## REST AFTER CAMPAIGN

Sore-Throated Speakers Settle Down to Watch Results on Thursday.

**EX-PREMIER STRONG** 

Lloyd George is Gaining in Elections, and Conservatives in Lead.

Not Hurt Lloyd George

When the story is fully known it will not hurt Lloyd George. He passed up the support of the most powerful newspaper group the world has ever known. It blankets England. But the old Lloyd George was back; not the ex-Premier and leader of a hybrid little party but a great Liberal.

The Liberals at once became reunited. Lloyd George and Herbert H. Asquith, leader of the Liberal party, had been the bitterest political enemies in England since in 1916 when Lloyd George had overthrown his old leader and become Prime Minister himself.

Now Lloyd George and Asquith are speaking from the same platform. Lloyd George's National Liberal party which he formed upon his overthrow in 1922, has died a natural death after

The old Lloyd George is slashin—
thrusting, cutting. He does not bother
to parry. In rejoining the Liberal party, he rejuvenated it as apparently his

He subordinated himself to Asquith, the senior, but he is the biggest figure in the country. The newspapers are full of him; he dominates the situation as the one big boy in a football game. ## Vancouver City Forced To Shut Off Aid To Ten Families In Bad Circumstances

Vancouver, Dec. 3-Relief has had to be refused to 10 families in very bad circumstances on account of lack of funds. G. D. Ireland, civic relief officer, has reported to the civic employment committee. Mr. Ireland said that in order to keep within his estimates he would have to refuse assistance to any new cases. A few single men were coming through from the prairies, most of whom came to Canada as a result of the government's immigration campaign of last summer, he said. Mother Takes Remains to Waasis, Where Funeral is Held.

Fredericton, Dec. 3.-George Grass, aged 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. Grass, of Waasis, Sunbury county, is dead, and his brother, Irving Grass, aged 13, is suffering from serious burns from which he may not recover, as the result of an explosion of blasting powder while they were carrying on some boyish pranks in the door yard of their home

The two boys had obtained a can of blasting powder and apparently touched a match to the contents as they allowed the powder to pour out the side of the can. Instead of a little blaze, as they evidently expected, the result was a terrific explosion, and the flames shot up in such a manner as to badly burn both boys about their heads and

Arms Painfully Burned.



also have to prevail on the C. N. R., else the national railway could not ge business.

"The government had the 'solid sixteen'," Dr. Baxter declared—"The 'solid sixteen' were the voting machip who would support the government in anything and everything. Therefore, Mr. King was in a position to deal with the Progressives. So, the government intervened, the report of the committee was changed and the Progressives had their way—at the direct expense of Maritime interests."

The result of this, said Dr. Baxter, was concession to the prairie provinces of many millions of dollars reduction in freight rates which enormous reduction made it increasingly difficult for the Maritimes to get justice in this respect. "For," said Dr. Baxter, "the whole Maritime question is bound up in freight rates. We must have lower freight rates if we are to get along."

Referring to the tide of Canadian trade flowing through Portland while Canadian ports were comparatively idle, Dr. Baxter asked: "If you owned the Canadian National line from Montreal to Portland and also the National line from Montreal to Halifax, what would you do? Would you keep the line to Portland bright and shining with Canadian traffic and allow the line to Halifax to rust for lack of traffic? If one line or the other had to lose money would you want the loss on the line to Portland or the line to Halifax? The question is not debatable. The answer of every friend of these provinces would be the words of the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier—'we would force Canadian trade through Canadian ports."
