

The result was extremely satisfactory, because to a man they went away dissatisfied with the condition of their aerials, and determined to improve them.

Thre are three conditions to be fulfilled for a good aerial. Sufficient height to clear surrounding buildings and trees, reasonable length, and where several aerials are in close proximity, to keep them at right angles to each other.

It is unfortunate, however, that the more crowded the neighbour hood, the greater is the necessity strictly to adhere to these conditions, and a moment's thought will show that up to the present these are just the very places where such conditions have been quite impossible. Nevertheless, here is a scheme so planned as to become more effective as the wireless area gets more, and more congested with the increasing number of people using sets.

In most, streets there is a row of houses, in the majority of which receiving sets are installed. I suggest that the owners of these sets group themselves together and erect two good, high masts, one in a garden near each end of their row of houses. If now between these masts a rope is tightly stretched, a number of



#### Whale Travels 300 Miles Inland

Edmonton, Alta.-Apparently intent

upon sampling the delights of city

life, a white whale was observed this fall swimming up against the current of the Mackenzie river in the general direction of Edmonton. The mammal in question succeeded in reaching the upper ramparts near Fort Good Hope, this being more than three hundred miles from his natural habitat in the Arctic Ocean. At the ramparts, a rock ridge crosses the Mackenzie and in the fall when the water is dropping, this forms a bar to all but the smaller units of the northern river fleets, and here the enquiring whale had to cease his tour, due to the fact that there was not sufficient water to permit him to cross the shallows. It is estimated that the Arctic tourist weighed nearly a ton and he was observed for some time by the crew of the Alberta and Arctic Trans-

#### The Flying Finn

portation Co's. vessel Liard River.

NEW YORK, Dec. 23 .- The name of Paavo Nurmi, who will race in Toronto and possibly in several other Canadian cities this winter, is well known throughout the world of athletics but probably few know how the "Flying Finn" was discovered as a runner.

Under the laws of Finland every young man between the ages of 16 and 0 must serve two years in the army When Nurmi joined the colors he was assigned to a regiment of infantry and took so readily to military training that he quickly passed the recuit stage and was made a non-commissioned officer. He soon gained a reputation as a good man on the march and when an inter-regimental hike was scheduled, he was one of the men chosen to represent his unit. The distance was to be 20 kilometers, approximately 12 miles, and the only condition was that each contestant must carry full field equipment.

Although Nurmi had never appeared in open competition before, his companions set their chief hopes upon him, but they were unprepared for the performance he was to give.

As soon as the field was sent away, Nurmi broke into a run and without slackening his pace covered the distance in the astonishing time of 1 hour. 17 minutes, only ten minutes slower than the world's track record, and that with a weight of 35 pounds on his back. When the crowd saw him start out at such a fast pace, it was NOT expected he would last but he finished without showing any signs of fatigue and was twenty minutes ahead

Among the spectators was one of the leading trainers of Finland who re-

marked after the race: "If I could get that man under my wing I would make a world's chamon out of him"

The first part of the trainer's wish soon was fulfilled and the rest is now matter of athletic history.

#### Fasted 360 Hours

Winnipeg, Man .- Following a fast lasting 360 hours, Dr. J. R. Goldstone, of the Thomas Sanitarium, Winnipeg. has expresed the opinion that the human body has a much larger stock of reserve energy than is ordinarily believed, and further that greater mental and physical activity results from prolonged fasting.

During the 360 hours. Dr. Goldstone took nothing but water, yet lost only 14 pounds in weight. 



Wife of Missionary Makes Arduous Trek

Winnipeg, Man., Dec. 13.—Over icebound wastes, through partly frozen muskeg, skirting dense bush and tracking over unsafe ice, Mrs. Gaudin, wife of Rev. S. D. Gaudin, Methodist missionary at Norway House, recently made a 42-mile journey to help a sick Indian of the Manitoba 'Northland. Although Mrs. Gaudin is 60 years old, she made the trip in a day and a half. Unable to secure the services of another nurse to take her place, Mr. Gaudin decided to make the long journey into the wilderness herself. Accompanied by two Indians, haul-

ing a jumper containing the camp equipment and supplies, she set out from Norway House on foot. The party was unable to use dogs as the rivers and lakes were only thinly coated with ice, and travel over these trails was yet unsafe.

Word was sent back to Norway House that Mrs. Gaudin had suffered no ill effects from the difficult trek. She remained in the distant North until her work among the Cree Indians was finished.

During the 'flu epidemic a few years ago, Mrs. Gaudin travelled many miles by dog sleigh, visiting the Intering to the needs of her charges.



#### **Devonshire Settlers** for W. Canada

Winnipeg, Man., Dec. 13.—Plans for the settlement in Western Canada of 300 families from Devonshire, England, are now being made, according to John Passmore, of Barnstaple, Devon, England, who recently passed through Winnipeg. This movement, he intimated, would be launched next

"The whole matter of this Devonshire immigration is being managed by J. R. Park, of Exeter, who spent several months in Western Canada this year under the auspices of the Canadian National railway," said the visitor. Continuing. he pointed out that arrangements were being made to bring out altogether 3,000 families and negotiations for the transportation of a large contingent next year have been opened with the Imperial and Canadian governments. The majority of the newcomers will be skilled agriculturists; they will be carefully selected and each family will receive an advance of 300 pounds, under the Empire Settlement Act, this amount being payable in 25 years at 5 per cent, interest.




