TWO NEW BRUNSWICK MEN AT DARDANELLES

At least two York County men are playing a part in the Dardanelles operations. One of them, Private C. J. Turnbull, who is with the 7th Battalion, Australian Imperial Force, has been wounded and writing to his brother, Alex. J. Turnbull, of Stanley, gives some interesting impressions of the fighting around the Dardanelles.

Private Turnbull's letter was written from the Mens Hospital in Egypt, where he was convalescing from his wounds. He had been in Australia several years before the war broke out. Of the landing of troops at the Dardanelles on April 25 he says:—

"When we were landing on Sunday, 25th of April, it was damnable; couldn't believe it till I saw it for myself. A lot of our lads got it, but did not mind—never stopped till a bullet stopped them."

The other York County man engaged at the Dardanelles is James Christie, of Fredericton, who was at one time a railroad engineer in the State of Maine, and was for some years an engineer on the dredges at Fredericton. He is on H. M. transport Cameronian, engaged in carrying troops from Alexandria, Egypt, to the Dardanelles.

KILLED WHILE BATTERY WAS CHARGING POSITION UNDER TERRIFIC FIRE

Moncton, June 16—Major Anderson, commander of the 8th Battery, replying to a letter from Mrs. George McDougall of this city, gives further particulars of the death of her husband, who was struck by a German bullet during the battle of Ypres, just south of Julien, and a wooden cross marks the spot. Major Anderson sent Mrs. McDougall a map showing the location of the grave. He had lost a lot of men since McDougall was killed.

TWO FREDERICTON BANK MEN ARE TO DON THE UNIFORM

Chas. Hobkirk and Frank Dunn Joining the 55th—Dr. R. Borden Going to Battle Scene; Bride to Accompany Him

Charles Hobkirk, son of G. M. Serp, Hobkirk, barrack master at Fredericton, and Frank Dunn, son of John R. Dunn of Gagetown, are to enlist with the 55th Battalion. Mr. Hobkirk is a member of the staff of the Royal Bank of Canada and Mr. Hobkirk is with the Bank of Nova Scotia. They have obtained leave from both institutions until the end of the war. Mr. Hobkirk recently qualified for the rank of lieutenant at Halifax, but is going in the ranks, having been unable to obtain a commission.

ADVICE IN SENDING ARTICLES TO SOLDIERS

Toronto, June 16—The following official announcement has been issued by Mrs. Plumpré, secretary of the National Service Commission:—

"Bales for the Canadian War Contingent Association must not exceed fifty-six pounds in weight and should contain only soft goods such as socks and shirts with contents marked plainly on the outside of the bale and protected by water proof material. All other goods as candles, soap, and tobacco, vermin powder, etc., must be packed in wooden cases not to exceed fifty-six lbs. in weight. A box should contain only one class of article."

"Cables received from England report that ninety-one bales containing mixed contributions chiefly from western Canada have arrived with the contents mixed together and destroyed by water. All those who desire to ship goods for the men in the trenches are earnestly requested to carry out these regulations; suitable articles, such as tobacco, candles, soap, etc., must be packed in cases plainly marked on the outside."

Canadian Highway Act The Carleton county municipal council in session at Woodstock yesterday condemned the provincial government Highway Act, and called upon that body to remedy the system of repairs and road building.

HEAVY SENTENCE FOR PATRIOTIC FUND FRAUD

In the police court yesterday afternoon Mrs. Annie Carlin was sentenced to two years in Dorchester for a charge of attempting to defraud the Canadian Patriotic Fund of \$98. The sentence was imposed, partly owing to the interference of the president and secretary of the Patriotic Fund.

The evening session was devoted to missions and addresses were given by Rev. James Allen, M. A., Mrs. J. B. Gough and Mrs. C. F. Sanford, president of the Women's Missionary Society.

The report of the secretary showed great activity during the year with finances in excellent condition. Mrs. Purdy was heard in a brief address in which she reviewed the work of closing year.

MORNING NEWS OF THE WAR

The Austro-Germans have captured Mosaika, east of Premez.

An Allied air fleet yesterday dropped bombs on Karlsruhe for forty-five minutes. It is about 75 miles from the French frontier. They also bombed other towns, Zabern, Strauburg and Rastatt. The fleet numbered twenty-three aeroplanes.

The New York Tribune charges that Dr. Alfred Meyer, of Germany, privy councillor of first rank is the real name and rank of Dr. A. M. Goldbart, who has recently sailed from New York to Christians, Norway. The Tribune accuses him of violating Red Cross principles, by making his real mission that of a buying agent for Germany and to spy upon United States preparedness for war while posing as an emissary for the Red Cross work.

SAYS CARDINAL WAS STOPPED BUT LATER PROCEEDED

Another Incident in Which Belgian Protest at Malines is Central Figure

Rotterdam, June 16.—A report of what seems to be an extraordinary affair at Malines, with Cardinal Mercier again the central figure, comes from the Wolf Bureau today. It purports to record a collision between the inhabitants and the German guard at Malines, a town which has been cut off by the government-general from communication with the rest of Belgium because its inhabitants refused to work in the arsenal. The statement says: "On Thursday Cardinal Mercier decided to leave Malines with a following of 100 persons who came into collision with the German guard. The cardinal wished to go on foot to Brussels, and the commander of the guard asked him for his passport. It was not possible to allow him to pass with so great a crowd, the cardinal and a small number of his followers were allowed to pass out of the town. The cardinal entered a carriage that had been sent from Brussels and went his way. "The reason of this demonstration was that Malines had been cut off from railway and other vehicular communication. No account of the affair has yet come through from Belgium, but the fact that Wolf should circulate the story suggests that the collision was more serious than is allowed to appear.

LONDON SHOPKEEPERS FIND HIGH PRICES HURT BUSINESS

The disastrous effect of the war upon the small shopkeepers in London is thus described by the Daily Mail: "War prices are taking the profits of the small shopkeepers and in many cases are bringing disaster and closed shops. "The poorer section of the public simply cannot afford to pay the prices which have to be charged for goods," said the proprietor of a formerly prosperous little provision establishment. "Butter is a serious problem." Fishmongers have suffered severely, and in the neighborhoods where money is scarce shops are already being closed. Fried fish, a staple diet of the poorer

classes, is described as being a dead loss to the shopkeeper. "The great increase in the price of vegetables is hitting the green grocer and at least 1,000 butcher shops have had to close in London. This is an official estimate and is declared to be a very modest one. "Four valuable blooded cows met a very sudden death at Columbia Hill, Calif., when several sticks of dynamite which they had eaten exploded. It had been hidden for safe-keeping, but the cows found it.

**LETTER FROM FRONT TELLS OF ST. JOHN BOYS**

Mrs. E. W. Chase, of Hawthorne Avenue, has received two letters from her son, Charles, in France. In one dated May 27, he says the weather is very hot. The Germans, he says, have raided some lovely towns and villages. They have been using the gas again. He had seen Jack Nixell, who is a sergeant in the 10th Battalion, and also William McCallan and Chris Graham. He was billeted in an old house with all its windows blown out. The day before he wrote the Germans sent eight or ten shells to their neighborhood but did no damage.  
 Chase was very glad to receive a bar of chocolate and the cigarettes sent him, and in a letter on May 30 asked for a box of cake and sweets. While the weather was hot by day it was very chilly at night.

**LOST COLONEL, 13 MAJORS, TEN LIEUTENANTS; 700 MEN**

Private Ambrose Cogrove, of Wellington Station, P. E. I., in writing to his parents from Boulogne, France, on May 1, said: "There were seven of us, including myself, standing together (at the battle of Ypres), when a big shell burst exactly in front of us. It fired us twenty-five feet in the air and killed five; myself and one more were injured. The stretcher-bearers came along and took us to a place of safety, and I was there five hours before I regained consciousness. We lost our colonel at five o'clock a.m., at eight we lost thirteen majors, at eleven we lost ten lieutenants; we also lost three company sergeant-majors, fifteen sergeants, fourteen full corporals and sixteen lance corporals. Besides these, we lost 700 men. You can imagine what we came through."
