NEWS IN A LINE

Eliaser Gosse, of Queen's Cove,
Random, T. B., had his house de-
stroyed by fire Monday night. The
loss was about \$1000. There was
no insurance.

Farquhar's steamers Seal and

fishery. The Sable I will fit out
at St. John's, and be in charge of
Capt. Jacob Kean, Crosbie's Fogota
will also go to the seasidery.

Four of one family named
Gillam, of Robinson's Head, Bay
St. George, have died of diphtheria.
The four included the father,
mother and two children.

Three employees of Hon. Geo.
Knowing were before the Court last
week charged with theft. One was
fined \$150 or three months imprison-
ment, and the other two were let go
on suspended sentence. A fourth
employee has been arrested charged
with the same offence.

The public building here is with-
out coal, and the Women's Patriotic
Assn. was compelled to suspend
their meeting on Wednesday night.
On Thursday Judge Oke also had to
conduct the court proceeding in the
Judge's office, there being no heat in
the main room. Still we are without
coal.

The local branch of the British
and Foreign Bible Society held a
public meeting in the old court
house, Cross Roads, on Wednesday
night. Considering the notice
given a fairly large audience was
present. Rev. Canon Field was
chairman, and introduced Rev. B.
R. Boyer, M. S. T. District Sec-
retary.

Mr. Boyer delivered a very in-
teresting and instructive address on
the great work of the Bible Society.
He told of the distribution of the
Bible in heathen lands, and the
great good it brought to mis-
sionary activities. Practically every
Protestant soldier of the Empire
and some of our Allies were sup-
plied with a copy of the Bible or
New Testament before leaving
for the front.

of the local Branch, and Mr. E.
Mercer was elected Secretary-
Treasurer.

The Victory of THE British Navy Germany's Hopes Are Crushed

That great silent victory of the British Navy, though no less wonderful because silent, is a victory which many underestimate, while we find many who even forget that it may be termed a victory. Some one has said that German defeat began when General Joffe won the battle of the Marne and Winston Churchill mobilized the British fleet.

Defeat, some one is saying, why Germany is victorious everywhere in Europe. She occupies the greater part of Belgium, possesses some 8,000 square miles of French territory, has invaded Serbia and even set up her standard at Warsaw. How then has she met with defeat?

It is an old story, now known by every child, what German statesmen and politicians, courtiers, philosophers and that King of Megalo-maniacs—the Kaiser—had dreamed of and planned for, viz: an empire world-wide in its domain, Germanized throughout; and 1914 offered that favorable opportunity which she thought would give her the realization of her dreams.

Counting on the paralysis of British statesmanship, and being impressed with the apparent weakness of France and Russia, here was her opportunity—to repeat the success of 1870, then to confront Britain with that arrogance which the flush of victory would bring her, arrogance so characteristic of the German nation. This was her object, but because of the prompt entrance of Britain into the arena with that magnificent array of ships and her "contemptible little army" the situation was transformed. We no longer hear now of world-wide Empire for Germany, but rather, "We are fighting for our very existence."

Knowing that Britain's ships control the seas, it is evident these seas can never again be used for German commerce until such terms of peace as are satisfactory to Britain and her allies have been made in exchange. Could Germany destroy Britain's Navy, then hers would be the privilege of the seas. But she cannot; and when she again sails her great commerce fleet across these waters of our globe it will only be at such a price which will take more than all her land victories of Europe have given her.

Let us see what Germany has to offer her opponents before ever she can again trade freely with the outside world. She cannot ever remain existing upon her own resources. She is a commerce and manufacturing nation, relying upon her trade with other countries and upon the markets opened up therein for her products.

We have already mentioned her occupation of some few thousands of square miles of French territory which contain many of that country's coal and iron mines, but that does not vitally injure France, for she can get these things from outside, while Germany cannot. She has occupied Belgium but has lost her colonies with the single exception that all East Africa, and even her colony there is being occupied on its coast by allied troops.

If peace then were to be made tomorrow in return for the privilege of again using the seas, she would have to evacuate Belgium, might have to restore her territory to France, and then face a casualty list of 3,000,000, and a debt circling round the figure of \$10,000,000,000.

Britain's line of ships prevents Germany from importing her foodstuffs, ores, munitions and every conceivable object for the carrying on of war which might be had from neutral countries, in order that her own resources might be consolidated, for resources she certainly does possess in some quality; prevents her from doing damage to British shipping; from repeating the incidents of Scarborough and Whitby; from destroying transports, and we might mention them in decreasing magnitude by the dozen, and what cruel irony is there in the fact that Dr. Dumba, Von Papen, or Boy-Ed, wishing to reach the Father-

land from America have to be conveyed by a British man-of-war!

Let Germany occupy Serbia, let her dominate Poland, permit her to stretch her Empire from the Baltic to the Golden Horn, from the Carpathians to the Vosges; then she would have an Empire, but could it be possible that such an empire composed of people so widely different in language, in temperament, in customs and race could ever be welded into a peaceful Empire with its centre at Berlin, where rules an Emperor whose ideals would ever be running counter to those of the nations thus absorbed.

Would Serbia ever remain submissive and peaceful? Would Poland never try to free herself from German bondage? Would Turkey and Austria forever consent to remain playing the goose step to the time of "Deutschland über alles" if assured of outside help? If past history is any evidence, then the existence of such an Empire would be an impossibility. After all Germany has lost the chance which 1914 gave her. She has failed, and her opportunity will never come again, for the Entente Allies, forgetting not the butcheries of Belgium, the sinking of the Lusitania, the Arabic and the Ancona, the murdering of their own sons and daughters, the shedding of blood of their fellows on the battlefields of Ypres, Mons, Langemarck and Gallipoli, will never rest satisfied until Germany has been beaten. We shall not say crushed but beaten in such a way that there will never again be given her the chance which 1914 gave.

Besides, Britain now possesses an army of 3,000,000 men, is fast organizing and equipping her munition factories which shall turn out everything necessary in that line; yes, in fact becoming the equal of Germany herself in munitions manufacture. She no longer has 100,000 troops to use as on the outbreak of war. Germany must count on twice 10 times that number. And supposing French had one-half of these at his command with Joffe's troops at the Battle of the Marne we may safely say that the war's aspect would not be just as it appears today. It is evident that although Germany has of late met with no great defeat on any one battle field, yet she is beaten nevertheless, and the day is coming when inwardly she will be forced to acknowledge it. Around her the cordon still exists. She may bulge that cordon in the Balkans, on the western front or in the East, but she is being ringed around her still.

That ring will gradually tighten while growing stronger in its grip, strangling these war gods of Germany, killing forever her feelings of arrogant pride and ambition, while making impossible a recurrence of another war with all that such brings with it—its bloodshed and horror, its maimed lives and desolated homes, its sorrowing wives and children, as well as its great burdens of debt which must be borne by generations yet unborn.

In a later issue we shall write of the Gallipoli Campaign; what it has demonstrated and accomplished.

Germany Must Pay The Price

London—No German flag is to be permitted to fly on any ocean; no neutral vessel owned in whole or in part by Germany is to be permitted to ply the seven seas until the indemnity which the allies will demand is paid in full—this is the authoritative plan of the British Admiralty.

The British navy will hereafter constitute itself an army of occupation of the high seas, both during and after the war. Germany may take and occupy countries and exact monthly indemnities as she has been doing in Belgium, but the British navy proposes to go a step further. With the full consent of the Government it will stranglehold Germany's overseas trade even after the war, if necessary, until the peace terms enunciated by Premier Asquith are fulfilled to the letter.

In a word, Germany may continue her occupation of territory in Europe, but the night of England's sea power will be steadfastly exerted to deprive Germany of the seas until she pays the price of her wanton pillaging.

Gailes Camp, Scotland, Dec. 23, 1915.

Dear Ethel,—I received your letter last night, and I was delighted to hear from you and to know that you did not forget about me. Well, dear Ethel, you may think that we find it hard over here of this kind of a job, but no, we find it all right. I expect that in the course of about 6 weeks we will be going to the front, which I am very pleased to say myself or any of us are not afraid to face.

It will be a long time before you and I will meet again, because I am signed on for 12 months, and if the war is not over then I am going to sign on till it is over supposing it costs me my life.

I received mother's letter last night. Tell her there is no need to worry about me, because if it is my good fortune to be saved out of this war I will come home alright. I have not received the socks nor gloves yet.

I hope you will have the same old Christmas time as we always had at home. Here Christmas is not kept so much, but it is in England. As soon as you receive this letter please answer and tell me all the news, and send me some cigarettes, cakes and a pair of socks. Good bye for now. Your loving brother,



POSTAL TELEGRAPH OFFICES are operated throughout the Colony at all the principal places. Messages of ten words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word.

A Government cable to Canso, Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient Telegraphic Service in existence.

A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 85 cents to \$1.00.

A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50

To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word.

Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round to Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass within the radii of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Bay. Telegram messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Offices on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the message may be left with the P.M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.



The Coal Situation

We would be false to the people of this section and recalcitrant in our duties as the publisher of a newspaper if we did not condemn what appears to us to be neglect on the part of our local representatives in not bringing to the attention of the Government the great need there was weeks ago of bringing a supply of coal to Bay Roberts.

As early as January 7 we referred to the activity of these authorities in meeting the shortage of coal in St. John's. We stated that there was a big coal shortage here, and called upon our representatives in the Government to consider the matter.

On the following Tuesday (Jan. 11) the St. John's Daily Star published an editorial on the shortage of coal in Conception Bay, quoting extracts from the H. Grace Standard and the Guardian. On the following day (Wednesday, Jan. 12) the Mail and Advocate also referred to the same matter. We again referred to the coal situation in our issue of Jan. 14th. Still, apparently, no notice was taken of the matter either by our local representatives or by the Government.

On Tuesday night, Jan. 14th, Mr. W. F. Coaker, one of the members of the Coal Committee of the Government, made certain suggestions re the securing of some coal, and shortly afterward we began

making enquiries from the local coal dealers regarding the handling of a cargo of coal if we could get the Government to send it here. In this work we were assisted by Mr. Stephen Mercer, chairman of the Local Council of the F. P. U.

In our issue of Jan. 21st we again for the third time referred to the seriousness of the shortage of coal in this section. On January 24th we wrote the Premier, Sir E. P. Morris, concerning the coal situation here, and in acknowledging the receipt of our letter he said he would bring the matter before the Executive which was meeting during the week.

Meantime, the Agricultural Society discussed the coal question at its meeting held on Saturday night, Jan. 22nd, and the Secretary, Mr. Samuel E. Mercer, was instructed to write the Government concerning the matter.

Mr. Mercer received a reply to his communication from the Colonial Secretary last Saturday night saying the Committee of Council had considered the Society's resolution and our communication on Jan. 27th. We received a copy of the letter sent to the Society.

These two communications, so the Secretary said, were the first intimation the Government had of any shortage of coal at Bay Roberts or in Conception Bay. He further stated that, if possible, the Committee of Council would endeavor to have a small cargo of coal sent to Bay Roberts by one of our local steamers, which would be sold here to meet pressing demands.

They were not long getting down to business when the St. John's newspapers called their attention to the shortage there. They are to be commended for their prompt action. But why should no heed be given to a similar condition in an outport when an outport newspaper refers to the matter? Are the citizens of St. John's citizens above all others that dwell in Newfoundland?

Several cargoes of coal have reached St. John's recently, but not one ton has been sent here. Tramp steamers short of coal have been supplied, but our own citizens are left without any whatever.

We are publishing this for the purpose of letting the public know how the coal situation stands at present. Up to this writing we have received no further information regarding the matter.

It appears to us very strange indeed that our local representatives who receive the Guardian each week paid no attention to this important question. Their attention was called to it as early as January 7. And how the Government can say that the receipt of our communication was the first intimation they had of a shortage of coal here puzzles us after the matter was mentioned in at least four newspapers.

Letter from Malcolm Bradbury

St. Paul's Hospital, Malta, Dec. 29, 1915

Dear Mother—It is so long since I received any letter from home it seems like ages. The last news I got from home was when I received the socks you sent me, and that was all the parcels I received. I did not get the cakes you sent me. It is very warm weather here at Malta, something like the weather you get home in May month. It is just nice.

I am doing fine. I will be getting out of the Hospital about the 3rd of January, and going into the rest camp for about two or three weeks to get my strength back, before I join my regiment, and get out after the Turks again.

Mother, I would much sooner die on the battlefield than be a coward. If the boys at home only knew how the enemy treats our fellow men fight for the liberty of the Empire, where the good old Union Jack floats. They ought to see what we are paying for their freedom after a night's fighting. But we are looking forward to the time when the enemy will have to yield and we hope the time won't be long.

I had a pin given to me by one of the Red Cross nurses to send to you as a souvenir. It is a silver pin with a cross engraved on it. I am sending it enclosed. And I will send my photo when I get out of the Hospital. I don't know whether my regiment is in Greece or not. But, mother, wherever I go I am safe while in God's keeping. Don't worry about me. If I'm killed it is well with my soul, and that is the best of all. 'Be ye also ready, for in such an hour as ye think not the Son of Man cometh.'

It is not only true when I have seen the roaring shells kill my comrades around me, but it is also true in life. Kindly remember me to all friends, especially to father, sisters and brothers. Wish you all a bright and prosperous New Year. I remain, your loving son,

The Mystery of the Appam

The mystery of the liner Appam is solved. The Appam was bound from Africa to England with a general cargo and several passengers, some of whom were British Government officials. Off the Canary Islands she was held up by a German steamer of some kind and a prize crew were placed on board, the crew and passengers being prevented from offering resistance by a battery of guns on board the German raider.

The Appam's crew were disarmed and locked in various cabins. One of the prize crew took charge of the wireless instrument and the vessel started for Hampton Roads, Va., U. S. A., which she reached on Tuesday. The wireless apparatus enabled the prize crew to know the whereabouts of the British cruisers and to steer clear of them.

What will become of the Appam is not at this writing exactly known. It is thought she may be given so many hours to leave port; or she may be taken by Germany as a prize and sold; or she may be interned.

At the time of her capture the ship was taking 20 interned German troops to England.

The Prohibition votes have been counted in Bay de Verde, Placentia, St. John's E. and St. John's W. Districts. The total loss for Prohibition in these Districts is 17 votes. Lots to spare yet.

A big fire occurred at Grand Falls Wednesday night, and several thousand pounds of wood were burned. The firemen managed to save the mills and other buildings.

Five men who are under arrest, charged with the casting away and destroying of the schooner Birch Hill in October last, were brought from the Penitentiary this forenoon to the magistrate's court where they gave evidence in the inquiry now being conducted before Mr. Morris, J. P.—Telegraph, Jan. 31.
