THREE CHARGES OF BRIBERY PROVEN

Argument on Charge That Hon. E. J. Davis Engaged W. J. Robinson, a Reputed Corrupt Practitioner, as His Agent in Sutton, Not Concluded.

Newmarket, Sept. 21.—(Staff Special.)—The second day of the North York election trial was prolific of some result. The petitioner succeeded in proving that bribery was resorted to in three different cases on behalf of Hon. E. J. Davis, but the court ruled that agency had not been established; hence the minister is not held responsible for the corrupt acts. The second charge was much more serious. Mr. Blackstock forged a chain of circumstances to show that W. J. Robinson, who was reported by the judges as being guilty of a corrupt act in North York, which act resulted in the voiding of the election, was brought into North York, and that he acted as agent for Mr. Davis at Sutton; that he attended committee meetings and generally assisted in the work of the campaign, and that he was seen in the presence of Mr. Davis and a man named McArdle. The act of personally engaging Robinson is sufficient unless Mr. Davis, here is the section of the act respecting the election of members of the legislative assembly, which covers the case.

If, on the trial of an election petition, any candidate is proved to have personally engaged at the election which the petition relates, or canvassed for or procured in relation to the election, any person, knowing that such person has within eight years previous to such engagement been found guilty of any corrupt practice, by a competent legal tribunal or by the report of the judges upon an election petition, the election of such candidate shall be void.

Mr. Blackstock presented this case in a lucid and able manner, quoting several precedents which show that candidates have been held to have personally engaged when they have personally engaged in person. If the personal liability of a candidate is not made by the court in this case, he pointed out, it would be practically impossible to hold a candidate liable for the corrupt act of any worker.

Mr. Aylesworth has still to put his construction on the law that was decided by the court in this case. The decision of the court is expected before noon to-day.

On the opening of the court, William Rolling spoke of the negotiations with Elias Pegg, his brother-in-law, on Monday, previous to the election. Pegg had broached the subject of the election, saying, "You are not married to Lennox, are you?" He was told if he did not take the money someone else would. Pegg said he was not married to Lennox, and during the drive Pegg had his hands under the blanket over the knees. When Pegg remarked, "What's that?" witness looked down and saw a \$5 bill, which he picked up and put in his pocket.

ARGUMENT ON CHARGE THAT HON. E. J. DAVIS ENGAGED W. J. ROBINSON, A REPUTED CORRUPT PRACTITIONER, AS HIS AGENT IN SUTTON, NOT CONCLUDED.

That Pegg paid Harry Hodge \$50 for dropping it in his buggy and calling attention to the fact that Pegg had engaged W. J. Robinson as his agent in Sutton, "you'll find the money for yourself."

That Pegg paid Harry Hodge \$25. He handed him the money, Hodge objecting to the roundabout method suggested by Pegg, but nothing was said about election, and the charge was dismissed.

Pegg, Rolling, Hodge and Blackstock were reported for corrupt acts. Argument on the second charge was not concluded at adjournment. This was the Minister Davis engaged W. J. Robinson, knowing that he had been reported for corrupt practices in North York. The proving of this charge is sufficient to void the election.

There seems to be a probability that a strike of the car men employed on the Canadian Pacific Railway from coast to coast may be called at any moment. Negotiations have been going on for some time for an increase in wages amounting to 20 per cent. all along the line. Prospects of a settlement look none too bright and on Monday the grand chief carman, F. H. Honours of St. Louis, was sent for and asked to mediate.

That an order to cease work is expected is evidenced by the action of local 238 of the Brotherhood of Railway Carmen at Toronto Junction last night, in appointing a committee to handle the strike, as it was announced afterwards. It was a special meeting and the remainder of the men in the shops who have been notified were invited.

LETTERS BY COMMISSION RULE EXPRESS COMPANIES

Canadian Manufacturers' Association Favor Advanced Legislation, as Advocated by The World.

Montréal, Que., Sept. 21.—(Special.)—The reception of reports occupied the time of the Manufacturers' Association to-day. The discussion to send a delegation to Great Britain next year, and the diplomatic move to meet representatives of the labor congress now in session here with approval. The session here met with the placing of express companies under the control of the railway commission.

George Booth of Toronto reported that the last year had been the most successful in the association's history. At the beginning of the year there was a balance on hand of \$405, which, however, was set off by a bank overdraft of \$584. However, by the end of the year, after spending more than ever before in one year, the association had on hand a balance of \$415. (Applause.)

The membership committee report was presented by Chairman Robert Green, and sketched the various resolutions which had been successfully carried out during the year. The membership at present is 151, an increase of 24. The main feature of the proposed trip to Great Britain in 1905 was discussed and approved.

Chairman Robert Green of Toronto, in an energetic speech, strongly urged the sending of the delegates to England to show in a decisive way, the feeling of the people of Canada that the Dominion is ready to return to the insurance of the British fleet save our ocean commerce.

Dr. S. Morley Wickert of Toronto was introduced to the convention, and delivered an interesting, businesslike address on "Special Civic Charters in Canada." The first question was whether our cities were to be ruled by special civic charters or by general acts. Ontario alone had a general municipal act, its cities being classified according to size. A charter was issued for each and consolidated municipal act. If Toronto's application would do no more than draw the attention of the Dominion government to the fact that it was a city with its own provisions and amendments, it would have done good. The argument for full powers in municipal acts in America seemed to be that the disposition of powers was a matter of course. In Canada should attempt to secure municipal powers less in detail and more in general. The report of the well defined power in this respect, for Canada in general, could not be overestimated.

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There were only seven members, a bare majority of the two committees present at the meeting this evening. The members of the company said that if the city did not consent to having the rate fixed at 45¢ they would go back to their homes in Cleveland. By the terms of the bylaw the citizens will be charged 45¢ a thousand for the first five years, and 40¢ for the next 15 years. After that the city may take over the plant. A special scale will be fixed for power purposes.
