifty times its weight in gold. And this matchless Guarnerius of Mr. Spalding's is just as valuable.

After the ceremony the young lady got so tired of the way her friends chipped her that she ran away, took up her abode in another "Camp," and within a few months became the wife of the chieftan-a bearded old man.
