LETTERS TO Y.M. C. A. ABOUT INDIA. Y. M. C. A., Madras, India, January 24, 1922. General Secretary Y. M. C. A., St. John, N. B.

Dear Sir—The closing weeks of 1921 witnessed a great struggle to meet our budget by December 31st. Trade depression has been so severe that it seemed as though we could not get any support from the firms which have been hit very hard. After considerable negotiation one of our best friends among the managing directors of all the firms said he would start the ball rolling by giving us Rs. 1,000 from one of his firms and Rs. 500 from another. This was of immense value; and we immediately approached all of the firms in the Madras Chamber of Commerce. All but three of the leading firms gave Rs. 500 each. Checks were received from the last three or four of the day before the banks closed for the New Year. It was with real thankfulness that we closed our budget free of debt and were able to turn over to the National Council the sum of Rs. 8,000. This experience gave us more conviction than ever that the association has won the confidence of people in the community sufficiently to warrant support even during the most difficult financial depression that business has ever experienced in India.

Another encouraging result of a year of hard work has been the increase of support from Indian friends. India is now passing through a very difficult period in her history. When national aspirations are running high and when we might expect that a Christian institution introduced from the west might suffer a loss of revenue, rather than receive an increase. As we have approached new friends, Hindus and Mohammedans, we have been impressed again and again by their evident sincerity and confidence in believing that the association has a contribution to make to the national life of India.

Increased self-respect of the Indian, one of the constructive results of Mr. Gandhi's movement, has made our approach to Indian friends far more satisfactory and interesting. We have regretted many times in the past the deference which Indians have paid to Europeans and Americans, but now we feel that we meet face to face on terms of equality which is much more healthy both for them and for us. One hopes that this attitude will continue and develop without its becoming anti-western in character.

You probably have read of a rebellion which occurred in a small area in Malabar on the West Coast. This was caused by a fanatical group of Mohammedans living in this district. As a result of their lawlessness we now have police

THE CASE SQUARELY PUT.

Last night's discussion at the Commercial Club brought out the fact that a committee consisting of Messrs. Phillips, Kirby and Vaughan is gathering information relative to the cost of civic hydro distribution system.

The whole trend of the argument of Mr. Phillips was in favor of civic distribution, and those opposed will have some difficulty in finding an effective answer. He admitted that the question of the cost of a civic distribution plant was complicated by the existence of another system and would be affected to some extent by the attitude of the New Brunswick Power Company.

A RINGING CHALLENGE.

The challenge thrown down to the Rotary Club yesterday by Miss McKeljohn of the public health service is a challenge to every citizen of St. John, and especially to those who have the influence to bring about the needed reforms.

At the recent meeting of the National Assembly of Free Church councils in Liverpool the Bishop of Manchester declared that "if ever it appeared that the Church of England as the established church was the only or chief bar to the unity of Christian churches in this land he would agitate for church disestablishment."

Referring again to the urgent need of infant welfare work and the care of children generally, a speaker before the Toronto Rotary Club recently said that 70 per cent of the 70,000 children attending school in Toronto had defective teeth, and that 76 per cent of men forty years of age have physical defects that could have been overcome in childhood.

VITAL STATISTICS.

The importance of having the birth of every child recorded is shown by two illustrations quoted by Dr. Kendall, state health commissioner in Maine.

"A young man and wife came from Switzerland to Indiana. They were hardy, honest, and industrious, the very kind of people needed to make a nation. They settled in South Carolina. The father was thrifty and intelligent and within three years became a foreman in a sawmill.

The second illustration deals with the case of a girl who had to prove her age in order to secure a valuable legacy, but there was no record, and it was only through the testimony of a neighbor who had an elaborate report prepared and published with the object of showing that public ownership is a failure.

ANOTHER RED HERRING

Interests in the United States which are opposed to public ownership have had an elaborate report prepared and published with the object of showing that public ownership is a failure. A comparison is made between publicly and privately owned electric utilities, and the conclusion reached that these should all be under private control.

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It would serve the interests of the New Brunswick Power Company if the impression could be created that "a ring" or group of persons were pursuing the company with ill-intent and a desire to do it injury. There is no such ring. Those who want civic distribution of hydro believe it to be in the interests of the public.

OVER-RULED THE AUDITOR GENERAL

Correspondence Tabled in the House of Commons Relative to Treasury Board Action.

Ottawa, March 14.—(Canadian Press)—Correspondence relating to the overruling of the auditor general by the treasury board in regard to the payment of \$5,000,000 to the Dominion Iron and Steel Corporation, is set forth in the first volume of the auditor general's report tabled in the commons yesterday by Hon. W. S. Fielding.

The auditor general protested, giving as his three reasons: 1. That he could not legally anticipate the finding of the exchequer court, where the question of whether or not the company should be offered \$4,600,000 in full settlement of its claim, which had been recommended to the government, was allowed to stand over for a month to allow the new government to act in that matter.

The treasury board also overruled objections to the payment of money in connection with ships at Prince Rupert, where the shipbuilders firm went into bankruptcy, and the payment of \$8,500 to the Ottawa Car Co. for utility vehicles constructed during the war in which account there was a disagreement between the government and the director of militia contracts as to the proper rate of payment.

REDUCED RATES ON FEED FOR STOCK

The following has to do with a matter referred to in a Fredericton despatch yesterday: Moncton, N. B., March 13, 1922

M. Mitchell, Department of Agriculture, Fredericton, N. B. Arrangements have been made effective today, 13th, reduced rates on hay from G. R. N. R. and C. P. R. stations Ontario to following sections in New Brunswick: Campbellton to Moncton, Loggieville to Fredericton, Bathurst to Tracadie and Shipigan, Moncton to Buctouche, Painsic Junction to Point du Chene and Chipman on the Trans-continental Railway. Reduced rates of oats and corn from lake points and on oats and grain screenings from Port Arthur and Fort William will become effective 14th instant, this for your information so that supplies can be ordered without further delay. In order to obtain these rates shipments must be consigned to Department of Agriculture, M. F. TOMPKINS, General Freight Agent.

Farmers wishing to take advantage of these reduced rates must sign a certificate furnished by Department of Agriculture that the shipments are to be sold to bona fide farmers for their own use, also that they will give to the farmer or farmers purchasing it full advantage of the reduced freight rates. Upon receipt of the certificate duly signed the department will issue a certificate of release.

With the reduced rates the freight is equal to the tariff prevailing previous to August 1920, which means about one-third off on straight carloads of hay, corn, oats and elevator screenings.

Electric Shock Kills Physician. Arcadia, Fla., March 14.—Dr. I. T. Law was killed by an electric shock in his office while making an X-ray examination of the fractured arm of a patient. As the physician was adjusting the machine his arm came in contact with a high voltage wire. Death was instantaneous.

FREDERICTON AND MR. COVEY

Baseball Prospects Discussed Last Night.

Favor Independent Ball—Say There is Handicap in Lack of Definite Charges—Golf Professional—Horse Racing.

(Canadian Press.) Fredericton, N. B., March 14.—Discussion expressed over the prospects of good baseball there this season under the present unsatisfactory existing conditions in amateur sport at an open meeting here, even to discuss baseball prospects resulted in a general expression of opinion favoring independent baseball in Fredericton and vicinity.

The general feeling of the meeting was that local players were faced with a situation they were unable to handle owing to the lack of definite accusations regarding Fredericton players listed for suspension and the vague and indefinite nature of charges which have been preferred against these players. It was also shown by the discussion that Fredericton wanted the best brand of baseball and that Fredericton players were willing to provide this brand of sport even if it was necessary to break away from the supervision of the A. A. U. to do so.

It was felt that the players were being forced into this by the action of Mr. Covey in not revealing the nature of the charges against players and thus enabling them either to clear themselves or accept the situation.

The maritime branch of the A. A. 

LEADERS HEARD
IN PARLIAMENT

The debate on the reply to the speech from the throne started in parliament, Ottawa, yesterday. Prime Minister Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King and the Right Hon. Mr. Meighen, leader of the opposition, spoke.

Previously the house listened to two new Liberal members who moved the reply to the speech. E. J. McMurray (North Winnipeg) and Paul Mevies (Winnipeg-St. Henri) showed themselves exceptionally good speakers and the house showed appreciation of the acquisition of two able debaters. Mr. Mevies spoke in French, bringing back a custom of days of previous administrations.

Mr. Meighen was in a most critical mood and repeated a large portion of the remarks he made during the campaign last fall. He attacked the Liberals

on their campaign in Quebec and showed his disappointment with the results by endeavoring to show great disunion in the ranks of the Liberal party even today over tariff and railway matters.

The prime minister replied to the attacks and made clear some points of government policy. He reiterated the statement that the government would give public ownership every opportunity.

The matter of explanation of the inferred to leave to the minister of railways. He promised there would be tariff changes as announced in the speech from the throne. He said the best method of handling the western grain would be considered by a committee of the house.

He explained the negotiations with the Progressives at the time of the formation of the government by the statement that Mr. O'Leary had been invited to join a Liberal administration.

That the Liberals had appealed to the country on the ground that the late government had usurped power, and had been sustained was the stand taken by Hon. Mr. King in his reply to Mr. Meighen. The prime minister insisted that responsible government had come back. The Conservatives had lost every seat in Quebec, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island. In the three prairie provinces they had not obtained a seat.

**MATTER OF POLICY
 THE BASIC ISSUE
 IN HYDRO QUESTION**

**Herbert Phillips Declares
 Most Important Issue is
 Public Versus Private Oper-
 ation—Commercial Club
 Asks Council For Estimate
 of Cost to Consumer.**

The vitally important and fundamen-
 tal issue in the hydro-electric power dis-
 cussion was the question of the policy
 to be adopted in working up the hydro-
 electric developments of New Brun-
 swick, declared Herbert Phillips, chair-
 man of the Citizens' committee in the
 course of an address at a meeting of the
 Commercial Club in their rooms in

Prince William street last evening at
 which R. A. McAvity, the president,
 was in the chair.

To get cheap electricity people must
 use it, said Mr. Phillips. Because dis-
 tribution costs greatly exceeded generat-
 ing costs, the real problem was not one
 of generating electricity but of market-
 ing it. That problem could be solved
 only when those marketing the electric-
 ity were public-spirited, courageous, fi-
 nancially capable and with any inter-
 est to serve other than the interests of
 the community, Mr. Phillips declared.

Before a community depending upon
 electricity could be built up, the electric-
 ity must be made safe from intervention,
 Mr. Phillips continued. The business of
 bringing power into the manufactory was
 just as much the business of the state
 as building the road over which the
 manufactured product was hauled away.
 It was doubtful whether an industry de-
 pendent upon electricity would stake its
 existence upon private corporation con-
 trol of power.

Some were advising the city to hand
 over the power to the New Brunswick
 Power Company without allowing them
 to make any profit out of it. How could
 the Power Company be expected to work
 for the expansion of the city if they
 were denied the right to make a profit,
 he asked. If the power were handed
 over to the Power Company at all—and
 he called attention to the "If"—Mr.
 Phillips said it should only be on the

basis of an agreement that would make
 it profitable for the Power Company to
 go out and develop a market in
 such a way as to develop the city as it
 was hoped the introduction of hydro-
 electric power would develop the city.

Before a new business could be started
 or an old one enlarged he said that there
 must be money behind it. There were
 New York engineers here presumably
 investigating the situation with a view
 to seeing whether more money would be
 forthcoming from New York in the
 event of the hydro-electric energy's be-
 ing handed over to the company.

A business concern must have the
 confidence of its customers, he declared.
 If the Power Company were to under-
 take successfully the distribution of the
 power the confidence of the citizens of
 St. John would have to be behind them,
 he indicated.

Want to Know Cost.

A resolution recommending that the
 Commercial Club urge upon the city
 council the necessity of finding out with
 the least possible delay the exact cost,
 as near as possible, per kilowatt hour to
 the consumer through a civic system of
 distribution of the hydro-electric energy
 to be developed at Musquash was passed
 at the meeting.

Amusement was expressed by Mayor
 Schofield that the committee had not
 come to city hall in search of the in-
 formation for which they were asking
 in the resolution. He had a great mass
 of data on the subject that he would be
 glad to place at their disposal and ex-
 tended an invitation to the committee
 to meet him and avail themselves of
 whatever information he had on the
 subject. He volunteered to answer any
 questions that he could and A. M. Belding
 asked his worship whether he could
 answer what the cost of the power per
 k.w.h. would be to the consumer under
 a municipal system of distribution. In
 reply Mayor Schofield said that that had
 not yet been ascertained but there was
 at present a committee of engineers
 working on the matter.

It would be practically impossible to
 answer the question as to what the cost
 of the power would be, Herbert Phil-
 lips, chairman of the citizens' committee,
 said. First of all the cost of a distribu-
 tion system in St. John where there was
 already a distribution system in exist-
 ence would depend more upon the atti-
 tude of the New Brunswick Power Com-
 pany than upon the actual physical con-
 ditions. If the power company were run
 for profit, and it would be practically im-
 possible not to run for profit, there
 might be costly litigation and delays
 that would add to the cost of the sys-
 tem. In not knowing beforehand what
 the attitude of the power company might
 be, it would be difficult to estimate the
 cost of the distribution system.

Moreover, a big factor determining
 the cost of the electricity to the cus-
 tomer was the amount of electricity that
 would be consumed. In view of these
 virtually unknown quantities which
 had to be taken into consideration in any
 estimate of what electricity would cost
 the consumer it was hardly possible to
 expect an engineer to say what the cost
 per kilowatt hour would be. A busi-
 ness man might give a better answer
 than an engineer in the circumstances.

The resolution was introduced by A.
 M. Belding in the absence of P. D. Mc-
 Avity, the chairman of the hydro-elec-
 tric committee of the club which framed it.

In consequence of what was said by
 Mayor Schofield and of what was said
 by Mr. Phillips, considerable discussion
 as to whether the resolution should not
 be withdrawn took place. The motion,
 however, was finally put and carried
 with a few dissenting voices.
 H. V. McKinnon, secretary of the club,
 read correspondence with the elec-



SIR ADAM BECK ANSWERS REPORT

Upholds Hydro and Says Montreal Rates are Twice as High as Toronto's.

(By Canadian Press.) Toronto, March 14.—His comparisons are all wrong," said Sir Adam Beck, chairman of the Ontario Hydro-Power Commission, today, in commenting on the report of William S. Murray to the National Electric Light Association of America, which was published yesterday in New York and which held that power prices were lower in the United States and in Quebec under private ownership than in Western Ontario under public ownership of hydro-power.

90 per cent. of the power they developed was used locally by large plants, and only 10 per cent. was available for the general public. "In the Niagara district in Ontario we have 175 municipalities co-operating and receiving a supply of power. No company ever tried to distribute power over so wide an area in the states as we have in Ontario."



Inquirers in Upper Canada wish to know how far St. John is interested in the "Made-in-Canada" movement. The Hon. Board of Trade has written again raising the question of the provisions of the marketing act and sales tax.

A candy table is in charge of the Good Cheer circle, with Miss Alice Rising as convener. The Lend a Hand circle, under Mrs. G. Wilford Campbell, have a home cooking table. Mrs. C. H. Stammers is leader of the Home Economics circle, who are looking after a fancy work and apron table. A book table is under the convener, Mrs. R. H. Plumptre. Mrs. C. A. Clark, the president, is general convener for the tea and sale.

ASK REMISSION OF LICENSE FEE

Chautauqua Committee Before Mayor—Will Present Their Request to the Full Council This Afternoon.

The local Chautauqua committee, consisting of Rev. A. L. Tedford, Mrs. H. H. Pickett, Alfred Burley and J. W. Flewelling, accompanied by Mr. McKinney, of the Swatmore Chautauqua headquarters, waited upon Mayor Schofield this morning to ask that in future the tax of \$10 levied against the Chautauqua be eliminated.

The mayor informed the delegation that this tax was fixed by by-law and it was not in his power to remit it. He extended an invitation to them to appear at this afternoon's session of the common council and place their request before the full board.

Mr. McKinney argued that St. John was the only city or town in the 797 on the circuit in Canada and the United States which demanded a license fee. He said that the Chautauqua was an educational organization which was not in business to make money and said that the deficit for last year was about \$22,000.

EVIDENCE GIVEN ON SERIOUS CHARGE

Two boys, aged about fifteen, gave evidence this morning in the preliminary hearing of a case against Boyd Andrews, charged with a serious crime against a young boy. The defendant offered him a job in a drug store at \$1.25 a day. He took him to Rothery and later brought him back to the city, making him travel second class so that they would not be seen together. The next day, the witness said, he went to the police court with his mother and gave information.

The other said the defendant asked him to do an errand and refusing to let him go with him because the car fare would be too much. They went out the Golden Grove road, where the defendant said he had a kit bag and a couple of guns which he wanted some help in carrying. The boy got away and ran until he met two men in a sleigh who gave him car fare back to his home. He also gave information to the police. Both of these boys said they were sure that the defendant was the man. The case was postponed for further evidence.

Leonard Kingston was before the magistrate this morning on a charge of breaking and entering the store of W. J. Magee, Charlotte street, on Sunday night. He was remanded for evidence.

It is alleged that he was found in the store by the clerk who let him go and that he was arrested this morning. A deposit of \$200 put up by Sandy McDiarmid for his appearance on a charge of violating the prohibition act was forfeited when he did not answer his name today. W. M. Ryan appeared for the prosecution.

NOT OPPOSED TO CITY OWNERSHIP

Mayor M. Schofield's Statement Regarding His Hydro Policy—No Interest in the Power Company—Preparing New Offer.

"I am not opposed to the principle of municipal ownership, if it can be shown that a saving for the taxpayer can be effected," said Mayor Schofield this morning in discussing the hydro-electric question with a Times reporter. "But so far, I may say," he added, "I have not been impressed with the results of public ownership here." He referred particularly to the loss occasioned by the city's recent experiment in housing.

When it was mentioned to His Worship that his recent denial of a rumor that he was a stockholder in the New Brunswick Power Co. was followed by the contention that he might not actually own the stock, but was interested in the ownership, he said: "I have not, nor have I ever had one cent's worth of New Brunswick Power Co. stock; nor is there one of my relatives that I know of who has any; I was never interested in any way in the doings of the company until I took this office, and my interest now is only as to how their operation affects the taxpayers and myself as one of the taxpayers."

His Worship said that just so soon as the data regarding distribution costs was obtained through the Power Company under the supervision of Messrs. Kirby, Vaughan and Phillips, he would prepare a report which he intended presenting to the council and from the information he framed a new offer to the power commission. He said that he could not give out any details of the proposed offer until the information regarding distribution costs had been completed.

TWO JUDGMENTS GIVEN TODAY

Matter of Property Deeds by H. Myers—Title to Green Hill, North End.

In Chancery this morning Chief Justice Haen gave judgment in the case of the Canadian Credit Men's Trust Association vs. Roy Myers, declaring invalid three separate deeds of property made by Herman Myers, deceased, father of the defendant, intended to become effective after his death. They were found to have been intended to operate in the nature of a will, and as they did not conform to the requirements of the wills act they were declared void. The deeds were drawn by Magistrate Hecche of Norton, and about the same time instructions were given for the drawing of a will. The papers were left with the magistrate and he was instructed to give them to the executors of the estate upon the testator's death. The deeds gave property to the testator's three children, Roy, Stella and Lawrence. Subsequently the father made a will to Roy valued at about \$3,500, and he took over the business, giving his father a provision note for \$2,000. Before his death Herman Myers said he had given Roy Myers the stock instead of the land decided to him. The court ordered the deeds to be turned over to the executors and the property bound to pay the liabilities through which the suit arose. W. H. Harrison appeared for the plaintiff and Hon. G. W. Fowler and R. St. Pierre for the defendant.

Judgment was given in favor of the plaintiffs in the suit of the Maritime Nail Co. Ltd. vs. J. S. Gregory, an action over title to land known as Green Hill, North End, originally begun in 1915 (Dec. 15). This property was conveyed in 1908 by Robert DeBury, in 1900 she gave deed of settlement appointing Irene Simonds and Charles Carter trustees. On a bill being filed by her husband and the property passed by her to the defendant. Dr. J. B. M. Baxter attempted to confirm the lease to Mr. Gregory. The court found that he could not so confirm the lease as coverture had ceased upon her death. Dr. J. B. M. Baxter conveyed the property and he afterwards conveyed it to Stanley Elkin, who was really acting as a trustee for the plaintiff. The question as to the validity of the defendant's lease arose and as to whether the Green Hill lot had passed to him. The court found in favor of the plaintiffs as stated.

CASE IN COURT IN CAPITAL OF INTEREST HERE

A case of local interest was before Mr. Justice Barry in Chambers in Fredericton on Monday. Captain Alfred W. Howard, a former Carleton resident, but now living in New York city, made application for a writ of habeas corpus which was directed to his father-in-law, Harry Deakin, of Benton, York county, his mother-in-law, Mrs. Carrie Deakin, Howard, and for the purpose of inquiring into the alleged detention by them of Capt. Howard's daughter, Barbara. The application was granted and the writ was made returnable at Fredericton on next Friday at 11 a. m. G. Earle Logan appeared for Capt. Howard.

Capt. Howard contends that his wife, who it was said is suing him in the courts of New York for a legal separation, agreed, if he would transfer his property to her, to give him sole custody of their daughter Barbara, aged eleven; that he did this, but that she took the child to her parents in Benton.
