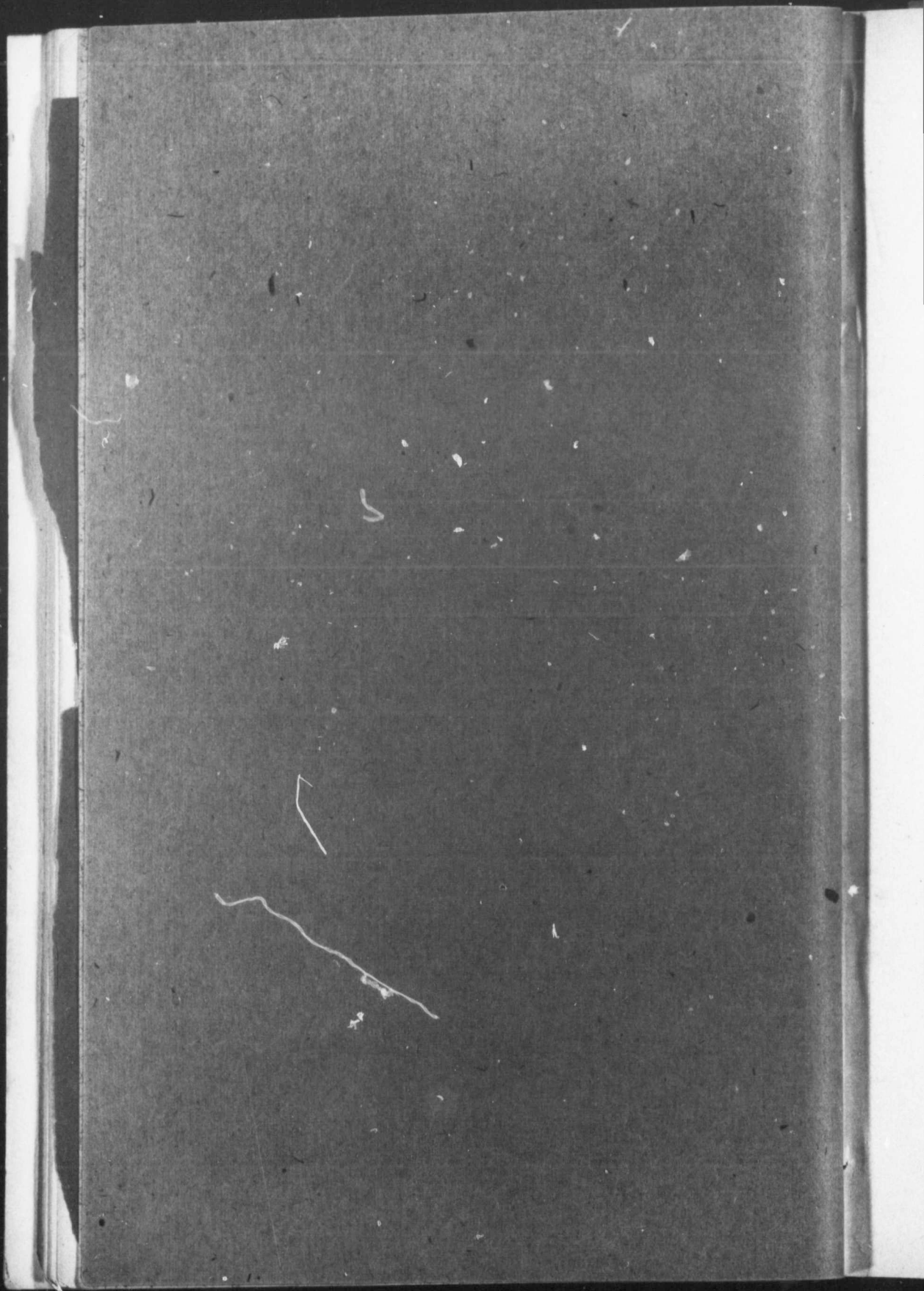

# HOUSE OF INDUSTRY.

## ANNUAL REPORT.

In submitting their Reports for 1876 and 1877 the Managers thought themselves justified in considering those years exceptional with regard to the demands made upon their resources. They regret to say that the year just closed has been, in this respect, no improvement upon its immediate predecessors, as will appear evident from the following comparative statements, which shew the numbers relieved in each year, exclusive of inmates and casuals :

In distributing out-door relief, the object contemplated by the founders of the Institution, and to which the Managers have always endeavoured to conform, was not to create a class of persons wholly dependent upon it for the means of living, but to assist in cases of temporary pressure those who were willing to help themselves; and by timely and judicious aid, to enable its recipients to maintain their independence, to keep their families together, and ultimately secure to them a comfortable and permanent home.

The Managers are fully aware of the inexpediency of training up people to become stated pensioners of the House; nevertheless during the last few years a class with strong tendencies in that direction, composed chiefly of

immigrants, who have been accustomed, in cases of emergency, to receive assistance from the parochial authorities of their native towns, has been slowly but surely in course of development. It is to be feared that relief given to such cases is neither more nor less than a direct encouragement of pauperism. If induced to emigrate, such people should be provided with employment in the country: they should not be allowed to hang about our cities, as a nucleus and encouragement to a pauper population. These people are, however, in our midst and must be provided for: the Managers must deal with things as they are, not with things as they might be.

Owing to the long and unprecedented continuance of "hard times," a class of mendicants, familiarly known as tramps, has increased proportionately. The House has done its best for the mitigation of this evil, but it is too widely spread for the efforts of the Managers to produce any sensible effect on its diminution. The records of the ward for casuals will shew to what extent the resources of the House have been employed to that end. In certain cities in the States the distribution of relief is under supervision of the police, and charitable organizations work in concert. It may be desirable that similar action be introduced into Canada, but individual exertion is inadequate to such a result: to be efficacious, measures for the purpose should be initiated by the Legislature.

The supply of work for persons willing but unable to procure employment has of late been discussed to some extent by the daily press, but no practical conclusion has been adopted. It is highly desirable that some scheme be devised which, while meeting this pressing need, will not tend to deprive the local poor of their daily bread. Even with the



assistance afforded by the House, the city poor find great difficulty in maintaining their families. This difficulty would be much increased were outside competition allowed to reduce the wages now ruling the already overstocked labour market.

The Managers respectfully call the attention of the Legislature of Ontario to the Statute now in force, and which empowers the several counties to maintain their own poor; but its provisions are merely permissive, and the municipalities are not obliged to provide buildings, or small farm properties, by which its requirements might be made effective. The experience of the Managers justifies their opinion that each county should be obliged to provide for its own poor, and thereby prevent their periodical migration into the neighbouring cities.

Another effect of hard times is seen in the falling off of subscriptions. The usual annual collection is now being made from the citizens: up to this time the Treasurer has received scarcely one-half of the sum collected at the corresponding date last year. In view of the increased demands for relief this is not an encouraging prospect. The Managers hope, however, that when their objects are fully known and understood, the liberality which has enabled them to do their work in the past will be extended to them in the future.

As was noticed in the Report for 1877, the number of Visitors has been increased to thirty. Most of the gentlemen who then undertook the duty have kindly consented to act for this year also. It may be desirable to increase the number of visitors still further, but persons qualified to act in that laborious and delicate character are not easily found. Visiting, like other occupations, requires an apprenticeship, and, until a man has had some practical experience, it is very possible that, with

the best intentions, he may do more harm than good. It was also intended to give additional facilities for the distribution of bread, but on mature reflection the Managers doubted whether the advantages gained thereby would be sufficient to counterbalance the inconveniences. There may, it is true, be cases of individual hardship, as when old or infirm people are required to come to the House for their bread ; but these have generally some one who can come in their place. The greater number of our clients are people who profess to have no occupation whatever : these can surely spare time enough to come to the House for their supplies. In this climate fuel is as necessary as bread : through the kindness of the Consumers' Gas Company the Managers have had placed at their disposal for distribution amongst the poor, a quantity of coke, which, as every one knows, has to be taken from the Gas Works, situated at a most inconvenient distance from the western and northern sections of the city, yet no one has proposed branch establishments for the distribution of coke. The Managers would have much pleasure in leaving relief at every man's door did circumstances warrant such a proceeding.

As the Managers have recently issued a Circular stating in detail the work they are prepared to do and the capabilities of the House, they consider it unnecessary to repeat now what was then said. To remove erroneous impressions, they may however be permitted to remind the citizens that, notwithstanding its name, the House of Industry is not a work-house, neither is it, as some seem to imagine, an hospital : it is simply a poor-house, sheltering ordinarily, exclusive of the casual ward, some 80 to 100 decrepit individuals, and doing its work throughout the city irrespective of colour, creed, or nationality.

**MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT.**

---

Only six persons, all aged, have died in the house since my last report, being the lowest number of which I have any record, and corresponding with the low death rate of the city generally, a circumstance which I attribute to the influence of the medical profession, in the diffusion of sanitary knowledge among the people, in the advice they are constantly giving in regard to ventilation, drainage; habits of life, and the disposal of domestic refuse; to the efforts they are continually making to secure a more strict observance of those hygienic laws which form so important a part of the medical curriculum, and from which the general public is now reaping so palpable an advantage.
