CENSUS VS. REPRESENTATION

The probable result of the next census as announced by the Federal Board of Statistics places the Maritime Provinces in a very unsettled state as to their representation in the Dominion Parliament.

The population of the eastern provinces did not increase in the same rates as that of the western provinces or Quebec and they are threatened with another reduction in their representation. The increase in the Maritime Provinces is figured at sixteen per cent, while the increase in Quebec is Ontario and nearly one hundred per cent in the West.

As the representation of the other provinces is based in the Province of Quebec, which has sixty four members it is easy to figure out the probable result of the next census, unless the act governing this is amended. The Maritime Provinces will lose three members and the Western Provinces will gain ten or more.

This is how the next parliament will probably be made up:

The Sun of St. John recently stated with bitterness that the people of the Maritime Provinces contributed to the expenses of the publicity campaign made by the Interior department to attract settlers to the West and now it is demonstrated that their contributions have been to their disadvantage as by the great increase in population of the West and East loses its representation.

This matter was the subject of a long debate in the House of Commons after the last census returns were published. The members of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island protested firmly against the diminution of their representation. At that time they asked for an amendment to the constitution but such was not granted, and the same predicament is again to be faced.

Why is it that the eastern provinces are not holding their own with Quebec and the West. Is it because the local governments are not making efforts to promote our natural resources and induce immigrants to our shores? Are they doing all that is necessary to make the provinces drawn by the sea as attractive as the West, or are they allowing matters to drift along. The natural wealth of the Maritime Provinces is beyond the comprehension of men, and are only being developed in a very small way. The soil is capable of bearing exceedingly large crops if properly cared for and social conditions are far superior to those existing in the West.

We are convinced that if all the people would work in harmony the Maritime Provinces would soon have

nothing to envy in the other provinces and the Federal parliament would not find it necessary to reduce our representation. We should make these provinces the 'New England' of Canada.

Those Conservative journals that professed to be in great glee the other day because there was quite a close vote in the selection of a Liberal candidate in Ottawa should not overlook the wrangling among Opposition followers.

Mr. R. O. Skiles, senior justice, presided at the dinner and a number of excellent speeches were made. Chancellor Jones who replied to the toast of Alma Mater made a plea for an increase of the Government grant for financial assistance from the graduates. He intimated that it was possible that money could be secured from the Carnegie Fund if funds could be secured from other sources. The Chancellor stated that more equipment and larger salaries for the professors were needed, although the college was doing excellent work.

Archdeacon W. O. Raymond, in the course of his remarks said he looked forward to the time when the denominational colleges would be destroyed and the U. N. B. Other speakers including Premier Hagen, advocated closer connection between the common schools and the university.

to the question I put on his examination, as to whether he would have stopped at New Mills if there had been a night agent there to inquire the whereabouts of No. 23 and he replied that it would have made no difference and he would have gone on as he figured on making Nash's Creek on the time he was then making.

**Night Agents a Safeguard**  
The absence of night agents at New Mills and Nash's Creek seems to me very material as the Chief Despatcher Henderson admitted in his evidence that had there been night agents at those places it would have been possible to have stalled Thompson at New Mills for a cross with 23 or to have stalled Morton on 23 at Nash's Creek until Thompson had reached safety. Another defect in the time order system appears in the failure of advice to the night agent at Jacques River of the wait order for 23 there until 2:40. He said she passed Jacques River without stopping at 2:35 and his first impulse was to flash the signal against her, but not having any orders he concluded not to hold up the express. The ordinary rule of the road gives the station agent full power, however, to stop any train and stall her on the siding for orders. The general opinion is that his clock was two minutes slow but if it was right Thompson would have had time to get into the siding at Nash's Creek though not in time to save himself from the ten minute train.
