

ENGLAND WINS KOLAPORE CUP

Team Scored 761 in Important Match, With South Africa Second and Canada Third.

BISLET, July 16.—(C. A. P.)—The mother country won the Kolapore Cup today with a total of 761. South Africa was second with 750; Canada third, 748; Guernsey fourth, 735; and India fifth, 724.

The mother country's team was composed of the following: Tippins (Essex), Mearns, Ray and Gray (London Scottish), Runciman (Essex), Scotts, and Bunkinson and Fulton (London Rifle).

MONTREAL, July 16.—(Le Canada.)—An editorial article this morning, quoted The Toronto Telegram's report of the Orange celebrations in Ontario, and makes it an excuse for a very severe criticism of the Ontario members of the Orange Order.

"It is easy to perceive the sentiments which animate this fanatical society, with which some French-Canadians, misled and deceived, allied themselves last September to overthrow Sir Wilfrid Laurier. The Telegram shows the true spirit of the society, which counts among its members Col. Sam Hughes, Minister of militia, and Dr. Spruille Braden, who was for a long time its grand master."

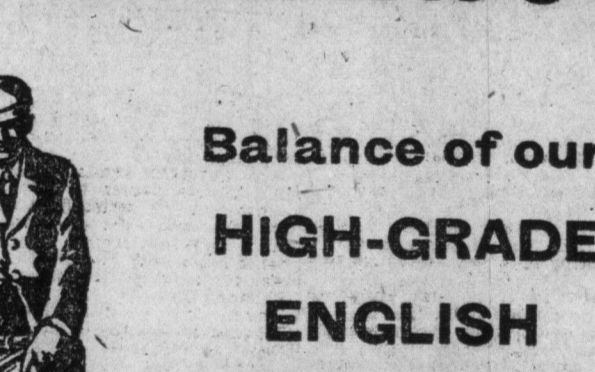

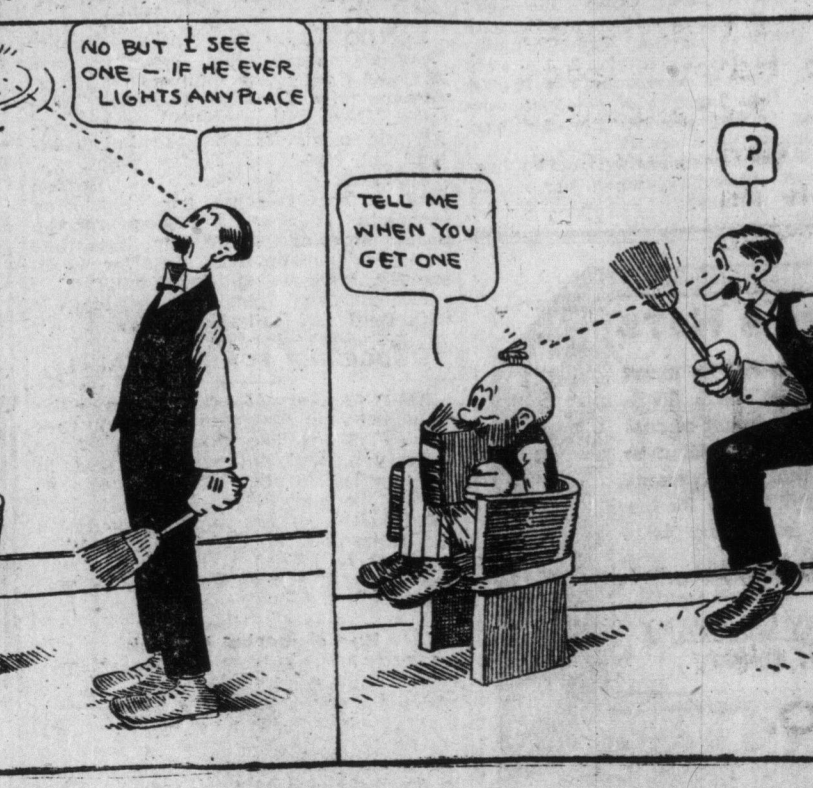

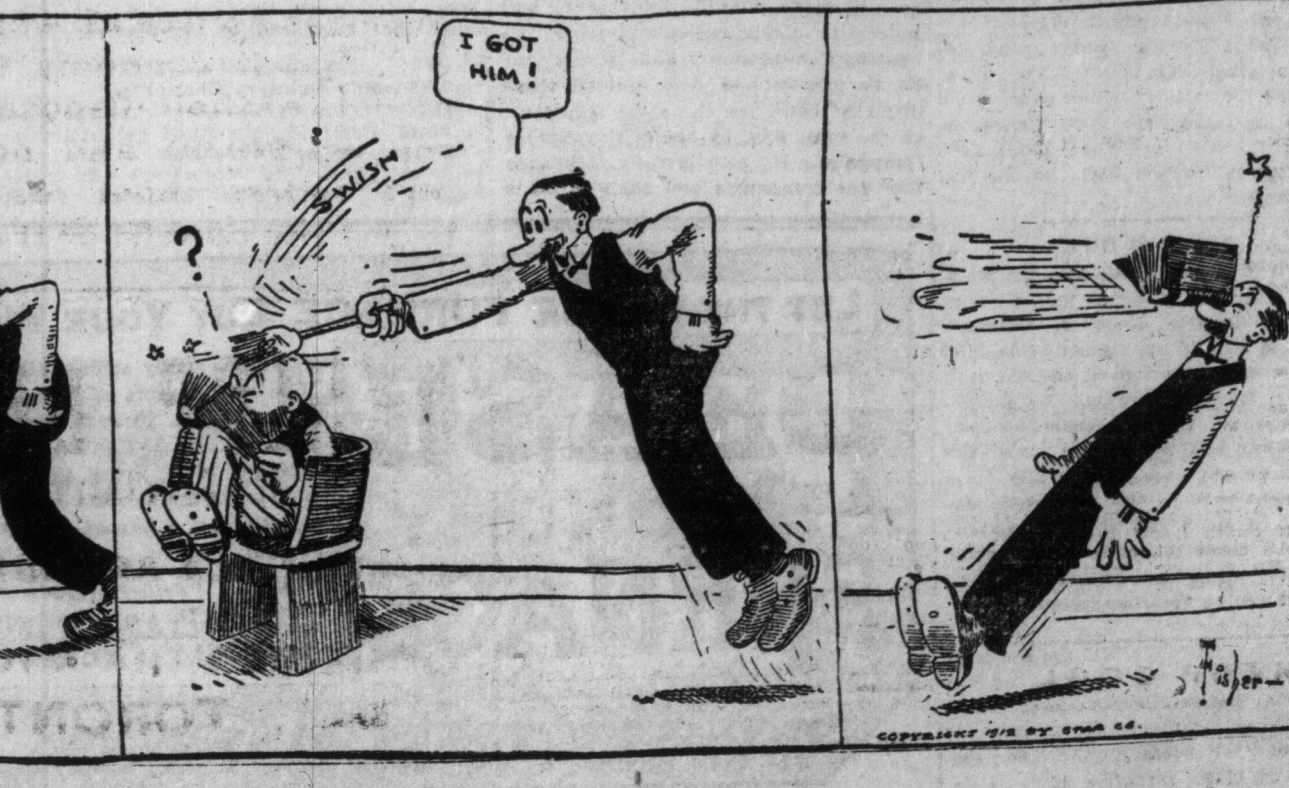

Then pound each piece until it is almost literally a rag. Roll up each and dip in cornmeal. Fry in very hot suet and serve at once.

Seasonable Recipes

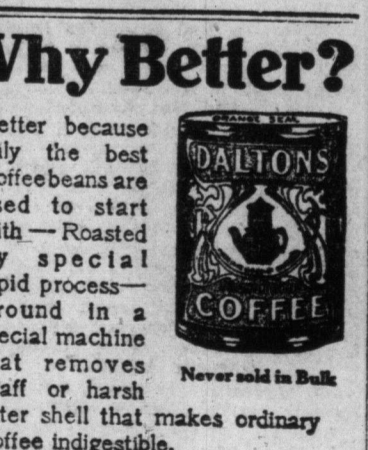
Jellied Veal.
Seasoning. Some Boiled Ham.
Have the butcher saw the bone across a couple of times, so that the shank may easily be placed in the pot. Put it on to stew with water enough to cover well. When the water begins to boil skim and set the pot back where it will simmer gently for four hours. When the veal is tender take it from the pot, cut the meat off the bones, and put the bones back in the stock to boil still longer. Cut the meat in pieces about half the size of a hazelnut. Take up the bones and strain the stock thru a fine sieve. Now place both the stock and the cut up meat in a clean pot, adding salt and pepper for seasoning, and let them boil down until there is just enough stock to cover the meat. Cut some boiled ham in pieces about half an inch square, allowing two tablespoons of ham to one quart of veal. Place the ham on the bottom of a mould and pour the veal stock over it. Set aside in a cool place to jelly.

Potted Cheese.
One pound grated cheese, 1-2 cupful of cream, 1 tablespoonful butter, 1 teaspoonful of mustard, 1-2 teaspoonful of salt.
It is well to use for this dish any dry or stale pieces of cheese, and curries and pepper is a little better than the ordinary bread-crumbs. Put all the ingredients in a bowl and set the bowl in a dish of hot water on the fire. Beat the mixture until it becomes smooth, then put in jam and seal them carefully. The cheese may be used as soon as it is made, but it will keep for some time.

Inverness Eggs in Tomato Sauce.
Three hard-cooked eggs, a quarter of a pound of sausage meat, a quarter of a pound of beef, a quarter of a pound of pork, 1 egg, 3-4 teaspoonful of salt, 1 raw potato, 2 raw carrots, 2 raw turnips, 2 raw radishes, 2 raw onions, 2 raw celery stalks, 2 raw stalks of celery, and two quarts of cold water.
Place where it will come to a boil in about an hour. Simmer for an hour, and then rub thru a colander. Return to the fire, with pepper and salt added, and stir in a tablespoonful of flour, just wetting the flour with cold water. Boil up a few minutes and serve plain or with tomato catsup.

Puree of Beans.
Soak one pint of beans over night in cold water, drain them, cover them with lukewarm water. After two hours more soaking drain again and put in a large egg, half a pound of salt pork, chopped; a small onion sliced, a minced stalk of celery and two quarts of cold water.

DAIRY LET PEARS ON THE MARKET

Fruit from California Sold at \$4 a Case — Lemon Season at Its Height.

July and August are the good months for lemons, and there are some nice specimens on the fruit market these days. They come from Messina, Italy, Georgia peaches brought \$2.75 a bushel, while Triumphs from California were quoted at \$1.75 a case. Californian cherries went at \$1 to \$1.25 the box. Two cars of California fruit were auctioned off by the Toronto Fruit Auction Company during the afternoon.

There is a good supply of green peppers on the market, sent in from the district around Oakville. Parsley sells at 75c the basket and the supply is nearly done.

Yesterday's fruit prices: Strawberries, 10c to 12c a box; raspberries, 10c to 12c a box; blackberries, 14c to 16c a box; cherries, white (very few) \$2, black, \$1.50 to \$1.75, sour 75c to \$1 a basket; American cherries, \$1 to \$1.25 a box; gooseberries, \$5 to \$1.25 a basket; cantaloupes, \$2 to \$2.50 a case; American apples, \$1 the bushel basket; Californian peaches, \$1.75 the case; Georgia peaches, \$2.75 a bushel; cantaloupes, Canadian \$1.50 a basket, imported \$1.75 to \$2 a basket; green peas, 10c a basket; beans, 60c a basket; green peppers, \$1 a basket; potatoes, \$3.25 to \$3.50 a barrel; tomatoes, first grade \$1 to \$1.75, second grade \$1.25 a crate; bananas, \$1.75 to \$2.25 a bunch; lemons, \$4.75 to \$5 a crate.

Savory Roast of Round Steak.
A thick round steak, bacon, onions, flour, salt and pepper.

Put the steak in a short-handled frying pan; spread a layer of sliced onions over it. Dredge with salt, pepper and flour, and over this lay thin slices of bacon. Put in a hot oven for 20 minutes, being careful not to let the bacon burn. At the end of that time add enough boiling water to cover the beef. Over the frying pan loosely, and cook slowly for three hours, adding a little boiling water from time to time. When the steak is done lift it on to a warm platter. Put the frying pan on the stove and thicken the gravy with a tablespoonful of flour mixed with cold water. Season with salt and pepper, boil for a few minutes, pour a little over the meat and serve the remainder in a sauce bowl.

Scalloped Sweet Potatoes.
Since the raw sweet potatoes very thin. Butter a pudding dish and arrange a layer of sliced potatoes in the bottom and sprinkle with a teaspoonful of flour, several bits of butter and a very little salt and pepper. Continue in this way until the dish is filled.

Strawberry Sponge.
Soak a half package of granulated gelatin in a half cupful of cold water. Boil together for a moment one cupful of sugar and a scant cupful of boiling water, add the soaked gelatin and stir until dissolved; take from the fire, add the juice of a half lemon and strain. When this has cooled and is beginning to thicken whip the whites of three eggs to a stiff froth. Gradually mix with the thickening jelly and whip until very spongy and quite stiff. Holding Company for Rochester Mines--Porcupines Lower

DECLINE IN WHEAT PIT IS CARRELLED FURTHER

Favorable Prospects for Growing Crops and Growing Reports From All Districts Lead to Further Break at Chicago.

CHICAGO, July 16.—All the experts in the Northwest reported practically perfect crop conditions to-day, and thereby threw the wheat market into a state of extreme weakness. Prices closed heavy, 5-8c to 1-3c under last night. Corn showed a net decline of 2-8c to 1-2c and oats a loss of 1-2c to 1c. Latest trading left provisions varying from 1-2c to 1-4c to an advance of 1-2c.

Hope faded for the bulls in wheat when one dispatch after another said there was no sign of black flies and that the weather remained just the sort needed to insure a bumper crop. Rains in Western Missouri meant delay to threshing helped sustained wheat prices during the last part of the session. Signs were noted, too, of a lighter yield of crop in Europe than had previously been expected.

Corn suffered not only because of the wheat weakness, but on account of a belief that oats would soon replace corn for stock feeding. Some recovery ensued when there were advices that the weather was too dry in Oklahoma and Kansas. Cash grades were in poor request.

The fact that cutting of oats was under way in Iowa and Illinois, under conditions which left nothing to desire, had a bearish effect on prices for that cereal. Action of other grain, however, formed the principal influence. Support from packers at opportune times averted any serious decline in fractions. Outside speculators taking advantage of a lighter run of hogs, displayed a tendency to unload.

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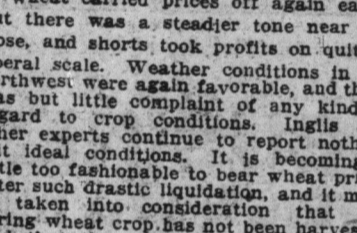

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EUROPEAN CROPS ARE BELOW USUAL AVERAGE

In United Kingdom Conditions Are Promising—Yield Below Last Year.

Broomhall's weekly summary of foreign crop conditions follows:

PORCUPINE STOCKS SHOW DISPOSITION TO SAG

Hollinger Leads Downward in Mining List—No Signs of Support in Market—Early Firmness Wiped Out.

World Office, Tuesday Evening, July 16. The continued weakness of Hollinger was the only outstanding feature of the local mining exchanges to-day. Early in the session some of the lesser issues, particularly Dome Extension, showed a disposition to mount to higher levels, but the firmer tone was wiped out on the incoming of liquidation, and closing quotations were generally at small declines for the day.

From the action of the market during the last couple of days it would appear that the insiders have withdrawn their support, and that temporarily Hollinger is being left to take care of itself. The decline from the high price reached last month has run into about \$1.75 a share, and up to this time the selling movement shows no signs of exhausting itself. It is to be said that no heavy liquidation has been in progress, nevertheless the almost continuous offering down of the stock is having a determined effect on sentiment, and if carried further may inspire realizing on the part of holders, who have been willing to ignore the action of the stock as indicated by the tape during the last three weeks.

Hollinger at the opening to-day stood at \$12.50, a net decline of 10 points from last night's close, and that quotation also proved the highest level of the day. Later transactions were put thru to low as \$12.10, a record bottom price for the month to date. Trading in the stock was exceedingly narrow, amounting in all to a couple of board lots.

The cheaper list a good deal of irregularity was shown, and this precluded the establishment of sentiment on any definite basis. Dome Extension closed a point to 19 early in the day, and was off again to 1-2 during the afternoon session, and the close at 15 bid was over a point below last night's close. Crown Chartered, which both dropped to new low levels for the month, the former selling at 3-4 and the latter at 10-1-2. A ten-share lot of big Dome Extension changed hands for a dollar a share below the last previous sale.

NEW REDUCTION COMPANY. The Dominion Reduction Company, organized to take over and carry on the work of the Nova Scotia Cobalt and Silver Mill, has this morning been incorporated as follows: J. Shaw, J. Montgomery and H. P. Edge.

NIPissing MILL NEARS COMPLETION. Work on the Nipissing low grade mill is progressing satisfactorily and the cyanide works will soon be completed. When in use the tramway will materially aid in getting the ore away from the dump, which is already too large to allow of good work at the shaft.

MCKINLEY-DARRAGH MAKES NEW RECORD. Production for Year to Date Exceeds Any Similar Period—New Ore Carrier.

For the first six months of this year, according to records now available, the production of the McKinley-Darragh mine in Cobalt has 1,530,000 lbs. of silver from the three properties operated. This is in excess of last year's production and larger than any six months' record yet made by the mine. No doubt but that the 1912 record will surpass any marks yet established by the mine.

FORM HOLDING COMPANY FOR ROCHESTER COBALT

One Time Prominent Mining Concern Forced to Take Measures to Meet Liabilities.
