HERE'S A DISCOVERY

Made During Concentration Tests of Le Roi Ore.

PRACTICALLY FREE MILLING

Low Grade Ore Over the Plates Shows 75 Per Cent. of Gold Value Saved.

It Had Heretofore Been Considered Valueless, But is Now Easily Capable of Successful Treatment—It Will Pay to Treat Million of Tons of This Low Grade Ore Now Lying on the Dumps—All Residues are Being Recovered.

Rosland, B. C. March 6.—(Special to The World, via Spokane, Wash.)—The greatest mineralogical discovery in the history of Trail Creek was made during the progress of the concentration tests of Le Roi ore in the O. K. mill. Ten tons of low-grade ore, averaging 110 in gold to the ton, was taken from the waste dump of the Le Roi and put through the O. K. stamp mill. The ore is very silicious and was found to concentrate well.

As an experiment, the crushings were run over the plates, when it was found that \$7.50 in gold per ton, or 75 per cent. of gold value, was saved, showing this ore heretofore considered almost valueless, to be practically free-milling, and easily capable of successful treatment.

The complete result of the test will not be known until the remaining concentrates have been treated, but it is already established that millions of tons of low-grade ore which has been thrown on the waste dumps, or left untroubled in the mines, will pay to mine and treat.

The problem of Rosland's low-grade ore has been solved. This discovery will lead to the establishment of concentrators at the mines. The low-grade ores will be crushed on the ground, and the concentrates, after yielding 75 per cent. of the gold value, will be sent to the smelter, where most of the remaining gold and copper will be extracted.

At the Treadwell mine in Alaska are running 50,000 tons a ton successfully treated by this process. The Le Roi has 500,000 tons and Jumbo 700,000 tons of low-grade ore. Nothing else is talked of in the camp since the news of the discovery was made public this morning.

ON THE LERGE OF WAR.

No Doubt That Europe is Badly Frightened.

WORST SCARE IN 25 YEARS.

Conflict Which Will Stain the Sea and Bathe the Continent in Blood.

The Battle of Armageddon at Hand, in the Opinion of Some Newspaper Correspondents—English Liberals Condemn Lord Salisbury and Mr. Balfour for Their Utterances to the Effect That War is Inevitable—King George Still Feels Firm and Places the Blame on Germany and Russia.

New York, March 7.—Mr. H. R. Chamberlain cables from London to The Sun:

There is no doubt about it, Europe is badly frightened. The present war scare is the worst she has experienced since swords were last sheathed 25 years ago. Every country fears it is about to be dragged into a great conflict which will stain the seas and bathe the Continent in blood. Everywhere except in Greece the prospect is looked upon with dread, if not horror, and both public and official minds are willing to make great sacrifices in order to escape the threatened calamity.

Such talk from an ex-M.P. of the Dominion and a Conservative at that, comes with singular bad grace. It is antagonistic to the entire traditions and policy of the Conservative party, as inaugurated and maintained by Sir John Macdonald and his successors. The annexation idea, moreover, has been vigorously repudiated by Premier Laurier and the other Liberal leaders, and finds no countenance among the masses of the self-respecting people of the Dominion. Mr. McGillivray, consequently, occupies the position of a man who has proven recreant to the policy and principles of the party to which he professed to adhere when in office, and who coolly stigmatises in his stump speeches the great Canadian policy that he once claimed to represent in Parliament. His remarks were evidently designed to catch the ear of those who hate Britain and everything British; they could never have been spoken with impunity in the hearing of true-spirited Canadian-Americans, for the latter still cherish a regard for the land of their birth that would not permit them to listen tamely to such treasonable trash. It speaks not poorly for the business judgment and future success of such a beneficiary organization as Mr. McGillivray represents, when in the feverish scramble for business it needs the aid of agents who will resort to such miserable clap-net as this renegade son of Canada. The sensible people of Chicago and Illinois may be trusted to draw their own inferences in regard to the business capacity of a concern which seeks to secure the support of Americans by such disingenuous and discreditable methods.

ALLEGED CROOKED WORK.

Operator Dan Kitman and a Hillsbury Merchant Named Royce Charged With Trying to Beat the C.P.R.

Brampton, Ont., March 7.—Dan Kitman, a C.P.R. day operator at Streetsville, and F. W. Royce, general merchant of Hillsbury, were arrested to-day by C. P. R. Detective Ross of Toronto and County Constable Broddy of Brampton, charged with conspiracy to defraud the C. P. R. Company by falsifying bills of lading for potatoes from the village of Hillsbury to a village called Petrolia, as being less than 7800 pounds, or thereabouts, than it in fact was, thereby defrauding the company of the amount of the difference. The prisoners were brought before Police Magistrate Math and remanded until Friday next. Bail was fixed at \$3000. The prisoners were taken for \$500 and two sureties for \$750 each.

Washington, March 7.—President McKinley's Sunday in the White House was a quiet one. No callers were received, and the President had an opportunity of resting from the fatigues of the week. He arose much later than usual, much refreshed from a hard day's work on Saturday. Breakfast was served at 10 o'clock. At 10 o'clock he prepared for church, and accompanied by his mother, attended services at the Metropolitan M. E. Church. As the President's intention was very large, and the President and his venerable mother had considerable trouble in reaching the church vestibule. The President was shown to what is called the Presidential pew. The other occupants were his mother, Abner McKinley, his brother and private secretary and Mrs. Porter. Rev. Dr. Johnson, the pastor, formerly of Canada, opened the services by prayer, and Bishop John Newman of Omaha, Neb., formerly the pastor of this church when Grant was President, preached the sermon. The sacred edifice was crowded, and many could not gain admittance. When the distinguished party left the church, the crowd was so great that the police had to clear the way.
