That gathering was held in this city and Dr. MacKay was elected moderator. There was an almost unanimous expression of opinion that the tax on Chinese immigrants, and all discrimination against them should be swept away. Some of the delegates from the far west, and two who had lived in Australia dissected from these views. The feeling of the assembly was no doubt greatly influenced by the strong personality of the moderator.
