GERMAN OFFICER CONFESSES BRITISH ARE NO EASY ENEMY

New York, Nov. 27.—An interesting description of how the British soldier impresses his enemies is given in a mail despatch received by the Associated Press from Berlin, under date of Nov. 14.

An earnest warning, the despatch says against underestimation of the British troops, such as has been customary with a certain section of the German press, is sent home by a well known Berlin newspaper man who is serving as first lieutenant with a regiment facing the British forces near Ypres.

His regiment, he writes, marched out with the idea that the British had legs only to run with, and that real fighting spirit or skill in arms was lacking in them. A few hours' contact with the British, however, showed that they were no easy enemy.

"The English infantry which opposed us there in the vicinity of Ypres must be characterized as troops of the first quality," he writes. "From the start it was noteworthy with what high energy the British troops defended their positions against our attacks. After being driven out they kept trying again and again, particularly by night attacks, to regain lost ground. They were supported most effectively by their field artillery, which, like the French, it is as good as ours. The British had also brought up heavy naval guns in the vicinity of Ypres, and the English shells and shrapnel caused us considerable loss."

"The skill of the British soldier in utilizing every advantage of the country was very noticeable in the numerous engagements in the vicinity of Ypres. The British trenches were usually so skilfully constructed that they could not be made out with the naked eye. When we had stormed the first trenches we were astonished to find how well laid out they were, particularly in depth, side protection against shell fragments, splinter-proofs and, above all, in regard to the Michigan floated.

Norfolk, Va., Nov. 28.—The United States battleship Michigan, aground on a sand bar just inside Cape Henry, was floated by tugs late yesterday, apparently undamaged.

SIMPLE AND CHIC.

The woman who cannot see wonderful possibilities in this model must be up and doing. It can be used in "making over" or in using up remnants of contrasting material. A bit each of cloth, velvet and lace can be used splendidly. Three yards of 40-inch velvet, 2 yards of 44-inch cloth and 1 1/4 yard 24-inch all-over lace make the design.

For the outside of basque, underface the front from front edge to 1 inch inside of line of small "oo" perforations; roll over on outside on small "oo" perforations to form revers. Pin at front edge placing "oo" on small "oo" perforations, and tack. Center-front indicated by large "O" perforations. Take up dart seam in back section as perforated. Close shoulder seam. Sew flare collar to neck edge, center-backs even and underneath revers along small "oo" perforations, bringing large "O" perforations in collar and in front together. Arrange on lining, center even; stitch edges of back together. Bring single large and double "oo" perforations to corresponding perforations in lining front; stitch side edge of outer back to position from lower edge to upper edge of dart seam. Stitch lower edges of lining and outer front together from lower edge to large "O" perforation in outer front. Gather at center-back of girdle on double "oo" perforations and buy better goods or more goods for same money. They relieve her of the necessity of paying tribute to Caesar at the customs house. WILL INCREASE BELGIAN ARMY OF STARVING PEOPLE

American Commissioner Reports Large Number of Refugees in Holland Are Returning to Their Native Land.

London, Nov. 27.—The population of Belgium requiring feeding during the winter likely will be many thousands more than seemed probable a very short time ago. This is the conclusion reached by a special commissioner who was delegated by the American Commission for the Relief of Belgium to make an investigation. The commissioner sent a telegraphic report from Rotterdam today to Hebert Clark Hoover, chairman of the American Commission.

Speaking of the Belgian refugees in the south of Holland, the commissioner said he found that large numbers, most of whom belonged to the agricultural element, had returned to Belgium, or were going to return, with the result that there would be an enormous addition to the starving populace, as it is impossible to get work.

At Bergen-Op-Zoom there are 3,000 refugees living in tents. Most of the tents shelter two families. With the ground like a quagmire, and the cold almost unbearable, the refugees sit bundled around a small fire by day, and sleep on straw at night.

"One tent contained two men, their wives and a couple of children," said the report. "One of the women was in a delicate condition."

Some recent arrivals from Antwerp admitted that the Germans were ready and anxious to give them work, but added: "They pay us with pieces of paper, telling us that some day it will be good money; but it won't buy food."

Refugees from small villages which the American commission has not yet been able to relieve said that the places had been entirely cleared of food by the Germans, who had also requisitioned all the cattle, so that positive starvation faced the people remaining.

WAR ORDERS THAT REACH TOTAL OF \$50,000,000

Schwab Brings Them Home From England and Rush Work Begins

South Bethlehem, Nov. 28.—It is learned from good authority, but an unofficial source, that part of the contracts for war material which Charles M. Schwab obtained on his recent visit to England, at the request of Lord Kitchener, calls for 200 shrapnel guns, six hundred caissons, and 800 limbers. This is in addition to a large submarine contract which will be partly filled at the Bethlehem steel plant and at the Fore River ship-building plant.

In addition, the steel company has an order for thousands of shrapnel shells for the English army. This English contract, and others that Mr. Schwab has recently secured from other European countries will, it is said, amount to \$50,000,000.

Days before Mr. Schwab set sail on the Adriatic for home, where he arrived last Thursday, he cabled over the result of his visit to Lord Kitchener. Immediately various departments at the local plant took on unusual evidences of activity. With the receipt of the order, the company established a strict guard around the works, adding several police to prevent undesirables from entering the plant. An order was issued to allow no one to enter the plant without a pass. Employees of the plant will be obliged to present their passes at the gate to gain entrance.

It has also been learned unofficially that the company has received a large railroad order from a South African railroad that will keep the rail mill busy until next April.

Churchill's Speech on Navy

London, Nov. 27.—Winston Spencer Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, in a speech in the House of Commons this evening, before the adjournment of the lower house to February 2, told the country, that despite the loss of some of the older ships of the British navy, there was no cause for nervousness, but every reason for complete confidence in the power of the navy to give effect to the wishes and purposes of the empire.

On the whole, the first lord said he considered the navy had done well. It was, he declared, driving German commerce from the seas, and preventing enemies getting war material, which they needed more and more as the war proceeded. Even if England were single-handed, there would be no reason to despair, but with the French in control in the Mediterranean, and Japan in the Pacific, and the Russian navy developing, "we could go on indefinitely, receiving our supplies from wherever we need them, transporting our troops wherever they are required, and continue the process with our strength growing greater every month, until at the end of perhaps, at not very distant date, we achieve the purpose for which we are fighting."

As for building, the first lord said, Britain would add fifteen capital ships to her fleet before the end of 1915 to Germany's three. In fact, he declared, Britain could lose one super-dreadnought monthly for a year and still maintain her superiority over Germany in these ships. Light cruisers, Mr. Churchill continued, were being rapidly added to the British fleet, and Britain had commissioned, since the commencement of the war, more than Germany had destroyed or interned. This number, including the Breslau, he said, amounts to six.



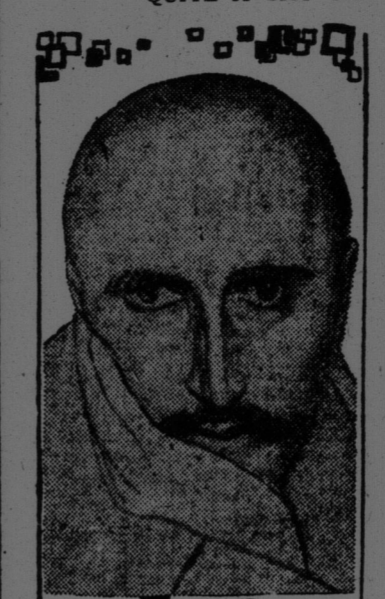
