FROM OUR LONDON CORRESPONDENT.

LONDON, June 4, 1858.—From India the news is far from agreeable—General Wolseley's check of a fort between Lucknow and Ferozepur is considered. The corps under his command, however, has effected junction with the Commander-in-Chief at the latter place, and the united forces will invest Barsi, which place is said to be not so fortified up to be capable of standing a long siege, though a large number of rebels under the command of a Mohammedan chieftain, Bahadur Khan, are concentrated there. Calpore is still in the possession of the enemy; the Ranks of Bengal with an army of 12,000 strong remain to be dealt with; and at Jaspurpur, in an attack on Roor Singh, a party of 150 soldiers and sailors and 150 Sikhs were defeated with the loss of their commander, two other officers, two guns, and nearly one-half of their number. "Now Emily," said the counsel for the prisoner, "on her being offered as a witness I desire to know if you understand the nature of an oath?"

"I don't know what you mean," was the simple answer.

"There, your Honor," said the Counsel, addressing the Court, "is anything further necessary to demonstrate the validity of my objection?" This witness should be rejected. She does not understand the nature of an oath.

"Let us see," said the Judge. "Come here," my daughter.

Assured by the kind tone and manner of the judge, the child stepped toward him, and looked confidingly up in his face, with a calm, clear eye, and in a manner so artless and frank, that went straight to the heart.

"Did you ever take an oath?" inquired the Judge. The little girl stepped back with a look of horror, and the red blood started in a blush all over her face and neck, as she answered:

"No, sir." She thought he intended to inquire if she had ever blasphemed.

"I do not mean that," said the Judge, who saw her mistake. "I mean were you ever a witness before?"

"No sir, I never was in court before."

He handed her the Bible open.

"Do you know that book, my daughter?" She looked at it, and answered, "Yes, sir, it is the Bible."

"Do you ever read it?" he asked.

"Yes, sir, every evening."

"Can you tell me what the Bible is?" asked the Judge.

"It is the word of the great God," she answered.

"I shall never go to Heaven," she replied.

"How do you know all this?" asked the Judge.

The child took the Bible, and turning to the chapter containing the commandments, pointed to the injunction: "Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbour."

I learnt that before I could read."

Has any man talked with you about you being a witness here against the prisoner at the bar," again inquired the Judge.

"Yes sir," she replied. "My mother heard they wanted me to be a witness; and last night she called me to her room, and asked me to repeat the ten commandments, and then we knelt down together, and she prayed that I might understand how wicked it was to bear false witness against my neighbor, and that God would help me, a little child, to tell the truth as it was before him. And when I came up here with mother she kissed me, and told me to remember the ninth commandment, and that God would hear every word that I said."

"Do you believe this?" asked the Judge with a tear glistered in his eye, and his lip quivering with emotion.

"Yes, sir," said the child, with a voice and manner which showed that her conviction of its truth was perfect;

"God bless you, my child," said the Judge, "you have a good mother. This witness is competent, he continued. Were I on trial for my life, and innocent of the charge against me, I would pray God for such a witness as this. Let her be examined."

She told her story with the simplicity of a child as she was, but there was a directness about it which carried conviction of its truth to every heart. She was rigidly cross-examined. The counsel pried her with infinite and ingenious questioning, but she varied from her first statement in nothing.
