Grey's Vigorous Protest Against Lord Salisbury's Hastings Speech.

Britain's Free Trade Policy the Secret of Its Enormous Growth in Trade and Increased Wealth.

London, May 28.—Earl Grey has written a lengthy letter to the Times, protesting against Salisbury's Hastings speech. He asks whether negotiations with foreign powers now on the basis of reciprocity are more likely to succeed than were the negotiations of successive Ministers for 30 years. He continues: After the conclusion of the peace of 1815, when we had considerable concessions to offer, we were unable to grant favors to one nation without offending another; and the practice of making varying tariffs to various countries would throw the whole spstem of revenue and trade into confusion. Lord Salisbury assigns no intelligible reason for incurring all the difficulties that would be involved by carrying his views into practice. The free telligible reason for incurring an the difficulties that would be involved by carrying his views into practice. The free trade policy of 40 years has seen an enormous growth in our trade. Our wealth has increased and our trade has flourished in a manner unexampled in any former period of our history. We should have the courage to either openly abjure the doctrines of free trade and try what we can achieve by a retaliatory policy, or else adopt a manly course by returning to the policy of free trade in its entirety, as acted from 1846 to 1860, namely, duties for revenue purposes only.



CARON WILL BE WHITEWASHED. the charges against Sir Adolphe Caron, formulated by Mr. Edgar, M.P.

Contrary to British and Canadian Parliamentary procedure, contrary to every semblance of justice, Sir Adolphe Caron has been permitted to select his own judges and to emasculate the charges as laid by his accuser, and a pliant Parliamentary majority, accepting the "That will do" of Sir John Thompson as their rule of conduct, have voted down a motion referring the unabridged charges to a select Parlia mentary committee for thorough investi-gation. This motion was in accordance with regular Parliamentary procedure. It owed out in the case of Mr. Rykert | D and of Sir Hector Langevin. Why, it may well be asked, is this radical departure made when grave charges against Sir Adolphe Caron come up ? No one need go hunting for reasons.

The charges alleged must be true, or Sir Adolphe and his associates would face them in their entirety, and challenge a searching investigation. Having refused to do so. having suppressed the more serious counts in the indictment, having chosen his own personal and political friends as his judges, Sir Adolphe now valiantly calls to his accusers to "Come on !" and Sir John Thompcon tells Mr. Edgar that he will be a coward if he fails to prove the charges which, as all can see, he is debarred by the action of the deperate defenders of Caron from bringing before the commission. The inquiry is to be a bogus, one-sided concern, conducted on a line wholly different from that laid down by precedents in Parliaentary procedure, and the taking of evidence is to be so restricted as to prevent full and free investigation of the entire indictment. It is wholly unworthy of repoet, and it is to be hoped that Mr. Edgar will treat it with contempt. His charges, laid down with a circumstantiality and definiteness to which there cannot be egitimate objection, demand an answer. In no court of law where justice is meted out is the accused allowed to change the indictment to provide him with a loophole for escape. Sir Adolphe has pursued this pelicy. Sir John Thompson says it is just such justice as he delights to mete out. What say the independent electors of Canada? Can they, under such circumstances accept either Caron's denials or the money is needed immediately. out is the accused allowed to change the Canada? It is not clear why Sir John Thompson has gone out of his way to legalize gambling on herse races. That is perhaps the worst form of gambling extant in many parts of the country, and it is not consistent to orusade against all other forms of betting and shield that with the law.—(Montreal Star (Independent Conservative.)

It does seem a most remarkable procedure that a parliamentary leader, on behalf of the Government of a country in which the sentiment against gambling is strong, should boldly decree that one species of gambling should be hedged around with legal protection, while all others shall be held to be illegal. Public sentiment is against gambling in all its phases, but Sir John Thompson appears to think that he can defy public sentiment. Can he? The great church bodies are about to hold their annual meetings, and no doubt they will be heard from. There should be strength enough in their protests to compel the withdrawal of the obnoxious legislation.

DISUNION ITS FRUIT.

The Hamilton Herald supports the Dominion Government, but it thinks the principle of the Gerrymander Bill cannot be defended, and it frankly says so. Thus declares our contemporary:

"The bill has been roundly denounced all along the line as one of the most infamous measures ever brought before the House, and seems to be the crowning act of a session made memorable by the Governmental juggling with the grave charges made against Judge Elliot and Sir Adolphic Caron. With the tremendous majority which Sir John Thompson has at his back there seems to be an equivalent to the contemporary of the care of there seems to be no doubt that the bill will be carried but it can hardly be de-lended from any point of view."

There is a good deal of truth in this ar-

raignment. We say nothing at present as to the means by which this increased maority was obtained. It may be asked, nowever, how deep the demands of party leaders and party manipulators, bent only on promoting their personal or family interests, should drag men with any sense of justice in their make-up?

A bad measure should be opposed by every honest man, no matter how it reaches the House. The Gerrymander Bill is confessediy a bad measure; it is an outrage on the rights of the people. It pretends to be a bill to equalize the constituencies, and it is nothing of the kind. It is in direct opposition to the spirit of the Act of Confederation. Instead of uniting the population, and curtailing that party spirit which is harmful to the speedy development of the country, this bill is calculated to intensify the bitterness that always exists where one portion of the community, by legal enactment or by unscrupulous conduct of partisan officials, endeavors to take unique and unjust advantage of another. Closing Session of the M. E. Conference.

The Question of the Admission of Wemen as Delegates Settled-An Individual Donation of \$1,060,000 for Missions Promised.

OMAHA, Neb., May 27.—Yesterday the Methodist Episcopal General Conference got through its business and adjourned. The committee on book concern was instructed to fix the salary of the missionary bishops and instruct Dr. Hunt, the treasurer, as to how the funds should be remitted. It was decided to appoint a commission, consisting of three bishops, three ministers and three laymen, to consider the advisability of the organic union of all the Methodist churches in the United States.

Dr. J. S. Peck announced that a Nebraska minister had contributed \$1,000 to the deaconess cause, and another had authorized him to say that he would contribute \$1,000,000 for missions during his life. This statement was received with applause.

The committee on missions then brought The committee on missions then brought in a red-hot report upon the attitude of the church with relation to polygamy. It declared that the church should under no circumstances admit any one who had not entirely abandoned the practice of polygamy. Adopted.

A resolution passed providing for the appointment of a commission of insurance to report, a plan of insurance at the acceptance.

appointment of a commission of insurance to report a plan of insurance at the next general conference congratulated the United States Congress upon the action taken a few days ago by which \$5,000,000 appropriation to the World's Fair was conditioned upon the proposition that no intoxicating liquors should be sold on the ground.

The judiciary committee reported that the word "laymen" in the discipline did not mean both sexes, but had reference to men only. The committee did not mean to take the ground that women should not be admitted, but simple that the meaning of the word "laymen" as it was placed in the discipline years ago did not include women.

Dr. D. H. Moore, the woman's champion, offered a substitute, declaring that the

Dr. D. H. Moore, the woman's champion, offered a substitute, declaring that the plan of lay delegation was not a constitutional question, but it might be decided by the action of the general conference might decide the right to admit women to the general conference without a constitutional change. He held, further, that the word "laymen" did mean women as well as men. The term might have been applied only to men at the time the words were adopted but by all justice and right the term ought to be applied to but men and women.

Dr. Hamilton proposed an amendment which provides that the word "laymen" as applied to lay delegates must mean male delegates, and in case this interpretation of the word is not sustained by a two-thirds vote of the annual conference and a three-fourths vote of the general conference then the word "laymen" shall mean both women and men, and will, of course, admit the women as lay delegates. In

ence then the word laymen shall mean both women and men, and will, of course, admit the women as lay delegates. Dr. Hamilton's amendment was adopted by a vote of 234 to 173. Dr. Hamilton's substitute was then adopted by a vote of 241 to 16C to take the place of all other parts of the paper and be submitted to the annual conferences. o the annual conferences.

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



Interesting Papers - Tobacco, Liquor

W. C. T. U. delegates from the counties of Middlesex and Lambton met in convention yesterday in the town of Petrolea. The president, Mrs. (Rev.) McCatcheon, occupied the chair. The first hour was spent in devotional exercises, Mrs. Hayhurst, of Forest, reading a portion of scripture. Committees on resolutions and plans of work were formed, Mrs. Millar and Mrs. Thornley conveners. A letter from Mrs. Coles, provincial superintendent of narcotis, was read with greetings for the sisters, and the suggestion made that every man who sells tobacco in Lambton and Middlesex should be supplied with a copy of the Tobacco Act. A paper from Mrs. S. M. Williams, of London, county superintendent of literature, was read, giving valuable hints in the matter of distributing temperance literature, and urging the members to pay more attention to this department.

After opening prayer a paper on narcotics written by Mrs. Childs, of South London, was read, which was well calculated to stir up all workers in the war against tobacco and opium. She said temperance was with women at least, and with a great many men, the leading problem which occupied the thoughts and measures out most of the heartfalt plans of the day. Perhaps its most dreaded form of approach was tobacco. The W. C. T. U. recognized this fact with a keenness which could only be realized by careful study of facts, and a quickening of God-given powers of observation. Out of the thousands who had been at Dr. Keeley's cure many had been interviewed on the tobacco question, and everyone admitted that they began the use of tobacco previous to the use of liquor. Some said the early use of tobacco led to the drinking. This unclean spirit last year robbed God of over \$400,000,000 in this country alone.

The provincial president, Mrs. J. R. Cavers, of Galt, was then introduced and spoke a few words of kindly greeting.

The following resolutions were brought in: Resolved, that we are now and always opposed to any increase in the license fee, either by local, Provincial or Dominion authority; also resolved, that we urge all temperance organizations to unite in exposing the fallacies of this so-called temperance measure, and that we importune all temperance fournals to educate their readers by placing before them unanswerable arguments in the form of facts from high license states, and thus demonstrate the falsity of the claims of high license advocates.

Resolved, that we commend this needed reform to the attention of all labor reformation and philanthropic organizations and to the merchants of this Province; also, that we urge upon our Dominion and Provincial Unions co-operation in every measure tending to bring about a compulsory closing act.
