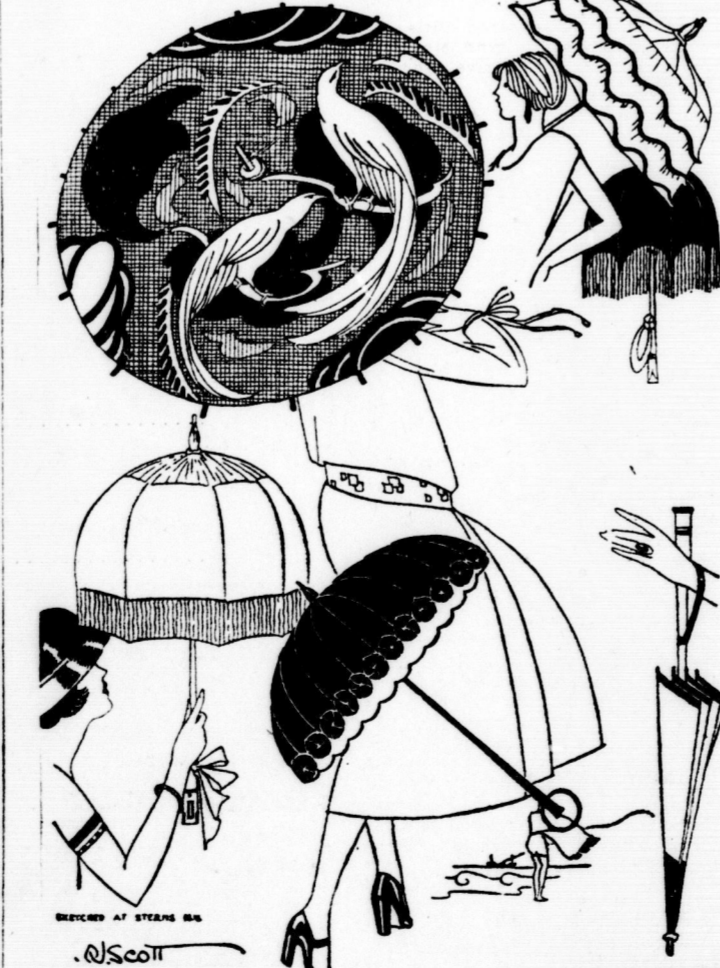

SPEED WELFARE DRIVE IN CITY

Members of Various Teams Tendered Banquet by President George M. Reid.

Subscriptions Total \$18,970 For 14 Deserving City Organizations.

With a total of almost \$19,000 already subscribed, canvassers for the United Welfare Fund Association of London went forth this morning on a two-day campaign to raise \$125,000 for fourteen city organizations that are every one deserving of support.

At a complimentary banquet given by George M. Reid, president of the Welfare Association, in the Tecumseh Hotel Monday night, attended by members of the various teams who will take part in the drive, enthusiasm ran so high that several members declared they would go after their men immediately and not wait for the official start Tuesday morning.

Speeches by President Reid, A. E. Silverwood, general campaign chairman, D. George Clark of the organizing committee, Rev. Dr. William Beattie, and reports of the various committee chairmen were all enthusiastically received by the 200 men present.

"This is the third annual campaign," declared President Reid after receiving a great ovation. "Last year your objective was not quite reached, but this year you should attain it without any trouble. We have all the clubs behind us, and the community spirit prevails. Just tell the gentlemen you call on that they are getting off with one call instead of fourteen. This is a feature that should appeal to them."

Can Avert Solicitation.

Mr. Reid told the workers that any subscriber could receive a membership ticket, which meant that he was good for the same amount next year without any further solicitation on the part of canvassers in 1923. Should the member run into financial difficulties and be unable to pay the allotted amount, he could notify the financial secretary to that effect.

"All the organizations are standing behind the amount of the budget committee," Mr. Reid stated, "and \$125,000 is not much for a city of 60,000. We must maintain these institutions. The welfare fund is an established fact, and it is the right thing."

"Some people think that the money for these dinners comes out of the fund, but it is not so. Tonight you are my guests, and tomorrow night you will be the guests of Mr. Philip Pocock.

George Clark of the publicity committee stated that expenses had been cut, and effectiveness increased.

W. R. Yendall, chairman of the employees' canvassing committee, declared there was a kindly feeling in all the factories toward the fund, while T. W. McFarland of the public utilities canvass committee stated that every man would be seen personally.

Frank Harley told the workers that the committee's travels would be out on Saturday and Sunday on a house-to-house canvass. Last year's amount would be increased by 25 per cent, he hoped.

Laud Reid's Ability.

A. E. Silverwood said if George M. Reid had been in the city when last year's drive was being made the amount would have been realized. The budget committee had cut down every amount to the minimum.

"We must sell this proposition to the city of London as it should be sold," declared Mr. Silverwood. "We must look after these organizations. Let us not be short in the amount. We must go over the top. This year the name and amount of every subscriber will be published. Let us see if we can't get this campaign cleaned up by Wednesday night."

Rev. Dr. Beattie's inspiring address was cheered to the echo. He told of visiting the Aged People's Home, the Byron Sanatorium, hospitals and orphan homes.

"If you could only see the dividends of the bright, cheery faces at the Sanatorium," he said, "the quiet smiles at the homes. Here you will find dividends that make the heart glad."

"Go and sell the citizens the privilege of helping these people in the hospitals to restored health. Give the children battling against tuberculosis a chance to have what multitudes in our day did not have. Sell them a chance to bring back these people to health. It is a worthy chance which is yours. It is nice to receive dividends from war bonds, but think of these dividends infinitely more valuable. Make the people feel what you feel."

Applaud Dr. Beattie.

"Don't be weary of well-doing. Think of the weary years of the war for the men overseas. These men fought and fought till the enemy was wearied," concluded Dr. Beattie, amid applause.

Riley's March Cost Canada \$2,000, But Second Army May Cost \$7,750

OTTAWA, June 12.—Another march on Ottawa by unemployed Toronto soldiers was halted this afternoon, according to a telegram received by Hon. H. S. Bland, minister of soldiers' civil re-establishment, from "General" Riley, leader of the last invasion.

It is understood here that Riley proposed to bring at least 1,000 men on his second march, but late advice as to the effect that only about 200 had volunteered.

It has developed that, while Riley may not have received a "specific answer" to his demands on the occasion of his last appearance here, return transportation of his army to Toronto cost the country \$1,853.25. Second-class fares were paid for 243 men at the rate of \$7.75 a head.

It is also understood that stragglers, not included in the first shipment, have increased the transportation costs considerably.

It follows that if Riley appears at the head of an army 1,000 strong, it will cost the government \$7,750 to return them to Toronto.
