CHEAP RATES TO BRITAIN

Universal Postal Congress Has Reduced Letter Postage Between Both Nations.

WASHINGTON, June 12--The postal conference has given out the following statement: "The universal postal congress, recently in convention at Rome, ordered a substantial reduction in letter postage by increasing the unit of weight, effective on and after October 1, 1907, for the 15 and 20 grams and providing that mail postage in the first twenty grams shall remain at 15 centimes (five cents) every additional 20 grams shall be at the rate of 15 centimes (3 cents)."

ABDUCTION CHARGED AGAINST MONCTON MAN WHO TOOK HIS WIFE AND BABY

Jonathan Smith in Trouble for Breaking Into His Mother-in-Law's House---Notorious ex-British Convict Shipped to Canada by Imperial Government.

MONCTON, June 12 (Special).--A young man named Jonathan Smith was arrested this afternoon by Provincial Constable A. W. Belys, charged with breaking and entering a house and abducting a child. The trouble occurred on the night of the 10th and 11th inst. Smith and his wife took refuge in the home of his mother-in-law, Mrs. Smith, and in consequence of the quarrel Smith was ejected from the house but his wife remained to accompany him. About a week later Smith returned one evening and demanded his two-year-old child. The doors were locked against him and he broke in taking the child by force.

He will be brought before Justice Leaman this afternoon. Judge Wells today gave judgment in the appeal case of Constable Duncan Stevenson as L. G. R. O'Brien. The conviction made by Magistrate P. J. Sweeney at Shediac, fixing Perry one dollar, and 25 cents was quashed with costs against Stevenson. Judge Wells commented strongly on cases of this kind being taken to the courts when they should be tried in the police court.

SOCIAL SIDE WAS NEVER NEGLECTED

Canada's Arctic Explorers Tripped Many Measures With Esquimaux Belles and Paid Social Calls to Them in Their Snow Houses.

OTTAWA, June 12 (Special).--The first witness at the special committee on the S. S. Arctic case this morning was Mr. Deschamps, the steward of the steamer. He was examined by Mr. Northrup and said that the Esquimaux came aboard daily at Fullerton and were fed from the ship's supplies. There were about sixty of them. There were also taken on board furs which would nearly half fill the committee rooms. These furs comprised wild, musk ox and white fox. The furs were transferred to the Neptune after the Arctic reached Shaler Bay and he never saw any of them since.

Returning to the ship's supplies the witness said there were always weekly dances with the Esquimaux ladies on board. One week it was on the Arctic and then on the Era the American whaler. The Esquimaux ladies were frequently on board the Arctic. Mr. Northrup read an order which Mr. DeChenay got from Major Moodie asking him to have refreshments ready for about sixty in a hurry. The latter climbed trees, whence they showered assegais on the troops, but bullets dropped them off the branches. Over forty were thus killed, and altogether 100 natives were slain. Darkness ended the operations of the troops, but the rout of the rebels is regarded as practically complete.

DEATH OF SIR HECTOR LANGEVIN

Quebec, June 11.—(Special).—Sir Hector Langevin, minister of public works in the cabinet of Sir John A. Macdonald and Sir John Abbott, died at 8:45 this evening.

The Hon. Sir Hector Langevin, K. C. M. G., was born in Quebec Aug. 26, 1825, was educated at the seminary in his native city, studied law in Montreal, and was called to the bar in 1850. He was created a knight of the Order of St. John, and chief editor of the Melanges Religieux, a weekly paper published in Quebec, and published in Montreal. INTERESTING LECTURE
H. G. Robinson Gave Splendid Demonstration of Marconi Wireless in York Theatre Last Night.
The intricacies and wonders of the Marconi system of wireless telegraphy were well illustrated last night in the York Theatre, when H. G. Robinson, the representative of the underwriters, who are controlling the financial interests of the Marconi Company, delivered a very interesting lecture dealing with the past and present value of the utility and future possibilities of the Marconi system.
The stage was lit up as a miniature receiving station, with an antenna and an accompanying receiving apparatus coherer and Morse inker tape machine. Besides these there were a railroad semaphore, fog alarm and six lights, it being shown in turn how effectively each could be operated by a sending apparatus placed in the vestibule of the theatre.
The lecturer, in his opening remarks, said he would make no attempt to prove that wireless telegraphy was a success, as that was being abundantly demonstrated by the numerous stations around the world. He was there to explain in technical language the various uses to which the discovery was being and would be put. After tracing the evolution of the first steps in the principle of wireless telegraphy, starting with the discovery of ether by Prof. Herz and of the vibration of the particles in it which were called Hertzian waves, he alluded to the further efforts made by Lodge to so regulate the motive force which discharges the waves and to which Tesla, Edison and Kelvin contributed.

Coming down to 1893, the lecturer spoke of Marconi, who was then an Oxford undergraduate, and who one being left a fortune, devoted his time, energies and money to the elucidation of the problem which had baffled his predecessors.
The lecturer showed how well he succeeded in perfecting the system which is in use today. One of his most recent patents was a machine which printed messages at 300 words a minute.
After referring to the coherer, which he described as Marconi's greatest invention, Mr. Robinson described in detail the various parts of the receiving and sending apparatus, which were shown in operation in connection with the railroad semaphore, which was also operated, he mentioned the fact that already four railways in the States, including the New York Central, had adopted the Marconi signalling system.
In concluding his interesting lecture, Mr. Robinson gave several instances in which the Marconi system had prevented loss of life and prevented delay in salvage, due also alluded to the fact that Lloyd underwriters had adopted it, and gave figures to show that after being only five years in existence, was more favorable as regards dividend earning powers than such gift-edged undertakings as the Bell telephone and Western Union companies were in their earlier stages of existence.
The lecture will be repeated, with wireless demonstrations, this evening and during the week.

Some of the suburbanites at Resforth were given a scare on Sunday evening when the cottages of J. H. Pullen and E. B. Seely caught fire. The blaze originated from the chimney in both cases, but was checked before a great deal of damage was done. 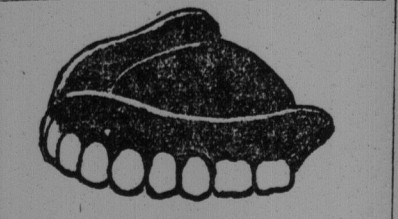

MARINE NOTES

The Nemesa arrived at Halifax from Pictou yesterday to complete loading her cargo of coal. The West India liner Oruro left Bermuda at 4 p. m. Saturday for St. John direct. She is due here Wednesday. Battle liner Treble, Capt. Hilton, arrived at Baltimore June 10 from Carthagena for West Bay and the west coast of England. The steamer Miamon was to leave Three Rivers P. Q. Friday for Halifax and sails from here Wednesday night or Thursday morning for Bermuda, St. Kitts, etc.—Halifax Chronicle, June 11.

The government steamer Lady Laurier left Halifax yesterday morning for Cape Horn, to render assistance to the wrecked Italia. Joseph Doherty of this port was pilot of the steamer going out of the bay. He was going to Sydney in her. The steamer Sovereign left Sydney, N. S., last Sunday for Seattle, Wash., via Cape Horn, with 6,000 tons of Sydney mills, which will be transhipped to British Columbia for use on J. Hill's mines. This is the ship's first cargo and the first cargo of Sydney mills ever shipped by water. Captain Kyllbeck of the Danish steamer Atlantis which came from Cape Horn and Christiania Saturday night, reported bad weather up to longitude 150° west, and for the past ten days thick fog was encountered, with only occasional clearing weather during the remainder of the voyage. Alexandria during a dense fog on June 4, when his latitude 42° 22' north, longitude 83° 12' west, passed dangerously close to an iceberg, which was only a thin sheet of ice. It loomed up like an island, and only the quick action of Captain Kyllbeck, who was on the bridge at the time, averted a collision.—Boston Post.
