An Appeal For Help

We have received a communication from a citizen, Charles Russell, a resident of Crane's Brook, Bay Roberts, asking us to appeal to the readers of the Guardian for assistance. He is a man of about 63 years of age, and has followed the fishery all his life. Some time ago he was stricken with paralysis, and is now almost helpless on his bed having just enough strength to feed himself.

About 17 years ago two of his sons went to the Crow's Nest Pass, and eight years ago another son left home. He does not receive any help from them, nor does he know where they are. (Shame on such children.) He is now left with only one little boy to look after him, his wife having died about 10 years ago.

Kind friends have been helping him so far, but many of them will be away to Labrador and other places during the summer, and he now appeals to the readers of the Guardian who are charitably disposed to help him in his sore distress.

The Amending Bill

An amending bill to the Home Rule Bill will it is understood, shortly be introduced giving certain concessions to the Province of Ulster.

Whether the amendments will satisfy the Ulstermen no one seems to know. So far everything remains quiet in Ulster, but the Ulstermen are determined not to submit to Home Rule. In the event of it being enforced they will immediately set up a provisional government and demand to be allowed to remain in the Union.

If this is denied them, serious consequences, which will doubtless affect the whole British Empire, are likely to follow. The Empire seems to be passing through a very perilous time, and it will take extremely wise heads to guide the destinies of Great Britain during the next few weeks and months.

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Home Rule Bill Passed

London, May 26.—The Irish Home Rule Bill was read a third time last night and passed on to the Lords by a vote of 324 to 247. The end came suddenly, the Unionists refusing to debate the Bill without further information as to the Government's intentions regarding the proposed amending measure. Asquith lifted a corner of the veil, but though Bonar Law admitted his words were as conciliatory as usual, he hastened to add that Asquith had not told them anything and to discuss the third reading, under the circumstances, would, he said, be futile and ridiculous. He added: 'Let the curtain ring down on this contemptible farce. It is only the end of an act of the drama. The Government plans to carry the Bill thru Parliament, but that the concluding act of the drama would be in the country where an appeal to the people will not end in a farce.'

Law then remarked that when the Government was unable to obtain a seat in Parliament for a member of the Cabinet, meaning Masterman, an appeal to the country evidently was not far off. After a brief speech by the Premier, in which he defended the Government against the charge of ignoring the rights of the minority and adjusting the balance of power between the parties by means of the Parliament Act, he concluded by saying he was introducing an Amending Bill, not because he thought the Irish Home Rule measure was bad or imperfect, but because he was anxious for peace. The vote was then taken and the announcement of figures brought out a great demonstration by the Nationalists and Liberals. The division was taken on strictly party lines but the followers of William O'Brien (eleven in all) abstained from voting, O'Brien expressing the view that the Premier's action was not straight dealing either with England or Ireland.

PUBLIC NOTICE

The following sections of Chapter 28 of the Consolidated Statutes (2nd Series) and the Act in Amendment thereof, are published for general information:—

Sec. 12.—When any death takes place in this Colony, information of the same shall be furnished or posted within 48 hours thereafter to the proper officer appointed under this chapter to receive the same in the form of Schedule A, under a fine not exceeding Ten Dollars for every neglect to do so. The obligation to furnish this information shall rest, in the first instance, on the medical attendant; secondly, on the undertaker; and failing these, on the next of kin to the deceased person.

Sec. 14.—No sexton or other person having charge of a cemetery or burial place shall permit the burial of any person in such cemetery or burial place without a certificate signed by a MEDICAL ATTENDANT, a CLERGYMAN, or TWO RELIABLE PERSONS cognizant of the facts certifying to the death of the person for whom burial is required, and setting forth as far as is known the cause of death; and all such certificates shall be forwarded monthly to the registering officers concerned.

This law does not apply to the City of Saint John's, where special and more strict regulations are enforced.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY

(Continued.)
MONDAY, MARCH 2nd.
The House met at 3 p.m., pursuant to adjournment.

Petitions were presented by Mr. Kent, from St. John's, in reference to Municipal Government; Mr. Clift, from Bishop's Falls, for a road, Mr. Jennings supported this; Dr. Lloyd, from Old Bonaventure for road grants, also from Sibley's Cove, for an elective road board, and for the dismissal of certain officials, and for various public matters, Mr. Stone supported it; Mr. Stone from a large number of places in Trinity District, for various public matters. Dr. Lloyd supported these; Mr. Devereaux, from Point la Haye, for a fog alarm. Mr. F. J. Morris supported this, but thought a light was worse needed on Colinet Island. Mr. Walsh and Mr. LeFevre supported it; Mr. Coaker, from a number of places in Bonavista Bay, on various public matters, including about 2,000 signatures. Mr. Winsor supported it; Mr. Hickman, from Bay de Verde District, on various public matters including inshore trawling on the Labrador. Mr. Jennings supported this.

MIN. MARINE AND FISHERIES said that trawling on Labrador had been petitioned against under this and also the last Government, and had been thoroughly discussed. The people did not know their own minds on this point, and had made opposite requests on different occasions. He thought there were already too many laws in force as to the method of fishing, and it was no use for the people of one part of the country to petition to hinder the fishing of another part. Most of the trawling was done by the West Coast people after the Northern people had left the coast. There was too much difference of opinion on these matters for them to be dealt with drastically.

Mr. HALEY said that the law was not strictly adhered to.
Mr. LEFEVRE said that in many cases the very people who petitioned against the bankers using trawls often used trawls themselves.
Mr. COAKER thought that the present law was sufficient for what the Bay de Verde people wanted. The law should be more widely announced.
Mr. F. J. MORRIS had been on Labrador as Judge, and knew that the operations of trawlers were a great grievance to the fishermen. He read extracts from the report then made by him as Judge.

HON. COLONIAL SECRETARY tabled account of Civil and Criminal Prosecutions, June 30th, 1913, Feb. 28th, 1914 asked for by Mr. Kent.

Mr. TARBET presented a petition from New Chelsea for a well.
The PREMIER had leave to introduce a bill respecting Municipal affairs, which was read a first time and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

Second reading of Council's Amendments to Bills.
Partridge Berry Protection Bill. The PREMIER explained the amendment, which was to the effect that the Board of Trade make rules and regulations and appoint an inspector of berries.

Mr. COAKER objected to this unless the berry sellers were also represented.
The PREMIER explained that the inspection was to be independent.

Mr. COAKER explained the limitation to inspectors for export would meet the present case. The Governor in Council could disallow any regulation.
Dr. LLOYD wished to have a verbal alteration.
Mr. COAKER made a suggestion along these lines.
The second reading was deferred pending conference with members of the upper House.

Explosive Bill. The PREMIER explained the amendment, which was merely verbal. Read a second time and concurred in. Protection of Animals Bill. The PREMIER briefly explained the amendments.
Mr. DOWNNEY spoke strongly of the fear produced in cattle by the slaughtering of other animals. That section should not be deleted.
Mr. MORRIS said we understood that the wording of the Bill had not been

revised by the solicitor to the House, but by other persons.
Mr. DWYER said there was a great many people looking into this cruelty to animals matter. More care ought to be taken of people as well as animals. The amendments were read a second time and concurred in.
Committee of the Whole on Logging Bill.

Mr. COAKER said that it had been decided to withdraw the sections relating to the minimum wage, and made one or two other alterations, which he proceeded to explain. He might on some later occasion although to work out one system by which a minimum wage here and there could be laid down for a minimum of work.

THE PREMIER pointed out the difficulties in writing a law application of a rule of minimum wage on condition of a fixed amount of work.
As to the general principle of giving the loggers clean and comfortable surroundings that he entirely agreed with. It was essential always to consider, in putting new burdens on an industry what that industry could bear. We must not penalize companies who had come here and spent their capital in establishing works in this country.

Mr. GRIMES said that the time had come when a standard wage should be established in all industries.
Mr. KENT said that he had refused to accept the minimum wage principle in the case of an industry which he did not consider was able to bear it.
HON. COLONIAL SECRETARY thought Mr. Coaker had done well to strike out the minimum wage clause. He approved, however, of anything which tended to increase the comfort of the men. But the regulations by the legislature of wages in any, or as it would eventually mean all industries, would be a very dangerous experiment. The comparative scarcity of labor in Newfoundland would suffice to keep up wages. A country like this, which was crying out for outside capital, must be very careful how it treats industries establishing in this country.

He approved the arrangements now made for medical attendance, sanitation and inspection.
Mr. HIGGINS suggested that the provision that board and lodging be given in the camps free, to the agent or delegate of the men, was a hardship and should be struck out. The delegates should be lodged only at a reasonable price. It was not right to compel employees to afford free lodgings to a man they must consider as hostile. It was sufficient for them to recognize him.

Mr. COAKER accepted the suggestion. The man was only to be protected from being left in the woods without shelter. There was no objection to the delegate paying for his reasonable board. The PREMIER said that the dismissal of the operator upon complaint of neglect of duty should take place only on enquiry and proof of the charges, and suggested an amendment accordingly, which was inserted.
MIN. MARINE AND FISHERIES thought that when men were summoned away by urgent illness in family etc., they should not forfeit wages for want of notice.
Messrs. Kent, Jennings and Coaker agreed. There was some discussion as to the best way of expressing this, in which various members took part.
The committee rose and reported having passed the bill with some amendment. It was ordered to be read a third time to-morrow.
The remaining orders of the day were deferred.

HON. MIN. MARINE AND FISHERIES gave notice of a bill respecting salaries.

MR. GRIMES gave notice of question. THE PREMIER said there was not much more to come before the House, and it was hoped to close by Saturday. The House adjourned till to-morrow at 8 o'clock.

TUESDAY, MARCH 3rd.
The House met at 3 o'clock pursuant to adjournment.

THE PREMIER at the request of certain parties, presented petitions in relation to the forwarding by trains and steamers of intoxicating liquors, and also to prohibition, including one from the W.C.T.U., with 500 signatures. He understood that other petitions would be presented on the same lines. It was represented that the facility with which liquor could be obtained from St. John's, destroyed in great part the effect of total prohibition. It was proposed that it be made unlawful for subsidized steamers or trains to convey liquors to any Local Option District. It was also represented that it was desirable to take a plebiscite on the question of total prohibition. Petitions so disinterestedly got up and so extensively signed, ought to receive careful consideration of methods and effects. Prohibition, where it did exist, went only to the extent of prohibiting importation for sale and prohibiting manufacture. The Local Option system all over the Colony had reduced to little the consumption of liquor in the Colony. Nevertheless, the abolition of public houses had an excellent moral effect. But so far as he had been able to discover, total prohibition of sale and manufacture in other countries had not been a success. A plebiscite, such as was now asked, had been taken in Canada some years ago. Only 550,000 out of 1,200,000 went to the polls, and they came only 10,000 ahead in favour of prohibition. The Government did not consider that that represented the voice of the people, and did nothing.

As to the prohibition of subsidized trains and steamers carrying liquor, that would involve prohibition which had no other means of communication. He knew of no other way in which liquor could be brought into the country for such legislation, in many cases it would mean that the people of certain areas, and at certain times, would in no way get a bottle of spirits for any purpose. There was no such legislation in any country. Again, there was the practical impossibilities of carrying out such a law. How could the steamship company investigate every package. He himself had given his best support for many years past to any temperance movement that he considered practicable. But a people could not altogether be made sober by Act of Parliament. Moral suasion is the most effective method, especially in dealing with the young. Let every child in the country take a pledge under the most solemn circumstances, and let him renew it every year, so that he grows up without the desire for liquor, and we would never be troubled with intemperance.

But it must never be forgotten, that to the temperance reformers we owed what we had in the direction of temperance, and for that reason he was glad to give the petition his best support. He hoped that something might be done in some way tending towards the bringing about the results hoped for.

TWO WOMEN SAVED FROM OPERATIONS

Messages of ten words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word. A Government cable to Casco, Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient Telegraphic Service in existence.

A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 85 cents to \$1.00. A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50. To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word.

Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass within the radii of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Ray. Telegraph messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Clerks on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the messages may be left with the P. M. to be forwarded by fast mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.

IV. What Christian Socialists Propose To Do.

Christian Socialists say we must work through politics. Co-operation, profit-sharing, etc., are all well, but they are not enough, and if one works for these and nothing more they become positively reactionary and hinder progress. Such authorities as Cliff Leslie, Prof. Walker and Dr. J. T. Ingram concur in dismissing the hope of saving society through merely introducing Co-operation and Profit-sharing into business as chimerical. Business is conducted today on such a gigantic scale that only the State can control it. Small co-operative concerns, competing with one another will never solve the problem. The Socialist says we need a Co-operative Commonwealth, and this means political action.

Christian Socialists, as Christian Socialists, do not enter politics, but as men and citizens they must carry their faith to the polls.

Christian Socialists appeal not to violence. Quietly, peaceably at the polls they must support that party which best represents their views. The economic features of the Socialist State may be summed up as follows:

- (1) Collective ownership of the land and other means of production, distribution and exchange.
- (2) The Socialist State will produce for use only and not for profit (Socialist orators gravely inform their audiences that, as the result of this policy, goods will be available for consumption at a social cost price.



Last Week's Fire

Judge Oke visited Bay Roberts on Tuesday last and conducted an enquiry into the cause of the fire which destroyed the residence of Mr. Jas. Joy last week. The insurance on the house was \$2,000, and on the furniture \$300.
It was well for the people living east of the Cross Roads that a high wind was not blowing and that it was blowing in the direction that it was. Had it been blowing a little more westerly the chances are that the R. C. church would have been destroyed as well as a number of dwellings and stores east and south of the church.
The property owners especially of Bay Roberts are vitally interested in the matter of fire protection, and as the Guardian has brought this matter before their attention in the past, so we again attention there is of a fire fighting apparatus for Bay Roberts.
We are almost ashamed to mention it, but it is a fact that in this comparatively thickly-populated and important town we have not even a few buckets or a ladder or two for use in case of a fire, and consequently when a fire does occur we are almost entirely at the mercy of the elements.
We are apathetic in this connection to a degree almost inconceivable, and we seem to be waiting for a general conflagration such as visited St. John's in 1892 before we take any action.
The City of St. John's can have its up-to-date Fire Department, with fire halls, chemical engines, steam engines, hoses, ladders, hose trucks and an efficient fire brigade, the expenses of which are met almost entirely by the government, the money coming out of the general revenue, while the citizens of Bay Roberts have not 'gumption' enough to demand a few buckets and a ladder or two.
Don't let us wait until the horse is stolen to lock the stable door, but let us ask for and demand from the government a fire engine, hose, ladders, etc.

Bad Times

According to a letter received recently we learn that times are very poor in Vancouver, B. C. and great many halibut boats are tied up and will remain so for the season. Some of the halibut steamers are beginning to bring in good trips both at Vancouver and Seattle, but things remain quiet.

Obituary

The grim reaper, Death, has been very busy the past few weeks amongst the more aged citizens of this community, and five have been called to their eternal reward. The funeral took place to the Methodist Cemetery, Coley's Point, on Wednesday afternoon, May 27th, at 2:30 o'clock, Rev. Wm. Grimes officiating.

The community of Butlerstown was startled on Tuesday last week by the sudden death of Patrick Butler, a highly-respected resident of that locality. Deceased was ill but a short time having contracted erysipelas about a week before, causing his death at the age of 55 years. Mr. Butler was a faithful son of toil, spending the majority of years at the fishery, and altho his efforts to obtain the necessities of life were not always smiled upon by Dame Fortune, he never complained but fought with grim determination to succeed.
He was also the proud possessor of honest and upright qualities, sterling character and a kindly and hospitable disposition and favorably impressed and endeared himself to all who knew him.
He leaves to mourn a widow, two sons, Edward and Michael, and one daughter, Annie, three brothers, Joseph, John and Michael, and three sisters, Mrs. Franey and Mrs. Parsons of Butlerstown, Mrs. Henry Dawe, Coley's Pt.
