The German building is by long odds the most picturesque of the foreign structures. It is a blend of harmonious, many types of German and Prussian architecture. Its principal suggestion is that of a splendid town hall as it stood in the middle of the last century. It is a most interesting display, consisting principally of books and educational publications, and appliances and German photographs. Here are fine specimens of the handwork of German bookbinders, illustrators and photographers, arts to which the Germans easily lead the world.

Great Britain's Victoria house, which occupies a conspicuous position on the lake front near Uncle Sam's hotel, is somewhat disappointing in its exterior, but within it is rich and delightful. The aim was to show a type of the fine old English half-timbered houses of the fourteenth century, of which many good examples are still extant. Great care has been bestowed on the interior decorations. The library is a fine specimen of work in English oak, and there are fine English English journals are kept on file for the convenience of guests. The drawing room and the great staircase are particularly noteworthy just what the interior of an old English house is like.

Spain is just finishing a handsome building on the lake front. It is a reproduction of the Louvre at Versailles. The Victoria house is a commodious structure erected by Canada, and it was one of the first buildings in the group. It is now ready and ready for visiting. The foreign buildings which will attract much attention, probably, on account of their interesting contents, is that of France, which occupies a commanding position on the lake front. With an Ionic pavilion the French have connected the Exhibition hall with a twin structure some sixty feet away, and within the court thus formed they have placed statues, fountains and fountains. The corridor running from one building to the other contains an exhibit which is decidedly French in character. It is that of the City of Paris, and consists in part of large pictures of all the notable streets, boulevards and boulevards in the French capital. There is also a complete exposition of the mechanical department of the Chatham pulp mill, at a handsome salary. The Messrs. Moorey and Sons were the contractors for the erection of the mill, and they have since built all the additions and improvements. These works were all done under the direction of Mr. M. F. Moorey, and his management of affairs so pleased the directors that they offered him the management of the mill. With some parts of the work Mr. Moorey is not at all familiar, but he is energetic and quick to learn and will soon have the business well in hand. His departure from St. John will be regretted by a large number of friends, who, however, will be pleased to hear of his appointment and of the confidence reposed in him. The property at Chatham is said to be worth in the vicinity of \$1,000,000.—Globe.

The police magistracy had to apologise for his illegal action and the humiliating position he had placed the young man in, and the latter was obliged to remain in town all night. New Residence of E. F. Burns, M. P.
Mr. R. C. John Dunn on Friday showed a Globe reporter the plans of the handsome new residence now being built at Bathurst by Mr. Kennedy F. Burns, M. Immediately back of the reception room are the stairs to the second floor. A library, 18,272 feet, is also on the right.
