SERBIANS TAKE HEAVY TOLL OF ENEMY AS THEY RETIRE IN NORTH; HOLD

BRITAIN AND FRANCE PREPARING TO STRIKE BLOW FOR BLOW IN THE BALKANS

Despatching Strong Force to Near East to be Used at Point Decided Upon After Gen. Munro Reports-Government Not Guided by Amateur Stratagests in Mapping Out Plans, but Steps Taken Only After Consulting Military and Naval Authorities, Lord Lansdowne Announces—Asquith to Make Full Statement on Progress of War.

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GERMANS START NEW DRIVE TO REACH DVINSK

London, Oct. 26.—The Serbian troops which have been so gallandly holding the little northeastern corner of their country, where the Austro-Germans and Bulgarian armies are about to join up, are being slowly forced back as the pressure upon them becomes greater. The Marquis of Lansdowne, minister without portfolio in the British cabinet, regretfully announced to the House of Lords this evening that he feared they could not much longer withstand the attacks.

In fact, all along the northern and eastern frontiers of Serbia the invaders are making steady progress, although at great cost, as the Serbians, now that they have reached the hills, are making them pay heavily for every mile covered.

SUMMED UP

London, Oct. 27—According to the Times the following is the situation of affairs in Serbia:

"On the Serbo-Roumanian frontier the Austro-German and Bulgarian forces are within twenty miles of each other. The Austro-German armies are advancing southwest and southeast of Belgrade om a hundred mile front, which now extends between twenty-five and forty miles south of the Dunube.

ube.
"On the west the converging advance from the Drina continues, and on the east the Bulgarian main force likewise is gaining ground.
"The following, the newspaper adds is the situation on the Belgrade-Nish-Celevith Line."

Saloniki line:

"The Germans command the first fifty miles from Belgrade, the Serbians the next one hundred and fifty miles, the Bulgarians the next 100 miles and the French the last fifty miles to the Greek frontier. The Bulgarian forces which have occupied Negotin and Prahovo are marching northward along the Serbo-Roumanian frontier to join the German army which, after crossing the Danube at Orsova, has driven the Serbians west of Kladovo."

Help Must Come Soon or Situation is Lost.

The London newspapers this morning publish an appeal from M. Pachitch, the Serbian premier, for speedy aid from England in Serbia's superhuman efforts to defend her existence against the Austro-Germans and Bulgarians, who have, he says, condemned her to death.

"For twenty days," the premier says, "our common enemies have tried to annihilate us, and despite the heroism of our soldiers our resistance cannot be expected to be maintained indefinitely."



Canadians D Some Ex Work

Five Canadian Patrols **Barbed Wire and Locate Causing Great Damage**

Ottawa, Oct. 26.—The minister of militia this afternoon gave out the following official communication just received at the department from the Canadian general representative at the

Canadian general representative at the front:

"There has been no material change in the general situation during the period from Oct. 15 to 22. For the first half of the period for prevalled and the enemy's artillery was unusually quiet. During the latter half the weather cleared and the enemy's artillery was unusually quiet. During the latter half the weather cleared and the enemy's artillery displayed considerable activity.

"About fifteen hundred shells were fired in our area. Our artillery replied with good effect against the enemy lines. The enemy has been daily engaged repairing the damage to his arapets and trenches caused by our bombardment of Oct. 13 and on several occasions at the commencement of the period his working parties were dispersed by our fire.

"The enemy has displayed no enterprise in patrolling. Our patrols have been very active and on the afternoon of Oct. 17 a patrol of our Fifth Battallon found the body of a German in an enemy sap opposite our trenches. On the night of the 18th a patrol of our 7th Battallon, consisting of Lieut. Owen, Sergts. Ashby and Mergerstein, Corp. Babcock and Private Berry cut through German wire and worked its way up the enemy parapet until it was able to locate the enemy machine gun emplacement and two trench mortars which had been causing considerable damage to our front line.

"These localities were successfully bombarded by us on Oct. 20 and Lieuts, Allan and MacLaren, of pur 16th Battallon, carried out a reconnaissance of a house close to the enemy's lines. This house was found to have been fortified by the enemy.

"On the night of Oct. 21 this house was blown up by our engineers under the direction of Lieut. Cosgrave.

New York, Oct. 26—The weak technical position of the war stocks resulted in a sharp decline in those issues late in the day, although there was no unfavorable news to give a downward impulse. The decline followed the publication of reports that Germany intended to communicate to President Wilson terms on which it would be willing to arrange peace with the Allies. An early conclusion of peace might be cause for selling the war stocks, but it is not seriously believed that any proposed terms Germany misht make now would be such that the Allies would accept them as a basis of negotiations. The Russians have been acting on the offensive with some success and the French neva also been giving a good account of themselves, while the British haze steadfastly maintained the gain which they have made in Northern France and Flanders and in Europe financial quarters there is a more confident feeling than at any time in months that the allied forces will ultimately achieve a complete success. The trade statement of the United States for the week endins Oct. 23rd has made an extraordinary shown, the exports exceeding the imports by \$70, 600,000, this being far in excess of alprevious records. The exchange market, however, shows some recovery, due to a better demand for sterling and a decreasing supply of bills. Possibly the plans for the arrangement of an additional credit for the Allies may also have entered into the case. The decline in the industrials did not affect the railroads to any material extent, and Erle held up remarkably well, considering the large advance which it has had in the past few days. The Coppers were active at non relapsing into duliness but held firmly when the other industrials sold off. The Steel statement is not as good as expected. Estimates were for rather over \$40,000,000 than under that amount.

Many times in his career the Rube has looked like the vertest book, only to come back in the very next game and pull off a brilliant feat that made him look like the greatest ever. It is probable that no more startling surprise party was ever pulled on any baseball player than on the occasion when Marquard was notified that he had been released to Toronto. Possibly the Rube expected to receive some such notification along about 1925, but that it could come in the present year of grace had never entered his noddle. Marquard fairly seethed at the thought of exile to the Canadian city, and, it is said, swore long and loud that he would never go back to the "bushes." Rather than that, he would deprive baseball of his services and leave it flat. The upshot was said Marquard was sold to Brooklyn for \$2,500. Rube was receiving a sairy of \$7,500 from the Glants, and had an ironclad contract which was dated an ironclad contract which was date to expire at the close of the 1916 sea

son.

Despite his generally inferior work for the Giants this season and last, Rube broke into the limelight in this period by his prowess in two noteworthy contests. In July, 1914, he pitched the Giants to victory in the National league's record game of twenty-one innings. At that, the Rube struck out only two Pirates, while the opposing pitcher, Adams, fanned half a dozen Giants. Since then Marquard has gained a niche among the forty "immortals" of the National league by pitching a no-hit game.

marquard's debut seven years ago today was a sample of what was to come, for the Reds knocked him off the rubber in a short period. Marquard had previously played with Canton, O., and Indianapolis, and McGraw bought him from the Hoosiers for \$11,000. His lack of control, still his great failing, made the title of "\$11,000 Lemon" bestowed upon him by the fans seem entirely appropriate, for in 1909 he won only five games out of the eighteen which he pitched. In 1910 his showing was not much better, but in 1911 McGraw's patience with the altitudinous southpaw was rewarded.
