The organized farmers, thru their officials, demanded immediate reduction of the tariff, and its final abolition in the interests of national prosperity and peace.

SEVEN ARE KILLED BY AN EXPLOSION

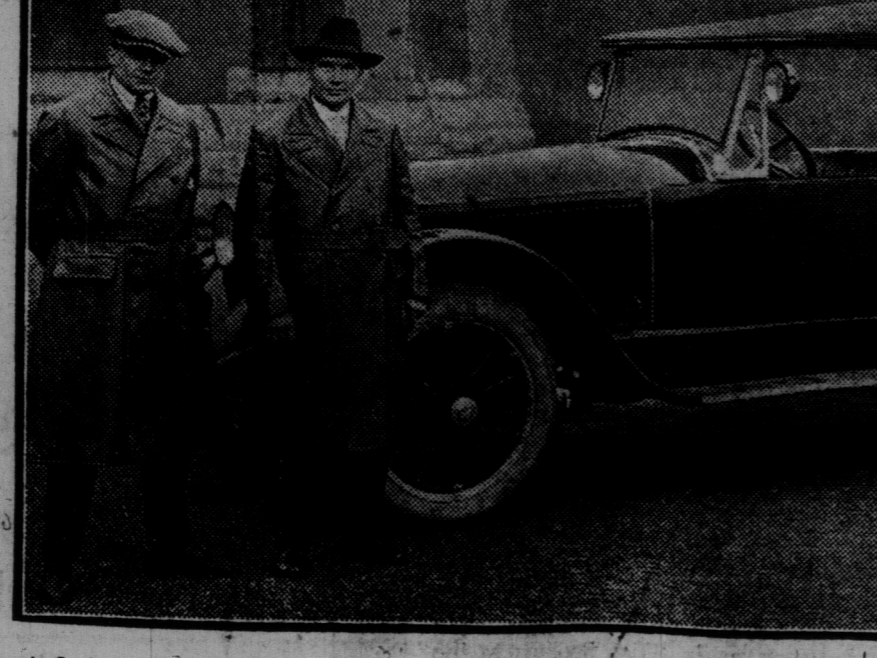
Fatality in Wexford Believed to Be From Experimenting With Bombs.

CECIL DEMANDS INVESTIGATION INTO REPRISALS

Lord Robert Joins Asquith and Grey in Denouncing Irish Policy.

PREMIER CONTRADICTED

London, Oct. 13.—Denunciation of the government's Irish policy by the Liberal forces of the country, represented by the recent statements of Viscount Grey, former Premier Asquith and Viscount Morley, seems likely to grow into a formidable movement. The latest recruit is Lord Robert Cecil, one of the most respected of the Unionist leaders, who has joined Viscount Grey in a letter to the House of Commons calling for an investigation by a constitutional tribunal as to whether the government is responsible for the reprisals.

The letter begins by referring to Premier Lloyd George's Carnarvon speech as assuming that the reprisals are a close friend of the shooting by the police of those reasonably suspected of an intention to attack them, or who had been incontrovertibly guilty of the murder of their fellows. It proceeds:

FOUR BIG REFINERS LOSE \$3,000,000 EACH?

Ottawa Hears Individual Losses May Reach \$5,000,000

Ottawa, Oct. 13.—It is hard to get at the bottom of the sugar situation. A friend of the sugar refiners, and a close friend of the government, says that four of the refineries are liable to lose three millions of dollars at the least each, and more likely five millions each, by the drop in price of their refined sugar, the raw sugar that went therein having cost them twenty-one cents a pound. If this is so, there is certain ruin ahead of them. They obeyed the board of commerce and did not export their output to the States more than a year ago, when they could have made big money. Instead they supplied Canada at seven cents a pound lower than they could have got if they had sold their output to the States. They had counted on a slow step-down of the price that would have let them out.

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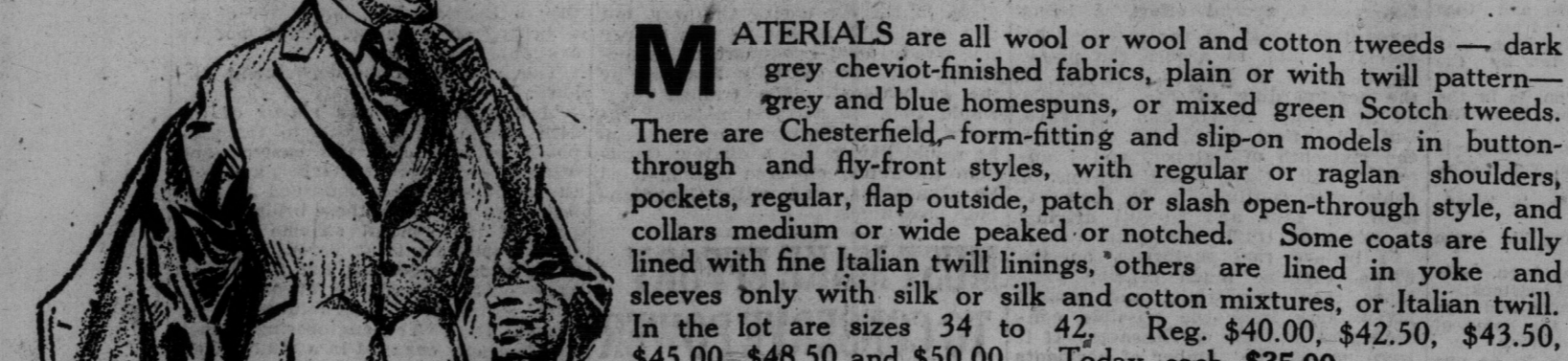

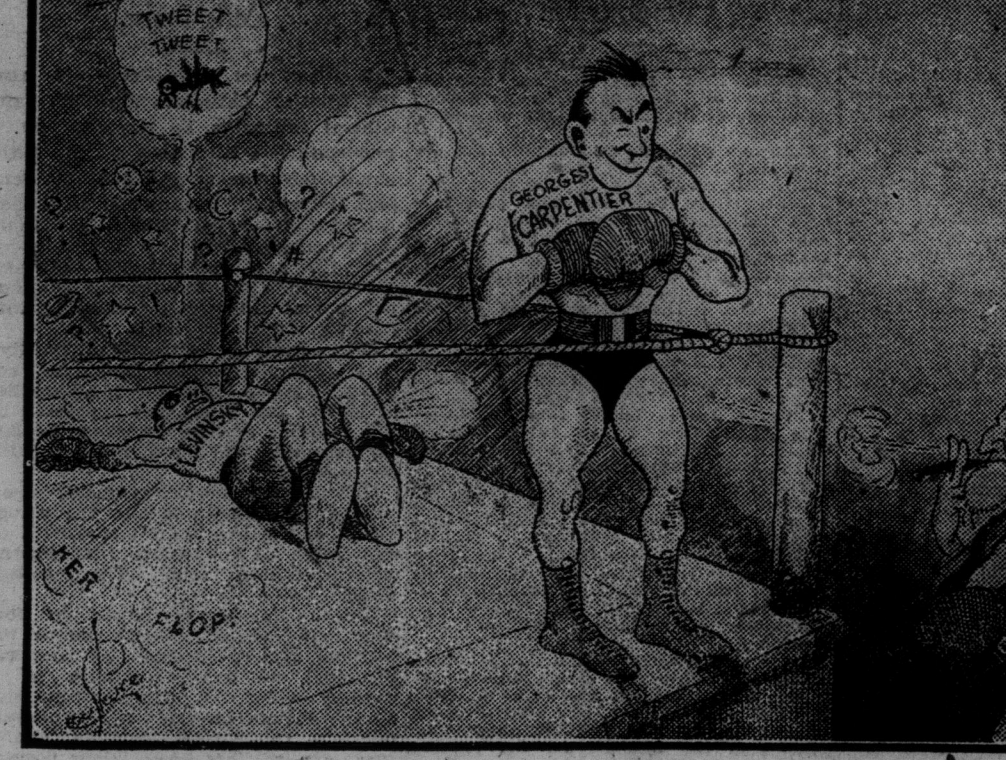

III.—What Controls It?
