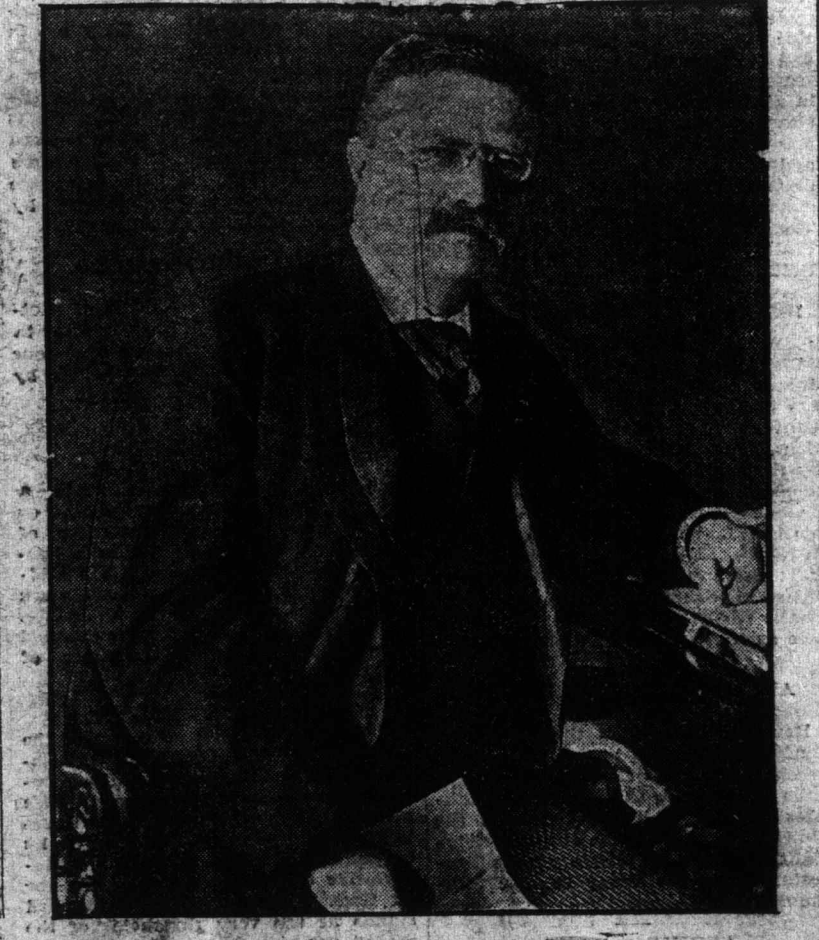

PREMIER SCOTT WILL SPEND WINTER ABROAD

Government Operation of Coal Mines—Public Ownership of Telephones—Already Adopted

OTTAWA, Dec. 9.—Premier Walter Scott of Saskatchewan, who has left in Ottawa for the past two days, left Saturday afternoon for New York, where he will spend the winter, and daughter for a three month trip to the Mediterranean. Mr. Scott states that at his health is now as good as ever and the present trip is taken so as to avoid a possible return of the attack of pneumonia, from which he suffered last winter.

BIG INCREASE THE U.S. ARMY ESTIMATES

This Year, Much of it for Insular Coast Defense

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 10.—Members of congress who came to Washington looking forward to a winter of political speeches designed for their effect upon the next presidential campaign find themselves confronted by serious matters. The president's message is found to have brought a more serious case than at the first reading when taken in connection with the enormous increase estimates for the army and navy. The conviction is growing that in the preparation of these estimates the government found itself confronted with grave possibilities of war with a strongly entrenched nation. It has accordingly called upon congress to authorize the expenditure of sums adequate for the country's protection.

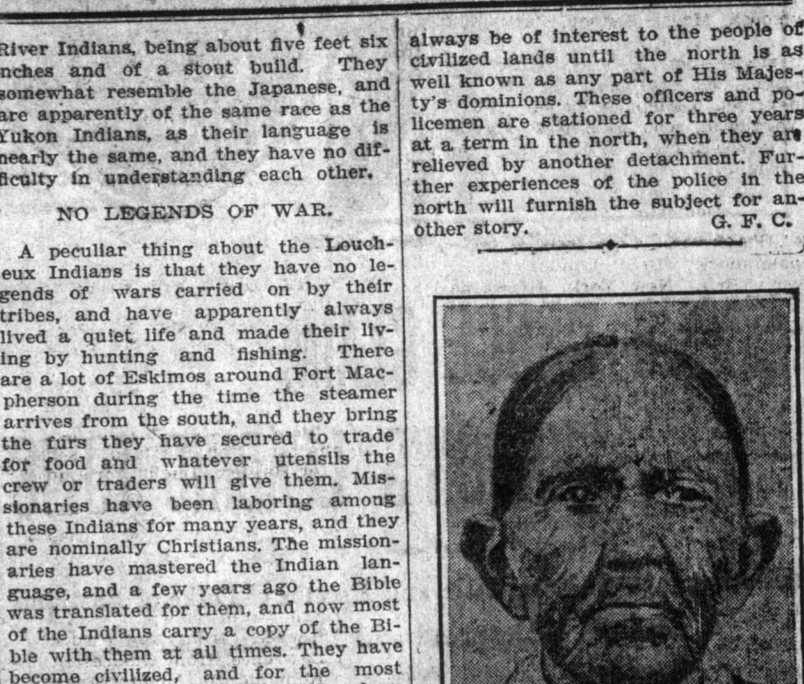

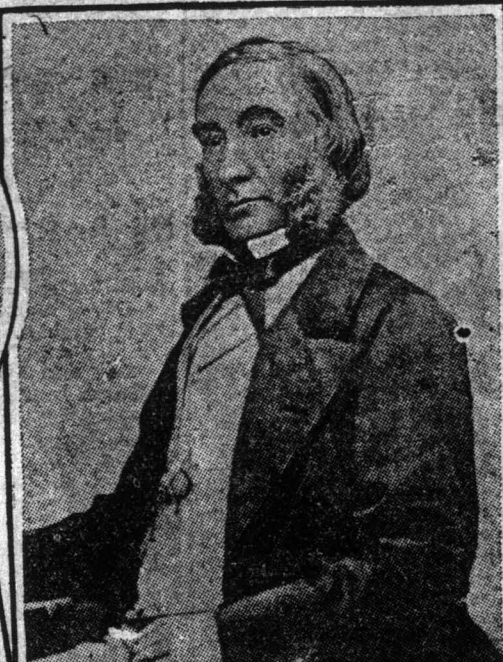
