Slavonian Laborer Meets Instant Death in Island Tunnel Camp at Foot of John Street.

MURDERER NOT KNOWN DOZEN MEN LOCKED UP

Arriving in the city only yesterday, a Slav laborer was shot and instantly killed late last night during a drunken fracas in the camp of foreign worgmen on the island tunnel which is located at the foot of John-street.

Shot had been fired and the victim, who had been lying down, arose and walked to a door leading to a larger sleeping room. Almost at once two bullets were fired thru a side window, one striking the man in the hand and the other in the side. He dropped to the floor and died in a few minutes.

Milich, awakened by the shots, rushed to a door which divides the shanty



Canadian Shipbuilding Company Declare That They Seek No Monopoly Privileges.

COLLINGWOOD, March 23.-(Special.)-"Canadian shipbuilders would gladly welcome a reciprocal arrangsment allowing ships of either country to be repaired at Canadian or United States shipyards free of duty, but cannot agree that they are receiving fair play under present arrangements," said James M. Smith, manager of the said James M. Smith, manager of the Collingwood Shipbuilding Co. to-day.
"You see we are prohibited from repairing United States ships, while the United States shipyards are enabled under existing conditions to offer special inducements to Canadian ship owners or agents to bring their work to the United States shipyards, knowing that, the Canadian shipyards have no opportunity of competing or retain no opportunity of competing or retain

iating against them.

"The United States shippards are strengthened in this position by the fact that over 95 per cent. of this repair work is what is known as insurance work, and is not paid for by the shipowners, but by the insurance companies who are carrying the risks protecting the shipowners against damage or loss to their ships, so that it is a matter of no direct concern to the Canadian shipowners or their agents where the ships are repaired, provided that the work is carried on with quickness and despatch to enable the ship to go into commission with least possible delay.







POULTRY NOTES

Cross-Bred yersus Pure-Bred. Amateurs who have only the opportunity of keeping a few fowls often enquire as to the relative qualities of pure and cross-bred fowl. It is a subject of importance when buying a few pullets for laying purposes. How often it is asked whether the cross-bred fowl has any advantage over the pure-bred one! In the first place, it is cheaper to purchase a good, first-cross pulle than a pure-bred one, and the crossed The question of good roads for Ontario County has been the theme of her county politicians for several months. One advan tage is: First-cross fowl are always hardy and, as a rule, lay at an earlier age than pure-bred birds. I should advise poultry-keepers, par-150 hens, to select about twelve of the best layers and mate them with a pure-bred bird. It will become the cheapest in the long run. Many people just buy several of the cheapest cockerels they can buy and turn them down with the hens and breed from the birds anyhow. This may improve the stock to a certain extent, but my advice is: Buy one or two good, pure-bred, male birds and mate them with the best selected laying hens and breed from them.





INSPECTION AT FACTORY FAVORS BREAD BUYERS 8

Where Municipalities Have Adopt- 6

ed System in Western Ontario

Results Have Been Good.

That Mr. McNaught's "bread bill" introduced in the legislature last week is decidedly in the interest of manufacturer and consumer alike was the opinion given yesterday by a wellknown baker from Western Ontario. "The system of factory fispection will be especially valuable," he de-clared. "I know that just now manufacturers in several cities and towns in Western Ontario have the bread inspected at the factory under the regu-lations of municipal bylaws, the in-

spectors being appointed by the municipality. "As a result the whole of the product or output of each particular factory is terated matter and weight. Also the inspector, who is usually the health officer, by coming to the factory, gains a thoro knowledge of the sanitary conditions under which bread is made, something which is very rarely done now where factory in does not exist, and we in Ontario think that the sanitary conditions under which bread is made is

of bread going to the public.

Where factory inspection does not exist, the bread is weighed at the store, but only about fifty per cent. of the bread produced goes into the stores now, so that the balance of the output is not inspected at all, for it goes to the consumer direct. The McNaught bill will place the whole product of the factory under the inspection of the proper authorities, and the private consumer who takes bread from the wagon will enjoy the same measure of protection as the one who obtains supply from the retail grocer.

of the peculiarities of bread-baking is that the larger the loaf the colder the oven, and it consequently takes longer for fermentation to be arrested, and there is greater likelihood of pro-ducing sour bread. Sour bread has been practically unheard of since the two and four-pound loaves had been

The Grocers' Section of the Retail Merchants' Association of Ontario have endorsed Mr. McNaught's idea of factory inspection. They feel it to be the most satisfactory method of preventing short weight, as it will be opportunity for complete inspection of every loaf, an impossibility under the






