A WINTER SPIN

A rather unusual occurrence took place on Dec. 24, 1899 at New Richmond, when R. O. McWhirter of New Richmond Centre, rode on his sled for a distance of about two miles and returned pronouncing the road in splendid condition for a wheel.

On page one will be found the seventy eighth annual report of the Board of Nova Scotia. It is a most encouraging statement; besides paying dividends totalling \$260,000 and paying bonuses of \$20,000; adding \$250,000 to the officers' pension fund, and writing off bank premiums \$125,000 it transmits \$100,000 to the reserve fund and carries over a balance of \$44,685. The net profits after providing for losses, etc. totals \$664,123.

BOOMING AGRICULTURE

Encouraged by the New Brunswick Department of Agriculture there are now in attendance at the short course at the Dalhousie Agricultural College thirty students of New Brunswick. Hon. Dr. Landry is spending a few days there studying the situation with a view to encouraging the development of the work for New Brunswick farmers' sons and daughters. The Dairy School at Sussex will open this year about the middle of March when practical and scientific instructions in factory and home dairy butter making will be given—Gleaner.

OBITUARY

The death of Mrs. Ellen Lewis, widow of the late E. Lewis, formerly principal of the Grammar School here took place at her home at an early hour Sunday morning after a long illness of consumption. The deceased was thirty seven years of age and leaves three children, two sons and a daughter, to mourn the loss of a kind mother. Her mother and two sisters have lived with her for some time. The funeral took place this afternoon at 2.30, Rev. P. J. Stackhouse officiating. A large number of citizens attended to pay the last token of respect to the departed. Interment was in the rural cemetery.

to the question I put on his examination, as to whether he would have stopped at New Mills if there had been a night agent there to inquire the whereabouts of No. 33 and he replied that it would have made no difference and he would have gone on as he figured on making Nash's Creek on the time he was then making.

Night Agents a Safeguard

The absence of night agents at New Mills and Nash's Creek seems to me very material as the Chief Despatcher Henderson admitted in his evidence that had there been night agents at those places it would have been possible to have stalled Thompson at New Mills for a cross with 33, or to have stalled Morton on 23 at Nash's Creek until Thompson had reached safety. Another defect in the time order system appears in the failure of advice to the night agent at Jacques River of the wait order for 33 there until 2:40. He said she passed Jacques River without stopping at 2:38 and his first impulse was to flash the signal against her, but not having any orders he concluded not to hold up the express. The ordinary rule of the road gives the station agents full power, however, to stop any train and stall her on the siding for orders. The general opinion is that his clock was two minutes slow but if it was right Thompson would have had time to get into the siding at Nash's Creek though not in time to save himself from the ten minutes crash.
