



SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST
LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male a over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homestead or any live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead natent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Preemption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—May reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. acre. 





# Brantford Catholic Churches and Schools

## St. Basil's is a Fine Example of Gothic ( Architecture and is the Oldest Church in the City

VERY citizen of Brantford who has at heart the beautiful edifices of our city should know St. Basil's R. C. Church. It is not only a model of purest Gothic architecture, but its stately tower, its powerful, musical-toned bell, its grand organ, appeal to lovers of art and of music alike. St. Basil's is one of the oldest and largest churches of our city, and is on Palace street, some three blocks from the Collegiate and two blocks from the Bell Memorial. Even the name Palace street owes its in to one of the founders of St. Basil's parish. Rev. Michael Robert Mills came from Dundas to Brantford as first pastor of St. Basil's in 1842, and away back as far as 1861 it was one of the largest Catholic parishes in Ontario. It numbered sixteen hundred souls. While to-day there are twice that number forming the two parishes of St. Basil's and St. Mary's, still there would have been a greater increase were it not that many of the older families moved to larger cities in Canada and the States.

The corner stone of the existing edifice was laid on Nov. 4, 1866, under the pastorate of Rev. August Carayon, the services being conducted by the Right Rev. John Farrell, D.D., Bishop of Hamilton, assisted by Rev. P. Bardou. The ceremony was very impressive, and a large concourse of people assembled to witness and participate in the services. An appropriate inscription, together with copies of newspapers, coins, etc., were enclosed in a glass jar and deposited in the stone. Since then it has been re-



succeeded Rev. P. Lennon. The present St. Basil's Church (white brick, stone trimming and slate roof), a model of pure Gothic, was built, the first half by Rev. A. Carayon in 1866, and the second half, with 3its stately tower, by Rev. P. Bardou in 1874. It was finished interiorly by Rev. P. Lennon, and the organ, valued at some ten thousand dollars, was the magnificent gift of Mrs. Mc-Dermott, a former parishioner and sister of Mrs. John McKenna, Pearl St.

The new St. Basil's Separate School was built by the Separate School Board some five years ago, and cost in the neighborhood of \$30,000. The Deanery and St. Joseph's Convent were built and the school opened during the incumbency of the present pastor.

## St. Mary's Parish Formed in 1898 When Growth of City Necessitated That a New Church be Built

St. Basil's. There are ten nuns of the Sisters of St. Joseph in the new convent. They teach the children of the Separate Schools of the city. Two of them teach in St. Joseph's School, which is attached to St. Mary's Church.

It was in the month of July, 1898, that it was found the parish of St. Basil's had grown to be too large, so a new parish had to be formed. The Bishop of Hamilton. the Rt. Rev. Dr. Dowling, gave to the same the name of St. Mary. Then Rev. Father Donovan was placed in charge as pastor, and he worked indefatigably in building up the parish until 1899, when his successor assumed the position. It was on January 4 of that year that Father Cummings arrived and took up the reins, and he was requested to stay until 1910. This he did, except for six months, extending from November, 1899, to March, 1900. Father O'Reilly of Oakville filled the vacancy during that time, and devoted many long hours to the work. The parish was in its infancy then, and required very careful watching in its development. Step by step it grew under the careful guidance of the pastor. Father Cummings purchased the lot on which the church stands in April of 1899, and during the following month the erection of the church was begun, under the direction of the Bishop. A year later it was completed and solemnly blessed by the Bishop of London, Rt. Rev. F. P. McEvoy. His

Lordship was assisted by Rev. Dr. Walters, Rev. Father Mahoney and Father Cummings. Immediately after, the first solemn high mass was sung by his Lordship Rt. Rev. T. J. Dowling, Rev. Father Donovan acting as deacon, Dr. Walters as sub-deacon, and Very Rev. Fr. Keogh, V.G., as deacon of honor.

In 1910 Father Cummings left to take charge of a parish in Walkerton, and he was succeeded by Rev. Father P. J. Padden, who has been pastor since. The parishioners have had no pastor whom they loved and respected more than Father Padden. The parish has been increased with every succeeding year un-til now the work of extending the church is under contemplation. These plans will be materialized, it is hoped, in the near future.

League of the Sacred Heart. Young Ladies' Sodality. Court of Catholic Order of Foresters.

Ladies' Aid Society. Christian Doctrine Classes for the study of the Scriptures and Church history. Young Ladies' Marguerite Club.

The school of the parish was built several years before the church, and the services were held there before the church's erection. There are 115 students attending the school at present, and it acts as a very important factor.
