TELETYPE FORCES CAPTURE GORIZIA

100,000 Italians Made Prisoners, Is Latest Claim by Berlin

GORIZIA IS RETAKEN BY AUSTRO-GERMANS

Further Grave Repulses for Italians, Some of Whom Surrender Without Fighting—Berlin Now Claims Total of 100,000 Italian Prisoners.

London, Oct. 28.—The Austro-German armies under the command of Emperor Charles, who has as his chief assistant the brilliant Field Marshal von Mackensen, are shaking the entire Italian line from the Julian Alps region to the Adriatic Sea. Having pressed back the Italians at several points upon Italian soil, the combined enemy forces have now pushed forward on the Italian left wing and captured the town of Gorizia, the north of which, and also the plains beyond. In addition, the Austrian Town of Gorizia, a point of great strategic value on the Isonzo River, has been retaken from the Italians.

ENEMY WILL ABANDON THE DIXMUDE SALIENT

Major Morath Informs Countrymen German Forces Will Soon Have to Withdraw From More Western Positions.

MERCKEM PENINSULA OCCUPIED BY THE FRANCO-BELGIAN FORCES

Entente Troops Make Important Gain of Territory in the Dixmude Sector—Over Thousand Huns Captured in Operations, Friday and Saturday.

According to the latest Berlin official statement, 100,000 Italians have been made prisoner and in excess of 700 guns have fallen into Austro-German hands. The second and third Italian armies are forced to retreat. Rome admits the falling back of the second army, asserting that it was similar to that shown by the Russians in Galicia, was exhibited in the face of the enemy, the Italians surrendering without giving battle, permitting the attacking Austro-German forces to advance and thereby giving easy access to the town of Cividale. Prior to falling back, however, the Italian army destroyed all the depots and Cividale was on fire when the Austro-Germans entered it.

London, Oct. 28.—British aerial attacks on German military establishments in Belgium were continued actively on Friday night and Saturday, and an official report issued today indicated that considerable damage was caused. The announcement followed a raid on the night of Friday and Saturday, in which the naval air service, on the night of Friday, October 27, carried out direct hits causing heavy damage to the Thourout railway junction also was bombed.

POLITICAL NEWS IN BRIEF

Liberal and Conservative of Waterloo will name a fusion candidate. Great War Veterans endorse W. F. Nickle as win-the-war candidate for Kingston. Brantford Conservatives chose W. F. Nickle to contest the riding as a supporter of union government. Liberal executive of South Wellington declares itself in favour of the unionist, and will call a convention at an early date. Lennox Conservatives will hold a convention on Nov. 14 to select a win-the-war candidate. The convention will be open to the Liberals. E. W. Nesbitt tells Liberals of North Oxford that if chosen as representative of the riding he will give his hearty support to the union government. The Greater Toronto Labor party will consider a resolution opposing the inclusion of a labor representative in any cabinet other than a labor cabinet. Hon. J. A. Calder has received the unionist nomination of A. J. Young Mahay, the grain grower candidate, will retire in Mr. Calder's favor. A return by acknowledgment is expected. Great War Veterans' Association will fight in North Oxford and has nominated Lieut.-Col. Donald Sutherland, a war overseas, and who resigned as the Conservative candidate, as its standard-bearer. Liberals of North Perth differ on their line of action in the coming contest. The Liberals meet next month to consider the resignation of A. J. Young Mahay as party candidate. The Conservatives will hold a convention at an early date. The Labor party and Conservative party on a candidate. West Algonia Liberals are in favor of the unionist candidates, but the Conservatives have named their standard-bearer as the situation in the riding stands. NEW LIBERTY LOAN PASSES THE \$5,000,000,000 MARK

Washington, Oct. 28.—The second Liberty Loan apparently has passed the \$5,000,000,000 mark. A last day drive of titanic proportions through the nation rounded up more than \$1,000,000,000 and was bound to have carried the total several hundred million dollars beyond the maximum sum treasury officials had hoped for. Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo announced late last night that the loan was an overwhelming success.

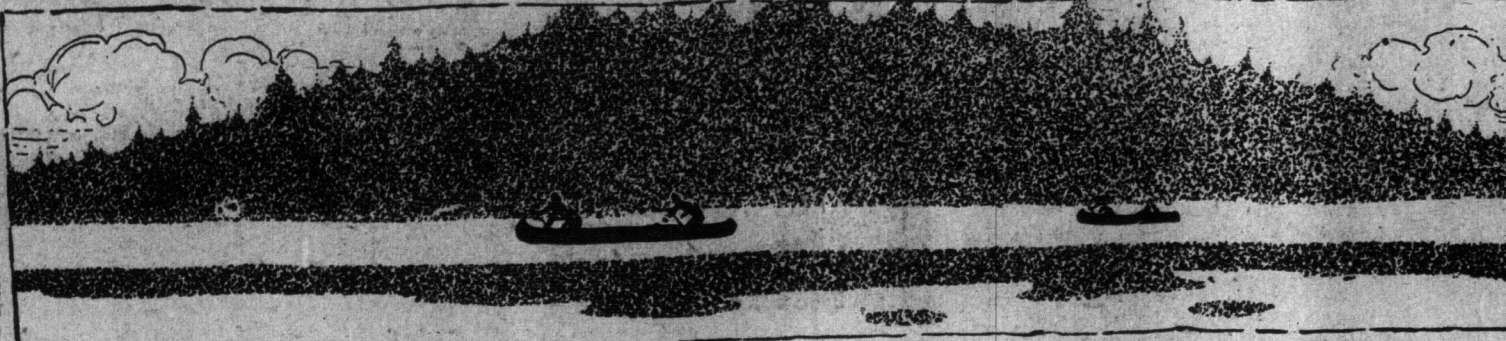

TELL OF NEEDS IN MISSION DIOCESES

Four Bishops Preach in Toronto Churches on Their Work.

The National Interest

In their enthusiasm to serve Canada, a number of men in Class One—bachelors and widowers without children (not otherwise excepted) who were 20 years old on the 13th October, 1917, and whose 34th birthday did not occur before January 1st, 1917—will desire to report for service, when in fact it is in the national interest that such men should continue in their habitual occupations.

The purpose of the Military Service Act is to select the authorized 100,000 reinforcements in such a way that the industries essential in the national interest will not be handicapped unnecessarily.

This course obviates the possibility of requiring that men be returned to civilian employment after months of military training—a waste of time and money for all concerned.

The grounds upon which exemption may be claimed, of special interest to employers, are:

- (A) That it is expedient in the national interest that the man should, instead of being employed in Military Service, be engaged in other work in which he is habitually engaged.
(B) That it is expedient in the national interest that the man should, instead of being employed in Military Service, be engaged in other work in which he has special qualifications, and for which he has special qualifications.
(C) That it is expedient in the national interest that, instead of being employed in Military Service, he should continue to be educated or trained for any work for which he is then being educated and trained.

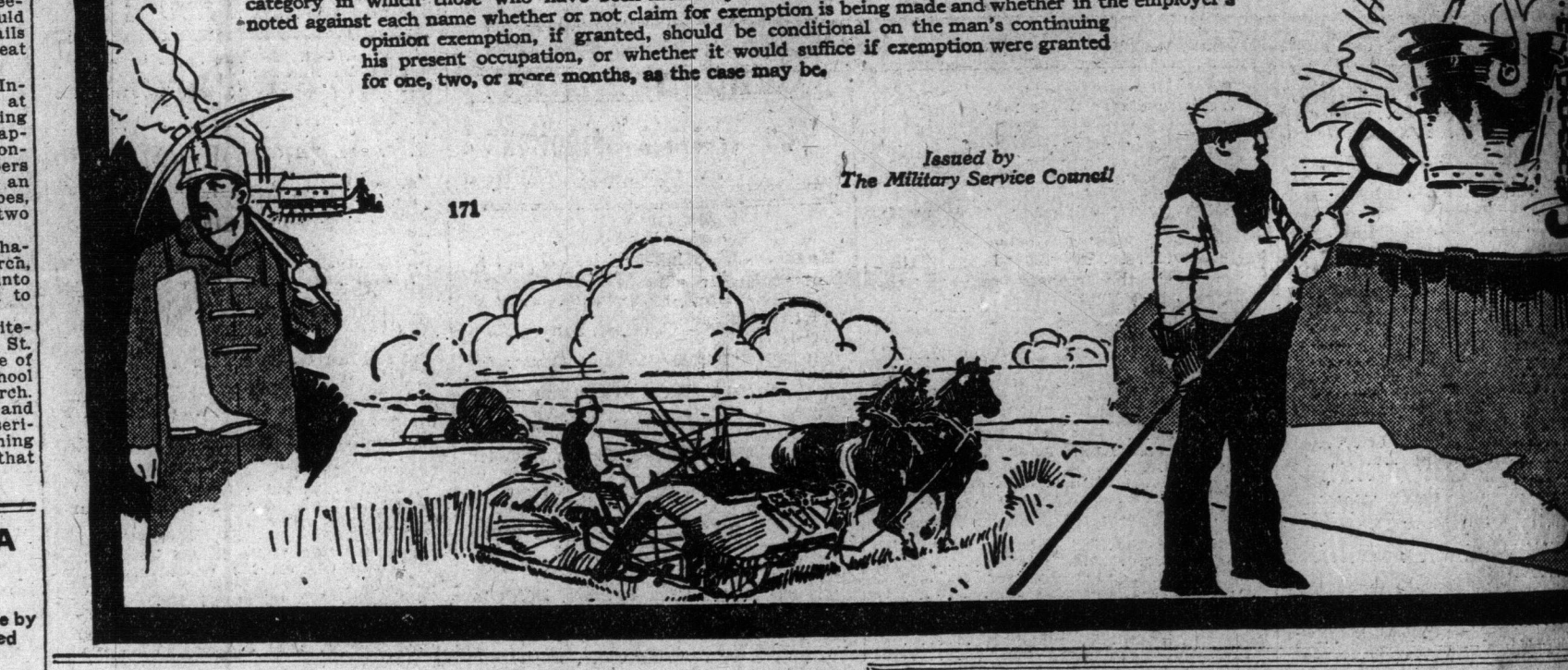
The Employer's Statement

Where an employer claims exemption for an employee on the ground that it is expedient in the national interest that the man should continue in the work in which he is habitually engaged, he should prepare for the tribunal a statement and schedule as follows:

Total number of employees, grouping them according to their respective occupations and qualifications, and stating the number in each group. Indicate the possibility or otherwise of replacing the labour of Class One men with the labour of those not in the statutory class called up; also the extent to which the withdrawal of men in the statutory class would affect the business, the reasons for considering that the carrying on of the business is in the national interest; and such other facts and circumstances as may appear to be relevant.

The Employer's Schedule

This should state the names, ages and occupations of all Class One men employed, and the medical category in which those who have been medically examined have been placed. There should also be noted against each name whether or not claim for exemption is being made and whether in the employer's opinion exemption, if granted, should be conditional on the man's continuing his present occupation, or whether it would suffice if exemption were granted for one, two, or more months, as the case may be.
