

### THE COLONIAL CONFERENCE

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Presides at Preliminary Meeeting of Colonial Statesmen.

Canada's Coronation Contin. gent Sails for Home on Thursday Next.

London, June 26.—Despite the illness of the King, the preparations for the colonial conference are being proceeded with. It can be easily understood that a meeting of the colonial statesmen in connection with the imperial home advisers of His Majesty is not be taken advantage of. Accord ngly this afternoon the colonial premers had a preliminary meeting at the Hotel Cecil. Sir Wilfrid Laurier presidded. A short sort of program will be planned and various matters will come in for informal discussion. Today's meeting will not interfere with Monday's conference at the Colonial Office, which has not been postponed, despite the illness of the king. The olonial premiers, however, have cancelled all previous engagements until the crisis at Buckingham palace is

THE CORONATION CONTINGENT. It is stated to-day that he Canadian coronation contingent will return to the Dominion, on July 3. They, of course share in the general disappointment incident upon the postponement of the coronation.

THE CANADIAN HONORS. The Canadian share of the coronation honors is favorably commented on, and the recipients of titles, now in London, are being warmly con-gratulated in Anglo-Canadian circles. Gilbert Parker, as a native Canadian and a member of the British House of Commons, comes in for special congratulation. Dr. Borden's knighthood is the outcome of his administration of the Canadian militia department during the period of the South African war, while Mr. Mulock's efforts in connection with imperial penny postage are recognized. Dealing with the honors bestowed on Gilbert Parker, the St. James' Gazette says that "he has not only made the question of imperial trade his own, but by his charming writings, he has done much to give the people of Great Britain an insight into the life and habits and thought of those most interesting sons of the empire, the French Canadians. In addition to the Canadians honored with the distinction of Companion of the Order of St. Michael and St. George and whose names were cabled last evening, the Gazette also contains the names of Capt. Gifford, New-foundiand; and Major Hudson, R. C. A., Kingston, who received the decor-ation in recognition of his services in South Africa.

#### BOARDS OF TRADE.

The powerful influence than can be exerted by an up-to-date Board of Trade, which has at heart the interests of the city in which it is located, was strikingly demonstrated in Toronto last week, during the negotiations between the Street Railway Company and its employees tending to avert a strike of the latter. The president and four members of the Toronto Board of Trade worked unceasingly and faithfully, but quietly, to prevent a strike, which is nothing short of a calamity. The calm reasonableness and sympathetic advice of these men had due effect upon the employees of the street railway company, and they consented to modify their demands to a considerable extent. Had the company proved equally amenable to counsels of reasons and fair play there would have been no strike.

The business men of this city can deduce their own moral from this. They have before them an illustration of the force they can create and wield in moulding public opinion. In these days of progress new conditions spring up in astonishingly short order, and, sometimes, with volcanic suddenness, It is a guarantee of public safety, to have in time of stress, and public, or class upheaval, a body of men, possessing church festivals and entertainments. the respect and confidence of the people, to which we can look for intervention and mediation.

It is the duty of every business man in this city to become a member of our Board of Trade. Those who are at present members are men whose integrity and honor and ability are measurable by the highest standards. These gentlemen have done good work for the public. They early recognized the fact that as time passes the needs for Boards of Trade will become greater and greater, while their influence will be increased and strengened proportionately. The Boards of Trade will be powerful factors in shaping the destiny of our country. Every business man who has the best interterests of the country at heart cannot serve them better than by becoming a member of the local Board of Trade and doing all in his power to make it efficient.

The chair upon which the King is to be crowned was built by "Master Walter, of Durham," and cost Edward I. the sum of £7 12s 11d. Beeneath 'the seat is the oblong block of dark purplish red freestone taken from the Abbey of Scone. Upon this stone the Scottish Kings were inaugurated, and tradition has it that the stone was that upon which Jacob rested his head at Bethel. The late Dean Stanley is alleged to have argued that Jacob took the stone to Egypt. When Pharaoh's daughter and her husband became alarmed at the rising greatness of Moses, they they fled to Spain or Sicily, taking the stone with them. Thence it passsed to Tara, on which the Kings of Ireland were placed, and then to Scotlad, and so to its present resting place in Westminster Abbey. 



THOUGH BURIED

Joshua Sanford's Voice Distinctly Heard-Hope of Rescue Revived.

Has Lain Since Tuesday Afternoon at the Bottom of a Well at Paris, Ont.

Paris, Ont., June 26 .- All hope of rescuing Joshua Sanford, who has for forty-six hours been entombed at the bottom of a well, is now abandoned by those who have since the cave-in on Tuesday afternoon been working incessantly for that end. Another well has been dug about five feet from that is imprisoned. After having about 48 feet down, and when those engaged in the work had decided to begin to tunnel, the old well caved in again, sinking about 20 feet farther. This occurred at 11.27 this morning, and no sound has since come from Sanford, and it is firmly believed he has been crushed to death.

SANFORD STILL ALIVE. Paris, Ont., Friday, June 27, 1 a. -Joshua Sanford still lives, and with chances of release considerably brighter than at any time since the well caved in on Tuesday afternoon. At noon yesterday the earth over the unfortunate man sank consider-ably, and all hopes of rescuing him

alive were abandoned. Some time after, however, heard rapping again, and work began more vigorously than ever to effect his release. He now taps on the brick wall of the old well instead of on the pipe, as formerly, and can be heard quite distinctly by those at the bottom of the tunnel, through which it is hoped he will be brought.

At ten o'clock last night it was thought they were about opposite the place he occupies, and preparations were made to penetrate the old well, which is about three feet from the vertical tunnel just dug. these preparations were being made, his voice was heard so indistinct that nothing could be gathered of what he was trying to say. After a little more digging the words "Oh, oh," were feebly heard, as though they

were whispered.
Still nearer dug his rescuers. At midnight he was able to say that he was still alive, but implored them to be quick. It is thought at the time of writing that about four more feet will have to be taken out of the bottom of the tunnel before it will be prud-ent to penetrate the old well, but is hoped that before many hours he will

Hundreds of people have been on the scene all day, and during the evening the road was bined for half a mile on each side with vehicles. Silence seizes the entire crowd whenever an announcement is to be made, and news is eagerly waited for.







It is a peculiar feature of their babits that they visit the domicile not on any evening indifferently, but only on Thursday, making their entrance by the keybole or by cracks of doors. If day surprises them before they leave the cottage, they change into toads and in this state remain until the following eve, when they are once more at liberty to resume their proper shape of beautiful women. During the interval the toad is sacred, because it is impossible to be sure that any particular



As twelve o'clock struck there arose from the far end of the nave the clear notes of the opening sentences of the Litany, chanted by four of the cathedral clergy. Their tones were in such unison that they seemed to emanate from one powerful voice. The choir took up the responses. At each supplication the procession, headed by the cross advanced a few steps, and then cross, advanced a few steps, and then stood still until the response was completed. Through the kneeling congrefollowed, and behind them were ten bishops in gorgeous robes. Then came the Archbishop of York, the Most Rev. William Dalrymple MacLagan; the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Most Rev. Frederick Temple, and the Lord Mayor, Sir Joseph C. Dimsdale, the corporation in full state bringing up the rear.
