American Professor Conferred With Counts Tisza and Andrassy.

CZERNIN SEES THE KAISER

Sudden Return Following Protests Causes Sensation at Vienna.

London, April 11 .- Negotiations regarding the possibility of peace between the United States and Austria-Hungary have been carried on between Professor Anderson of Washington and Count Stephen Tisza and Count Julius An-drassy, former Hungarian premiers, ac-cording to a Vienna dispatch to the Berlin Tageblatt, as quoted in an Ex-change Telegraph message from Copen-

change Telegraph message from Copenhagen.

The dispatch also says the Austro-Hungarian foreign office admits various attempts have been made to obtain a general peace, and that Emperor Charles has had negotiations with several persons, who have international connections.

connections.

Czernin's Sudden Return.

The Austro-Hungarian foreign minister, Count Czernin, has returned unexpectedly to Vienna from a visit to German headquarters, where he conferred with Emperor William. The dispatch says the sudden return of the count caused a sensation in Austrian political circles.

The stand taken by the Czechs against Count Czernin, the dispatch continues, overshadows the controversy between the count and Premier Clemenceau of France. In Prague on Saturday a Czech meeting of protest against Count Czernin will be held.

Washington, April 11.—No one in official circles in Washington could identify today the Professor Anderson, reported to have carried on negotiations with Austro-Hungarian representatives.

ITALY FRIEND TO OPPRESSED. Washington, April 11.—Greatest importance is attached by official dispatches from Rome, to the congress of nationalities oppressed by Austria which began sessions in the Italian

"While Vienna raises her deflance against the sacred rights of the nations," the dispatches say, "Rome listens to the voice of the oppressed Austrian subjects who have met there to discuss the means of obtaining liberty and a permanent page under the to discuss the means of obtaining liberty and a permanent peace under the auspices of the free Italian institutions. "The congress is the best evidence of Italy's sympathy for the aspirations of the peoples suffering under the Austro-Hungarian domination. The Slavic races will receive from Italy all the support and co-operation which they may need for their free development and progress, if they succeed in setting themselves free from the Austrian yoke. To this effect Italy offers all the assistance she can give."

AUSTRIA ADMITS KAISER ATTEMPTS TO WIPE OUT

Exact Heavy Toll of Lives For Minor Successes-Armentieres Likely To Be Abandoned.

London, April 11.—Desperate fighting continues uninterruptedly on a 25-mile front between Givenchy and Wytschaete, with the Germans suffering severe losses for small gains against the strong British defence. In two days of heavy engagements the enemy has not yet gained any point of strategical importance, and the British still dominate the battlefield from the heights of Messines Ridge on the north and Givenchy on the south

Below Armentieres, where the attack was launched Tuesday, the Germans have made little additional progress, although they have crossed to the left bank of the Lys, between Estaires and Bac St. Maur.. Re-

North of Armentleres the Germans, after driving the British from their first defences in the lowland, have been unable to gain the crest of Massines Ridge, despite many furious assaults. Armentieres is still in British hands, but it is the apex of a sharp sallent as the result of the two days' fighting, and a British withdrawal to west of the Lys is

IN THE PRESENT OFFENSIVES, IT IS REPORTED IN DISPATCHES, FROM THE BATTLEFRONT, PLAN THE WIPING OUT OF THE BRITISH ARMY. It is believed that the Germans now are seriously attempting, by swinging their attacks to the north, to annihilate British resistance. In consequence further assaults along the British front and much desperate fighting is expected.

Infantry fighting on the Picardy battlefront has quieted down momentarily. The French and German artillery fire has been violent north of Montdidler and along the Oise Canal, northwest of Soissons. There have been artillery exchanges on the British front, which has not yet been linked up with the northern battlefield.

There has been no Infantry activity on the Loos-Lens-Vimy sectors, the connecting link, although the German artillery fire is increasing.

American gunners and infantrymen holding a certain sector on the front in France drove back in disorder on Wednesday a strong German attack. The enemy effort was the heaviest yet made against an American position, but the Germans did not get through the wire entanglements

GERMANS STRIKING FOR RIDGE TAKE ARMENTIERES, BUT FAIL TO KEEP FOOTHOLD ON KEYPOINT AND GIVE UP GAINS TO BRITISH

Furious Hand-to-Hand Fighti ng as Germans Drive Toward Messines From Southwest -Villages Won Back by Haig's Forces in Clos e Contact Battling.

THE BATTLE ON THE NORTH FRONT.

Armentieres has been evacuated by the British, while the Germans, driving in from the southwest of the town, are struggling to push forward in the area southwest of Messines Ridge, the key point of the British line in Flanders.

Messines Ridge Itself has been the objective of desperate frontal attacks. and the Germans are reported to have pushed on to the ridge several times during the flerce hand-to-hand fighting. Each time, however, the British came back at them with effective counter-attacks, and today were still holding the

West of Armentieres the enemy, struggling in his deep salient, has pushed the fighting to the limit, and at one time succeeded in driving some three miles beyond the River Lys to La Creche. In this situation the British likewise reacted strongly, and by vigorous counter-attacks ousted the Germans from La Creche and other neighboring terrain.

Wytschaete, south of Messines, was also the objective of heavy German at-

tacks and possession of it changed several times, but this morning found Field Marshal Haig's troops holding the town. There was a similar hard fight for Lestrem, at the western tip of the German salient, on the River Lawe. The Germans worked their way into this place vesterday, but were unable to move on further, and ultimately were driven out

of it and back across the Lawe. The evacuation of Armentieres had been forecast and discounted, as the place is without strategical value. What is left of the town is full of gas, hanging there from the copious gas shell bombardments. North of Armentieres the British position hinges on Ploegsteert and Ploegsteert wood, which the line bisected this morning. There was no let up in the engagement today, the battle continuing on the

entire 25-mile front from La Bassee north to the Ypres-Comines Canal, just London, April 11.—The British have withdrawn from Armentieres, on the northern battlefront, the war office announces. Violent fighting continues all along the front

SNOW WILL IMPROVE CHANCES OF WHEAT. **DECLARES A FARMER**

But Much Has Been Killed by Frost.

SPRING WHEAT INCREASE

Five Times as Much in the County as Ever Before.

"This bit of snow, if the fall covered any area, will be a good thing for the wheat in this district, that is, the wheat that hasn't been killed by the frosts," said a farmer who was in The Advertiser office today. "Much of the wheat killed out your

way?" he was asked. "We can't tell until a good rain comes," he replied, adding, "For one thing, this east wind isn't any good for growing purposes," Much Wheat Nipped.

Roscoe A. Finn, district agricultural representative, estimates that possibly 25 per cent of the fall wheat has been nipped by the spring frosts. "Of course," he says, "we cannot tell exactly. In order to make an accurate estimate it would be necessary to go over every field in the county. However, a great deal more spring wheat is being sown this spring than ever before. Up in the north part of the county, where a little spring wheat was grown last year, the whole grow is being used for seed the whole crop is being used for seed this spring. In addition, the farmers are getting two oarloads of western Marquis wheat, which Hunt Bros. are distributing for the Government. One carload at least has already been dis-

Seeding Is Early, Seeding this year is two weeks in ad-Seeding this year is two weeks in advance of last year, at least, owing to the early opening up of spring in March. However, that doesn't signify very much with later weather conditions such as have obtained. In the western part of the county many of the farmers are all through seeding. Most people were on the land by April 1, and down around Chatham, in Kent County, they were at it as early as March 25. This hasn't been much advantage, owing to the manner in which operations have been held up lately. The ground has been frozen every morning. ground has been frozen every morning, and it has been practically impossible to do anything until after noon. Conditions for growing require a temperature of from 45 to 50 degrees, and half the time it has been under 32 degrees." One man who knows the situation estimates that five times as much spring wheat is being sown in Middlesex County this year as ever before.

Lloyd George has called for more men to eneet the enemy in the supreme and perhaps final onslaught. The Allies have been fighting cautiously to preserve their men. But there is need for new armies, and men below 51 years of age are to be taken in England, Wales and Scotland for military service, while the long exemption granted to Ireland is almost certain to come to an end.

Canada should consider that the call of Lloyd George is directed to all the available men in the Dominion. To conscript men is the method of securing soldiers in Canada. Therefore, in the interests of humanity and for the preservation of liberty conscription should be applied in such a manner as to secure large drafts of men. With the hurricane of combat at its height on the western front, and with British and French arms standing up nobly to the attack, it is possible that few if any men who would now be called for service will reach the firing line. But the men are needed now, needed far more than at election time, and since the military service act is an instrument designed to secure soldiers, it should be erforced to the hilt in this hour of supreme crisis. Are you buying the right cooking utenslis for use in the kitchen, and selecting for each cooking process the best for the purpose? Aluminum ware, steel ware, agate ware and nickeled copper ware, all have practically the same value as heat conductors,

In buying cooking utenslis it is well to remember that the maintenance cost as well as the first cost should be considered. For tea kettles, sauce pans and boiling kettles it is well to select luminum, nickel, steel, enamel on steel or agate ware. For deep frying a kettle of iron can scarcely be improved on, but cast aluminum ware of the same old Scotch type is also good.

For browned surfaces in baking the best ware for the purpose is Russia from ware, aluminum or glass. Select rounded instead of sharp corners,







Much emphasis was laid by the speaker in the course of his address upon getting hold of the no-church people not being reached by other agencies, and adapting the church and its message to their needs.

Must Be Prepared.

The church, he declared, must hold itself prepared to mould itself to meet new conditions in Canada as a result of the return of the soldiers from overseas and the reconstruction process that will inevitably take place.

"We stood in danger of missing our greatest opportunity through conservation and conventionality," he warned, adding, "Following the Franco-Prussian war. Roman Catholicism and Protestadding, "Following the Franco-Prussian war, Roman Catholicism and Protestuntism alike lost their chance in France, and the new gospel that gripped the seople was that of Secularism, because it was sincere. The trouble with us is that we are inclined to glory too much in what we are doing, instead of concerning ourselves over what we are cerning ourselves over what we are concerning ourselves over what we are not doing."

While paying full measure of tribute to the influence of the church in Canada, as manifested in the enlistment of such numbers of young men of the churches for military service, and giving the church its due concerning the lowering of the walls of denominationalism and the service rendered through the "by-products"—social service, the Y.M.C.A., boys, organizations, etc.—the speaker held to his statement that the church still requires to be and do much more to adequately meet the needs of the day and the future.

Beyond the Church.

"A considerable part of the religious

"A considerable part of the religious life is outside the church, and this is our judgment on the church," he said.

"What of those outside?

"The church people aren't interested. The church people gave very little concern about getting under the skin of these people outside, and finding out what they are like. To a great many people Jesus Christ is a long distance off. A flesh and blood revelation of the Eternal God in the followers of Jesus is what is needed today by the souls of men in darkness.

"We are proud of our soldiers, but when we come to consider our political life we hang our heads. Since the beginning of the war the need has been demonstrated of strong leadership.

"As Congregationalists we are united the contractions of the church of canda but them

"As Congregationalists we are united from coast to coast in Canada, but there are thousands of members of our denomination across the boundary line with whom we have no connection. We haven't yet found our religion international enough. Imagine a national Christ! The tyranny to the boundary line is greater than the power of Christ."

An interesting discussion followed the address, in which Rev. W. H. A. Claris of this city, Rev. G. A. Mackenzie of Stratford and several others took part. Reports from the church represented at the convention revealed encouraging conditions.
