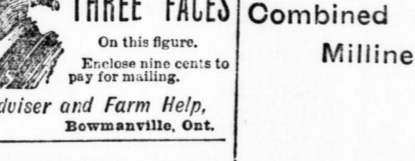

God's in His heaven, It's right with the world. —[BROWNING.] London, Saturday, May 28.

ELECTRICAL power is now used to drive looms in the great manufacturing center of Blackburn. There seems to be no end to the adaptation of this agency to the wants of man.

FACILEM seem to be the cause of a great many of the common diseases. Epilepsy's bacillus is reported as found by Dr. Gerdes, of Halle. He found it in a patient's liver, lungs, kidneys and blood.

DR. MONTAGUE, M. P. for Haldimand, is said to be the author of the gerrymander of the Niagara Peninsula. All the other Conservative leaders in Wentworth, Niagara, Monk and Welland are ashamed of the rascally carving of the constituencies, and disavow paternity of the scheme.

THE Canada Baptist attributes the comparative smallness of the increase in the membership of the Baptist body of Canada, shown by the census return, to the exodus to the States. It can truthfully be said that the loss to the church here has been a gain to the church over the border. The Baptists make good settlers.

MR. MASSON, M. P. for North Grey, has a novel defense for legalizing gambling on race courses, while prohibiting it on railroads. Mr. Masson says that gambling at horse races is congenial to those who attend; therefore he approves of it. It may not be congenial to some travelers on trains if it takes the shape of playing cards for money; therefore it is prohibited. Most people have hitherto entertained the view that gambling was legislated against on the ground that it was opposed to good morals. If not, why are private gambling houses every now and again raided?

CARON WILL BE WHITEWASHED. There will be no genuine investigation of the charges against Sir Adolphe Caron, formulated by Mr. Edgar, M.P.

Contrary to British and Canadian Parliamentary procedure, contrary to every semblance of justice, Sir Adolphe Caron has been permitted to select his own judges and to emasculate the charges as laid by his accuser, and a pliant Parliamentary majority, accepting the "That will do" of Sir John Thompson as their rule of conduct, have voted down a motion referring the unadjudged charges to a select Parliamentary committee for thorough investigation. This motion was in accordance with regular Parliamentary procedure. It was followed out in the case of Mr. Rykert and Sir Hector Langevin. Why, it may be asked, is this radical departure made when grave charges against Sir Adolphe Caron come up? No one need go hunting for reasons.

The charges alleged must be true, or Sir Adolphe and his associates would face them in their entirety, and challenge a searching investigation. Having refused to do so, having suppressed the more serious counts in the indictment, having chosen his own personal and political friends as his judges, Sir Adolphe now valiantly calls to his accusers to "Come on!" and Sir John Thompson tells Mr. Edgar that he will be a coward if he fails to prove the charges which, as all can see, he is debared by the action of the deperate defenders of Caron from bringing before the commission. The inquiry is to be a bogus, one-sided concern, conducted on a line wholly different from that laid down by precedents in Parliamentary procedure, and the taking of evidence is to be so restricted as to prevent a full and free investigation of the entire indictment. It is wholly unworthy of respect, and it is to be hoped that Mr. Edgar will treat it with contempt. His charges, laid down with a circumstantiality and definiteness to which there cannot be legitimate objection, demand an answer. In no court of law where justice is meted out is the accused allowed to change the indictment to provide him with a loophole for escape. Sir Adolphe has pursued this policy. Sir John Thompson says it is just such justice as he delights to mete out. What say the independent electors of Canada? Can they, under such circumstances accept either Caron's denials or the smug investigation of an emasculated indictment as a proof that the men in power have nothing to fear from a complete inquiry into every charge made by Mr. Edgar? In any case, the public should know the whole truth. They are the arbiters. They cannot judge if the greater portion of the evidence is ruled out in advance by the accused.

Despite the flood, Kansas expects to raise 50,000,000 bushels of wheat, and in the central and western sections the rain has proved a benefit rather than a detriment.

GAMBLING LEGALIZED.

It is not clear why Sir John Thompson has gone out of his way to legalize gambling on horse races. That is perhaps the worst form of gambling extant in many parts of the country, and it is not consistent to crusade against all other forms of betting and shield that with the law. [Montreal Star (Independent Conservative.)] This language is none too strong. It does seem a most remarkable procedure the Government of a country in which the sentiment against gambling is strong, should boldly decree that one species of gambling should be hedged around with legal protection, while all others shall be held to be illegal. Public sentiment is against gambling in all its phases, but Sir John Thompson appears to think that he can defy public sentiment. Can he? The great church bodies are about to hold their annual meetings, and no doubt they will be heard from. There should be strength enough in their protests to compel the withdrawal of the obnoxious legislation.

DISUNION ITS FRUIT.

The Hamilton Herald supports the Dominion Government, but it thinks the principle of the Gerrymander Bill cannot be defended, and it frankly says so. Thus declares our contemporary: "The bill has been roundly denounced all along the line as one of the most infamous measures ever brought before the House, and seems to be the crowning act of a session made memorable by the Government juggling with the grave charges made against Judge Elliot and Sir Adolphe Caron. With the tremendous majority which Sir John Thompson has at his back, there seems to be no doubt that the bill will be carried, but it can hardly be defended from any point of view."

There is a good deal of truth in this arraignment. We say nothing at present to the means by which this increased majority was obtained. It may be asked, however, how deep the demands of party leaders and party manipulators, bent only on promoting their personal or family interests, should drag men with any sense of justice in their make-up?

A bad measure should be opposed by every honest man, no matter how it reaches the House. The Gerrymander Bill is confessedly a bad measure; it is an outrage on the rights of the people. It pretends to be a bill to equalize the constituencies, and it is nothing of the kind. It is in direct opposition to the spirit of the Act of Confederation. Instead of uniting the population, and curtailing that party spirit which is harmful to the speedy development of the country, this bill is calculated to intensify the bitterness that always exists where one portion of the community, by legal enactment or by unscrupulous conduct of partisan officials, endeavors to take undue and unjust advantage of another. We hear a great deal of talk about the unity of Canadians. Unity there cannot be unless a sense of justice prevails the measures of Parliament. As to redistribution, the proper plan is to take the work out of the hands of partisans and delegate it to the Supreme Court of Canada.

A PECULIAR REQUEST.

The Board of Trade of St. John, N.B., has addressed a petition to the Board of Trade of this city asking it to petition the Minister of Customs to collect statistics showing the extent of trade between the Provinces. It is not easy to discover how the Minister of Customs can collect statistics of inter-provincial trade. He has nothing to do with local trade. His duty is to make it as difficult as possible for importers to get goods into this country, in exchange for goods sent out of it. The railway and shipping companies alone can give statistics of trade between the Provinces, and even they would have to guess a good deal. If we were an intelligent foreign trade policy, local trade will in a large measure take care of itself.

The Quebec bishopric of the Church of England is vacant and there is a likelihood of Bishop Hamilton, of Niagara, being appointed to the See. The bishop came to the Niagara Diocese from Quebec, and his relatives and nearest friends reside there. There has been friction in the Niagara diocese since Bishop Hamilton's advent, because of the fact that he is a High Churchman, while a large proportion of the adherents of the church in the diocese are Low.

General Booth announces a great need of funds to carry on the Salvation Army. He recalls his announcement that the \$300,000 given for his "Darkest England" scheme would require \$150,000 annually for maintenance, as only \$20,000 of that had been furnished so far. So the scheme is almost at a standstill. The "Spiritual" fund is also exhausted. To carry on this "spiritual side of the war" into the self-denial week in October will require \$40,000, and the money is needed immediately.

The current talk about Anne Hathaway's cottage has brought out some information about Annie Laurie's home, Craigdarroch. It lies deep in the shady recesses of a vale near Dunblair, and doubtless the hand never plays there. As the house is very ancient, it is easy to credit the statement that "the view from the distance is most beautiful." In the house are fully a thousand carefully treasured relics of the fair Anne, and her great-great-granddaughter is still living, for Annie bore several children to the rich laird of Craigdarroch, for whom she fought the tender and true William Douglas.

Mr. Donald Macmillan, manager of the former, having been recently appointed accountant of the London Mutual Fire Insurance Company, the directors of the Royal Standard decided not to make the experiment of a new manager, and this course has been followed in the action they took. Tenders were received from all the leading loan companies for the assets, and that of the London Loan was accepted.

That the Royal Standard Loan was in excellent financial shape is assured by the terms of the transfer and the reliability of the directors. A circular has been issued calling a meeting of the shareholders on Friday "for the purpose of considering and confirming a sale of the assets of the company which will pay them a premium of 7 per cent. and accrued dividend. The accrued dividend is 3 per cent. due in July, so that the creditable figure of 110 was realized."

The directors of the Royal Standard Loan Company were: Messrs. George Taylor (ex-mayor), president; W. H. Ferguson, first vice-president; Joshua Jackson, second vice-president; John Johnson, city; Robert Rich, city; W. M. Spencer (mayor), city; James Cameron, Strathroy; John Tanton, city; and Robert McEwen, Byron. The financial standing according to the last annual report was: Capital, subscribed, \$240,000; paid up stock, \$180,550; paid on accumulating stock, \$3,088 18; reserve fund, \$19,500; contingent fund, \$1,506 10; total assets, \$404,648 18.

President Thomas Kent, of the London Loan Company, has issued a circular as follows: "This company, having now purchased the assets and business of the Royal Standard Loan Company, amounting to over \$400,000, the assets of the combined companies will be increased to nearly \$2,000,000. Arrangements have been made so that shareholders who wish to continue their investments can do so without extra charge, thus maintaining their former dividend. Depositors in savings bank will have increased security and suffer no reduction in rate."

Business Better. NEW YORK, May 28.—Dun, Wiman & Co.'s weekly review of business: Better weather has wrought improvement in business at many points. The failures during the past week number, for the United States 185 and for Canada 13, or a total of 198, as compared with 192 last week. For the corresponding week last year the figures were 247, representing 219 failures in the United States and 28 in Canada.

Lawlessness in the Neighborhood of Rouen. ROUEN, Ont., May 28.—Ever since the firing and destruction of Mr. Richardson's buildings at Rouen on the night of the 14th inst. the lawless element, venting their fury by pulling up fence posts and cutting the wires. The outlaws virtually hold the fort, and there is no certainty of a cessation of lawlessness in the neighborhood. For various reasons the "combine" against Richardson is powerful and determined, and it is feared that a repetition of the kind of lawless acts will be enacted, unless the "law and order" portion of the community organizes to suppress the riot.

How Pure Air Acts on the System. Pure air and exercise are equal forces acting in the same direction. They get rid of waste, and with it of the poisons in the system which are depressing various organs. We need not, therefore, be surprised when we are told by Sir D. Galton that after barracks were better supplied with the ration of the men had to be increased; or by "the pathetic" story of certain seamstresses whose work room was ventilated, and who then began to get fat. The things might be restored, as their appetites had increased beyond their earnings.—[Popular Science Monthly.]

 Convention of Middlesex and Lambton W. C. T. U. Delegates.

**INTERESTING PAPERS.**  
 Tobacco, Liquor and Opium Secured—High License Denounced—The Dominion Government Taken to Task—A Sunday Newspaper Referred to—London Ladies Take Prominent Part.

The W. C. T. U. delegates from the counties of Middlesex and Lambton met in convention yesterday in the town of Petrolia. The president, Mrs. J. McCutcheon, occupied the chair. The first hour was spent in devotional exercises. Mrs. Hay, secretary, read a portion of the minutes of the last meeting, and Mrs. Thorneley convened. A letter from Mrs. Cole, provincial superintendent of the Middlesex and Lambton county branch, was read with greetings for the man who sells tobacco in London and Middlesex should be supplied with a copy of the Tobacco Act. A paper from Mrs. S. M.
