London, Nov. 11 .- 12:35 p.m .- The war office announces that German trenches over a front of 1,000 yards on the Somme front were stormed last night by the British. The announcement follows:

"Last night the eastern portion of Regina trench (on the northern end of the Somme front), being a continuation of the length of trench captured by us in our successful assault of October 21, was stormed and captured on a front of 1,000 yards, in spite of a heavy enemy barrage. The new trench has been joined up with the old line and the position secured. Prisoners of two regiments were taken.

Thanks to great rubber plantations established, in the face of criticism and ridicule, many years before in her tropical Dominions, Great Britain at the outbreak of the war held a firm and tightening grip on the world's supply of raw rubber-a grip reinforced by her dominating navy. From 60% in 1914, the production of these plantations has grown this year to 75% of the whole world's output, leaving only about half the requirements of the United States alone to come from all other sources.

The result has been that the needs of the Allies. enormous though they are, have been plentifully supplied, while Germany has been reduced to registered mails and the "Deutschland" in desperate attempts to mitigate her rubber famine. Neutrals have been allowed all the rubber they want, at prices actually lower than before the war, so long as they prevent any of it from reaching the enemy, while Canada and other parts of the Empire have an abundant supply at equally favorable Government-regu-

In this foresight and generosity of the British Government lies the reason why rubber alone, of all the great staples, has not gone up in price—why rubbers and overshoes, in spite of not gone up in price—why rubbers and overshoes, in spite of increased cost of fabric, chemicals and labor, are as inexpensive as ever, while shoes are costing several dollars a pair more. I beg to submit my report on the examination of the books, accounts and vouchers of the London and Port Stanley Railway for the year ending Jane 30th, 1916, together with the Construction account from August, 1914, to June 30th, 1916, in accordance with instructions of your Council through the City Auditor,

BANK OF MONTREAL .- Balance per passbook, plus deposits after June 30th, belonging to the year, less checks outstanding RAILWAY COMPANIES .- Accounts with the Railway Companies showing balances due debit and

VARIOUS PERSONS .- Accounts with other than Railways, showing balances. AGENTS' ACCOUNTS .- Balances due the Company by the Agents or vice versa.

INVENTORIES .- These have been made up by the Superintendent, and additions checked by us. CONSTRUCTION ACCOUNTS .- I have thoroughly examined the vouchers for the expenditure on this count, which have for the most part been certified by the Engineer of Construction, and passed by the Chairman and Secretary of the Commission.

The item of \$40,951.00 consists of purchases for construction by the Railway Commission out of the the item of \$20,351.00 consists of purchases for construction by the Kailway Commission out of the current revenue and accounts that are unpaid, and included among the liabilities.

The item of \$26,856.30 consists of rails and material on hand in stores. These rails were purchased by the Commission, along with a piece of the line at St. Thomas, for which was paid \$10,000.00. These items were not included among the assets of the Company when the Road was leased on January 1st, 1914.

LIABILITIES. ACCOUNTS PAYABLE .- A detailed list of all accounts payable is attached. There is also a list inting to \$8,550, consisting of accounts unpaid on construction account, which are approximately correct CITY OF LONDON .- This account shows the balance at credit in the ledger of the Railway Company CITY OF LONDON.—This account shows the balance at credit in the ledger of the Railway Company \$35,571.20. In addition to this the City Treasurer claims a further amount, which is set out in a separate statement of the City of London Account. Bylaw 4475 of the City, provides that the City shall execute a lease from the London and Port Stanley Railway Company of the Company's property from January 1st, 1914, and that the rental to be paid by the Corporation of the City of London shall be Twenty Thousand Dollars per annum, for the first ten years. The Corporation is, therefore, in my opinion, liable to pay the above rental from the date of the lease. This amount would be chargeable against the Construction of the Road until the 30th of June, 1915, or until the operation of the road was taken over by the Commission. The surplus would not be affected, but the construction account would be increased by \$5,472.23, and the liability to the City by the same amount

The City Treasurer's account with the Commission corresponds with the Company's account as on the same date, with the exception of the items mentioned in the statement above. SINKING FUND .- An account of \$496.69 is credited to the City for sinking fund, payable during the

year 1916. This is the amount payable for the whole year, and should be only one-half, or \$248.34, to June 30th. 1916. L. E. AND D. R. R. CO .- An item of \$563.55 in the City Auditor's statement is not yet adjusted. Mr.
