### Racing at Halifax

The racing at the Halifax exhibition last Tuesday drew a large crowd and great interest was manifested throughout. There were two races, the free-for-all and 2.35 trot and pace.

Border was the drawing card in the free-for-all and captured the race in three straight heats and now claims the title King of the Provincial turf.

The first heat was finished as follows: Billmont 1st. Archlight 2nd. Rock Farm Grace 3rd. Ferron 4th. Border came in 1st but was put last for fouling Rock Farm Grace at the first heat. Border finished in 2.21.1-2 and Billmont in 2.22. The first quarter was covered in 35; half 1.11.1-2 and the three-quarters in 1.46.1-2.

In the second heat he broke the track record of 2.19.3-4 by covering the mile in 2.19.1-2, and again in the third heat he succeeded in still further reducing the record by clipping off another quarter. Border making the mile in 2.19.1-2, and beating the track record of 2.20 made by Mimota.

Boutiller called upon Billmont when entering the home stretch, and the handsome stallion swung along at a fine clip. He cut a length off the lead and then challenged Border for first place. The horses came to the wire with a great burst of speed. Billmont lapping Border's sulky when the flag dropped, Billmont forcing Border to beat the track record. The first quarter was made in 34.1-2; half 1.08.1-2; three quarters 1.44.1-4 and mile in 2.19.1-2.

The third heat was another victory for Border. After considerable scoring the horses got away to a good start. Border again demonstrated his ability to trot faster than the others. He showed the remainder his heels at the first turn. Billmont broke shortly after the start. Archlight was showing lots of speed and was hanging on to Border, with Rock Farm Grace next, then Ferron and Billmont. When nearing the upper turn Rock Farm Grace passed Archlight, and the leaders came down the stretch to the first half at a lively clip. The horses remaining in the same positions during the second half, Border winning the heat in 2.19.1-4. Rock Farm Grace was second and Archlight third.

The fourth heat proved to be the concluding one and was finished as follows:—The three quarter mile mark was reached by Border in 1.46.1-2 and he trotted under the wire an easy winner in 2.21. Rock Farm Grace finished second, three lengths behind, and Archlight third, Ferron fourth and Billmont next.

APPLE CIRCULAR

Following is a report from M. Isaacs & Sons, Ltd. London, England:—

As we are approaching the Season for the Shipment of Apples from your side, we take this opportunity of giving you some information of the prospects of Apple Crops on this side in the districts that are likely to have any effect on the prices that may rule in the coming season.

FRANCE.—In some parts, owing to the dryness, there will be no apples at all, but in some of the more northern districts crop is likely to be good.

GERMANY and AUSTRIA.—A very small crop, and our agents advise us from there they will have to look to your side for supplies.

RHINE DISTRICTS.—A small crop.

BELGIUM.—A very scarce crop.

HOLLAND.—A poor crop, except of the very common kind.

As you will gather from the condensed particulars, which represents the information we have been able to collect from various sources, the supply of Apples on this side is not likely to be plentiful.

Generally speaking, other sorts of fruit that may be considered to have an indirect influence on the Apple Trade, are also much scarcer than in the past year or two, and although we do not wish to hold up the hope of exaggerated prices, we think we may safely say that the outlook for shipments of Apples from your side to our markets is distinctly favorable.

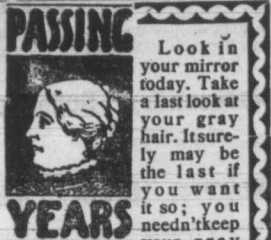

Arthur Drysdale, M. P. P. for Hants has been appointed commissioner of public works and mines, to fill the vacancy caused by the retirement of Hon. C. E. Church.

Capt. Oakley of the Senator Ross steam yacht Gundreda, was the guest of his father-in-law, Capt. John McDonald, over Sunday. Senator Ross is on his way to New York.

The Sunday School of the Brooklyn Baptist church, Lockhartville, intend holding a concert in the church Sunday evening, Sept 22nd, beginning at 7 o'clock. A silver collection will be taken.

Funeral services of the late President McKinley took place at Buffalo on Sunday. The body will lie in state at the city hall. The burial will probably be at Canton, Ohio. The Duke of York may possibly attend.

The quarterly meeting of the Baptist Churches of Hants Co. was held on the 9th and 10th of last week at Noel. Delegates present were from the Falmouth, Windsor, Kempt, Summerville, Newport, Radwon, Walton and Noel churches.

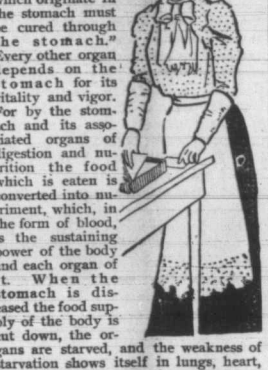

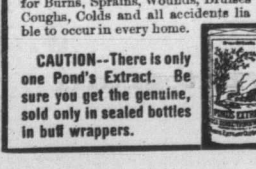

Canada extends a hearty welcome to the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York. May their visit be long remembered.

What is to be the punishment of Czolgosz the assassin?

Sampson-Schley can well be called fighting American Admirals. The famous controversy over the battle of Santiago has now reached an interesting stage.

An Anarchist may deprive a home of a loved one and a country its head, but the nation is as before.

Mr. Roosevelt is now President and has the good wishes of all men and we are greatly mistaken if he does not add glory to the presidency.

Since September Kitchener has put 685 Boers out of business composed of 67 killed 85 wounded, 384 made prisoners, and 163 surrendered, also 189 rifles and 65,211 rounds of ammunition; 3,400 horses and 19,000 heads of cattle.

On Saturday after the attempt on the life of President McKinley not less than 650,000 words were sent out in special despatches to newspapers by Buffalo correspondents, and as much more was sent from other points. Some 1700 operators were at work.

HOW MURRAY BOASTS

The address of Premier Murray to the electorate has been published in his Halifax organ and it is now issued in pamphlet form and can be found in any of the Grit organizers office ready for promiscuous delivery. In it he says:-

"During the last fiscal year the government appropriated for every branch of the public service larger sums than ever were expended for similar services in the history of the province."

Of this the Toronto Mail and Empire says:-

"This is a great change. The new liberals are now actually boasting of their extravagance. One of these days we shall have politicians of this type openly bragging of the amount by which the taxpayers are fleeced."

The Halifax Herald adds:-

"The worst feature of Mr. Murray's boast our contemporary fails to note, and that is its inaccuracy. He did not do what he states. He divided the largest revenue the province has had for a number of years, but for the great services of the province he did not give as much as had been given formerly when the revenue was little more than one half what it is to day. The services to which the large grants about which he boasts were such as interest on provincial debt legislative expenses, salaries, etc. For such services very generous sums were voted, and will continue to be voted so long as we have the present crowd in power."

The electors who reads and thinks will readily see that the people are not getting as much for the great and needy services of the province as we did 15 years ago. The money goes in such a way that it can be used for political purposes to induce constituencies to send liberal representatives. Look at our roads today. Every municipality in the province is calling out for more money to use on roads and the grant is being gradually reduced instead of increased. Any government can spend money even as poor a one as the present Nova Scotia government can take care of an immense provincial revenue in its own interests. But what is needed today is a government that will use the peoples money for the benefit of the people themselves and not to maintain themselves in power. Kings County needs more road money and even the Western Chronicle is compelled to affirm that our roads and bridges were never in such a condition before. Nineteen years of liberal rule is too long, what

we desire now is a change and a rule for the people and by the people.

CONSERVATIVE CONVENTION

On Tuesday the Court House was well filled with delegates from different sections of the county and members of the Liberal Conservative party. President B. Webster occupied the chair and C. A. Tutis secretary read the list of delegates who proceeded to the Jury room to make selection of candidates. After some deliberation the delegates returned and announced that Messrs. P. Innes and J. W. Ryan had received a unanimous nomination from the delegates. This was greeted with cheers and on motion the nomination of these gentlemen was made unanimous to the convention.

Mr. Innes was absent in Halifax and Mr. Ryan was called upon and although taken by surprise in receiving a nomination he delivered an address which showed that he was thoroughly conversant with the public questions of this political campaign. He had not sought the nomination from the party and coming as it did he would require a few hours before giving his final decision. He stated however that there was sure to be a contest.

The convention was a most enthusiastic and harmonious one and with two such able men in the field the Conservatives felt that with strenuous efforts their candidates had a good chance of being elected.

Stirring speeches were made by Messrs Barclay Webster, Dr. H. Chipman and S. Baker.

We called attention last week to the fact that 19 years of rule had made the Liberals believe they owned the country and could do as they liked irrespective of the opinion of the mass of the people. Even in Kings this is apparent. The sentiment of the Liberal convention on Saturday was that the Conservatives or any one else had no right to bring out candidates in opposition to the ones they selected. The Conservatives always had the right to place men in the field and will continue so to do even though it is against the fiat of the leaders of the Liberal association. The reason that our opponents are so strenuously preaching "no opposition" is because they know full well their candidates are not as popular as formerly and they are doubtful of electing both men if a determined fight is made. There were more men at the Conservative convention on Tuesday who desired to see Messrs Innes and Ryan as candidates than there were at the Liberal convention on Saturday who desired the selection of the Liberal nominees.

### FLORIDA LETTER

Jacksonville, Florida, Sept. 5th, 1901.

Dear ADVERTISER:—Your punctual arrival and that of the Orchardist have become pleasant and agreeable events in our Southern home. It was our intention some months ago to visit the Cornwallis Valley, but the burning of our city, changed many plans and disturbed many a well-laid scheme. Church building in all its senses has engrossed our time, and although Mrs. Blenus will leave on the 8th for a sea trip to New York and New Jersey, the writer finds himself compelled to remain at his post of duty, despite the Pan-American and the alluring cheap rates of travel.

By the way writing Pan-American reminds me. I suppose there is not a school in Nova Scotia to day, unless things have changed somewhat, that is not teaching that it was Vespucci who succeeded in giving his name to this continent. Books are not to be blamed for their mistakes always, but teachers should be on the watch for the errors. The teacher is always above the book, to the child. The book reaches the mind of the student, only as it has been filtered through the mind of the teacher. It is not well to have the child believe that the book is an idol, or infallible, or even of the fullest and highest authority, lest we worship the dead thing for the living. America was not, in all probability named after Vespucci, as his name was not American, but Alberic, and he never called the continent by any other name than "The New World." Nor do we find that the name America comes from anything that Vespucci ever did, or wrote, or claimed; Columbus landed first on the continent at a bay named Maracaibo. He coasted north along a land called Amerasia, that is Amerasia-land. Scholars have in part recovered the maps and records of Vespucci, and these facts have been unearthed. This is but another proof that many "latest school books" are behind the scholarships of the times, and are of little importance compared with the up to date teacher who is fit for the important work of an instructor. Teaching like religion must be living and breathing, to be of any practical worth.

This country is not an easy land to govern. The national laws fitting Maine are a burden to California. Texas and Massachusetts do not see alike. Chicago has just declared for a reciprocity treaty with France, and the Republican state convention in Iowa says "Reciprocity is the hand-maid of protection, and we favor both." There is a reason, Chicago and Iowa both want cheap wines, raisins, prunes and other semi-tropical products. California rises to declare this treaty will ruin her, put back her development and impoverish her land and people. The better element in Havana declare against thrusting the ballot into hands in which it is as dangerous as a loaded pistol in the hands of a child, but when the people of Virginia and Alabama try to escape Heaven in holy horror. A good Republican resident withholds self government from "unfit," "untotured" people in the island possessions but the rule of the "unfit" and unwashed in America is a "diverge and natural law." What shall we do about it? We opine the Motherland could teach this lusty child a point or two, in world wide manipulation of "tribes and races."

Since the above was written the news of the attempted assassination of President McKinley has become history, and the horror of the crime has clothed this continent in a grief and consternation, finding no adequate expression in words. Neither the high office with which he is intrusted by the approval of a strong nation, nor the frank, manly, though simple-hearted tenderness of his character, has been able to save him from the attempt of a fenshish fanatic. He was smitten when he was acting in a strict conformity with duty, and while carrying out those principles affecting the life, the good name, the freedom, and the progress of his country as they appealed to his manliness. It is believed here that steps will now be taken to make such an attempt on the life of the chief of the nation an act of treason punishable with death. This is correct, and we believe that the cause of popular liberty throughout the world demand such an enactment.
