Evidently several of the City Council committees have been doing some work recently, as their reports submitted at last night's meeting indicated that attention had been given to several important matters. Four committees submitted reports last night, and the only matter which excited discussion was the grant of \$2000 towards an enlarged Catholic cemetery. This grant was made, the reasons therefor being set forth plainly in the report of Ald. Pitcher's committee. The finance committee also submitted a wideawake report, money-saving recommendations being the feature.






