

CITY'S BONDS MUST TAKE CHANGE THE SAME AS ALL THE OTHERS!

North Midland People Object to Giving London a First Mortgage on the Proposed Railway—Company Also Object to Clause Which States City Engineer Must Pass Contracts.

The North Midland Railway Company strongly object to the city demanding a first mortgage on the road between here and St. Marys as security for the guarantee of \$200,000 worth of bonds.

At a conference this morning between the company's directors and the finance committee of the city council, they made strenuous objections to that clause, and declared that the city's debentures would have to take a chance with the others.

There were other clauses that did not meet with their approval, but this one caused the most serious break. The finance committee decided to take cognizance of their objections, and a meeting will be held later to consider the matter.

The first clause objected to by Mr. P. G. Rumball, who conducted the negotiations on behalf of the company, was that where it stated that the city engineer should pass on the contracts and the road.

A Strong Objection.

"We object being put into the power of one man," declared Mr. Rumball. "I think the fact that the road shall pass the Ontario railway and municipal board should be sufficient guarantee. If the road was not satisfactory to this body, then the city could refuse to pay the money. If we are held up by one man's great difficulties we will be placed in our way."

"The railway board only pass on the question whether or not the road is safe to travel on," declared A. H. Richter. "Our object goes farther than that. We want our engineer to say whether or not the specifications are right, whether or not the contract prices are fair both to the company and the men; in a word, we want him to protect us in the expenditure of the money."

"We would like to have some machinery so that we could appeal to an other body, in case your engineer failed to pass the road," said Mr. Rumball.

PAPER MAKER OPPOSES

Says United States is Not Dependent on Canadian Pulpwood.

Washington, Feb. 20.—Hearings on the McCall bill, to carry out the provisions of the Canadian reciprocity agreement were begun today by the Senate committee on finance. During the forenoon the only witness was John Strang, of Nevada, a paper manufacturer and former lieutenant-governor of his state. Mr. Strang opposed the bill in vigorous language, charging that false sentiment in favor of it had been manufactured by a league of newspapers.

Stiffed of its attacks upon newspapers and other organizations which favor the agreement, Mr. Strang's statement contained the following arguments:

"That the United States has no more need for Canadian pulp wood than it has for Canadian disease germs; that spruce is not necessary to papermaking, as any wood which has a fibre wall surface, and there are many woods which are better than spruce; that the forests of the northwest make excellent paper, and that there is nothing better than the soft woods of the north."

TRAGIC SEQUEL TO MYSTERY

Suspect in Coffee Murder Case Commits Suicide.

FOURTEEN POISONED

Two Died as Result of Act at Dinner Party in Dead Man's Home.

London, Feb. 20.—The coffee poisoning mystery at Dulworth had a tragic sequel today in the suicide of John Hutchinson, a son of one of the victims, who swallowed a fatal dose in the presence of officers sent to arrest him.

The suicide was a chemist and was charged with having played poison in the coffee served at a dinner party at his father's home, resulting in two deaths and the serious illness of several other persons.

POISONED COFFEE

On the evening of Feb. 4, Charles E. Hutchinson, a man about 50 years of age, connected with the Duke of Bedford's Dulworth estate office, gave a dinner for sixteen persons. At the end of the meal, coffee was served first to the ladies and later to the gentlemen. After only a few minutes, several of the ladies became ill, and then a number of the men complained of distress.

Physicians were summoned, but the host and during the night, later Alexander Clapperton, a relative, died. Twelve others were more or less seriously ill for some days.

Post mortem examinations revealed that the deaths were due to poisoning, and suspicion fell on the son John. A warrant for his arrest was issued, and today the officers found him at a hotel at Dulworth. An exciting scene followed, during which the young man drew a revolver from his pocket, and despite the efforts of the officers to prevent him, drank the contents. He died in a few moments. The motive for the poisoning of the dinner party, if known, has not been divulged.

PAPUANS MASSACRE A PARTY OF WHITES

British Administrator and Commissioners Killed While Exploring New Guinea.

Brisbane, Australia, Feb. 20.—Word was received today from Papua, a division of the island of New Guinea, of the massacre of Stanbury Smith, the British administrator of Papua, two white officers, and a party of natives by inhabitants of the interior.

Smith, accompanied by the officers, twelve native police and fourteen carriers, left Port Moresby, the capital of Papua, on Nov. 18, last, to explore the interior country. The party was last heard of Dec. 1. Subsequently searchers were sent out, and these have failed to return.

Two natives, who accompanied Smith, arrived at Gorbud with the bodies of all of the party except the natives, who were killed by natives.

PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT ASKED TO EXPLAIN TRAVERS MATTER

Leading Conservative Journal of Toronto Exonerates the Federal Government of All Blame and Censures Ontario Attorney-General's Department.

Toronto, Feb. 20.—The impression is very strong today that the sudden departure of W. R. Travers for Kingston on Saturday cannot be looked up to the Provincial Government, either directly or indirectly. The Telegram editorially explicitly exonerates Sheriff Mowat from all blame in the matter, and calls on the Provincial Government for an explanation. From the very beginning the attorney-general's department and the officials who owe allegiance to the department have been censured for their lack of aggressiveness in pushing the case.

"They can't make political question out of this case," said a well-known lawyer today. "The attempt to blame the Provincial Government for failing to have justice perfectly served, and to put a herring down across the track. The finance department may not have been as astute as they might have been, but nobody seriously believes that their course has been other than perfectly honest and straightforward."

Toronto, Feb. 20.—The Star publishes a letter today from Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, minister of justice, in which he says in part:

Your telegram of Saturday, asking the reason of the omission authorities for transferring prisoner Travers from the Toronto Jail to the penitentiary, without notifying the Ontario authorities, was the first intimation which had come to me that Travers was being taken to Kingston.

I replied at once that I knew nothing about the matter, except what I saw in the newspapers, and that the Dominion authorities had nothing to do with the case, and that they reached the penitentiary under the law it is the business of the staff of any court from which a convict has been sentenced to the penitentiary to convey such convict to the penitentiary. Still further difficulties are in the way of the sale of the city hall. For the past few days there has been a close scrutiny of the council proceedings of 1853.

This was the year in which the city hall was first erected, and arrangements were made for the purchase of the land, and the erection of the building.

It has been discovered that the council at that time passed a motion to the effect that the arcade should forever be left as a passageway or passageway to the market.

It further provided that it could not be disposed of for any purpose whatever.

It is feared that this will hold up the sale of the hall, for the time being at least.

The discovery of this clause was not made until Saturday, and since then the minutes have been diligently searched for any other clause that may have a bearing on the sale of the property.

However, the Legislature could give the city power to dispose of this piece of land, if the council so petitioned.

The nature of the property, the reasons for the sale, and a very great deal of other information, not at the present time in the hands of the council, would have to be brought down before the Legislature would act.

In addition it is understood that the time limit has expired in which it had to be reported to the council at the present session of the Legislature, and nothing can be done this year.

Mayor Beattie fears that the clause will tie up the whole transaction at this time, and prevent the disposal of the building.

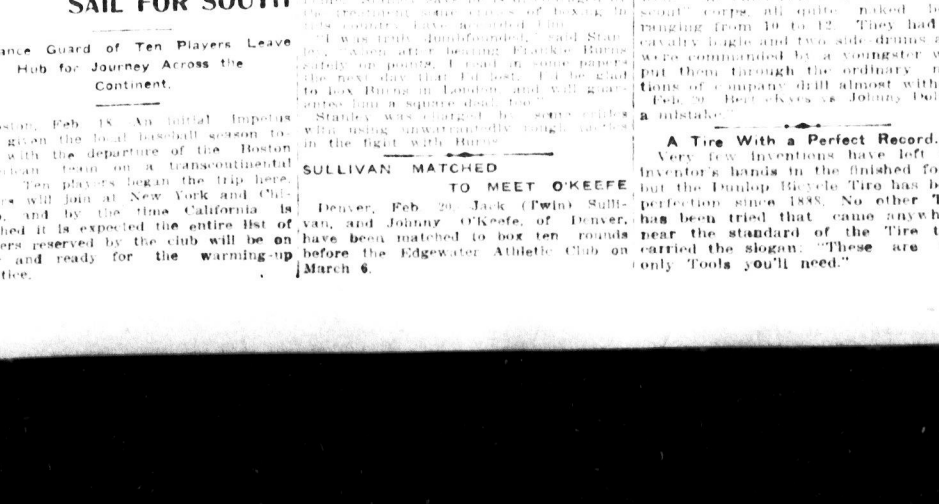
