The most intense interest has been aroused in the attachment of the couple, whose wedding had first been fixed to take place in India on May 5, but it was suddenly broken off, after which the bride and her parents sailed from Bombay for England, and were followed by Prince Jitendra.

It is understood that the Gaekwar finally yielded to the importunities of his daughter and consented to the marriage, at which, however, he

was not present.




