- The more favorable turn out of the Minatoha wheat crop, following many adverse peports, will be hailed with pleasure, not only by the growers, but by business men throughout the Dominion. Earlier returns were far from satisfactory. As a consequenco retail dealers thromghont the povince were at a loss to detormine jist what pereentagre of businces to reckon on. Some were hopeful and atlowed gools ordered for foture delivery to be shipped while others, more conservative, or less secure financially, counformanded orders or harl them so reduced as to make it of divect eoneern to Dastern importers. Thappily this has been largely removed by the latest reports as the wheat is heing threstied ind prepared for shipment. A dispateli from Winnipeg dated sum inst, says: Th an interview to-day in regard to the threshing results, Mr. M. W. Thompson, geneml manager of the Ogilvie Milling Company, said: "Reports all continue very satisfactory. The new wheat, has shown to le exeellont in quality, as a whole fhe yibla in most localities is far heyond carlier expectations, and T now mive it as my undoubted opinion that the sied of the provinces and teritories will not he less than $28,000,000$ bushels, and that over 05 per cent. of this quantity will be in grool milling whent. I expeet onn company to hamde a barere quantity of what this year than in any previous year. The present position of Manitobs is excepliomally fovomable, and in my opinion there will be about as much realized to the firmers on this year's erop as was netied on that of last year, so that all fear as to a possible stringency is removed. T have had extensive tests maile of the milling qualities of the new wheats, and these are shown to be remalkably good."
--The Ontario Government has sold by tender five lots of Whr limher limits in the township of Dana, Nipissing District for $\$ 01,2 \pi 5$. The lots comprise $21 / 2$ seluare miles of county of which one lot, or about one-hall. square mile lus been burnt, leaving only two miles of good timber. 'lhis is the highest price over reali\%ed per mile for Ontario timber limits.

-The stock, book delts, etc., of Archambault Freres, dry grods, Montreal, who recently assigned, will be sold by auction on the 29 th instant. The stoek is invoied at $\$ 17,004$.
-The trains of the Oitawa \& Gatineau Railway will likely le rumning into the Central depot, Ottawa, in three or four weeks, according to a dispateh from that city. An official of the interprovincial bridge,stated that all armangements for the service should easily be completed in the time mentioned or sooner. The iron work is up, and the workmen are engrged in riveting and laying the flooring. The rails have ahready been laid.
-Among the various jobbers and wholesale merchants the dealer in produce is the most likely to lose through bat debts. Fis goods are wanted every day and sometimes in such small quantities that he cannot refuse ereilit to the retailer who buys from him constantly. Many times he is foreed to sell a small bin on time through the perishable nature of much of his stock, and its uncertain walue from duy to day. The stock of W. II. Smith, wholesale produce and commission merchant, Toronto, who recently assigned, was disposed of at anction in that eity on the 23 of instant. The statement, prepared from the books, showed liabilities uf. $\$ 11,729$, and assets of $\$ 2.560$. Only accounts amounting to $\$ 248$ were preferred. The prineipal eredifors were T. S. Vipond, Montreal, Que., \$1,444; Truit Despatel Compauy, Buffalo, N.Y., \$1.06s; Thacker Fruit Company, Chicage, Tll., \$1,000; Fermando Gatto, New York, \$800; Grand 'Trumk Rail way, $\$ 650$. There were 149 commission ereditors under $\$ 100$, whose elaims totalled $\$ 1,060$. Mrr. Smith attributes his failure chiefly to an unfortunate rum of bad. debts, his books showing over $\$ 10,000$ during the past few years.

A Yorkshive house invites offers of old rails.-A Notinghan correspondent, asks for nomes of Canadian manufacturers of flcoring hoeks.-A manufachurer of medium and cheap grade umbrellas and parasols wishes to be placed in eommunication with active Canallian house prepared to introrluce their goods.

- The Onfario Bureat of Mines, says a 'loronto dispateh, has reedivel worl that the collection of minewils sent by the province of Ontario to the lintis Exposition had recoived the grand pris, and that Aubrey White, deputy commissioner of Crown lands, who superintended the gathering of the eolleefion, and their arrangement at the exosition, had received a gold medal for his services.
-A bateh of timber liuds in the Township of Dana, Ont., hurned over, were recently disposed of by the Department. of Crown Lands to the highest tenderer. The purchaser was the Victoria llabor Jumber Company of Toronto, at a price of $\$ 01,275$.

[^1]-It may seem strange to those well versed in Canadian grography, as well as those engaged in the manufacture of moderu maps of the Dominion that it has remained for the closing season of the present century to disclose the oivigin and flow of certain rivers within its borders. Yet such has leen proven by one of the exploring parties recently return ed from a governmental trip into Northern Ontario. This party, No, 4, was conducted by Mr. Alex. Baird of Jeanington, who had as companions Mr. Wm. Laidlaw of Guelph, farm expert; Mr. G. M. Stewart, Toronto, geologist; Mr. Tohn MeConachie. Tuntsville, timber estimator; Mr. Miles Grimshan of Teamington, eook and three Tudians. The party has reported the results of the season's work to the Department of Crown Lands. Mr. Baird and Mr. Laidaw were enthusiastic over the wealth of the country. They startied from Ginssett, near Missambie, on the C.R.R., main line, tavelling north and east through the Magpie River; Take Tsnogami, Take Kabinakagami, the river of the same name, then Mattawaishquia river, to the Missanabic. They travelled about two hundred miles, heading for Moose Factory, but har to return owing to low water. The party fromd an abundance of excellent farming land of a samdy clay nature, also discovering a Fudson Bay post, where all kinds of vegetables, harley, oats, and strawberries, eurrants and raspluerries grew to perfection. The land was mostly forest. There was a fine lot of pine in one lociality, but, cverywhere pulpwood, particularly spruce, was to be fount in abundance. Being above the height of land the pulp. could not be floated southward. There were, however, many water-powers throughout the tract coverech. There was evidence of plenty game, and the fishing was unsurpassed. Recks were searce, and there was little evidence of mineral deposits. The climate was very healthy, the air being clear and bracing. One of the errors on current maps corrected by this party's work was the discovery that the River Kat himakagami empties northward into the Albany, instead of eastward into the Moose River.
-The Laing Packing and Provision Company, Montreal, have given nolice of their intention to ercet a large packing house, which will give employment to at least 200 men at the commencement.

-A cablegram has been received by the Department of Agriculture, Ottiwa, stating that the grapes shipped recentIs by the Manchester 'lyader arrived in most excellent condition. 'lhey were carried in chambers ventilated by means oí electric faus. The Minister of Agriculture has received from Liverpool the following letter: "Mr. Grindley, in your name and with your compliments, has presented this ollice with a specimen box of the pears which arrived in the Manchester Commerce,and in writing to acknowledge your courtesy perhaps you will allow me to congratulate you on the condition in which you have succeeded in landing truit. fudging by the sumple it could not possibly arrive in a state hetter suited to the requirements of the market, and this result of your entorts must be very gratifying. The quality and size of the iruit itself leave nothing to be desired, and, if your instructions are followed in regard to packing and trausport the success of the trade is assured. In order to sece how long the fruit would remain good after leaving the eoh! chamber some of the pears have been kept, and now, ton days later, show no signs of the slightest deterionation." Euglish prperss speak in high praise of the enterprise of the Camadian (iusermment, in plachg Camdian prodacts on the Erglish market. 'The diverpool Mercury and the Liverpool Jon'mal of ('ommeree have much to say, in which the following appears: "गhe enterprise of out Canadian cousins has for many years beem a fictor of considerable inportance in rigird to the trate of this country, for Canada has year by Jear been semding supplies of various kinds in ever-inereasing ghantities. At last there is reason to think the time has conto when Canadian-grown fruit will compete on exceedingly favorable terms with the homb-grown article, and this not only in the hardier elass but also in fruits of the most delicale description. Shrough the elforts of the Minister of Agriculture, shipments were made in steamers which provided the temperature reauisite for the proper curging of frut, the product being earried in a special chamber cooled by the Linde system. Jhe improvements have, of course, been gradual, and suecess came very slowly, but it is thought bow that the general principles under which fruit can be carried to the best advantage are pretty well known, and that only in minor details can the system be improved. A recent shipment of fruit by the Manchester Commerce arrived in this country in the pink of condition, and samples have for the pest week been exhibited at the oflices of the Canadian Pacific Railway. Passers-by were astonished to read that all the fruit exhibited, which inchuded some of the finest peaches imaginable, was grown in the open air, and some were so carried away by the exceptional appearance of the fruit as to be induced to enter and attempt to purchase what were only exhibited as samples. Of late, owing to the splendid arrangements made on wost of the newer boats crossing the Atlantic, the carriage to this country has been perfectly satisfactory, and the result is that the Canadian growers have been able to put their fruit on the English market in perfect condition."

-A special from Cornwall, Ont., states inab, Mr. M. P. bavis has commenced the work of developing the allenost miJomited water power at Sheile's Island. He has the contract for lighting the Cornwall canal.with electricty, and will also transmit power to Cornwall. Whis will be ateomplished by digging in short canal wh leet long and 2l feet deep, at the fower end of the canai at the leved of the lake, formed by the famous Sheik's Island dam, thas conveging the water to the turbines mad power house. 'llou latter will be of brick on stune foundations, (i0n60 feet. There will be three bwin turbines of 1,000 horse-power each. At linst only machinery for 1,000 horse-power will be put in, but the powei house, head race, ete, will be made large enough for the development of 4,000 horse-power. The eost of developing the power will be about $\$ 150,000$. 'lhe spot is an ideal one for chetriead deveropment, the conditions being exceptionally favorable. Jhe ability to procure cheap power will, doubtless speedily lead to the establishment of new industries in Cormwall. Actual work will begin at onee, with joo or more men. Operations will be continued all winter, as the contract calls for completion by April $15,1901$.
-strikes, it would appear, are not altogether confined to the American continent. A recent disputch from Kingston, Jamaict, anmounces that at strike of the employees of the electrical ruilroad is in progress. The road is owned by Canadian and American capitalists. . 'lhe men demanded an increase of pay, and the manager of the road promised to forward their pelition to Montreal with a recommendation hat it be conceded, whereupon the men agreed to resume work for the forbnight which must elapse belore a reply is seceived.
-Recent advices from Wimipeg state that at a mass meeting of citizens held there, the ofter of the C.jin. to build a subway on Nain strect for a bonus of $\$ 00,000$ from the city was accepted. The company has promised to spend orer a million dollars in Wimiper next year in erecting a hotel and station, and in enlarging workshops and yards.

- A special meeting of the Butter and Cheese $A$ ssociation was hed in Noutreal on the 23 rd instant, to consider a letter itrom Prolessor hobertson, asking for the appointment of a committee to exanine and report upon the relative yuality of cheese cured at different teraperatures. On motion,' the nomination of a committee was left to the presidemt, Mr. A. Hoilgson, who named the following: Messis. James Alexander, D. A. Melherson, 1. W. MeLagan, $A$. Grant, J. Farrell, and A. C. Wieland. Prof. J. A. Ruddick, of the Depurtment of Agriculture, spoke regarding the dilliculty experienced in finding suitable terms for condition and guatity of cheese and butter which would be undersitood equally by all interested.
-'The agent at Liverpool of the Department of Agricultare at Ottawa writes as follows: "One of the largest London retail concerns was recently havily fined for selling American (Chicage) ham as "Canadian." 'Jo avoid that risk, the gernemal enstom is by some retaiters to put popular goods If in a prominent phace, and then fill orders with other groals, saying mothing about were hey came from, but selling them on their merits. Jutehers will hang up is side of beel' and label it, "ll'rme English fed." Tllacy will have wher ber ent wit in roasts and other forms, and labelled "Einglish killed." from the above that other reports it is io he chserved that, as the eathe shipped fitom Camada are killed in Englamd, this last definition of "English killed" is eorred, athough the beel was fattened in and shipped from C'maba. 'lhe Merehamise Marks' Act provides that goods ecming into Eagland shall be branded on the ontside of the package with the name of the comitry of origin. Lately, a shipment of egges was semed becanse the wood "Canadian" was not on the outiside of the ense. If is important that all Camadian shippers should stencil "Camadian" or "Canada" plainly on the andside or every packige, for the best trade reasons, as well as that of complying with the British law.
-'luat active compedition will be encountered in the many arge contracts likely soon to he given ont on South African aceount is already discernible. The vast, enterprises to be undertaken will call for a big eombination of brains and money. A recent dispatch from Birmingham, Jng., states that the Midtand irommasters are inquiring in oflicial quarters about the reported intention to preder dmerican mantfactarers to. Thitish in awarding eontracts for the extensive milway and bridge construetion contemplated in South Afdien. Several of the principal iron men, who are acting conjaintly in making these ingnitits, intend to organize a "ampaign to press the Govermment into favoring british mamulachers if it is foum that any contracts are likely to ge to the United States, even thongh the American bids : Hotld be lower than the British. The Daity Express condinues its campaign in hehalf of liritish engineers against Ameriem in the mater of the Sonth African railway contracts. To-tay it gives voice to the protests of various English firms which drnounce the unfairness of the rumored preference for Americans, On the other hand, the Daily News doubts the aceuracy of the report and detends Lient.Colonel (iironard, Director of Railways in British South Africa, from the charge of partiality for the United States. It conchudes its editorial thas: "hime is as important in South Africa as it was in Egy'pt. If American firms should eventally get any share of the contracts it will be because they are smarter than their Tritish competitors or because they have less work in hand. Whe best protest would be to beat the Americans in their estimates."

## THE GROCERY TRADE.

-Our correspondent at Bedford, Que., writes, under date Oci. 23 rd : There were bought here to-day 200 boxes creuthary butter at $203 / 4 \mathrm{c}$; 35 packages dairy at 10 c ; separator, 20 c ; 25: boxes cheese at $10 \% \mathrm{~s}$. Degs offering more freety thath for some weeks, brought 16c. Large numbers of hogrs brought $51 / 4 \mathrm{e}$ to $51 / 2 \mathrm{e}$ per lb .
-A Yokohama circular of 29 th ult., treating of the tea trade, says:-The market continues active at slightly caster prices. Quality las become rery poor. Stock remains at a,500 piculs, consisting chiefly of the lower grades. Thotal settlements for the scason to Sct. 2sth, amount to 187,200 piculs against 204,525 piculs at cormsponding date last year.
--A private london, ling., circular, date 13 th inst., treating of the cheese and butter situation says: hutter.-The dry weather which has existed all over Europe and the United Kingdom practically ever since the last report was issucd, has considerably destroyed the exeellent prospects that then prevailed for a very large make of autumn butter and cheese. The pastures are by no means so good as was expected, the supply of milk is falling of fast, ant prices for thits commodity are rising. Winter contracts for the supply of milk to the large towns during the next few months are being mathe at $8 d$ per gallon, and, as the househo!d has the first claim on the milk supply, less and less is going into butter and cheese making. The demand for Austmbian butter grows every week, though it is yet by no means large, and weekly arrivals are more than suffieient to meel corrent requirements. The quality of the butter is improving each shipment, and arrivals will shortly consist of pure spring grass butter. The arrivals of Australian to date this scason are 35,720 boxes, against 34,832 last year, which, eonsidering the earlier commencement of arrivals this year, shows no signs of greatly increased quantities yet. The shipments from Australia up to date this year are 103,300 hoxes against 111,000 last year, so that the reported very - large increase in supplies this year, which are to come from Ausbulia, have not yet put in appearabce. the artivals from Canada since the Canadian season began on 1st- May are $1.40,524$ boxes less than in the corvesponding period of 1809, and those from the United States are 60,430 boves below last year's receipts, making a total of 208,554 boxes or 5,248 tons short from across the Atlantic. The priers of "Choicest" Ausiralian butter are 108s to 110 s per ewt., with a flew sales of small lots at 112s. "Pinest" makes 100 s to 104s. "lime" 94s to 98s. The Copenhagen Onicial Quotation which stood at 103 kroner when the last teport was issted, fell to 5 s kroner on 27 th September, and since then has risen two kroner a week, and now stands at 99 kroner, which is 13 kroner lower than twelve months ago. 'Ihe supplies of Danish and other Continental butters are falling awiy, and the imports from all somres for the hast four weeks are 35,347 cwts. below twelve months ago. In the face of these short supplies it is reasonable to expect stiffening prices, and it looks as if Noveniber prices were to be the highest of the season. Trish butter is begimang to diminish and the home make in Great Britain is getting inte much smatler compass. Checso.-'There has been an easier tome this week owing possibly to the stocks of July cheese which have been released from cold store in Canala and were sold for forwad delivery on a hasis of ais to ins. IThis is temporarily discomting the marke for autumn cheese. The outcone, however, will probably he a strengthening in atue of actual antumn mado cheese. The Septention make is computed at 20 to 25 per cent. less than in 1 som. The make of eheese in the United Kinglom this year is about an-ordinary one, though of courser, it is much larger inan last yeare. The arrivals of checse from Camada sitice the ist of thy this year are 189,000 packages in excess of last year.
-Shavon, Pemusylvania, is rapidy becoming a centre for steel and iron production. limmense plants have been started dhere within the past fow years, and now it is annonnced that the sum of $\$ 5,000,000$ is to be invested in a rod and mais plant.
-The Canadian Govermment agent at; Detroiti shipped 23 seftiers and three cars of stock and eftects to Western Canadu on the 18th instant:

## WrITH THE REMATLIERS.

In the gezerat store there are many odd articles whieh had been put aside during the smmer months, and are now likely to be again called for. 'Mhese should be restored to prominent piaces, or, if not comvenient, signs placed where theg could be deadily observed, denoting each article and its pitice.

Do not be second in the fiela In amouncing and displaying seasonable goods. The first pominent display is alwoys remembered better than others which follow, if suflieient care and taste nre given in its production.
The shoe dealer who has some odd sires in dall and winter wights, held over from last spring, in styles somewhat diffurent from those he is carrying his season, ean add considerable to the groot name of his store by offering these as largains at a reduced price. The possibility of getting first price later on, will be more than offset by the early advertising thus aftorded, if merit is really in the goods.

Shoe laces shonld be hung up in a conspicuous place, each length and quality scparate, with prices attached. 'IYey' will sell themselves in increased numbers if so arranged.
A really good shoe will sell more readily at a fair profit than at cost, except in case of a gennine closing put sale.
The grocer who voluntanily suggests some other kind, hrand or blend of tea than what his customers are in the habit of using, is risking his future trade with them in that article. New blends and packages may be pushed where the parties have not been purchasers heretofore, but a now tea to an old customer is very apt to he disappointing, mnlass requested by them. Purthermore, one lot of mosatisfactory tea is apt to turn the customer's mind from buying tica of any kind at that particular store.
Whether selling spool cotiton--the six cord standard makes -at five or six cents is the more profitable in a general sense, is still in open question. Some Montreal refailers sell at one price and some at the other. There is one fact that may apply with force hem. It doos not, matter whether the person needing a spool of thread is worth fifty thousand dollars or fifty cents, the ifea of saving a cent is of as mueh interest to one as to the other. 'Ilhe person who has wealth always desires to add? the person who has not is too often careless about making a start. Spending a doflar out of a thousand canses more regeret han if it, were the only dollar possessed.

## BANK S＇A＇PEMENT FOR SEPTEMDERR．

Beyond the customary expansion of the note issues at this season there is nothing of interest to be found in the Septenber bank statement．The circulation went up from $\$ 47,421,277$ to $\$ 50,387,0 \% 0$ ，the increase in Sep－ lember being．$\$ 2,965,793$ ．This is a comparatively small amount as will be seen by the following table，showing the circulation at end of August and September for years since $189 \%$ ，with the increase of cach year made in the lat－ fer month，and the percentage of such increase．

The average increase in September from 1893 to 1899 was $\$ 2,593,500$, so this year's increase is an average one. But the comparison is of little significance as last year the increase in September was, $\$ 5,236,000$. What is more important than the month's expansion is the year's, and it is a notable incident that the note issues in September ${ }_{r}$ 1900, went, for the tirst time, over the 50 millions mark, the increase since 1893 being $\$ 15,258,000$, an advance of of over 43 per ceat.
The lesser harvest in the North West may have ciused the circulation this Fall to have expanded less than in 1899, but it is probable there was already a larger amount of money $\mathrm{in}_{1}$ the hands of the people generally than in any previous year. The current loans in September remained practically at the figure of August, the change being merely an increase from $\$ 272,012,320$ to $\$ 272,020$,391. As a mule, these loans or discounts show considerable expansion in September. Last year they went up by $\$ 6,764,606$, and the average increase of the three previous years was $\$ 3,720,000$. The absence of any expansive movement in discounts confirms what we said when the wheat crops of the country were found to be so large, the returns from the large harvests we foreshadoweil is yielding money which would lessen the demand for it during future Fiall seasons.
The deposits on demand in their Canadian offices increased from $\$ 100,738,575$ to $\$ 101,911,549$ in Septemiver, and the "deposits outside Canada," were onlarged from $\$ 16,429,516$ to $\$ 21,218,758$, so that the aggregate increase in deposits last month was $\$ 5,957,216$. As there was no extra. demand for discounts nt home the banks placed these new deposits in loans outside Canadn, in call loans and securities: The call loans at home were increased from $\$ 30,028,215$ to $\$ 30,786.953$, those in the States from $\$ 27,771,191$ to $\$ 29,749,949$; the outside discounts from $\$ 14,885{ }_{\alpha} 183$ to $\$ 18,650,778$, and the securitics from $\$ 46,281,388$, to $\$ 48,914,813$. These increases of loans aggregate $\$ 9,135,916$, and the aggregate of the increase of circulation and deposits was $\$ 8,923,009$, which was all absorbed, except 8212,907 , hy arditional call lonns, Inans outside Canada, and securities.
The overdue debts item shows an unfortunate increase from $\$ 1,988,004$ to $\$ 2,391,949$; For so large a sum as

## THE MRON ANO STEEL IRADE.

'llhough the present production of pig iron in the States is considerably hetuw what it has been during the whole of this year and throughout the latter half of 1890 , the irom masters are reported to be full of connidence in an enomous demand being kept up in the future. There is always more or less chieck to production given by a presidentind election coming on and to this is partly attributwd a redneed output wf iron. The figures of this trade, however, are onormous. The the first eight months of 1sog the exports of iron and steel from the States were $\$ * 9,95 \%, 090$, whereas this year they liave been $\$ 87,174$, , 389. 'IThe shipments of iron ore trom Dulath un to 1st Octolear were $14,585,000$ tons, which exeeeds those to stume date in 1899 by two millions of tons. The following shons the number of fumees in blast and their total oulput per week al eorrespionding date this year and 1890:

These stalisties show that the mitput of pig jron this month from American furnaces is less than at any period lon over in year and four months. The production on June 1st hast was at the mile of $15,000,000$ tons yenty, wherens now it is only at male oflid $11,500,000$ tons,and stocks are aceumulating. Stisl the trade is not anticipating any reduction in priees, confidence being very firm in large contacts being unde that will keep the output from accumulating. The steel rail industry must be a perfect lonanza. The cost of production is $\$ 16$ per ton, and the selling price is \$20 per ton, which gives an profit of 61 per cent. The trade is controlled by about a dozen men who work together to dictate prices. It is easily seen how they can compete with Europen makers when they have such an enomous margin to play with, and such profits secured in the home market. A feature in the stecl situation which is exciting great interest is the movement to ship Amerjcan steel for Europe via the St. Lawrence, as described in our last issue. This means active competition with Inglish, Belgian and German steel makers, which, when there is a large surplus stock accumulating in the States, will be exceedingly depressing to loreign producers, as Europe will be made a slaughter market for American steel and the Carnegie ocear freight boats will make things lively for the older lines of Athantic steamers.
'The leading Eaglish authority on finance and general trade afluirs regards the comparatively high prices which have rulud during at least a portion of that period as "now a thing of the past." That prices hatd become inflated in the States was showa by a decided "cut" in prices of wire in April last and a general "climls down," until 1898 figures were mearly reached. Then a revival took place. There was no corresponding movement in England, so when dancrican prices fell there were large quantities of siced blooms, billets, tin-plate bars, and ship-plates sold for the English market which await transportation facilities on this side. The imports of U. S. pig iron into Fingland have, this year, anounted to 40,329 tons, and unwronght steel, to about 70,000 tons. Our London courtemporary alludes to the decline in protuction, the extent of which is shown by our comparative table. Considering that a few years ago the exports of irom and steed from the States were too insignificant for notice, so fur as their effect on England's trade was coneerned, the expansion in last there years has been remarkable. In 1890 the United States exported only about 120,000 tons of iron and steel, while in 1897-S the exports were $71 \%,-$ 988 tons, in 189S-9, 881,062 toms, int in 189!)-1900, 1,026,234 tons. Tf this keeps up the Gamerrie boats will have a good supply of freights.
One main leature in the cost of producing iran and stecl is the price of conl, indeed coal is the controlling olement in cost. In this respecti America has had an advantage over Engmad as ordinatity the prices of exal at the pit's mouth have been $\$ 1.16$ in the states as against $\$ 1.36$ in Fighand. Ihese figures have been disturbed by strikes in both comitrics, so that the outlook so far as the price of cond affects the iron and sted market, is somewhat onseine. Tt is andicipated in Eingland that, within a few months, coal may come down to more normal figures, which would bring prices of iron and steel lower. This no dnabt wonld assist Fuglish protucers in meeting competitien, wid bring new demants for goods at lower quotations.
If the price of eon is redneed in England, as our contemporay expects; it will be getting down to lower figures at the same time that higher ones will probably be prevailing in the States. Such conditions will, no doubt, tend to cheok American exportations of iron and steel to
the old comitry ${ }_{\mu}$ and to restrict the making of contracts for future delivery. But, there is still great uncertainty as to the cost of mining labour: in both countrics. Until a clearer view can be had as to the cost of the conl supply, the iron and steel industry must he more or less unsettled. There is, however, a decidedly hopeinl spinit aumating the trade, confidence being generally felt that considerable improvenent is likely to occur ere the year closes.
the gavemanent of Holland has placed an order for 12,000 tons of steel rails with the Carnegie Co. These are chiefly for railways proposed to be built in Dutch colonies and India. Holland is alleged to be entering upon a new erm of colonial development, which will create an enormous demand for iron and steel for water works and other jublic enterinises. Whe Great Northern and Western hailway of Ircland has placed anorder for 3,000 tons ol steel rails with the Maryhand Steel Co., which concem is about coneluding a contract for 3,000 tons with the Londou and Brighton Railway: In addition to these large orders for steel rails the Riter-Conley Co., of Pittslourg, have the largest contracts ever on their books for structural stecl. •This concern is building an immense phamit for the Dominion Iron and Steel Company at Sydney, Cape Breton, Canada. They have also a great deal of work for the new plants of the Sharon Steel Company and Sharon Steel Hoap Company, at Sharon, Pa. Within a few days this company has submitted bids for irom and steel work of varions kinds amounting to fully $\$ 00,000$, all of which are contingent upon the re-election of President McKinley. Nuch of this is fon work in the Pittsburg district. An Jonglish firm is about establishing a plant at Pittshmerg for making a specially high grade of steel for which they have a reputation. Jatest advices indicate a movement towards higher prices, as demand is incrensing and the political ontlook is more assuring to trade interests.

## THE MARINE INSURANCE DISCRDMEATION.

We publish tarday a letter from a correspondent in Nova Scotia out the above subject which speaks for itself. It expresses a strong opinion of the injustice perpetrated from a local experfence, in all parts of the Dominion Athantic ports as well as those on the St. Lawrence route. IThis Jommal was the first to call attention to this outragcous discrimination which was certain to work serious jujury, and, il not put a stop too would cripple the ocean shipping interests of the Domiuion to such an extent as it would take yeirs to overcome. We have repantedly stated that the injury that has already been done was of such magnitude as to call for governmental action, in some ways to provide a remedy. 'The falling ofl in the number of ships arriving in this port, and the consequent diversion of Proight from the St. Isawrence route to American Atlantic ports has so fairly aroused public fecling in the matter that the Dominion Govermment will be forced to lake some action that will bring about redress.

It is not likely that a country that has done so much to build up and foster the mavitime interests as Canada has done, will tamely submit to those efforts being destroyed by ann unfair and unjustifiable combination of the marine insuramce companies, however powerful they may be. It has been the ambition of Canadians to rank ligh in the estimation of the world as a maritime country. The shipping interests of Canada have been steadily growing in importance, and would continue to grow, but for the dis-
crimination in the marine insumate rates of the last two or three yours. These have operated so injuriously as to have seriously handicapped the regular lines and have practically debarred all the tramp steancre-that. heretofore have helped to build up the trade-from coming to the St. Lawrence, and as our Nova Scotia correspondent truly says, is so unfaizly injurious to all our Dominion Atlantic ports.

As we have belore pointed out there is no just reason for this discrimination. It is based simply on misunderstandings and misrepresentations in rumning down the whole system of aids to the safety of navigation that have been established at a great cost. 'Those aids may not be perfect in the Canadian system, but neither are they in any other country. At the same time it must be adinitted that the Department in charge of those aids has always, for mawy years back, endeavoured to meet as fir as possible, all the demands for improvements. This quiestion is one that aflects the material prosperity of the comtry at large, therefore should be dealt with irrespective of political party fecling and by the Federal Govermient in a broad and statesmanlike manner.

## CII'Y SEWERAGE IN ME HARBOUR.

On several occasions we have directed the health atuthorities' attention to the disgracelul condition of the cily sewer which empties into the harbour opposite the Custom House, as being a serious menace to the health of the city. On the return from Europe of the President of the Provincial Board of Health-which is popularly supposed to have jurisdiction and extensive powers in such matters when the local authorities fail to act-we called that official's attention to the subject, and we were given to understand that both the city; and the harlionr authorities had been called upon to provide a remedy. This was some weeks ago. The evil is growing daily and nothing further is being dowe to remove this danger. In our last issue, we thercfore again called upon the Pressilent of the Provincial Board of Fealth to excrese his authority in the best interests of the city and port. We have received in reply the following letter:

Montreal 2and Oct., 1900.
To the Editor of the Canadian Jommal of Commerce:
Dear Sir,--l have been instructed to send you a copy of a report made as early as 1895 , respecting the harbour muisance. Since then, the attention of both the city and the Harbour Commissioners was again called to the matter, and we were given to understand that the nuisance would be remedicd in the course of the harbour improvements actually being carried out.

The explamation given can scarcely be considered satisfactory. It has ahways been understood that the sewer in question would be extended to below the Vietorin pier so as to strike the strong current in the river, hefore the new piers comected with the harbour improvenents were commenced. That work is essentially and was always understood to be a city work. It should have been anoing the first to bo undertaken in connection with the new improvements after the current was cut off from the harbeur by the construction of the garard pier. Tlie new piers have made the whole hatbour practically a stagnant pool, all the water of which is polluted and discolowed by the fluid matter from that sower, whilst the solid mation
deposited is constanlly lermenting, at the botion mid the eruption of the geysers, to which we alluded list week, is continuous and the escaping gases therefrom are an abomination and a danger to the health of all persons working or living in the vicinity, therefore to all our citizens and visitors.
Whe President of the lerovincial Board of Heath may not be aware of it, but as a matter of fact, it is well linown that the reason nothing is being done in this mather is becanse some tow of the aldermen have repudated the obligation and phain duty of the city in this -matiter and have refused lo go on with the work. Ilhe reason given is, that the Jharbour Commissioners should pay for il. 'lhis the lharbour Board very properly reluse to agree lo, and it must be apparent to all that unless some superior authori-ty-il there be such-steps in and enforces action the mather will remain and the danger grow until it will become intolerable. If the Provincial Board of Heally is vested with the necessary powers to effect any grod they should be exercised in this case. If that Board is powerless to act its impotence should be made known.
IThe report which is sent to us with the secretary's letter is a very long one, and is dated as far back as August, 1895. . It is signed by Mr. Jos. A. Beaudry, Inspector of Health, and is a very clear and able document. Although the conclusions arrived at were made known at the time we have no recollection of its ever having been published in extenso. That report was the result of a fear expressed by some of the leading medical men of the city that the guard pier, then nearing completion, unless some change was made, would have the eflect of causing a stagmation of the water in the harbour, and also of the opinion of eminent engineers that openings should be made in the guard pier so as to admit sufficient water inside to make a current that would ensure a continual change. The correctness of those opinions given by the medieal men and engineers at that time have been verified by present conditions and the reasons given therefor are well put in the report in question. As a result of the information obtained and the references to the cases of sickness that had already been coused from the sewer at the Cuslom House even at that time, three conclusions are arrived al in the report, which we append:
1st. That the discharge into Rigin basin of the sutace frem the eity collecting sewer constitutes a mismee ant a ihuger to pultic health.
Mad. That these nuisance and danger were
by the conselpuetion of the guard pier, which has stombur the strong eurrentio of the river from roming near the wharves, therely callsing the water inside of the bus $t$, remain stagumat.
3rd. 'That steps should ho haken at once to remmee these misamea and danger by rembing the ont thet of the collecting sower to some other plate where it will mase no muisame or dunger.

## AN UNDGRWTTMER ON FIRE TOSSBS,

At a convention of Fire Chiefs hedd recently at Charlestom, S.C., Mr. Afteed, manger of the Hamlarg-Bremen Fire Insurance Co., delivered a well prepared address on the ammal fire waste. Te wfirmed that the fire waste out this centinent is from six tor ten times greater proportionately than in any other combtry, which startling statement he ilechared was based upon the records of 76 of the principal cities of the world. The enormous loss of $\$ 127,-$ $506,20_{0} 0$ in the first eight munths of this year is more
than double the normal live loss and nearly 50 per cent. more than that of 1899 , which is remembered as a very disastrous year to insurance interests. A comparison of the fire record ol' 1890 of six of the principal cities in Surope (I'mis, Berlin, St. L'elersburg, Hamburg. Constantinople and Dublin), as oftained through the assistance of the state Jeparturent at Washington, showed ada average loss of 10 cents per cetpiti, while in the United States, the cily of Now lork, which was chosen as a representative city, and whose average was lar below the average of ten of the principad cities of this coumtry showed an average loss of $\$ 2.80$ per capita. hior a term of eight years the loss ratio has averaged $\$ 2.49$ and last yeur $\$ 3.36$. The underwriters have organized associations in all parts of the country to inspect and classily towns and risks according to their construction and means of protection. They have caused the introduction of water works and improvements of fire departments in hundreds of cities and towns by their intimation that the insumpuce rates would be increased unless such improvements were made. They have introduced pro rata liability clauses in their pulicies to be able to establish an equitable basis for rating and to enable their fire statistics to be of some value as indicating the percentage of destruction o value, and they have established rates based on the conditions that make one risk superior to another. They have settled losses more promptly and paid them quicker, been more liberal to agents and the assured than ever before in the hope of increasing the volume in order to head ofi: the increasing loss ratio, but it has been all in vain. The fire system has been, improved, handpipes, reservoirs, lire boats, and sprinklers, chemical engines, \&c. have been multiplied yet the fire loss goes on increasing. Mr. Afteed gave the following statistics:

the risks written in 1899 showed an increase ol 30 per cent. over those of 1890 , while the preminn receints showed an incre:se of only 19.5 orer those of 1890 , making an actual reduction oft 1 per cont. on the total tereipts. an the loss ratio increasing 20 per eent.; the memere increase it the number of failures was 7.04 ; average inerease in the number of fires was 181 .

Tu view of these facts does not the thought lie neald that perhaps the ense with which ample protection can le obtained through fire insurance, and stil] greater case and promptness with which losses are adjusted and paid is the couse for much of this destruction? The charge against fire insurance companies that they are responsible for a large pontion of the fire waste becouse of the apparent recklessness with which insurance is given was combatted as unjustified. The comprinies had no interesti in exposing themselves to fraudulent demands. Theiv offorts to check dishonest insumince were not supported ly public sentiment. Twenty American states have put. laws on their statute books to the effect that where the assured succecds in getting over-insurance on a building
the company must pay the full amount insured in case of total desiruction without reference to its actual value. The pro rata liability clause, which is the basis of all insurance in Lurope, the basis of every marine contract, and must be the basis of every equitable insurance contract, if the lowest rates are desired, has also been prohibited ly ten states.
The public sympathises with exorbitant claims made after a fire; this has been shown in so many instances in the courts that not one out of a hundred questionable loses are litigated; and of those litigated, not one out of ten successfully. In a community where so large a proportion are indifferent to the cxtortion of all that is possible out of the public through the insurance companies whenever the opportunity offers, there is but one remedy that occurs to me that would be simple, absolutely automatic and thoroughly effective in reducing this annual destruction, amely: The state must prohibit full indemnity being paid to anyone responsible for a fire loss, and to any one on whose premises a fire originates, unless such occupant can show affirmatively that it originated through the carelessness or design of another party. Where the exact location of the origin of the fire remains in doubt, none of the immediately adjoining parties should receive full indemnity. The possibility of any party profiting by a fire happening on his premises would be so remote that fires from this source would cease as if by magic.
Mr. Affeed expressed the confident belief that such a provision would at once create a demand for a safe and non-inflammable construction ard for the investigation of every fire before any insurance company would be permitted to pay a loss. But as our government camnot rise above the honesty and intelligence of the majority, and as it would rajse a protest from all who are profiting from the ammal destruction by fire at the expense of the pulbJic, as it would greatly interfere with speculation on inflated valuation of property backed by over-insurance, it is more than likely that this, the simplest and most effeetive method, will not soom be adopted. We must continue to collect our data and premiums and publish our statistics to an apathetic public until some great calamity shall arouse public sentiment to the justice and equity of the Trench code which assumes that no fire happens without some one's negligence, and which allows no indemnity whatever to the party responsible for the fire, or in whose premises it originated, unless stich party can show that the fire did not happen through his own gross aegligence nor his procurement, and makes such party responsible to all others who suffer damage thereby.

The next best thing was to have every fire promptly investigated, to prohibit inflammable roofs and buildings; to forlid the use of maptha or gasoline jn any dwelling, and to restrict it in workshops; to prohihit the storing of friction matches in houses or wherever combustible goods are kept; and to give the chief of every fire department legal athority to order the removal of all dangerous rullhish or materials, liable to originate or aggravate a fire.

## Cotid "storage frutt.

During our recent visit to lhurope; when crossing the Paglish Chamuel, we became aequainted with a passenger who had an expert knowledge of Canadian imports. He had heen in business at Bristol from which he relired with a fortune, and, after the very sensible English fashion, was spending his later years in secing the world and re-
creating himself. He admitted that the fruits of Camada were unsurpassed, sive probably by the apples grown in New Zealand. But, his experience was, that Canadian shippers of fruit were much too carcless in packing them, the result boing that considerable guantities were spoilt in transit, and a prejudice created againsl Camadian apples. We assured him that for many years past we had advocated the package of apples in boxes divided into sectionse as cggs are packed. This phan our fellow passenger thought an excellent one, and he wondered why it had not been adopted. The difference in cost between packing a rough barrel, and in a box with sections, would be quite trifling compared with the extra value which would be given to truit by careful packing. One Camadian fruit grower has been taking special pains to pack his apples so carefully as to ensure their being delivered in perfect condition. Owing to this he has been able to obtain prices from 50 per cent. and upwards in excess of those for the same class of fruits carelessly packed in bartrels. The success of the Canadian cold storage system in keeping our fruits in good, marketable condition was shown by the exhibit at the Paris Exhibition. The Minister of Agriculture received the following cablegran on the 15th inst., from the Secretary of the Camadian Commission, Paris:

Paris, Oct. 15th, 1900.
Hon. Sydney Fisher, Ottawa:
Fresh fruits have arrived in splendid condition; four additional gold medals received by Canada. Prof. Drummond, writing from London, warns the Department of Agriculture at Washington that it must wake up, as Canada leads in quality and quantity of dairy products. . Its superiority ascribed to aggressive govermmental action with modern scientific appliances.

## DUPUIS.

A description of Canadian pears and peaches landed and sold at Manchester this month appeared in several English papers. The London Daily Mail, of Oct. 3rd, says: "Ihe magnificent pears- 1,000 cases in all-sold at Manchester, came from London, Ontario, and crented quite a stir in trade circles. . Many of the pears are what are termed "giant fruits," being from 4 in., to $4 \frac{1}{2}$ in. long the dianter being from 3 in. to $3 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{in}$. In color, flavor and juciness they are far superior to french pears, and meet a ready sale. The fruit was packed in chambers regulated by mechanical refrigeration. This systen which has revolutionized the Iruit lrade of the United Kingdom, was inaugurated three years ago by the Minister of Agriculture for Canada, and since then varions improvements have been male under the supervision of Professor Robertsous. The conditions of transit are now so faultiess that the most delicate Canadian fruit can be delivered in Great Britain in perfect condition," Cold storage, however, does not obviate the necessity for carclul packing in order to ensure such fruit being sound and attractive.

THE GERMAN ALJJANCE.
One of the most important of modern events is the alliance lomed between Great Britain and Germany in regard to the Chinesa Empire. The entrance of Cermany into a friendly agreement with England at this juncture is an interesting commentary on the utterances of those who have been depicting the old land as wholly withont allics, or even friends, as, "occupying indeed a position of disgraceful and dangerous isolation," to quote the recent:
words of a prominem, Americtn joumal. Although the alliance is techinically confined to the Chinese yuestion, it is a mattor of historic experienee that, when two nations enter into a treaty affecting their action in regard to one combtry, they usbilly beeme allics in a gemeral sense. No agrecment of a restricted, special charater can he mainhained between two powers unless they also act in harmony, throughout the whote fied of diplomacy.

She agrement in question was armageil by Lord Satishury, and the German Ambassador in Tonden, Comet Von Thathedd. The terms are umusually short, and remarkably explicit. Ihe agrement has four clauses. The first combuns the gist of the matter. It reads in full: "lt is a matter of joint permanent intermational interest that the ports on the rivers and littome of Chima should mamin free and open to trade and to every other legitimate form at economic activity for the peoples of all countries without distinction and the two Governments agree on their part to uphold the same lor all Chinese terribory as lar as they can exereise influence."
The second clase phedges each power to abstain from scouring any part of the termitory of China, and to a policy of "maintaining undiminished the territorial condition of the Chinese Empine." Jhe third chuse deelares that, it another power seeks bo obtain tervitorial mbantages, the two powers "reserve to themselves the right to come to a preliminary understanding regarding the eventand step to be taken for the protection of their own interests in China." The fourth clause reads: "IThe two Governments will commmicate this agreement to the other powers interested, especially Austrin-Itmagry, France, Italy, Dapan, Russia, and dic Uuited States, and invite them to weept the princijples recorded in it."

This brief dowment, on which the penee of the woth linges, is variously interpreted. It is thought to be a warning to Russia to keep her hands off China, but, in our judgment, it is not likely that Clermany and England weuld do anything to aftront Russia nt this crisis. The German press gericmally approves highly of the alliance as being in accord with the hest traditions of the Empire, and is following the course most calenlated to give the tade of Gormany free scope in China.

White the lading papers of France see nothing in the agreement adverse to the interests of French trade with (hima, they show considerable chagein at an alliance being conswmmated between Gread Britain and Gemmany. With a lamentable want of tact the tone of the French press has been far from amiable towards England for a. length of time, and, for what rational purpose no one can explain; the weakness and solitary position of Great Britain have been incessantly haped upon by the general body of the French newspapers. The German alliance makes all this fusilade of sneers and disparigement direeted against Enghand appear somewhat hadicrons. Hence the anger of some lending French papers at an event which cstablishes a condition that ensures the perce of Europe.
The immediate effect of the agrement becoming known was to advance values on the learis bourse and the Tondon Stook Exchange, It would have redounded much to the honour and the repulabion of the United States if that power lad been a formal paty to the German alliance Now that Tingland and Germany have joined in a formal agreement to pursue a mutual policy in China and to stand by each other in case of eventuadities arising from their muon, the United States is claiming, that the two allies simply, followed American precedent: It requires colossal assurnene to make such a claim, and when made,
and even if admithed, it is mether a disaredil than utherwise to the Americati Govemment. The United States slands ready to reap any adrantage that arises from Earope keeping open the ports of China, but declines to make any sacrifice in suppport of the powers of Europe in pursuing that policy. Sueh diplomacy may be excecdingly smart, butit is execedingly ignoble. We hail the alliance of Enghnd and Germany for their mutual interests and the interests of the world's peace. as an event that brightons the gloom that had gathered over the dying hours of this century.

## MADANSLUN OW WLE HLANO AND ORGAN TRADEA.

In order to make a point in lavour of the fiseal policy which has prevailed in Canada since 1896, the Glole has issued a statement showing how the piano fulustry in Joronto has been eharged since 1895. The figeres show, that in the latter year the musioal insirument lactories in Joronto employed 112 men, while this year there are 1201 so employed. The incrense is doubtless large, but it is Wifficult to trace any connection between the expansion in piano and organ making and the fiscal system in foree since the increase took pace. Mir. John Charlon, one of the most faithful members and supporters of the Liberal party, in a recently issued leiter, says; "It is well to rocognize that our prosjurity has been dua to the blessings of. Providence and to caluses beyond the control of the Canadian Govermmont." When so strong a Tiberal partizan alfirms that the prosperous trade which has prerailed since 1895 , has arisen from causes beyoud the conhol of the Govermment, we shall not be exposed to the charge of pantizanship of the other type il we take the same view as Mr. Charlon. We therelore attribute the increase in the output of piainos and organs since 1.895 to the improved condition of the people gencrally, but more especially those engaged in agriculture.

The tarife has not been altered since 1895 in any way calculated to cllarge the production of organs and pianos in Canada. The changed condition of the trade sinen 1895 has therefore no interest as an illustration of the effect of a fiscal policy. But, the whole condition of this industry is an illustration of the bencficial results of a pelicy designed to develop and protect native enterprisos. In $18 \% 9$ the manufacture of organs and pinnos in Canada. was in a very obscure aud crude condition. A Canadian made piano was indeed a curiosity. After the protective tariff of 1879 had been established only a brief time the opening for capital in that industry was seen, and several factories were opened. 'The pioncer firm in making instruments of superior excellence was, Mason \& Risch, Toronto, who, from the first, determined to make notin cheap, common piano, but one as good as could be made in Canada muder the then existing conditions. This policy was followed by other firms in Toronto and this city, whose instruments, if not equal to the splendid ones made by the leading Amorican mamofacturers, are at lenst acceptable to pianisls of good average ability and some refinement in musical taste.

Other firms devoted themselves to the making of organs and pianos of the chenpesti kind, of which there has been an enormous snle in Canada since the industry was prolected. These instruments have this apology, they afford pleasure and the facilities for musical cultiure to a large class of persons who, were a low priced piano not availible, would be without such an opportunity. Cheap pianos help to create a taste for more perfect ones, so the fasti-
dious connoisseur may rejoice to find the sale of low priced instruments being so extensive. But our present object is ta draw attention to the real cause of the expansion of the organ and pinno trade since 1895 , and to point out that this industry is a child of protection.

## THE COBDEN CLUB ON CANADA'S PREFERENTIAL TARIFF.

The Cobden Club seems anxious to take a hand in the political game of Canada. It has issued a leaflet on, "The Canadian Preferential Tariff," of which it has favoured us with a copy. This movement on the part of the Cobden Club having been initiated during the height of an election contest is a somewhat peculiar preceeding. We do not deny the right of this Club to address the Camadian people, it shares this with every person in the world who is vain enough to imagine that he has a message of some interest or value to us. We claim the right to send out missionaries to all the peoples who, in our judgment, are in meed of such ministrations. We camot justly complain, therefore, if a political mission society, like the Cobden Club, puts forth efforts to economically evangelise the political heathens of this country. At the same time - we feel an impulse to say to the Coblen Club, "mind your own business."

In the leaflet hefore us it says, "We lave mo desire to criticise the 'National Policy,' which is the fiscal policy of Canadn:" But in spite of its own lack of desire to do so, it criticises that policy with the customary severity of those who do not compreheud its necessity, or expedicncy. or its proved advantages. The Colden CInl) has Free Trade on the brain. It regards that system to be as sacred as though it were a divine revelation. In order to lave that system carried out in Camada, it would regard the destruction of our manufacturing industrics as wise, as inded obligatory. We Camadime, who prefer the national welfare to anv theory, are looked upon as though we wore breaking all the ten commindments for the sake of profit. The members of the Cobden Chub, put their toes towards the fire in an Buglish grate while they moan over the hapless lot of the farmers and lumibermen in Canada, who they faney are being bled white by the protection given to wative manufactures. It is, havever notorious that, while the fiscal system which thic Cobden Club deplores has been in forec about 20 ycars, the farmers of Canada have piled up savings in our banks by millions yearly. Naturally therefore they, today, are utterly uneonscions of the bleeding which so distresses their Cobden Club sympathizers. The Camadian farmers were never so woll off as they now are, nor were they ever before so advantageously phaced for using their incoines with economy:
The Cobden Club alfirms that, "Jverything that the Canadian farmer or lumberman buys is tased for the beneift of a compratively snall number of manufacturers." That assertion inplics, that, "everything the Canadian farmer or Jumberinan buys," is imported. No one conversant with life in Canada would have made such a statement, for he would know that the greater bulk of the purchases made by our farmers and lumbermen are for goods produced in this country, a large portion of which are such natural products, as food, fuel, fodder, \&c., on which there is no duty. The goods which our farmers and lumbermen chiefly purehase, outside the above, are mainly such as are made in Canada, which, of their class, are as cheap as those made elsewhere:- We liave before
us an elaborate retail price list of an immense variety of costume goods on sale at Manchester, England. From earcful cxamination and enquiries we have information from which we could prove, that every single article can he bought at about the same price in this city; or Toronts. The truth is, that under a protective policy, a large class of goods are now made in Camada, such as farmors buy. which are retailed in our stores as lor in price as the same class of goods are retailed in the cities and torms of Figland.

There are other elasses of goods which are mot made here. on which import duties are charged, which would sell far more freely were English manufacturers more determined to capture this market. That the duties on such goods are unt oppressive, that they are not unjustly levied, is demonstrated by this fact. at this moment an cxeiting election contest is going on in Canadn and not a roice has been raised in favour of any modification of the tariff, nor is thigre a single condidate seeking popular supnort in Camada as a Free Trader. There are newspapers in Canada which hash up Free Trade arguments continually, and speakers whd make o sad hash of them, hut they will support the protective fisenl svetem now estal)lished. Theirs is a case of, "Yox ct preterea nihil.".

The Cobden Club has struck Sir Wilfrid Lamuer a very uncalled for and most un Priendly blow. It declares that "ns a nractical steri towards a ploger umion of the different; piarts of the Empire Sir Wilcrit Taurier's preferential tariff has heen a failure." It affirms that. "The tariff has absolutelv failed to effect the purnicse for which it was intended." The leaflet of the Club has a diagram showing that: "In spite of the preferential tariff, the perrentage of American goods entering Canadn has continuied to inorense. and the percentrige of British goods to decline." It declares that, "The improvement in Camadian exports to Great Britain is duo to quite other causes than the Thaurice tariff" Thie assertion is made that. "The preferential tariff is $n$ failure because, in spite of the preference, British goods still pay a higher average tax on entering Camada than American goods." To prove this it gives the following dith:


We give these figures precisely as they appear in the leaflet of the Coldeden Club, which, in its comments thereon, says: "गTye more important branches of American trade are enosuraged ly the Canadian tariff, while most hanches of Builish irade are discoutaged." From all which the Cobden Club arrives at this conclusion: "The preferential toriff desigmed by Sir Wilfrid Jaurier to be a new bond of Tmpire las proved a failure."

As Sir Wilfrid, upon, whose scheme this vigorous attack is made, is the prome wearer of the gold medal of the Cobden Club, he will be adje to appreciate the significance of the reloff it has administered. To return their medal seems to be liis natural course. He might saty to his brethren of the Club:

> "I own you'd a right to dissemble your love;
> But why did you liek me down stairs?"

## BOER PROPBECIES A YEAR AGO.

Anticipating what has occurred in South Africa since war was cominenced against England by the Boers on 11th Oct,; 1809, we have been kecping copies of letters in which prophecies were niade as to the result of the con-

lliet then just emmenced. In the London times of 16 th Oct., hast yens, an entive column is occupied by a letter frem a distinguished participaut in the movement to oust (ireat Britain from Sonth Afriea. The Tlimes is very chary of the use of its enlumas lyy strangers, or persoms of no political, literary, scientific or social prominence. Tt is therefore cortain that the letiers before us were not anly genuine but emmated from some highly influential Poer. We shall give a few extracts from these letters which are most interesting realling in the light of what has necurred since they were published.
The writer opene by saying: "Tlue radicals of Bngband have heen the blind tools of our far-seeing and intelligent President, Mr. Kruger. We Boers desired delay and have hat $\mathrm{it}_{\text {, }}$ and we are now practically masters of South Africa from the Zambesi to the Cape. All Afrikanders have been working to this end. Germany, Russia and Tramee do not desire Fingland to get possession of the r00 millions of pounde' worth of gold in the Transvaal, and so, after enemuging Thgland to believe that, they willmot interfere in South Africa they will ecertainly do so, and those powers will assist us Boers directly and indirectly to drive England ont of Africa." Frow vain was this prophecy was shown hy the Boov delegates bening shown the door by Germany, Russia and France. We lope the radienl leaders in England enjoy being called Mrr. Kruger's tools.
The writer goes on to sny: "The lazy, dirty, drumken working classes of Bngland will never permit themselves to be taxed to support, the British Empire, or even to pre-
serve the existence of England as a nation, for there is no patriotism in the working classes of Great Britain." The recent clection makes such remarks and prophecies appear absurd, as no class in England has more enthusiastically supported the war than those whom this Boer reviles. He gocs on to declare, that Americans will assist foreign powers in starving England into surrender, and to eonquer the old land. He pronounces "the soldiers of the Queen" as wenklings in mind, in physique, in conrage and in skill. Fis langunge in describing the British soldier is too vile for publication. He says: "The major part of the British population consists of cripples, epileptics, consumptives, cancerous people, invalids and lunatics"! Even the statesmen and high officials of Ingland are said by this Boer to be victims of disease which makes them cowards. The Tnglish sailors are described as "honey-combed with disloyalty," of which no doubt, the splendid services of the marines of Fi.M.S. Powerful were a proof! The sailors are said to be the poorest in the world.

The first letter winds up by this prophecy: "We Boers will drive you Pritish curs out of Africa altogether, and the armed manhood of Europe will then divide all the possessions of Great Britain between them." His last wotls are: " 300,000 . Dutch herocs will trample England under their feet; weem afford to tell the truth now, and in this letter you have got jt"!

In his second letter this distinguished Boer prophet dips into history. He declares that since 1867 "No British Government has dared to increase the expenditure on

military furees," and that "the Empire can be starved into submission in spite of its naryp even it three times as lig, is admitted by all intelligent Britishors." As to Indian troops, "they are too disgusted with the wenkness nud cowardice of their English commates to be relied upon." Thommy Atkins is described as "so teoble that he is incapable of marching a few miles at a moderate pace in his own country.". The whole British mee is declated to the so degenerating as to have so pluck, courage or staminit. Even the women of Great Britain are not spmed by this Boer. He says: "Your women are helping your race on the road to physical and moral ruin." The poliey of British stalesmen, Liberal and Conservative, is pronounced to be "a poliey of snivel, snuffic, weakness, whining and cant." The minines are said to be "deerting wholesale:" It is highly significant that the ahove prophecies of British disaster are declared to be in harmony with the viows of Messrs. Stead, Morley, Harcourt, Clark amd Courtney, whose pro-Boer sympathies have disgusled even the radicals of lingland. This second letter conemites with the prephecy: "In a fow short weeks Thgland will be relegated to her proper position, that is, considerally below Spain in the estimation of the world."

Necdless to say, the writer, who was a distinguished associate of Mr. Kruger, expresses his intense hatred of Fingland. Fis words read : "In common with the natives of all civilized countries I deșire the destruction of the British Empire."

We should very much enjoy an interview with the Boer prophet whose vaticinations we have quoted, in ortcer to see the humiliation of this enemy of the British Burpire tnd the insulter of the British race and slanderer of all who own their allegiance to the British Crown.

## WHAT WAS THE PRICI?

A sensation has been caused in this city by one of the Freuch daily papers suddenly changing its politics. One of its ablest editorial writers has withdrawn from all comnection with the paper. The journal in question has posed for years as independent, but its loanings have been towards the party out of power. Only recently the responsible conductor arranged to give Sit Charles 'Tupper' the papor's decided support. Then, there was a sudde! twist round, just at the same time as two other papers were, unsuccessfulily sought to be bribed. It wound be interesting to know, what was the price paid to secure this change, and out of whose pocket it canc? We should be gind to have this information to insert in our market report, along with current prices of other cattle wel gon!: We have recently learnt that $\$ 10,000$ was ton a high a price to be paid for a seat in the Senate, which is unsatisfactory information. What the public would like to know is, What has been paid for a Senatorship? Tf this were quoted we could then say how the market we ran ? for political houours. Tf, too, we knew what has been,
or is being, paid for the use of the ceritor of a daily paper to write articles contrary to those he has become associated with, we shouk know the market price of brans and of honour.

## IJGGAL MANNERS.

The action of one of the Pamks of this eity in initiating criminal proccedings against persons aceused of having defrauded it, has naturally caused considerable public disenssion, in the course of which the emiluet of other institutions, in refraining from similar prosecutions, has heen commented upon.
It is not mureasomathe to allow that one of the first duties which any enrporation or individual which may have heen rohbed thinks of performing, is, to secure repayment of the loss sustained in consequence of the erime, and where this can he accomplished without any condonation of the offenee or any paltering, or eompromise with Whe persons aceused of having committed it, the public is not, ememerned. The law, as we understand it, does not require an injured person to disregard the ordinary precantions and romedies of a creditor, thongh it does prohibit any corrupt burguin, calculated to impede the course of justice.

The reluchance of such institutions as hanks, and, in fact, the muwillingness of private persons, to emlark upon protracted and expensive prosceutions in our eriminal eomerts would he greatly diminishei, and the interests of publie justice would, to that extent be decidedly furtheren, if less latitude were permitted the hawyers for the defence in such eases to make the matter one for vituperiafion of the complainant, the exposute and ventiatation of utterly irrelevant details, and persistent attempts to make it gencrally winemufortable and umpensmbe for those who seek legal redress.

Very frefuenty, the umformate supplimt, at: the bar of justice is treated as if he and not the prisoner, were the real criminal. Ithe most private affirs of his life are pried into and made the subjects of coarse jokes, intended "to tiekle the mats of the gromudings" who infiest the porliens of eriminal Conets.

It is not, in the nature of things, agroentle for ats. Tomes, whoso domestic eutlery has been purloined, to be asked ly Mr. Buzina, Q.C., whether it is mot true that Mres. Tones wears finse teelh, nor to he tolld, "on the instruction of the accused," by her counsel, that he is informed that Mr. Tones plays poker at his Club. Nor does a Rank, or other public Company, care to expose it-
self to the gibes and jests of some pettifogger, anxious to achieve a cheap reputation as criminal lawyer by speeches and comments utterly forcigm to the matter in hand.

If those in control of judicial proceedings, of the nature of those to which we are referring, conifined these legal luminaries to the real question bofore the Courts and circumscribed the limits of the defence-without interfering with legitimate effort to elicit the truth about the achaal issue involved-perhaps wo should hear less about suppressed crimes and unlawful compromises of fransactions which should be brought to light. Lawyers should not "strike below the belt," but remember Chief Justice Cockburn's admonition to "employ the weapons of the soldier, mot the dagger of the assassin."

## TORONIO MUNICTPAL LIBRARY.

In 1883 the ratepayers of Toronto decided by vote to establish a Public Sibrary to be furnished and mainanined out of the rates. Thlis decision was the result of an agitation commenced in the editorial columns of the Foronto Mail, which found support also in other papers. The first appeal to the civic electorate proved successtul. The premises selected were occupied as a music hall and oflices. Ihey were well adapted to the purpose at the time, but are now too small to give adequate aceommotation to a public reading room, a reference library, and a large public libury. The enterprise was very fortumate in having an enthusiastic supporter in the late Alderman Tham, who donated a splendid collection of 2,034 valuable hooks of relerence, which were selected and purehased for him by the libratian. In securing so expert a book buyer and book lover, as well as courteous official ms Mr. Bain for its chice librarian Iloronto was also very fortumate. It has also been so in having ar succession of citizens on the boned of mangemetot who have shown their thorough sympathy with the objects nad the works of a civic public library The present Chairman is Jutge MoDougall, whose enlightitned views, energy and somnd literary juigment have been of the greatest service.
The Tloronto Public Tibrary contains 112,849 volumes, of which 50,555 are in the referdnce department, the looks in which are not in circulation outside. The books are valued at $\$ 1$ an0,000. This department contains a perfect sett of the official reports of the government of Canarla, and of a number of public institutions, and soejecties. These are invaluable for students of Canadian history mad are being contimually consilted by editorial writers, bar-

The Referenee Libury, 'looronto, is always occupied by a number of persons who find the volumes at thein service of the greatest value in pursuing investigations called for by their professions or occujations. The practical utility of such opportumities is known to us by the maker of a patented article in great demanid informing us that, when a meename: he used to study in the Reference Ribrary and from a technical work he took a hint which led to his invention. Naturally the demand for works of fiction exeects that of auny other subject. But the schedule of books issued last year gives those treating of the arts and sciences as 26,111; generad literature, as travels, biograply, history, poctry, \&c., 76,354; juvenile works, 79,680, and those used for reference, $24,88 \%$. The total circulation of books, \&c., in the Public Tibrary, Joronto, last year amounted to 516,490 .

The entire expenditure last year was $\$ 34,050$, of which \$9,697 was for books, magazine, and newspapers. The cost to the attepayers of this institution amomis to ahout 15 cents per hend for the year. Besides the library proper there is a splendid reading room furnishel with about 400 diflerent periodicenls, which comprise well nigh all the newspapers published in Canadia, a large number of American onces, and the leading papers of Great Britam. there is a commodions reading room set apart for ladies which is much appreciated, as are the four bowehes of the library placed conveniently for different sections of the people. As a movement has commonced for a Public I.ibrary in this city, the albove data will be of use and interest.

## Gmbaper gas min chmoago.

IThere has been a struggle to obtain cheaper gas for illuminating purposes in Chicengo which has resulted in the City Council passing a bylaw fixing the price of gas to be charged to the consumers there at 75 cents per 1,000 feet. This reduction is to take effect forthoth. In this respect Chicago has put itself in line with many other cities in relieving the people from the extortionate ates of monopolies which use the publie strects to enable them to gain excessive profits out of one of the most common conveniences, if not necessities, of city life. We contend that our ports are just as safe as Boston or New York, and they receive the sume rates to South Ameriea. We are thus compelled to suspend our lenglish business after September, while we can insure cargoes at 2 per cent. to South America and less to the West Indies.

As only one vessel in 1.00 has been lost from our Nova Scotian deal fleet, most of the shippers insure themselves when the rate advances over 4 per cent. We are now loading two hargues and eertainly prefor to risk the shipment to pexing 10 guineas per cent. on them. Koping this may be rectifiod some day, we remain, yours truly.

Mr. Brush, the United States Consul at Niagara Tauls, Ont., has made a report to the State Department at Washington upon the eftects of the Canadian preferential tarifl. In 1SOC a tarif: of 25 per cent. in favor of English, as against American products, was imposed in Canada, and recently this was increased to 33 1-3 per ceint. The Consul says, the effect of the increase upon the United States will not be very noticealje, because Canada imports into the United States in 100 lines and from England only in four. The Canadian manufacturers are now protesting bectuse the increase injores them, particularly in the matten of woolleus. The Canadians have $\$ 20,000,000$ in woollen mills, and the United States imports were less than $\$ 1,000,000$, as against $\$ 8,000,000$ from England.
Under the 25 per cent. preferential tariff, by reason of increased activity, the United States exports actually increased $\$(11,000,000$ to $\$ 101,000,000$ in 1890 , or nearly three times the total British exports to Camada. The American consul considers that the British are reaping a substantial benefit, and :are favoring Canada in return wherever possible, so that Camadian exports to Great Tritain have increased 00 per cent. Now Camada wants free trade in food supplies with England, which would be a serious loss to the United States, but the Consul thinks this danger is remote.

## THE MUTUAK, RESERVE FUND LIPE ASSOCLATION.

When the lnsurance Aet of the Dominion of Canada was amended, something over a year ago, an amendment was inchaded, providing that companies heretofore licensed to do business in Canada as assessment institutions might qualify as to their future business in Canada under the provision of the law requiring the mantenance of a reserve, the same as that held by companies licensed as legal reserve companies in the Dominion of Conada. The Mutual Reserve Fund Jite Association announces that it includes in all of its policies now written a prowision for maintaining the full reserve reciuired by statute of legal reserve compauies, and the Association has complied with the requirements of the law above retered to in this regacd, and that, with relation to all business herealter written in the Duminion of Canada, it will bes sultyect to the same provisions as to reserve and stand in the same relation to the law of the Dominion as legal reserve companies, thus following the action already taken in the Slate of Massachusetts.

## POIULARTTY OF THE SL. LAWRENCE ROUTE.

American capitalists are understood to be proposing to take idvantage of the St. Tawrence route next season and the improved faeilities for the handling of grain which are expecteil to be ready before the season is far advanced, A flet of large steamships is at present under construction Which will trade between the lakes and the sea. This shipbuilding is now groing on at varions points on American soil. The Union Dry Doek Co. of Buthalo and the Craig Shipbuikting Co. of' 'Toledo are each building a steamer for J. J. Crosthwate of Buthalo. I'hey are designed especially for the lumber trate. Dhe Hawgood-Perry layne Co. of Cleveland, O., has two stemmers now in commission on the lakes that ure litted with surfuce condensers and other necessary apparatus tor satt water service.

The lessemer Steamship Co. (Rockefeller interests) is arranging to send on or about Nov. 1 three of their whalebick barges to tho const. Morcover, there are building at the domin works of the American Shipbuilding Co. two steamers designed especially for the Atlantic const trade. ## THE LONGEST RATLWAY.

The Scientific American in its desire to rob Canada of the distinction of having a line with the greatest mileage, has fallen into several serious blunders. These are pointed out in the liailway World. The Canadian Pacific is conceded to have 10,005 miles, but the New York Central is claimed to have 10,410, and the Pennsylvania system, 10,302. These figures are wholly wrong, unless the Scientific American counts their tracks both ways. Official returns give the $\therefore$. Y. Oentral 2,034 miles, and the lennsylvania system, including lines operated jointly, has 7,088 miles. So that as a matter of tact the aggregate mileage; of the two U.S. railways said to have cach a greater length than our C.P.R., does not equal the mileage of Canada's great railway. The total of the two railways, the New York Central and the lennsylvania systems, amownt together to only 10,022 , which falls 13 miles short of the length of the Canadian Pacific. Canada indeed has the most extensive railway system in the world, as well as the noblest waterway system.

## AN INSURANCE TNSTITIUTE FOR MONTREAL.

A number of the representatives of insurance companies in Montreal, met a few days ago to establish an insurance institute in this city. After the usual preliminaries the ollicers of the institute were elected for 1900-1901, and are: W. M. Ramsay, Standard Life, President; G. F. C. Smith, Liverpool and London and Globe, 1st Vice-President; f. J. Bond, British Foreign and Marine, 2nd Vice-President; David Jurke, Royal Victoria Life, Hon. Ireasurer; B. Hal Brown, London and Lancashire Life, Hon. Secretary. The nembers of the governing council are: Messis. E. P. Heatom, Guardian Fire and Lite; 'I. B. Macaulay, Sun Life of Conada; Randall Davidson, North British and Mercantile; J. W. Marling, Cauada Life; M. C. Jinshaw, Atlas and Natiomal; F. F. Rolland, Ocean:Accident; F. W. Evans, Aetna Fire; S. J. Stenuns, Equitable Life; A. MaDongald, British Empire MLuthal; Chas. Stânsfield, Metropolitan Jife.
Aecording to the constitution, the objects of the institute are: The reading of papers and delivery of lectures upon subjects connected with insurance business generally; the discussion of questions relating thereto; the establishment of educational classes; the collection and preservation of

papers read before the institute, together with other documents, maps and statistics bearing upon the science; and the promotion of social intercourse amiongst the members of the profession; and generally such other matters as may tend to the advantage of the institute.
The new organization opens under promising auspices and we trust will fulfil all its promoters anticipate and hope for. A committee has been appointed to arrange for a first meeting of the approaching winter session of the institute, which will probably take the form of a social gathering.

## NEW SPECIES OF WOOL.

The shecp, as a wool producer, has long held the field uninvaded, but with the dawn of a new century a rival is stepping in, whom, we are told, possesses qualities which will, tre long, cause him to be generally recognized as a factorin the production of clothing material. Musk-ox wool is hardly likely to figure largely at the London wool sales for many years to come, says the Toxtile Mercury, nevertheless it is one of the possibilities of an uncertain'future. The Kolthoff Aretic Expedition has sucoected in bringing to sweder it male and frmale calf of the musk-ox (Ovibos moschalus, Gmelin). As soon as the animals seem to be acelinatised they aro to be set fire in the northem mountain regions, where it is thought they will speedily increase in number, as they are very prolific. Herr Kolthoft has great 1..1f: in the future importance of the musk-ox, not so much as an article of food as on account of its thick brown wool, which is sutid to be remarkably strong.

We commend Mr. Fairweather's Hand Book eordially to all fire insurance officials.
-Lord Strathcona has intimated that, ere long, he will take up his permanent residence in this city. The news is exeredingly welcome.
-A 'loronto firm has on exhibition in this city an inproved invalid bed for hospital and private use. Physiciaus speak of it in high terms.
-Ex-President Kruger is now on his way to Holland, having succeeded in sneaking out of Lorenzo Marquer, where his own combtrymen, Boers, threatened his life.
-A ship canal is proposed from London to Southampton to save the long detour through the Straits of Dover and up the Thames. The saving of time would be half a day.
-The Nelson Monument in this city, after being renovated was again uncovered ceremonially this week by Jord Sirathcona who made an appropriate address on the occasion
-In 1899 there were $1,569,000$ tons of sugar consumed in the United Kingdom, 980,000 tons were talken for domestic use, 404,000 tons for confectionery, and 185,000 tons for brewing and distilling.
-The terrors of the ocean are gradually being ignored. A St. Augustine, Florida, dispatch tells of the arrival there of a sea captain and his twelve-year-old son, from a trip across the ocean in a boat 20 feet long and 7 feet 6 inches beam. I'he voyage was completed in filty-nine days.
-The disclosures in the Ives bank failure Detroit are said by the News, to be "positively shocking in the system of lecting which they show." On the day of the failure Mr. Ires drew $\$ 1,000$, and in last six years the withdrawals for fimily use had been $\$ 250,000$, money stolen from the depositors.
-A Qucbec letter states that the City, Treasurer has issued the annual statement of Quebee's finauces. Notwithstanding the many improvements made in the city during the 12 months corered by the report there is a surplus of $\$ 20,233$ in the revenue over the expenditure. The total revenue was $\$ 0.43,013,04$, and the expenditure $\$ 613,780.95$.
-A special general meeting of the shareholders of the Quebec and Lake St. Jolen Railway Company was called for the 23rd inst., to authorize the directors of the company to issue prior lien bonds to an amount not exceeding $£ 170,000$ stering, bearing interest not exceeding 4 per oent. per an num, for such term, not exgeeding thirty years, as the directors may determine, such bouds to be a first mortgage charge upon the whole railway system of the company.
-A lingston, Ont., dispatch states that the schooner liabiala; which left Charlotte on the 20th inst., with a cargo of wal for that city, sprang a leak and though the pumps were used to their full extent, foundered and went to the bottom a mile south of the Talse Ducks, the following morning. The schooner was a fore and aft cralt and was in commission for orer 25 years. She was owned by Capt. D. Bates, who was also her master, and was uninsured. The alliance established between England and Germany has had an excellent iolluence over the money market，as it makes for the world＇s peace．The September bank statement shows the demand for money this year to have fallen far below what it was in 1899 ，and the increase of note issues considerabiy leas．What expansion of do－ pusits and loans took place last month vecurred in their agoncies outside Canada． Now York has had a sensation caused by Now York has had a sengation caused by
a teller of the First National Bank proving to have embezzled $\$ 700,000$ of the bauk＇s money．The bank is suid to have under－ gone periodic inspection by its own staff and that of the＇Ireasury．Low $\$ 700,000$ could be stolen by a clerk under such cir． cumstances needs explainiug－the crime roflects most seriously upon the manage－ ment and the inspection．The bank is commercially a strong one，haviug a sur－ plus of five millions，but it must bo very weak indeed in competent officials．The widely extended interest taken by the American people in stock investments since＇good times set in，and trust stocks got into so many hands，is having a strong influence favouring McKinley，as his cause is belleved to be that of those who have a stake in the country，while Mr． Bryan＇s is regarded as most favoured by those who covet their neighbour＇s goods A mint is to be built in British Columbia，for which there is not the least need，except for election purposes．The gold holdings of the U．S．Nreasury are reported at 440 millions of dollars，yet there is a cry of scarcity of money for harvest purposes ！ The Bank of British North America has recelved drafts from San Francisco repre－ senting $\$ 950,000$ Yukon gold deposited at that point，and the Bank has advices of $\$ 400,000$ of this gold which has been de－ posited at Seattle．The Cauadian Bank of Commerce has received drafts for $\$ 200,000$ Youkon goid from San Francisco and $\$ 2 \overline{0} 0,000$ more，it is reporte 1，of such dradts will arrive next week．Stock exchanges are generally under bull influences as the war cloud seems．rising．On the local ＇Change，Toronto St．，has had another in－ nings，large salos having been made at $1053 / 4$ to $1061 / 4$ ．Royal Electric has been moving off freely at 202 to $2051 / 4$ ；Pacilic at 875 to $87 / 8$ ；Montreal St．， 279 to 280 Richelieu $1051 / 2$ to 106 ．A few Quebec Bank shares have fotched 124．At Berlin exchange on London is 20 marks， 45 pfgs ； at Parls 25 fis， $101 / 2 \mathrm{c}$ ．Paris francs stand $5.21 / 7,5.181 / 3$ ．Sterling exchange，sixties， $81 / 8$ to $83.10 ; 2$ demand， $83 / 4$ to $87 / 8$ ．Con sols are creoping up to 99 ．Local money remains as last weok；

Grapes are gradially disappearing, stock in market this week commanding a better price. Lemons are down owing to large consignments arriving this week. The cropof apples in the U.S., according to final report of American Agriculturist, approximates $48,000,000$ barrels, against $37,500,000$ barrels in 1809 and $69,000,000$ barrels in the year 1896. Michigan, Indiana, Tllinois, and the Southwest crop roturns not brillinat. Micligan better than further west; Ohio uneven. New England is securing a good many winter apples and crop considerably larger than a year ago, except in Connecticut, Nova Scotia apple growers losti lreavily by high winds and estimates are for not over half a full crop. Ontario yield considerably larger than last year. "Tho season opened with medium to low prices; situation somewhat mised, growers generally showing a disposition to sell direct from the orchards. While trade is unsettled and markets overistocked, it is not improbuble that good fruit well packed will command fair prices later. California apples are shown to be infected with what is known as purple seale; many shipments having been condemmed. ## JHE GERM-PJOOF FITHERS.

The Jouldon and General Water Purifying Water Co., Ltd., 157, Strand, Lombon, W.C., have introduced a new (ierm-Trool Filter, which is fitted with a cylinder of porous porcelain, otherwise known as a "candle," and special-

ly adapted for the use of travellers, sportsmen, and others, who have occasion to draw a supply of water from
romming streams or ponds. The illustration shows the article in sections. The pump is attached to the filter so that the water mily be first drawn, subsequently forced ilrough the caudle, and delivered as required. the water is forced through the filtering medium at a fairly rapid rate, but not too fast. It will be seen from the sketch that the filtering tube is fixed inside the larger cylinder of the pump, and those who are agquainted with this system of filtration need not be told that the object is to arrest all impurities and to thoroughly sterilise the water. The candle can be cleaned very readily, but it is recommended that, after some little use, it should be boiled for an hour or so in clean water, and

that, when using a new tube for the first time, it is desirable to soak it in water for about half an hour, and the
first lot of water passiag through it should be thrown away, because this water will have a rather carthy taste. The pump and filter combined is strougJy made, and is neatly boxed, has mo parts that get out of order, and the whole thiug only weights about $31 / 2^{1 b}$. A now main service filter for attaching to the supply pipe in a house has also been introduced by this company. The water erters the filter from below, passes upwards through a specially prepared filtering medium, and subsequently flows through the germ-proof porous plate or dise before merging at the outlet. The company list this at 21s. The "candle" principle is applied to the cheap glass table filters. I'his is designed to supersede the old-fashioned carbon block type. Notwithstanding this new introduction, the company adhere as firmly as they ever did to their specialty in specially prepared animal charcoal of the kinds shown in Fig. 3 this system provides for the filter being placed in the tank. The system is doubtless well known by this time, and every traveller along the Strand must at some time or other have observed the operations in the window of the company's premises.

mand for tonnage will receive further stimulus from the marketing of Ameri－ can coal aboad，which，the paper says， ＂is one of the most remarkable ceono－ mic evolutions of our time．＇The Stat－ ist expects that Americans will shortly． solve the problem of evolving a type of thans－Atlantic colliers able，like tank steamers，to deliver cargoes at Euro－ pean points without expecting return cargoes．It thinks that this great ex－ port trade will prove a powerful stim－ ulus to the shipping subsidies bills，and lays stress upon the recrudescence of shipbuilding in New England as an im－ portant new departure in ocean com－ petition，which may be expected to ex－ pinted rapidly．
－The Canadian West will ship out $15,000,000$ bushels of wheat this season， which isn＇t so bad for what，is calleil all off year．In addition to this amount，there is dough in the combtry for its seed and brean．This report was given out by Mr．Geo．II．Ham， of the Canadian Pacific Railway Com－ pany，on his return from a three months＇trip through Manitoba，the Northwest and British Columbia． ＂＇ihere has been pretty bad weather all over，the world，＂ho continues，＂and of course the Northwest did not escape all of it．The result is that what pro－ mised to be one the grentest crops on record has not been fully harvested．
