Purity Killed in Charlotte

Conservatives Insist That Agents Must be Sent to Different Parishes on Election Day.

In spite of all efforts of the Liberal Executive to carry through an agreement to conduct the election on a purity basis, the Conservative Executive will not agree to what is undoubtedly the most important feature of the agreement. The following correspondence will give the voters of this county an idea of how the matter stands: St. Stephen, N. B., Saturday Oct. 3rd, at 5 o'clock. To the Purity Election Committee of Conservative Executive. Gentlemen: We beg leave to acknowledge receipt of your letter with resolutions attached, dated October 2nd, 1908 and received by us at one o'clock October 3rd, 1908. Some weeks ago, Mr. W. F. Todd, the Liberal candidate, approached Mr. G. W. Ganong, the Conservative candidate, in regard to the matter of conducting a pure election. As a result of the conversation of these two gentlemen the matter was brought before the executive committee of the Liberal and Conservative Associations of the County at their respective meetings held on Wednesday afternoon last, each executive committee passed resolutions in favor of conducting a pure election, and the Conservative Executive appointed you a committee to discuss the matter with the committee appointed by the Liberal Executive. You met with us at the Liberal Club rooms on Wednesday afternoon and we brought to your attention specific instances of where the election law had already been broken in this County in this election by Conservative workers. You stated that you had no knowledge of these matters and promised to look into them. Before adjourning you requested us to prepare an agreement on purity and submit same at our next meeting to be held the following day. In accordance with your request we prepared a form of agreement which complied with the resolutions of our County Executive Committee. The following morning we met you again, and again in the afternoon and the whole matter was thoroughly thrashed out by all of us. After a thorough discussion we were united on every section of the agreement as submitted by us with the exception of the following clause, namely: "In order to further the end and purposes for which this agreement is made we also agree that no agents shall be appointed for election day to act at any polling place other than the polling place where he is at this date registered as a voter, and that no person other than an agent shall be sent by either party for the purpose of working in the interests of either party on election day to any polling place other than the polling place where he is at this date registered as a voter." Our County Executive Committee by resolution instructed us to put such clause in an agreement which might be signed, the reason given for this by the various members of the County Executive Committee, was that each polling district had capable men enough in each party to look after the interests of the respective candidates; and also that in past elections it was the agents on both sides who had violated the election law relating to purity. You stated to us that you could not accept the above clause regarding agents without consulting with Mr.

Ganong and with the members of your Executive Committee. This was agreed to and the meeting was adjourned until Thursday evening at nine o'clock for the purpose of giving you a chance to hold such consultation. We met at nine o'clock that evening and you stated that you were unable to give us the answer whether you would accept this clause or not. We again adjourned to give you further time. We held nothing from you on Friday and nothing at all until Mr. Henry F. Todd of our committee, got in touch with Mr. A. I. Teed of your committee this morning and asked for an answer, when we were informed that you would meet us about ten o'clock this morning. No meeting was held and at one o'clock we received your counter proposition. You state in your letter that you called a meeting of some of your conservative workers in St. Stephen and Milltown and submitted the proposed agreement to them and that the agreement was accepted by them with the exception of the clause regarding agents, above set out. We feel that everything possible should be done by both parties to put this agreement through. We drafted an agreement which contained the views of our County Executive committee and of our Conservative workers in St. Stephen and Milltown are opposed to this clause regarding agents. Our County Executive committee feel that said clause is essential for the carrying out of a pure election in this county and that the voters of this county on seeing such a clause in the agreement will have additional reason to believe that such agreement will be strictly adhered to. As stated to you by us at our several meetings we believe that the agreement should be signed at once because we have had information that men have been already working in the interests of the conservative candidate and in violation of the election law. As our last two adjournments were for the purpose of giving you time to consult Mr. Ganong and the members of your Executive committee in order that you could let us know whether you would accept said section or not we must respectfully ask that you notify us before eight o'clock this evening whether you are willing to accept said clause or not. If we do not receive an answer before said hour we will feel it our duty to regretfully notify our county Executive committee that we are unable to come to an agreement in this matter. ing to agents in the original draft of the agreement. This is submitted for your consideration to see if some satisfactory agreement cannot be arrived at between us in accordance with ours. It might be that you would call your Town Committees together and submit the matter to them to see if our suggestions would meet with their approval, and then if necessary submit the whole matter to your Executive committee to see if this agent section of the agreement cannot be made satisfactory to both of us. We believe it can be. Our committee and the members of our party want this election run entirely in accordance with the Election Act and we hope that no slight differences between us will be the means of throwing down the Purity movement. TEED Resolved (A) That the committee accept the provisions of the agreement submitted by the Purity committee of the Liberal party, except that in the opinion of this meeting it is not desirable to draw from the Executive of either party the privilege conferred by the Election Law of appointing agents from one polling place to act elsewhere than in the place where they may be registered, but while insisting that the appointment of such agents be permitted we submit that such restriction be placed around such agent sent [out] that no violation of the Election Law or of the agreement as drafted shall be possible, and we recommend that this modification of the agreement be made. Resolved (B) That each party of this agreement will send none but authorized agents of the candidates to the different polling divisions on Election Day, and agree that all Agents that may be appointed to act elsewhere than in the place where they are Registered Voters shall subscribe to a declaration to act strictly in accordance with the Election Law.

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even-numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 28, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 80 acres, more or less.

Application for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may, however, be made at any Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

**DETURNS.**—(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. He may also do so by living with father or mother, on certain conditions. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.

(3) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention.

## What the Laurier Government Has Done For Labor

### Some of the Achievements in Behalf of The Toiler Since the Liberals Took Office in 1896

An attractive pamphlet has just been issued telling in clear and forcible language what the Laurier Government has done for Labor. It takes many pages for little more than a mere recital of Liberal achievements for the toilers of the land, while the Conservative record in the same regard could be put in two lines.

From the commencement of its term of office in 1896 the Liberal Government has advocated and carried into effect a progressive labor policy. Here are a few of its actual achievements:

The establishment of a Department of Labor.

The publication of a monthly journal known as the Labor Gazette.

The abolition of the sweating system in connection with Government contracts.

The adoption of a fair wages policy with regard to all Government contracts.

The enactment of legislation to aid in the prevention and settlement of strikes and lockouts by:

(1) The Conciliation Act, 1900.

(2) The Railway Labor Disputes Act, 1903.

(3) The Industrial Disputes Investigation Act, 1907.

**PROTECTION AGAINST ALIEN LABOR AND UNFAIR COMPETITION.**

The enactment of legislation and the adoption of measures to protect Canadian workmen from competition of alien labor, and the unfair competition of such classes of labor as might tend to lower the standard of living of the industrial classes of this country, as for example:

(1) The Alien Labor Act of 1897, and amendments of 1898 and 1901.

(2) The appointment in 1903 of royal commissions to enquire into the alleged employment of aliens on the Pere Marquette Railway, and on the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway.

(3) The Act to prevent false representations to induce immigrants to come to Canada, 1903.

(4) The enactment in 1905 by the Parliament of Great Britain, of a measure in reference to false representations, similar to the last named, in the British Isles to induce emigration to Canada, passed at the request of the Canadian Government, the Deputy Minister of Labor having been sent to England to urge the wishes of the Canadian Government upon the British authorities.

(5) The appointment of a royal commission in 1900 to enquire into the effect of Chinese and Japanese immigration.

(6) The imposition, as the result of the recommendations of this commission, of a \$500 head tax upon Chinese coming into Canada.

(7) The investigation, under royal commission, of the methods by which oriental laborers have been induced to come to Canada.

(8) The effective restriction, amounting to complete prohibition so far as contract labor is concerned, of all immigration from India, as a result of the investigation and the special mission of the Deputy Minister of Labor to Japan to confer with the Japanese authorities.

(9) The effective restriction, amounting to complete prohibition, so far as contract labor is concerned, of all immigration from India, as a result of the investigation and the special mission of the Deputy Minister of Labor to Japan to confer with the Japanese authorities on the subject of immigration from the Orient, and immigration from India in particular.

(10) Regulation of the Immigration Branch of the Department of the Interior requiring immigrants to come to Canada by direct passage on a through ticket, to have in their possession a specified sum of money, and other like requirements.

### MEASURES FOR THE WELFARE OF THE WORKMEN

The enactment of legislation and the adoption of measures to protect the health and life of workmen and women, so far as action along these lines was within the power of the Dominion, as for example:

(1) The investigation, under Royal Commission, in 1898, into the death from diphtheria of workmen employed upon the construction of the Crow's Nest Pass Railway.

(2) The enactment in 1899 as a result of the investigations of the Royal Commission of 1898, of an Act for the protection of the health of employees engaged on public works followed by further regulations by Order-in-Council on January 31, 1900 and again by Order-in-Council on May 31, 1902 providing machinery for the proper carrying out of the measure.

(3) Legislation for the prevention of accidents on railways, and the appointment of an officer to investigate cases of the railway accidents.

(4) An investigation in 1907 into the methods by which Government clothing contracts were being carried out, which has been followed by regulations for the suppression of the sweating system and the adoption of a fair wages policy on all Government contract work.

(5) An investigation in 1907 into conditions of employment of the operatives in the employ of the Bell Telephone Company which resulted in a material improvement in the condition of labor of hundreds of women and young girls, and in the publication of a report which will have a far reaching effect in influencing provincial legislation and practice in the matter of employment in this calling.

(6) An investigation during the past few months under royal commission into conditions of employment of operatives in the cotton factories in the Province of Quebec, which has brought to light some startling facts in regard to the employment of child labor in that industry, and which is certain to result in regulations for the betterment of conditions of women and children, as well as for all classes of labor in that and kindred industries.

(7) The enactment of important measures of social and moral reform such as the Lost's Day Act, which contains important provisions on the subject of Sunday labor, and the suppression of the opium traffic in Canada, which was a direct outcome of a report prepared by the Deputy Minister of Labor, and a bill introduced at the last session by the Minister of Labor.

"There is a reason" why nearly all measures intended to advance the interests of Labor emanate from the Liberal party, and that reason is easily found by those who trace the history and principles of the two great political parties, whether in Great Britain or in Canada. The Liberal Party has always been the friend of the toiler.

### A Little About Fish

As a rule the average housewife does not give as much time and thought to the preparation of fish as it rightly deserves. Frequently she regards it as a luxury to be indulged in occasionally, and then she probably restricts herself to boiled cod, haddock or, when she is extravagantly inclined, a cut of salmon.

Nowadays, when we have such an excellent supply of fish brought almost to our very door, it is poor economy not to take advantage of it. People complain that they get tired of fish. Why should they any more than of meat? Surely the fault lies with the cook, not with the fish. It is not probably because there is monotony in the manner of cooking and serving?

Boiled cod and fried pan fish perhaps appear alternately on the menu. Then there certainly is an excuse for soon loathing the sight of them.

In place of the usual boiled cod, there might be given some perfectly fried cod steaks. These, with a dainty garnish of cut lemon and steamed cucumber, would tempt even the most fastidious.

Salmon plays a very important part in fish cookery. Frequently they are used to mask—that is, to cover the fish, in which case they must be thin enough to flow smoothly over the surface of the fish but not so thin that they run off. Great care must be taken in seasoning them.

If the sauce is to be distinguished by some special characteristic, see that there is no doubt on the point. If it is oyster sauce, let there be a liberal supply of oysters; if horseshall, a strong flavor of it.

Garnishes can make or mar a dish. A few sprigs of parsley add greatly to the appearance of a dish of fried fish, while watercress, cut lemon, etc., are suitable for boiled fish.

At this particular season more fish is consumed than at any other time of the year. Have all fish trimmed and filleted at home, otherwise you lose the bones and trimmings, and these are valuable for fish stock and sauces.

When purchasing lobsters be guided by their weight, the heaviest being the best. See also that the tail springs sharply back when straightened out; if it does not, it is not fresh.

When choosing fish see that the gills are red, not of a smoky tint; the fish firm and elastic when pressed with the finger; the fish itself stiff and flabby.

Oysters, if fresh, should have their shells tightly closed. If they are otherwise, avoid them.

**WHAT TO SERVE WITH FISH**  
 With boiled fish—Sauce Hollandaise, boiled potatoes, parsley sauce, cucumbers or lettuce with French dressing.

With baked fish—Fried or plain boiled potato balls, cucumbers or lettuce with French dressing.

With boiled fish—Potato balls, potato puff or plain boiled potatoes, cucumbers or lettuce with French dressing.

With small fried fish (such as smelts)—Tartar sauce, light crisp bread and butter.

With creamed or deviled fish—Crisp bread and butter.

With plain mackerel and cod—Boiled potatoes, parsnips, sour milk biscuits or brown bread.

With creamed cod—For breakfast, baked potatoes; for luncheon or supper, plain boiled potatoes.

With halibut steaks for luncheon—Cucumbers with French dressing.

With fried halibut steaks for dinner—Plain boiled potatoes, cucumbers or lettuce with French dressing.

With shellfish: Oysters—Brown bread and butter, lemon in quarters, chili vinegar and cayenne. With broiled oysters—Toast and brown sauce. With broiled lobster—Lettuce with French dressing, chili sauce.

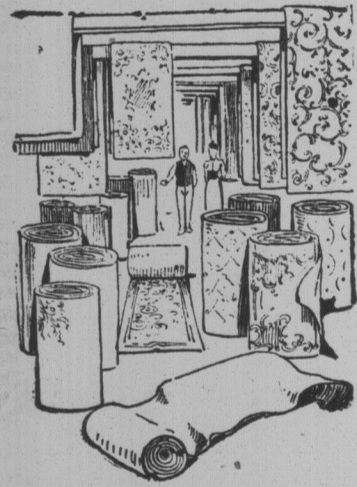

### An Independent Opinion

That "famous journalist of rugged honesty; that fair, impartial critic," Mr. E. W. Thomson, as the Halifax Herald called him some time ago, has sent another significant and interesting letter to the Boston Transcript, of which paper he is the Ottawa correspondent. In this letter, a judicial study of Canada's political condition, Mr. Thomson predicts a sweeping victory for the Liberal party at the coming elections. The recent provincial election in Saskatchewan, he says, shows that Western sentiment is unchanged in support of the Liberal party and that Canadians prefer to allow Laurier to complete the building of the new Transcontinental Railway and to conduct other negotiations in which he has been signally successful.

Mr. Thomson is a man who does not come to conclusions hastily. His paper is disinterested in any Canadian political issue. It has nothing to gain or lose by the selection of either Sir Wilfrid Laurier or Mr. R. L. Borden. It is also one of the leading newspapers in all America. Consequently its opinion must necessarily carry great weight.

Mr. Thomson after reviewing at some length the recent political contest in Saskatchewan in which he criticises the weakness of Mr. F. W. G. Haultain, the opposition leader, goes on to say that the federal contest now is largely a republica of the situation of 1904, when Laurier obtained sixty-eight majority. Sir Wilfrid, Mr. Thomson points out, has held a wonderful record since the people of Canada decided to put into power a man "whose friends were not subservient to the Canadian Pacific Railway influence."

The correspondent describes Sir Wilfrid's efforts in launching the Grand Trunk Pacific Transcontinental Railway, contending that the road promises to give Canada that commercial depth or breadth which the Dominion has ever lacked, making the United States a settled country from three to five hundred miles wide from north to south. "Is it likely," asks Mr. Thomson, "that the steadfast Canadian people will deliver their great national enterprise, before it is more than half built, into the political control of their enemies?"

"It may be said Laurier's legislation has secured the Grand Trunk company that the political friends of the Canadian Pacific Railway, even if they got into power at Ottawa, could not damage the Grand Trunk Pacific. But can anybody seriously imagine that story likely to go down with the shrewd electors of Canada? They will inevitably reflect that an Ottawa government controlled by the Canadian Pacific Railway Company could embrace the Grand Trunk Pacific Company. Such a government could refuse or hamper such bits of amendatory legislation as every large and complicated concern needs from time to time. It could deny reasonable countenance to the company in such times of possible stress as all sound prevision must expect. It could even enable some great combine of financiers to utilize any temporary setback for the purpose of causing parliament to sanction the amalgamation of Canadian Pacific Railway with the Grand Trunk Pacific. This would place the Dominion under a monopoly vastly more formidable and impregnable than that from which Laurier and his party are engaged in trying to relieve the people. Doesn't it seem certain that Canadians will finish the Grand Trunk Pacific before they put the Canadian Pacific Railway party into power?"

Mr. Thomson takes occasion to express his opinion of the "scandal" cry and the charges of corruption and condemns Mr. Foster as the man who directs the whole scandal campaign. He fails to understand how the electors of Canada could ever stand for Foster as a Minister of Finance after all that has been proved against him. He also asks why Borden does not dissociate himself from such a man as Foster, who took commissions and other illegitimate profits at the expense of the Foresters. Mr. Thomson observes that R. L. Borden is impossible as a premier.

"There is no exaggeration," he says, "in asserting that a Canadian premier hostile to the system of voluntary preference might at the next conference complicate affairs so as to be remembered among destroyers of the Empire. Until Mr. Borden shall have publicly repented of his hostility to the voluntary preference plan he would appear to be impos-

sible as a Canadian premier.

"Mr. Borden is a pleasant, good, clever man and may make an excellent Premier after Laurier retires. It is evident that he learns much by just sitting opposite Sir Wilfrid in parliament. Thus he sees how a great statesman conducts things. Just so Laurier learned much from Sir John Macdonald. It appears that the canny Canadian people like leaders of opposition to be thoroughly instructed in this way before entrusting them with power. The situation appears to be that those cautious electors do not think Mr. Borden has yet gone long enough to that school. Saskatchewan is but one more indication that Laurier will be again Premier and preceptor to Borden who is sure to do his instructor much honor--eventually."

### W. F. TODD FOR OTTAWA

"False statement as to character of candidate.—Any person who, before or during an election, for the purpose of affecting the return of any candidate at such election, makes or publishes any false statement of fact in relation to the personal character or conduct of such candidate shall be liable to a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars and costs, or in default of payment of such fine and costs to imprisonment for a term not exceeding two years and not less than six months, with or without hard labor."

### NOT DEPENDENT UPON QUEBEC

That there is nothing in the oft-repeated statements that Sir Wilfrid Laurier ruled by means of Quebec, is shown by the following table which gives standing of parties in the House of Commons when Parliament was dissolved a few days ago:

Thus we see that Sir Wilfrid could have ruled the country if Quebec had been equally divided, for he had a majority of twenty-three outside of that province. The alleged domination of Quebec must have been rather a mild tyranny, for the English-speaking representatives could at any time have thrown it off.

He is attractive personally, he speaks with grace and polish, and he occupies the highest position in the gift of the country. He can get a huge crowd even in Toronto, but a demonstration may not produce many votes." That remains to be seen. Up to the present Sir Wilfrid has been Canada's best vote-getter. His majority in the last House was 64, and it promises to be no less in the next.

A politician relates that he was making a speech last week when he was annoyed by the frequent interruptions of an opposition voter, who seemed bent on making trouble.

"My friend," said the speaker, determining to suppress the disturber, "haven't you heard the story of how a braying ass put to flight the entire Syrian Army?"

"Don't you be afraid of this audience," shouted back the disturber of the meeting; "there ain't no danger of it stampeding. You've tested it!"

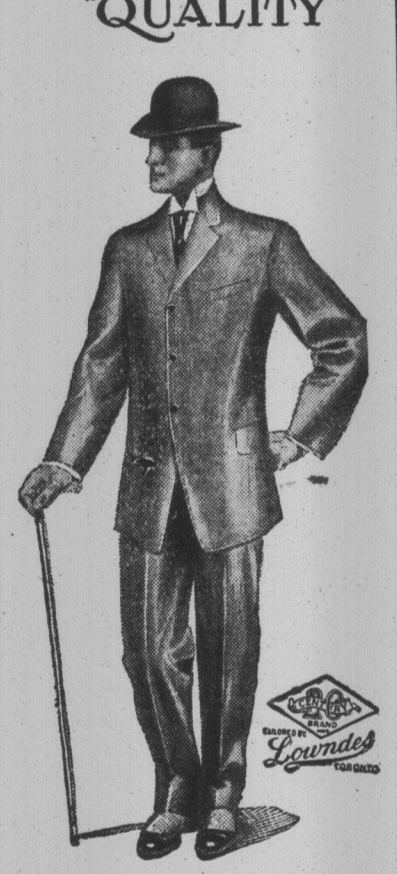

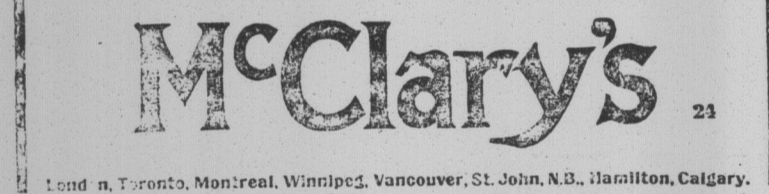

### Disgraceful Methods of a Beaten Party and its Organs

The Campaign of Slander Which is Being Waged Against Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his Government is a Disgrace to a Civilized People, and its Promoters Should Receive the Emphatic Rebuke of the Enlightened People of Canada--The Tactics of the Highwayman and Assassin

The Winnipeg Free Press in every respect one of the greatest of Canadian newspapers, which has been aptly described as "the Voice of the West" prints this strong protest against the "Uncivilized Political Methods" which the Tory campaigners are employing in their desperate attempt to lie the Laurier Government out of office. It deserves the thoughtful attention of every fair-minded man in the country. It is an appeal to reason and fair play. The Free Press says:

#### UNCIVILIZED POLITICAL METHODS

"The country is apparently on the verge of a general election campaign. Unfortunately, this does not mean that we are to have big issues, affecting the national welfare debated by our ablest men under conditions making for the education of the electorate. It means a babel of wrangling and abuse, crimination and recrimination, that will speedily transform the people into a lot of political dancing Derzishes, whirling about in the madness of party hysteria and bereft, for the time being of the qualities of kindness, generosity, sympathy and justice which they ordinarily possess. The Canadian nation, in the hysteria of a general election, with the sudden stripping away of the surface conventions and the recrudescence of savage habits of thought is not an inspiring sight, and must leave upon the mind of the astonished onlooker the impression that despite our prosperity and energy we are still, in some respects, a primitive people. General elections anywhere are not periods of calm; but our election customs, so far as they relate to our platform and journalistic methods are exceptionally obnoxious. A national campaign is in progress to the south of us; and a comparison of the good nature, the courtesy, the disposition to be fair, which mark the American disputants with the methods already in vogue in this country, is not complimentary to the Canadians—but very much the reverse.

THE EXAMPLE OF BRITAIN  
"The scandal-hunter and mud-thrower never lacks for pretexts. Governments are human and make mistakes—often very costly mistakes. The Liberal Government, for instance, in its twelve years of office has administered over five hundred million dollars; and to say that there has not been wastage through bad judgment, through mistaken policies, through the inefficiency and in cases, no doubt, the dishonesty of officials would be to attribute superhuman business ability to Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his colleagues. In these mistakes and blunders the scandal-monger finds his opportunities; and by regarding them as the personal delinquencies of the Ministers in whose departments they occur, he proceeds to indict the whole Ministry from the Premier down, as an organized band of thieves. In no other country in the civilized world is the doctrine of ministerial responsibility pushed to such extremes to justify assaults on private character. There was on the occasion of the South African war an aftermath of

exposures which revealed graft in its most odious form in the contracting department of the army; but there was no attempt made by the Opposition in Great Britain to involve the War Minister and his colleagues in the disgrace of the transactions. Similarly, in the United States, there were revelations a few years ago of thieving in the Post Office Department in the granting of contracts; but not even the most partisan Democrat found in these facts sure and certain proof that President Roosevelt and his colleagues and all the Republican party leaders were involved in an organized plunderbunch. In Canada, Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his Ministers would not have escaped the charge of direct personal liability for these irregularities; with the insinuation that in some roundabout way, they had shared in the graft.

A DISGRACEFUL ATTACK  
"How absurd, how contemptible it is, to represent, as Conservative scribblers and stumpers are now doing from one end of Canada to the other, Sir Wilfrid Laurier and all his colleagues as a Canadian equivalent to All Baba and his Forty Thieves. Sir Wilfrid is now an old man who has spent nearly forty years in the public life of Canada. He has been for over twenty years the leader of one of the two great parties; thrice he has been honored by a majority of the votes of the Canadian people; he is beyond all question the most distinguished Canadian. He has been the recipient of the most marked honors in the Motherland. He is admittedly, the most experienced, the most distinguished of all the Statesmen of Britain Beyond the Seas. He is a great International figure. His name and his career are known, not only to the people of the Empire, but, to a considerable degree, to the world at large. This is the man who, in the supposed interests of a political party is to be assailed by half the newspapers and half the platform-speakers of Canada as a cheap, conscienceless schemer, the hardened leader of a gang of brigands, the associate and defender of hoodlums and thieves—unscrupulous, crafty, dishonest, without a sign of public conscience, or regard for the obligations of his position. It is disgraceful that a political party should resort to such methods of political warfare; but what a reflection it is on the whole community that a party should deem such methods effective! The disgrace of the present campaign of slander and scandal attaches to the whole nation because it should not be tolerated in any community which claims to be civilized; and the Canadian electors must rebuke its promoters in the most emphatic manner if Canada is not to suffer in reputation in the judgment of the enlightened, both at home and abroad."

THE CAMPAIGN OF SLANDER  
"It is too true, as pointed out by Mr. E. W. Thomson in an interesting article quoted before that the first unfailing weapon of the Canadian political fighter is personal detracted, preferably in the form of a charge of corruption and malfeasance in office. It is, as he says, largely an inheritance from the days when the Government should be dignified and courteous, and inflames his personal animosities of electors; but it does not determine though it may affect somewhat the decision at the polls. No Government in Canada has ever been slandered out of office. When they have been beaten it has been due to other causes.

### The Scientific Castaway
