London, Aug. 10 .- (4 a.m.)-In the capture of Yangtsun the losses of the allies, according to a despatch to The Daily Express from Che Foo, dated Aug. 8, purporting to give an account of that engagement, were 200,

the majority of these being killed. "The allies marched on Yangtsun," says the report, "at dawn Monday. The position, held by 1500 Chinese, was well entrenched to the east of the river. After four hours' heavy fighting, the Chinese were driven from their defence works."




