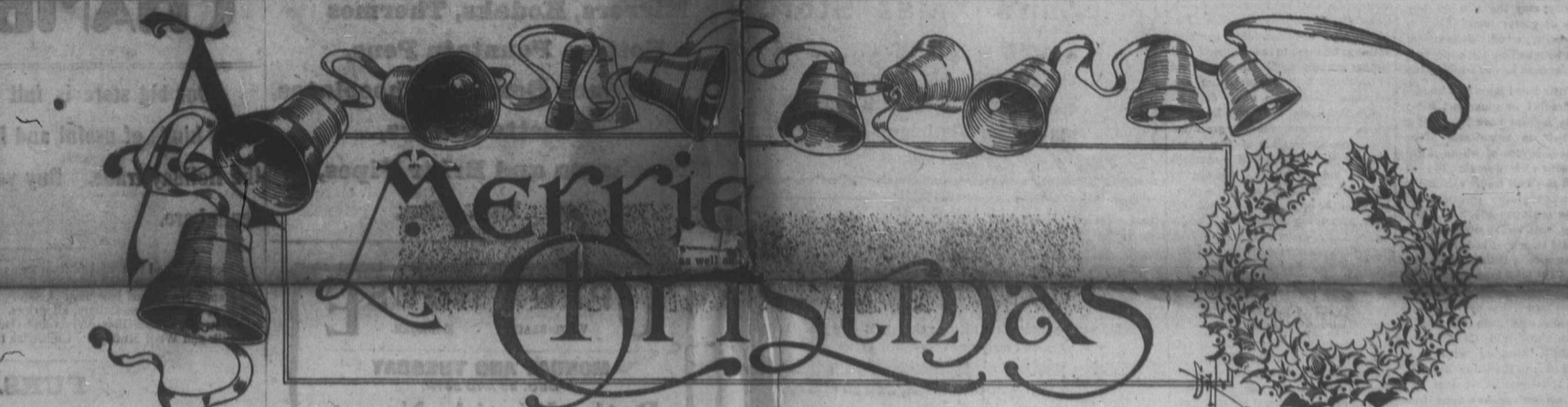

Horses.

Sudden changes are dangerous. It is not what is fed so much as whether the horse is accustomed to the feed or not. Brood mares should get only clean choice food.

Avoid mold silage. Silage, if fed at all, must be fed very carefully. Try to arrange the stabling so as to provide a box stall for the brood mares.

Let the in foal mare do her share of the light work of the farm during the winter. It may seem to be a small thing, but it will bring more money and contain less fertilizing value than the clover.

With many the care of the horse ends with the busy season. A little attention during the idle days of winter, will bring the horse through in better condition for the spring work.

How often do you clean out your horse stable. Twice each day is not too often, and many scrape it out three times.

There is no so valuable to the colt as the 'colt tail'. Once lost it is almost impossible to replace it. Thin weaning colts are difficult to fatten, while fat colts are easily maintained.

The horse-digests rough feed with less ease than do cattle or sheep, therefore the farm horse should get a larger proportion of easily-digested or soft fibrous feed than cattle, provided all are on the maintenance ration.

Never lose sight of the fact that the using of the muscles of the colt develops them and insures great power of endurance, while disease means flabby muscular development and a weaker animal.

Remove all wet bedding at each stable cleaning. The whiff of ammonia, rising from old straw saturated with the horse urine, should be enough to convince one that such a condition should be avoided by carefully removing all this material regularly.

Colts properly fed make rapid growth. During the period the colt is with its dam the average increase is said to be over two pounds daily, and during the second year of life they increase about one and one-third pounds daily, gradually decreasing, until at the beginning of the third year of life it falls to less than a pound, and finally ceases.

Sir Wilfrid's Surrender.

The speech in which Sir Wilfrid Laurier presented the amendment of the opposition to the Borden naval resolution, while in part clever and eloquent as the product of the human mind, was in reality an amazing production. It is an abject surrender of the feeling which has been aroused in the country by Mr. Borden's proposal. Sir Wilfrid denies that the empire is confronted by an emergency, but he seems to think Canada is face to face with one. The admiralty memorandum contains nothing, he says, to indicate that the mother country needs immediate aid in her heavy task of supplying the empire with adequate naval defense. Yet in that same document he finds reason for recommending a great increase and acceleration of the naval program, his government prescribed and had not the political courage to carry out. While presenting, as the policy of the opposition on naval defence, something different in character from the government proposals, Sir Wilfrid Laurier declares there is no emergency, and he secondly declares that a Canadian navy is the

The Wall Street Journal estimates that 150,000 people from the United States have come into Canada this year to settle, bringing with them effects and cash to the value of \$200,000,000. It estimates that since 1906 some 675,000 settlers have come from that country into Canada with effects and cash valued at over \$775,000,000. These are striking figures, and the movement will continue. Among the very best settlers Canada is receiving are these people who come in from the United States with money enough to give them a good start, under conditions with which they are already familiar.

The World Too Small for War.

The declaration of war in the Balkan States increased the cost of food-stuffs to the people in Britain within ten hours, and the report that a Greek navy had taken command of the Dardanelles raised the price of wheat in Chicago, Stock markets in London, Berlin, Paris and New York were injuriously affected, and hundreds of Canadians, who knew little and cared less about the Balkan question, suffered serious financial loss. Trade has been interrupted in all parts of the world. Industries for a time were paralyzed not only by the sudden cessation of the world's credit but by the withdrawal of thousands of workmen from economic labor to return to their native countries as soldiers at the expense of those engaged in remunerative production. The loss of seven hundred Bulgarian workmen bound for the front caused delay and loss in the construction of the world's great engineering works. The world is getting too small for war. Every advance of civilization, every discovery of science, every improvement in the means of international communication and every widening of the bounds of human thought makes war between any two nations an archaic, pagan, and intolerable nuisance to every other nation in the world. Were it not that the so-called "Powers" are themselves still the victims of the military delusion this now exploded bluff of the Turk would long ago have been ended as the antics of a half-drunken desperado in a Rocky Mountain mining camp or of a hold-up gang in a railway cutting would be ended by a squad of Northwest Mounted Police.

What is needed in Britain and Germany to-day is not so much the annual expenditure of \$500,000,000 on the means of the incitements to the warlike temper, and compulsory training for war, but rather a common sense appreciation of the stupid folly of war, its lumbering patriotism, and its impotence as a disturber of the legitimate business of the community of independent nations. What civilized world society had done with the browser and the bully must now be done by civilized world society with any lawless and bullying nation. War is out of date. It is stupid. And even at best it leaves the real question at issue to be solved by international law, reason and arbitral justice.

If war in the little Balkan territories puts out of gear the machinery of the world's industry, trade and credit, what would war between Britain and Germany mean? That question makes world-treason out of war scare and the way talk that leads war fever. War anywhere is an injustice and a curse everywhere. The world is too small for it any more.—Toronto Globe.

The illustration presents Old Lombard Street, London, so named for the number of Lombards (merchants) and goldsmiths transacting business and who settled there in the middle of the 13th century and were the first to carry on a regular banking and money lending business.

The interesting point lies in the fact that Sir Wilfrid Laurier now accepts in its entirety the alternative plan of defence outlined in the final admiralty memorandum, and advocates not one naval unit but two naval units, one on each coast. Sir Wilfrid did not when in power make any attempt to carry the admiralty's suggestions, and now his main anxiety is to use a storm to fill the opposition's sails, which would sweep them out of existence if they tried to beat against it. Sir Wilfrid Laurier showed very clearly that he is face to face with a force which he cannot withstand, but he also showed that ingrained in the fibre of his being is a rooted antagonism to the spirit which has aroused it. He entered into a defence of his doctrine of conditional neutrality to which his followers must listen in dismay, and all others with derision. He says he knows that when Great Britain was at war, Canada was at war. But he says Canada need not be in any way, except through invasion or by the consent of the Canadian Parliament. Whatever may be thought of this as a legal abstraction there is only one practical interpretation of it, namely, optional neutrality for Canada, so long as Great Britain is winning, and compulsory conquest if ever Great Britain is defeated.

He also showed plainly that he disliked anything to do with the foreign policy of the empire, and while in the loftier language he disclaimed any desire for Canadian independence, very few Canadians will have any doubt that if we accepted this latter as a present condition we cannot avoid the outcome. The great gain of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's speech to Canada and the empire is the evidence which it gives of the fact that all the subtle ways in which the inmost feelings of Sir Wilfrid Laurier that were translated into action while he was in power, have vanished for ever, obliterated by the declaration of the country's will, of which Rt. Hon. R. L. Borden has been the mouthpiece. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, without the intention of doing so, has delivered the opposition bodily into the hands of the government and has limited contentions to abstract questions of permanent policy, making the substantial unity of the whole country, in the acceptance of the naval proposals of the government, clear beyond all question. When Tait was stampeding congress and the whole American nation with speeches about the great crisis his reciprocity pact was to pull the United States out of what frantic and fanatical advocates of that did Sir Wilfrid and his government, lieutenants, newspapers and adherents become. They could see an emergency there. But there was none. They can see none now when there is one, but this time it is Britain and the British empire that are concerned.—The Emp. a out of which Tait admitted he was admitting to draw Canada into the condition of "adjustment of the United States." The Borden naval policy, like the Borden Trade policy, is for closer British colonial relations and the greatness of the British Empire.
