Ottawa Fears Flood.

It is officially announced that Russ train filled with ammunition has reached Port Arthur. No explanation is forthcoming as to how communication has been kept open in the face of the large number of Japs supposed to be close to the fortress. Reports that the Russians were blowing up their fleet at Port Arthur are discredited at St. Petersburg. The explosions, the noise of which reached Togo's ears was evidently caused by the dynamiting of the Jan Greships in the channel. The Russians claim that torpedo boats can now pass in and out.

Russ ans Clear a Channel for Torpedo Boats-Not Destroying Fleet

432 MILES AN HOUR

New Motor Train That Is Expected to Break All Records.

New York, May 12 .- A mile and threetenths in fifteen seconds is the speed promised by Professor Albert C. Albertson, president of the Electro-Magnetic Rallway Construction Company. By July 1 he expects to have in operation in Staten Island a railroad equipped with his new magnetic motor. He has figured it all out with a model, According to Professor Albertson's time schedule this train will travel at a rate of about 432 miles an hour, which is approximately five times as fast as the swiftest express in the United States. He says he himself does not yet know the exact maximum of speed that his invention can attain to, but is convinced that it can haul a train along a straight of them. that it can haul a train along a straight track at more than 400 miles an hour. The rails of the Staten Island road rest on a steel framework eight feet above the ground. The object of this is to give the train what the inventor regards as absolute immunity from wreck. 





> London, May 12.-The question of the lomicile of William Louis Winans, formerly of Baltimore, Md., who died n London, June 25, 1897, leaving a arge fortune, was decided yesterday by the Privy Council in favor of the family, who appealed from the decision of the lower courts that Mr. Winans was a British subject, and, therefore, the revenue authorities were entitled to collect a death duty on his

The Privy Council in giving judgment expressed doubt as to whether Mr. Winans intended to abandon his American domicile, but said the crown certainly had not made out a conclu-

The late William Louis Winans died in 1897 worth \$15,000,000. He born in New Jersey, where his father was domiciled. He never became naturalized in any other country, but after living in Russia went to reside in England in 1858. His estate came before the British courts in the shape of an information prepared for the crown by the Attorney-General with the cbject of recovering legacy duty on it. The particular claim was small, but the decision would involve millions. It was argued for the crown that Mr. Winans had acquired a domicile England. He had marriel a British subject, had acquired very large property in Scotland and had leased a mansion at Kensington, London,
The defendants, Mr. Walter Winans
and Mr. Louis W. Winans, sons of the
deceased, argued, through counsel, that
a rich man taking expensive houses in

England for temporary possession signified nothing, nor did the possession of deer forests in Scotland where he never shot. Their father had always called Baltimore his home, and had invested in millions of American scentities, as well as in European securities. millions of American securities, as wenter as in European securities.

The court decided that Mr. Winans had a domicile in England, and decided against the heirs. This meant a benefit to the British exchequer of \$1,200,000. The heirs thereupon appealed to the privy council. The case has been pending since




