Petrograd, June 16.—The following official statement was issued last night at the War Office: "Fighting continues in the Shavli district without substantially modifying the situation. During Monday night the enemy delivered a futile attack in the direction of Myssynice and Bakh, as well as several isolated attacks in the district north of Pryzanytsa, all of which were successfully repulsed."

POLICE COURT

In the police court this morning Fred McAfee, arrested yesterday on charge of begging from door to door in Spring street, was remanded.

One man arrested on a drunkenness charge was also remanded.

A case against Frank Van Hedegan was taken up. He was reported by Inspector Jones for keeping liquor on his beer licensed premises, Britain street. He pleaded not guilty. Mr. Jones testified that he went to the house and there found two valises containing twenty-five bottles of liquor. He seized them and reported the defendant.

Two Belgians testified, one that he owned the liquor and intended to take it to his home in Minto this morning. He swore it was for his father and was for his own use, and not to be resold. He told where he had procured the liquor, and said that his uncle, the defendant, had nothing to do with it. His friend corroborated his statements.

Magistrate Ritchie said he felt convinced that the witnesses had spoken the truth, and that the defendant had not intended to violate the law, and therefore he was loath to impose a fine. According to the wording of the law no beer license can keep liquor on his premises. As Urvon Swanson, who appeared on behalf of the defendant, contended that his client did not keep it there, and that the owner would have removed it in a short time, he said everything hinged on the word "keep." The magistrate reserved judgment.

OUR HEROES If anything were needed to arouse the young men of New Brunswick, and fill them with a determination to do their part in bringing the war to a successful issue, it should be found in the letters written by men we know, who have met the enemy, and some of them received sore wounds, but all of whom breathe the spirit of undying devotion to the cause for which they are fighting today in France. Extracts from these letters are found in the columns of The Times from day to day. They reveal the conditions under which the Canadian soldiers are fighting, the constant danger, the daily toll of lives, the savage methods adopted by the enemy, but most and always the dauntless spirit of our fighting men. We can understand, too, something of the blood-thirst that seizes a man when he sees his comrade fall a victim to the poisonous gas, or learns that a wounded comrade has been bayoneted by a murderous enemy.

MR. HAZEN CAN HELP. Hon. J. D. Hazen says to the Standard, "If I can be of service to the Empire in this crisis I have no intention of evading that duty." Then let Mr. Hazen demand that his comrade Sir Robert Borden, accept the offer made by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and bring to an end all partisan activities in Canada until after the war. With that accomplished, and Sir Robert Borden has to say the word, this country could be organized for war much more rapidly and effectively, for that would be the sole united aim of all members of all parties.

There it is—obliterating all distinction of party, to unite every personal and political as well as every moral and material force in the prosecution of our cause. What has Mr. Hazen to say to that? Sir Robert Borden has not been asked to form a coalition government, but to put an end to partisan activities. Has he done so? He was asked to say there would be no political campaign till after the war, but declined to do so. Sir George Foster was non-committal when interviewed here last week. Mr. Hazen himself does not refer to the matter. Yet all three of them know, and the country knows, that partisan Conservative activities have never ceased.

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CITY MANAGERS. The June number of that very valuable magazine, The American City, sets forth information from forty-five cities in the United States which have adopted the city manager plan. In practically all of them the plan has been adopted within the last two years. In some cases the manager was appointed under the existing charter, and in others by the adoption of a commission government charter, with provision for the appointment by the commission of a city manager, to whom are delegated the non-political executive functions of the municipality.

TWO NEW BRUNSWICK MEN AT DARDANELLES

At least two York County men are playing a part in the Dardanelles operations. One of them, Private C. J. Turnbull, who is with the 7th Battalion, Australian Imperial Force, has been wounded and writing to his brother, Alex. J. Turnbull, of Stanley, gives some interesting impressions of the fighting around the Dardanelles.

Private Turnbull's letter was written from the Mens Hospital in Egypt, where he was convalescing from his wounds. He had been in Australia several years before the war broke out. Of the landing of troops at the Dardanelles on April 25 he says: "When we were landing on Sunday, 25th of April, it was damnable; couldn't believe it till I saw it for myself. A lot of our lads got it, but did not mind—never stopped till a bullet stopped them."

The other York County man engaged at the Dardanelles is James Christie, of Fredericton, who was at one time a rail-road engineer in the State of Maine, and was for some years an engineer on the dredges at Fredericton. He is on H. M. transport Cameronian, engaged in carrying troops from Alexandria, Egypt, to the Dardanelles.

Mr. Hobkirk is a member of the staff of the Royal Bank of Canada and Mr. Hobkirk is with the Bank of Nova Scotia. They have obtained leave from both institutions until the end of the war. Mr. Hobkirk recently qualified for the rank of lieutenant at Halifax, but is going in the ranks, having been unable to obtain a commission.

HEAVY SENTENCE FOR PATRIOTIC FUND FRAUD

In the police court yesterday afternoon Mrs. Annie Carlin was sentenced to two years in Dorchester for a charge of attempting to defraud the Canadian Patriotic Fund of \$98. The sentence was imposed, partly owing to the interference of the president and secretary of the Patriotic Fund.

Rosie Magaglio, a Russian, was sent up for trial on suspicion of stealing \$148 from a young woman named Nellie Patrick. She was allowed out on \$200 bail. Max Morris was fined \$50 and costs by Magistrate Adams in Brockville last night for selling beer in Coldbrook on Sunday.

ADVICE IN SENDING ARTICLES TO SOLDIERS

Toronto, June 16—The following official announcement has been issued by Mrs. Plumpré, secretary of the National Service Commission: "Bales for the Canadian War Contingent Association must not exceed fifty-six pounds in weight and should contain only soft goods such as socks and shirts with contents marked plainly on the outside of the bale and protected by water proof material. All other goods as candles, soap, and tobacco, vermin powder, etc., must be packed in wooden cases not to exceed fifty-six lbs. in weight. A box should contain only one class of article."

"Cables received from England report that ninety-one bales containing mixed contributions chiefly from western Canada have arrived with the contents mixed together and destroyed by water. All those who desire to ship goods for the men in the trenches are earnestly requested to carry out these regulations: suitable articles, such as tobacco, candies, soap, etc., must be packed in cases plainly marked on the outside."

Wedding Anniversary Mr. and Mrs. E. McMackin of Havelock, N. B., were honored on June 15th by friends, who called to celebrate with them the 18th anniversary of their marriage. Mr. McMackin was the recipient of a gold-headed cane, and Mrs. McMackin of a handsome rocker.

Canadian Highway Act The Carleton county municipal council in session at Woodstock yesterday condemned the provincial government Highway Act, and called upon that body to remedy the system of repairs and road building.

HIS SPEECH RETURNS

"Jawed All Night" so as Not To Lose It Again—Rendered Dumb by Explosion of Shells

Medical men on both sides of the Channel have been greatly interested in the case of a young soldier, Rifleman Poulton, who is in the 11th County of London Rifles, and is now a patient at the 4th Northern General Hospital, Lincoln.

By the terrific explosion of a shell three weeks ago Poulton was deprived of speech and hearing. He has now regained his speech, and it is anticipated that he will eventually regain hearing in his right ear.

"Before I left Boulogne," Poulton explained, "the doctor had me in his room, and told me that nothing but my own effort would bring my speech back. He told me to keep shaping my mouth as if I were pronouncing vowels. Ever since I had been in London I had been trying this, and was successful the other night, but found I could not carry on next night."

"I determined to make some sort of noise and suddenly found I could speak. I kept having to myself all night in case it went again. I saw the night sister flying around and it was in my mind to say something to her, but then I thought she might faint, and I remembered that a man would be coming

round with a cup of tea at five in the next morning, and thought I would give him a shock instead.

"So when he came along with the tea, I said 'Shove it down there, old son!' He nearly shot the tea over me. Then he fetched the sister, and everybody seemed inclined to kiss me!"

Poulton's home is in Hampstead road. He was employed by a New Oxford street firm of silversmiths. His age is 22.

SAYS CARDINAL WAS STOPPED BUT LATER PROCEEDED

Another Incident in Which Belgian, Prussian and German Figures

Rotterdam, June 16.—A report of what seems to be an extraordinary affair at Malines, with Cardinal Mercier again the central figure, comes from the Wolf Bureau today.

It purports to record a collision between the inhabitants and the German guard at Malines, a town which has been cut off by the government-general from communication with the rest of Belgium because its inhabitants refused to work in the arsenal. The statement says: "On Thursday Cardinal Mercier decided to leave Malines with a following of 100 persons who came into collision with the German guard. The cardinal wished to go on foot to Brussels, and the commander of the guard asked him for his passport. It was not possible to allow him to pass with so great a crowd, the cardinal and a small number of his followers were allowed to pass out of the town. The cardinal entered a carriage that had been sent from Brussels and went his way."

"The reason of this demonstration was that Malines had been cut off from railway and other vehicular communication."

No account of the affair has yet come through from Belgium, but the fact that Wolf should circulate the story suggests that the collision was more serious than is allowed to appear.

LONDON SHOPKEEPERS FIND HIGH PRICES HURT BUSINESS

The disastrous effect of the war upon the small shopkeepers in London is thus described by the Daily Mail:

War prices are taking the profits of the small shopkeepers and in many cases are bringing disaster and closed shops.

"The poorer section of the public simply cannot afford to pay the prices which have to be charged for goods," said the proprietor of a formerly prosperous little provision establishment. "Butter is a serious problem."

classes, is described as being a dead loss to the shopkeeper.

LETTER FROM FRONT TELLS OF ST. JOHN BOYS

Mrs. E. W. Chase, of Hawthorne Avenue, has received two letters from her son, Charles, in France. In one dated May 27, he says the weather is very hot. The Germans, he says, have raided some lovely towns and villages. They have been using the gas again. He had seen Jack Nixell, who is a sergeant in the 10th Battalion, and also William McCallan and Chris Graham. He was billeted in an old house with all its windows blown out. The day before he wrote the Germans sent eight or ten shells to their neighborhood but did no damage.
 Chase was very glad to receive a bar of chocolate and the cigarettes sent him, and in a letter on May 30 asked for a box of cake and sweets. While the weather was hot by day it was very chilly at night.

LOST COLONEL, 13 MAJORS, TEN LIEUTENANTS; 700 MEN

Private Ambrose Cogrove, of Wellington Station, P. E. I., in writing to his parents from Boulogne, France, on May 1, said: "There were seven of us, including myself, standing together (at the battle of Ypres), when a big shell burst exactly in front of us. It fired us twenty-five feet in the air and killed five; myself and one more were injured. The stretcher-bearers came along and took us to a place of safety, and I was there five hours before I regained consciousness. We lost our colonel at five o'clock a.m., at eight we lost thirteen majors, at eleven we lost ten lieutenants; we also lost three company sergeant-majors, fifteen sergeants, fourteen full corporals and sixteen lance corporals. Besides these, we lost 700 men. You can imagine what we came through."

Miss Lottie Corbett, head nurse in Moncton Hospital, who leaves Friday morning to go to the front, by way of New York, has been presented with an address and \$50 in gold by the Moncton Red Cross.
