PROHIBITION WAVE SWEEPING THE SOUTH

Immense Area to Be Added to "Dry" Zone on New Year

Liquor Dealers Still Have Foothold in the Large Cities—Changed Conditions Have Led to Less Drunkenness, Fewer Arrests, Decreased Number of Abandoned Wives and More Money in Savings Banks.

Washington, Dec. 27.—A wave of prohibition has swept with such remarkable effect over the south and sentiment has crystallized against the saloon that the dawn of the new year opens upon a vast stretch of territory bereft of liquor, while the area where anti-prohibitionists have triumphed marks the battleground for impending fights for and against the sale of intoxicants.

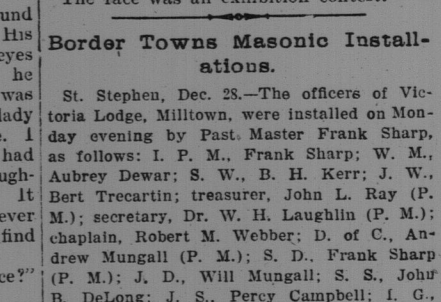
NUMBER OF SUICIDES BY USE OF CARBOLIC DUE TO LOOSENESS OF SALE

Seriously Wounded River du Loup Officer, and Jewelry Stolen from North Shore Town Found on Him.
Campbellton, Dec. 24--During the night of Dec. 14, the store of S. Rosenhek, in the old Masonic building, Water street, was entered and a quantity of jewelry taken. JEALOUS BOSTON COLORED WOMAN KILLS WHITE LOVER

Boston, Dec. 25--Murder was tonight added to the number of suicides, fatal accidents and sudden deaths from natural causes, which have made the Christmas Day of 1908 an unusual one. During the early evening of Monday before, a colored woman, aged 36 years, followed her friend, George S. Rawson, white, aged 38 years, said to be a Boston and Albany trolley switchman, who she claimed, she suspected, was untrue to her, and finding him leaving a house in Thornton Place, she shot him down with a .38-calibre revolver, pouring three shots into the man's body as he lay on the ground. Rawson died on the way to the hospital.
